

Burglary Prevention Week Observed in City

The Pampa Police Department in cooperation with other law enforcement authorities over the state are observing this week as Burglary Prevention Week in Pampa.

Police Chief Jim Conner said the week is intended to emphasize the seriousness of burglary and demonstrate how the public can help by observing a few simple methods to keep burglars out of their homes during the vacation months ahead.

There are two burglaries in the U.S.A. every minute, more than a million every year. Burglary is our nation's most common and fastest-growing crime, Chief Conner said.

"It's so simple to discourage prowlers," the Chief said. "Don't, for instance, broadcast your absence by letting papers and milk accumulate on your porch. And, don't make it easy for burglars by not locking doors and windows securely. If possible, get the police to make an occasional check of your house and grounds while you're away."

"Quite a few burglars specialize in looting houses left unguarded by vacationers. And once these burglars get in, they can burgle away to their hearts' content with little fear of embarrassing interruptions," said Chief Conner.

Here are a few tips from the Texas Police Association on how to prevent burglaries while you're away on vacation. Start by not using spring-type snap locks on your doors. Any amateur burglar can open such a lock with a piece of celluloid. Use the safe, "deadlock" bolt type of lock. Be certain that a sturdy pintumbler cylinder lock is on all exterior doors of your home.



Never leave a note in your mailbox, or in any of the other traditional places where a burglar will surely look for it. For extra protection, glass doors should be protected by double cylinder locks, requiring

keys on each side. Make certain that basement and second-story windows are just as securely locked as those on your first floor. Hook storm windows and screens from the inside.

Leave shades up and venetian blinds partially open to give your house a lived-in look. And you can obtain an inexpensive automatic timing device to turn lights on at dusk and off at your normal retiring time.

It is wise to keep a record of the serial numbers and descriptions of all your valuables. This will help the police to recover them in case you do have the misfortune to be robbed. If possible, store these records in a safe deposit box in your bank.

And, finally, advise nearby neighbors that you're leaving. Tell them to call the police in case they see any prowlers in or near your home.

Sky Diver Tries To Learn More Of Gravity Law

POINT ARGUELLO, Calif. (UPI)—Sky diver Lyle Cameron, 32, used a parachute and a movie camera Monday in a Galileo-like experiment to try to learn more about the law of gravity.

It was the first of a series of experiments being conducted by the University of California at Los Angeles (UCLA) and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA).

The two agencies hope that the research will aid in the launching of ballistic missiles.

The research began when Dr. Uri Shafir, a UCLA research geophysicist who is heading the experiments, discovered that a sphere falls in a cork-screw pattern rather than a straight line when descending in still air or water.

Galileo, of course, was supposed to have dropped two objects of different weights from the Tower of Pisa in Italy in an experiment that helped him conceive the three laws of motion.

Cameron, editor of Sky Diver magazine, jumped from a helicopter at 10,000 feet. As he dropped to earth, a camera attached to his helmet recorded the simultaneous descent of a 16-inch sphere also released from the helicopter. Ground cameras and radar also tracked the descent.

About 20 such sky diver experiments were scheduled from this Navy missile facility during the next few days. Each time the sphere will be dropped with a smoke grenade inside it to help track it.

Washington Window

Sen. Karl E. Mundt, R-S.D., has summoned the attorney general of some small state—any small state—to sue in a federal court for a new deal in the electoral college system of choosing presidents of the United States.

Sen. Thurston B. Morton, R-Ky., seconds Mundt's motion. Mundt and Morton seek relief from what Mundt terms the most flagrant violation of voting rights of individual citizens existing in the republic.

Morton and Mundt are confident that the Supreme Court would hold the present electoral college system to be in violation of the Constitution. Their confidence is based on last week's court ruling that both Houses of the legislature in individual states must be similarly representative of numbers of

people, in short, a one-man-one-vote rule.

State by state, the electors are chosen on a winner-take-all basis. A one-vote majority in New York state will deliver to a presidential candidate all of the state's 43 electoral votes. Mundt contrasted that situation with the objectives of the pending civil rights bill.

"The bloc system of voting in all state presidential elections as a unit in the electoral college in support of a presidential candidate scoring a bare majority of the votes of his state," Mundt told the Senate, "nullifies to a considerable degree the equity of provisions of this (civil rights) proposed legislation."

"The concept of one-citizen-one-vote is written out in the civil rights bill. Under the winner-take-all method of counting electoral votes, however, the winner gets not only the votes cast for him, but also the votes cast for his opponent. He literally can reach down into the polling places and steal every vote cast against him and have them added to his total as counted for in the Electoral College."

Mundt cited the massive influence of the big cities in determining the winner of the electoral votes of the big industrial states. And he cited the massive influence within those great cities of racial, labor and other pressure groups. These powerful minorities actually are enabled to veto or to select and to elect presidential nominees and to write political platforms and presidential policies. There results in great cities a kind of multiple voting.

Says Its Unfair

Mundt contends that this is unfair to small state voters. If some small state does not soon move to challenge the system in the courts, Mundt and Morton hope to get Congress moving on a resolution for a constitutional amendment. The project is pending in the Senate under the title Senate Joint Resolution 12.

S.J. 12 would provide for the choice of electors exactly as members of Congress are chosen: One from each congressional district and two at large as U.S. senators are elected from each state. This system would enfranchise the small state voters and rural voters in the big states who now are largely disenfranchised in the choice of a president.

The left of center or liberal congressional elements that sparked the 1963 civil rights bill are in general on record against extending the presidential vote right to the little guys in the small states and in the big state farms. The political power of these left of center or liberal congressional elements rests very largely on the big city pressure groups whose power would be clipped.

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Independent Oil Producers Are Suffering, Connally Says

BILLINGS, Mont. (UPI)—Two speakers—the governor of Texas and a spokesman for 30,000 independent oil producers—highlighted the plight of the independents before the Interstate Oil Compact Commission today.

Texas Gov. John Connally said that while the industry as a whole reported record earnings, independent operators were suffering because of rising costs, falling crude oil prices, shrinking allowables, increasing oil imports, and an uncertain market for the oil they can produce.

He suggested that even if imports cannot be reduced substantially now, certain adjustments should be made within the existing framework of import controls. He sharply criticized certain economists and theoreticians who advocate closing down hundreds of thousands of oil wells that have small output and thus putting thousands of independent opera-

tors out of business.

An even stronger worded statement was delivered during an "open forum" by J. A. Mull Jr., chairman of the liaison committee of cooperating oil and gas associations. He said his group represents 26 associations in 23 states with a total membership of more than 30,000 independent oil producers.

Mull said the independents are the "poor relations" of the oil industry who need attention in the war against poverty. He accused major integrated oil companies of grasping for higher profits each year and of being willing to see the United States become completely dependent on foreign crude oil.

Mull said factors contributing to the problems of independent oil producers included rising import levels, ever-increasing cost, the administration of oil import quotas, certain pipeline and purchasing practices of integrated major companies, and high allowables for offshore

production in the Gulf of Mexico.

He urged both major political parties to discuss oil imports and related matters and to make their positions known in the 1964 platforms.

He said independent producers are interested in dealing with a bill on the regulation of natural gas, but not until the imports problem has been solved.

Walter Rogers Reports GI Bill of Rights Was Long-range Planning

Twenty years ago, American GI's were consolidating their foothold in Normandy, battling north of Rome in Italy, pressing the South Pacific campaign against the Japanese. On June 22, 1944, President Roosevelt signed into law the "GI Bill of Rights," a measure approved unanimously by both houses of Congress and surely one of the most historic legislative measures ever enacted. Its impact was great on millions of veterans and their families — and on our national way of life.

More than 16,500,000 Americans were eventually under arms in World War II. Although the war was a long way from won in 1944, the people, their Congress, and leaders of veterans' organizations recognized the need to provide a program serving as a buffer against possible economic and social chaos in the post-war period.

In 1944, public opinion was near-unanimous in its support for the "Servicemen's Readjustment Act," as the GI Bill was formally titled. Americans could envision the prospect of a million men a month passing through separation centers and heading for home. It was apparent that the veterans would face an uncertain economy as production. Could the post-war industry retooled to peacetime productions. Could the post-war economy absorb them? It could and it did. Private industry, responding to five years of pent-up demand for consumer goods, was to convert from defense to peacetime production in a much more orderly manner than many pessimists had thought possible. And the readjustment, loan, and educational benefits provided by the GI Bill helped the national conversion from wartime to peacetime in ways that historians and economists have not yet fully assessed.

The education and training programs of the GI Bill cost approximately \$14.1 billion. It is estimated that veterans trained under the GI Bill, because of the increased skills and education they have attained, will return to the Treasury — in taxes — twice and perhaps three times that amount.

The GI Bill is perhaps best known for the educational benefits provided. More than 7,800,000 World War II veterans — nearly half of all those who served — took some form of training under the GI Bill. Of the total enrolled in the program, 2.2 million attended colleges and universities; 3.5 million went to schools below col-

lege level; 1.4 million participated in on-the-job training; 700,000 underwent on-the-job training.

With the Nation's high-gear economy still critically short in some areas of skills and with our unemployment problems centered on workers who are primarily unskilled, it is interesting to speculate whether our economic advance could have been made without the enormous reservoir of manpower trained under the GI Bill. By categories, the United States gained 450,000 engineers; 180,000 doctors, dentists, and nurses; 360,000 school teachers; 150,000 scientists; 107,000 lawyers; 243,000 accountants; 36,000 clergymen of all faiths; 711,000 mechanics; 383,000 construction workers; 288,000 metalworkers; 138,000 electricians and 700,000 who trained for business and executive careers.

One out of every five single-family houses built in the United States since the end of World War II has been financed by the GI loan program for either World War II or Korean War veterans. Of the 28 million home-owner properties in the country, 16 million are mortgaged properties and about 22 percent are financed with Veterans Administration GI loans. In all, more than 5,268,000 GI loans were made to World War II veterans to purchase homes, farms, or businesses — and the record of repayment has been excellent. The GI loan program made a vital contribution to home-ownership in this country.

The GI Bill is a historic example of long-range planning in the national interest.

Foreign Commentary

Dr. Francois Duvalier took his path of office as lifetime president of Haiti this week to the beat of voodoo bongo drums, and if he cast a sardonic eye in the direction of Washington there was reason for it. Since May of 1961, stopping only short of armed intervention, the United States has missed few opportunities to express its displeasure with Duvalier's anti-democratic regime. By its silence, the United States this week gave tacit recognition to reality.

In the rain-soaked streets of Port Au Prince, Haiti's capital, dancers performed to the music of flutes and the jungle drums in officially proclaimed "popular rejoicing." Duvalier's 10,000-man blue-uniformed militia, marching in close-order drill provided positive proof of who was the man in charge. It was not that the United States loved Duvalier more or that his rule was any less oppressive. It was the proven fact that Duvalier had survived not only U.S. pressures, but two outside invasion attempts and terrorism at home as well. And no successor was in sight.

Duvalier, a 57-year-old doctor-turned-dictator, came to office in 1957 in an election which his opponents even then declared was fraudulent. In 1961, with two years still to go, he entered his name upon a legislative election list and announced that the results had

electd him to office for six more years. On Sunday, June 14 of this year, Haiti's voters were called upon once more to cast ballots which only one in 10 could read. It was to ratify a new constitution which named Duvalier president for life. Duvalier rules over a French speaking nation of around four million persons. It once was so rich that it supplied half the income of French King Louis IV but now is so poor that its average annual consumption per person is figured at around \$8. At the root of Duvalier's power is his 10,000-man militia which Haitians call "tonton macoute", or, translated from the Creole, "bogeymen." The name is not without meaning for the "bogeymen" have the power to maim, torture or kill almost without question. They also have the power to collect "voluntary" contributions from peasants and terrified businessmen. Over the ignorant peasant, Duvalier wields a special power for his own reported knowledge of the magic of voodoo. Into Haiti from 1946 to mid-1962, the United States poured around \$100 million in outright grants and loans. It was a bottomless well. In 1962 all there was to show for it was a small dam, some road repair and some progress in eliminating the tropical yaws. For the United States the problem was a familiar one. It could continue its pressures against Duvalier, including the continued elimination of U.S. aid. But at the same time it also would contribute to the misery of the Haitian people. This is the reality which the United States has accepted.





1 tsp vanilla
1 tsp. lemon extract
Cream sugar and shortening; add eggs and cream well. Sift together flour, salt and baking powder. Add dry ingredients alternately with milk and vanilla and lemon extract. Cream well. Bake in two nine inch pans; greased and floured, in moderate

oven, 350 degrees.
APRICOT FILLING
2 cups dried apricots
1 1/2 cups powdered sugar
2 Tblsps. corn starch
1/4 tsp. salt
5 bananas
2 Tblsps. lemon juice
Coconut
Cook dried apricots; run through sieve. Combine powdered sugar, corn starch and salt. Stir into apricot pulp and cook over double boiler for 10 minutes. Add diced bananas and cook five minutes longer. Stir while cooking. Add lemon juice. While cooling, beat until bananas are thoroughly blended into mixture. When cool, spread between layers, on top and sides of cake. Sprinkle with coconut.

TO CATCH A FALLING STAR—The National Aeronautics and Space Administration and the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory have put into full operation a seven-state, midwestern network to photograph meteors. Newsmap spots the 16 unmanned automatic camera stations. Photos of the meteor trails will be used for scientific studies and to track and recover any meteorites that might hit the earth. Field headquarters for the project, called Prairie Network, is in Lincoln, Neb. Total area covered by the camera network is more than 2.5 billion acres.

Catholic Church Studies Birth Control Problem

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—Pope Paul VI said today the Roman Catholic Church is actively studying the "extremely serious problem" of birth control. But he said so far he finds no grounds for changing church policy, which includes a total ban—on artificial contraceptives.

In one of the major speeches of his year-old pontificate, the Pope spoke before 26 cardinals on the eve of his name day, the Feast of St. John the Baptist. He covered subjects ranging from Christian unity to world peace.

The discussion of birth control came at a time when the

subject is the topic of lively debate within the Catholic Church, especially over the use of newly-developed contraceptive pills.

The Pope, in the first statement he has made on the subject, said the question of birth control "is being considered as amply and deeply as possible, and we hope soon to conclude these studies with the collaboration of many distinguished scholars."

"But, meanwhile," he warned, "we frankly say that so far we have no sufficient motive to consider surmounted, and therefore not compulsory, the rules given out by Pope Pius XII in this regard."

The Pope said that when current studies are completed, "we will therefore soon put forth the conclusions in the forms which will be considered more adequate on the subject dealt with and to the target to be achieved."

Thus, he said, the teachings laid down by the late Pope Pius XII that no artificial contraceptives may be used "must be considered valid, at least until that time when we conscientiously will feel obliged to change them."

"In a subject of such gravity it appears good that Catholics should follow a single law, such as the church of authority proposes and it seems therefore opportune to recommend that nobody for the time being take upon himself to pronounce himself in terms that are different from the existing rule."

UPI religion editor Louis Cassels writes from Washington:

Pope Paul's statement evidently is intended to put the quietus on public controversy among Catholic theologians and prelates over the moral acceptability of progesterone pills, which prevent conception by suppressing ovulation.

Catholic leaders in Belgium and Holland have been contending that the pills may be a "natural" method of birth control which the church can condone, along with the so-called rhythm method. But most moral theologians in the United States have argued that the progesterone pills fall within the artificial contraceptive category which was condemned by Pope Pius XII.

The British hierarchy has taken the same line, and issued a public statement last month pronouncing use of the pills for birth control an immoral act.

What Pope Paul said today, in effect, was that the pills are out—for the present.

But, perhaps significantly, he did not say that the church would never approve the pills. He simply called for obedience to the rules laid down by Pius XII—in effect, limiting Catholics to the rhythm method—"at least until that time when we conscientiously will feel obliged to change them."

The whole tone of the Pope's statement was one of suspending judgment, keeping the door open. He did say frankly that "so far" he has found "no sufficient motive" for modifying the church's teaching.

But he certainly did not rule out the hopes, voiced publicly by such high-ranking prelates as Leo Cardinal Suenens of Belgium, that research may soon produce a pill that the church could condone. (Moral theologians have suggested that there would be no objection, for example, to a pill which regulated ovulation, making the rhythm method reliable, rather than suppressing ovulation entirely as do currently available progesterone compounds.)

15 Astronauts Plan Visit to Central America

BALBOA, C.Z. (UPI) — Fifteen American astronauts planned a visit today to a tribe of Choco Indians on the Chagres River, a preview of their three-day stay in the jungle with bare survival gear.

The astronauts, 14 of whom just joined the tiny group of U.S. spacemen last Feb. 3, came to this Central American country for jungle survival training.

If they are ever forced to land in the jungle while on a manned orbital flight, they supposedly will know how to stay alive with a minimum of gear and live off the land.

America's orbital flights criss cross the earth's tropical regions.

After the visit to the Indian village, the 15 will go into the jungle and stay there until Friday.

They will brave the jungle rainy season, now heading into full swing; deadly fer-de-lance snakes; and the continuous nighttime din of jungle sounds, not to mention jaguars and boa constrictors.

Standard procedure for jungle survival training in the past here has been for the Army to pay a bounty to local Indians for caps of trainees.

The Indians stalk the fledgling jungle men and have been known to swing down out of trees and snatch their caps to collect the bounty, adding to the pressures on the already jittery trainees.

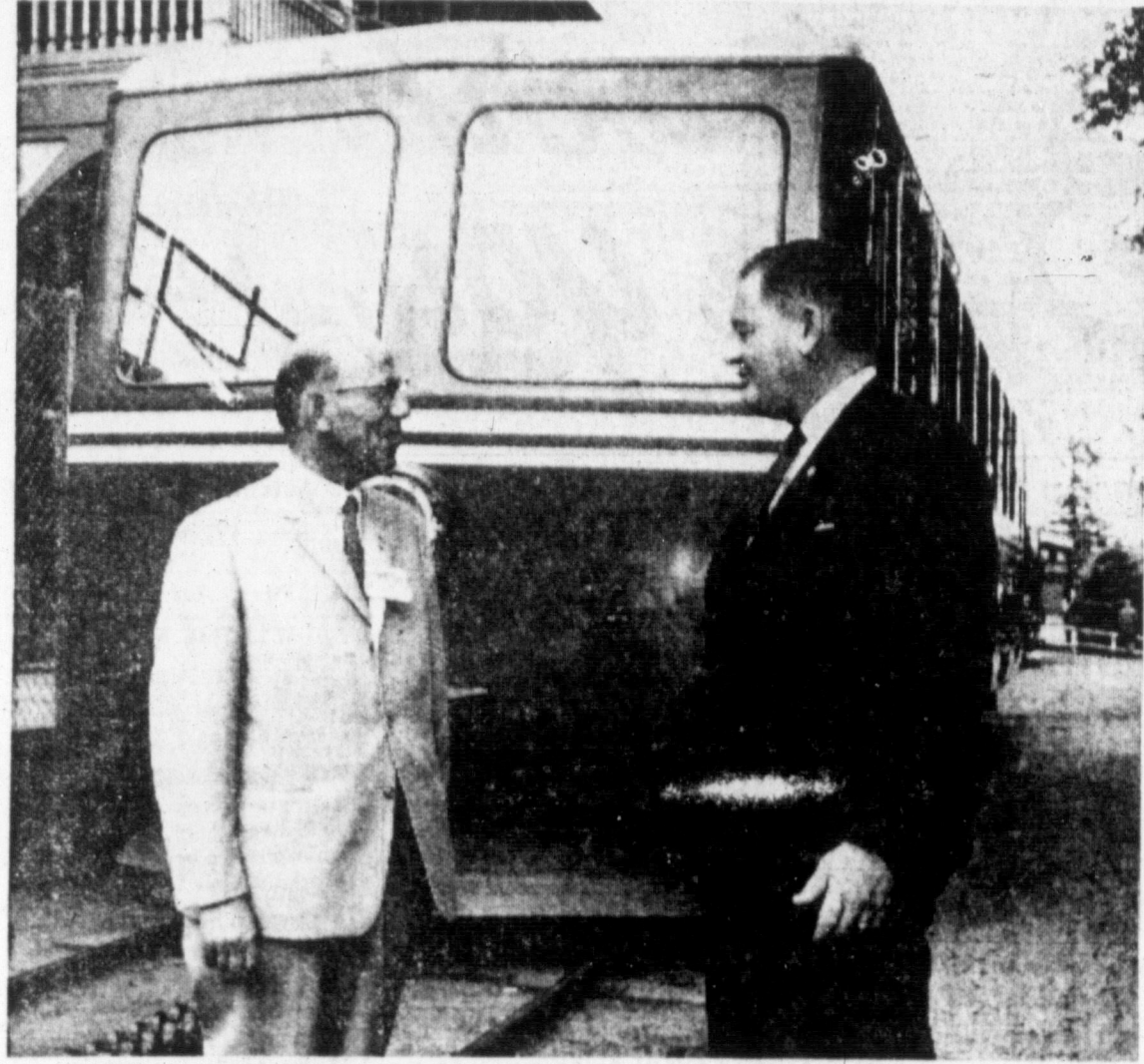

Californian Discusses Smog With Houston

HOUSTON (UPI) — Eyes watering. Throat burning. Nose assaulted.

In some cities—but particularly Los Angeles—smog. In others, just plain old dirty air, the result of an industrial "smokestack and exhaust pipe" society.

A group of men whose aim is to clean up that air are meeting here. They are members of the Air Pollution Control Association.

They heard Monday from S. Smith Griswold, the air pollution control officer for Los Angeles county, where smog as a civic problem gets more attention than it does in most other U.S. cities.

Griswold pointed a finger at auto makers. He said they developed devices years ago that would cut down the amount of air pollution from car exhausts, but just haven't made them available.

But he pointed out that California is on the verge of a breakthrough. State laws requiring anti-pollution devices on autos will begin going into effect soon, starting with new cars and gradually taking in older and older used cars.

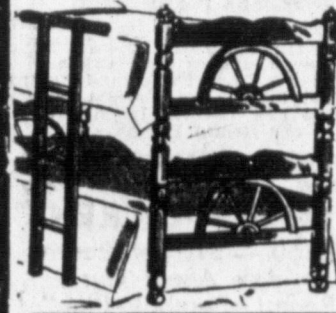
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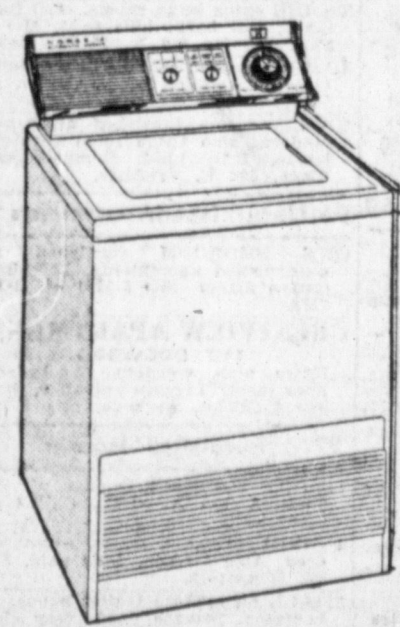
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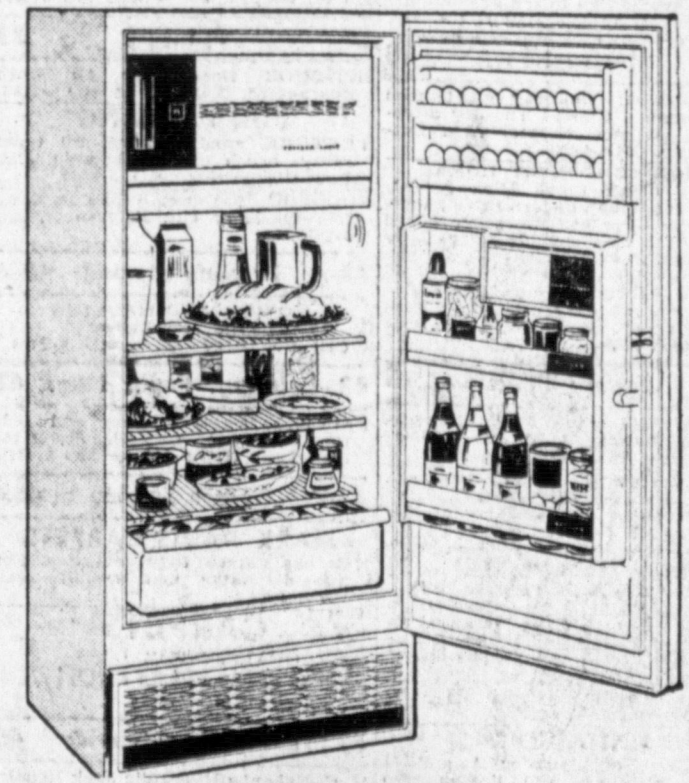
