Johnson asked for \$1 billion in new military assistance funds, but forecast actual 1965 outlays of \$1.2 billion because some money is left over from past years. He said about 70 per cent of U.S. military aid now goes to nine countries on the borders of the Soviet Union and Red China. Although the budget asked

for \$2.39 billion in new economic aid money, it forecast actual outlays of only \$2.15 billion during the year. This would be about \$50 million above estimated outlays for the current fiscal year.

A junior college can provide a general education for adults who are unable to go to a conventional college or university and can provide instruction for dropouts who need help in obtaining training for new jobs, thus taking them out of the problem bracket for society," he said. . . .

MUSGRAVES TRACED the state's junior college plan from its beginning at Decatur in 1898 until now, pointing out how the system has "grown out of being junior in the sense of the word."

The two-year college system, he declared, has reached a "big business and higher educational level" never obtained before and the idea is a "pure American form of

education." "Junior colleges did not come from across the ocean or from our pilgrims. It came from an idea born in the United States and since ex-

panded," he continued. Musgraves said that there was no other direction for the

By 1900 the tourist trade began to grow and Bar Harbor and Winter Harbor drew outsiders during the summer months. 


