By GAYNOR MADDOX The fun season of outdoor cooking is now in full swing. It can also be the season of good eating, as any self-respecting outdoor chef will tell you. So let's try something new like this combination of lamb and pineapple on skewers.

PINEAPPLE LAMB, ISLANDER (6 servings) 4 pounds boned leg of lamb 1 (1 pound 412 ounce) can pineapple slices 1/4 cup lemon juice 1/4 cup wine vinegar 1/4 cup catsup 1/2 cup sauterne or lemon and water 3 tablespoons cooking oil 1 tablespoon prepared mustard 2 teaspoons seasoned salt 1/2 teaspoon oregano

2 sprigs mint or 1 teaspoon

dried mint 2 cloves garlic 12 small white onions, parboiled or canned 12 small plum tomatoes Trim fat from lamb, cut meat into 11/2-inch chunks. Drain 1/2 cup syrup from pineapple and combine with lemon juice, vinegar, catsup, wine, oil, mustard, salt and oregano. Add bruised mint sprigs or dried mint and cut garlic cloves. Combine with lamb, cover and refrigerate several hours or overnight. When ready to barbecue, discard mint and garlic. Thread 4 or 5 lamb cubes on each skewer. Grill over hot coals until meat is crusty and brown on outside and faintly

pink inside. Brush frequently with marinade and turn often for even cooking. When meat is almost done, push cubes together to-




BARBECUED LAMB and pineapple on skewers are delicious.

ward upper end of skewer. Thread quartered pineapple slices on end of skewer and grill a few minutes until heated and browned. Thread onions and tomatoes on separate skewers, grill, brushing with marinade, until heated and tinged with brown.

Additional skewers to take care of the vegetable selection are made by threading white onions and small whole tomatoes together. Brush with the same zesty marinade as they join the lamb 'n' pineapple skewers for a few minutes' heating.





Houston Woman Wins Damage Suit **Over** Arrest



Laos and in South Viet Nam some of its critics say too restrained - the United States has clearly shown it does not want a head-on clash with Red China, although it remains committed to protect the independence of both Laos and South Viet Nam. The Red Chinese are doing

all right as they are through methods of infiltration and encouragement of guerrilla warfare carried on by elements of the Laotian and Vietnamese populations at small cost to themselves.

Moscow, forced by ideological considerations to support Communist regimes, has no interest in helping the Red Chinese feather their nests in an area where the Chinese already have usurped most of Moscow's influence.

The details of these suggestions may not become apparent But the nature and backor weeks or months to come. ground of the problem make it possible to forecast a probable ine of thinking.

The short-range problem is to estore a semblance of neutrality to Laos and to convince the Communist North Vietnamese and Chinese that they cannot win in South Viet Nam.

The longer-range problem involves the probabilities and the possibilities within the Communist world itself.

Whistling In Dark Both the Russians and the Chinese have said that, despite their own family quarrel, an attack upon either would bring them together in a common defense. For the Red Chinese this may be whistling in the dark. Denied Russian support, with out nuclear weapons and with an obsolete air force, the Red Chinese are in no shape to fight a major war. And there remains the possiblity that some day the two Communist giants might decide to destroy each other. In such an event there could

be no profit for the United States in a head-on collision with the Red Chinese now. The advantage would lie in a holding operation, and through economic and military aid an attempt to bolster wavering South Vietnamese 212 N. BALLARD
