Industrial Foundation To Raise \$200,000

Oilman Appointed To Head Campaign

An industrial foundation program was approved today by Pampa businessmen and a Pampa oilman was named to lead the drive to raise some \$200,000 in development funds. The action came at a meeting of businessmen, Chamber of Commerce directors, city officials and industrial development committee members at the Coronado Inn. Fred J. Neslage accepted the chairmanship of the drive and told businessmen "this is where you sink or swim." Neslage was named by unanimous vote of the some 75-100 persons present in the Starlight Inn room of the hotel. Belli Uses Sixth Juror Challenge

DALLAS (UPI)—The defense at Jack Ruby's murder trial was forced to throw out a prospective juror today when the judge cut off questioning about bias in Dallas. Defense attorney Melvin Belli used up the sixth of his 15 peremptory challenges to dismiss Bill Bohannon, a traveling salesman for the Lone Star Steel Co., in questioning that drew a stream of prosecution objections. With one juror picked Thursday, both sides now have refused to accept a total of 29 veniremen. The prosecution has used only one of its peremptory challenges. Judge Joe Brown had under advisement Belli's request for additional peremptory challenges. Belli had set today as the deadline for proving his contention that Dallas feels so guilty it cannot give the slayer of Lee Harvey Oswald a fair trial. Sustains Objections Brown sustained objections to questions such as whether Bohannon found in his travels bias against Ruby. Questions as to whether Dallas is the proper place to try the 53-year-old striptease club operator drew another round of objections. They were sustained.

Former Pampa Man Sentenced in Dallas

A 57-year-old Pampa former tavern operator and bookie Jesse E. Mayes was sentenced this morning before Federal Judge Joe Estes in Dallas. He pleaded guilty February 17 to a federal tax charge of willfully failing to file wagering excise tax returns for the month of November, 1962. The former owner and operator of the Pampa Club in Pampa was sentenced by Judge Estes to pay a \$300 fine and committed to the custody of the attorney general for one year. Execution of the sentence was deferred one year. Execution of the fine was deferred 30 days. Mayes was arrested on Dec. 1, 1962 during a raid on the Pennant Club by Internal Revenue agents. A criminal information was filed against Mayes on May 22, 1963. The charges stated that Mayes had been in the business of accepting wagers during the fiscal years 1961, 1962 and 1963 without having purchased a wagering occupational stamp, and that Mayes willfully failed to file a wagering excise tax return for the ten per cent excise tax on wagers accepted during November 1962.

Radio Blamed For Shooting

DALLAS (UPI)—Politics had nothing to do with her attempt to shoot radio executive Gordon McLendon, according to Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Stone, 47. She told newsmen Thursday that tunes played by disc jockeys on station KLIF, which McLendon owns, led to her decision to shoot McLendon. It turned out that Mrs. Stone mistook another man at Dallas Love Field airport for McLendon and a .32-caliber shot was wide. No one was hurt, but Mrs. Stone was charged with assault with intent to murder. Police said Mrs. Stone has asked to see a psychiatrist, and would do so. The woman said she did not know McLendon was a political candidate. He opposes U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough. Dallas is in the May 2 Democratic primary. "I decided I had to shoot McLendon to alert the world to the conspiracy... of a gang of hundreds of people who put red ribbons on their cars as an identification mark. "I wouldn't have regretted it if I had killed him. But I don't think there is a great need now to shoot him. I have served my purpose." McLendon asked for an investigation of Mrs. Stone's "complete background." He said he wanted to know if there was any political motivation, and if she was a left-winger.

Canadian Dam Job Ahead of Schedule

A progress report on the Canadian River Dam project was given to members of the Canadian Waterworks and Sewerage Association at a dinner meeting here Thurs. night. Vern O. Grantham, assistant project construction engineer, said the dam project is running slightly ahead of its construction schedule. Grantham discussed various construction phases and stressed importance of the economic impact recreational facilities at the lake site will have on the Panhandle area. Tribute was paid to Grantham to the late C. A. Hart, former mayor of Pampa, and to the late A. A. Meredith of Ranger, former head of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority. Grantham pointed out the important roles both men played in the dam project's early stages. The Canadian Waterworks and Sewerage Association is comprised of city employees from 11 Panhandle towns and cities. Delegates were present at the meeting in Ruston, Goldsboro and Pampa. Sherman, Rock, Canadian, Ferris, Darwell, Wheeler and Polk. The Pampa delegation was headed by Mayor H. R. Young, City Public Works Director R. S. Sex Scandal Hits Fireman

NEW YORK (UPI)—The New York City Fire Department today notified a red hot sex scandal in the firehouse of Engine Company 35. The engine company "blaze" already has resulted in the suspension from duty of a captain and four firemen. The firefighters were formally charged with misconduct and combining visits to the red brick firehouse of women "allegedly of ill repute." One report said the women were prostitutes who charged a basic \$5 rate not only for sex but neighborhood friends of the firefighters. It was said that the top floor of the three-story firehouse was the center of activities. Fire Commissioner Edward Thompson ordered the men to stand departmental trial within the next two weeks.

Big Stink' Makes For Clean Floors

There was a "big stink" at city hall this morning, but it wasn't a fuss between officials. Windows and doors were sealed off in police headquarters while employees attempted to keep from breathing the "big stink." The doors had been mopped with heavy duty ammonia. The odor from the clean floors caused the "big stink" but officers declared the shiny gloss left was worth a not breathing for a while.

Bullets Miss Turkish Chief

ANKARA, Turkey (UPI)—Turkish Premier Ismet Inonu today escaped an assassination attempt by a man who said he opposed the 1960 revolution that brought the present regime to power. A man identified as Mesut Sinay, 32, fired three shots at the 70-year-old premier as he entered his car to drive to the National Assembly. The shots struck the car but missed Inonu. A soldier fired at Sinay and he was missed. There was an unconfirmed report a second man had been arrested. When he refused, she was taken away. Milwaukee police planned to bring charges against him today. Waukesha County charged him in connection with the escape Thursday.

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MILWAUKEE SHOTGUN Armed Man Terrorizes School

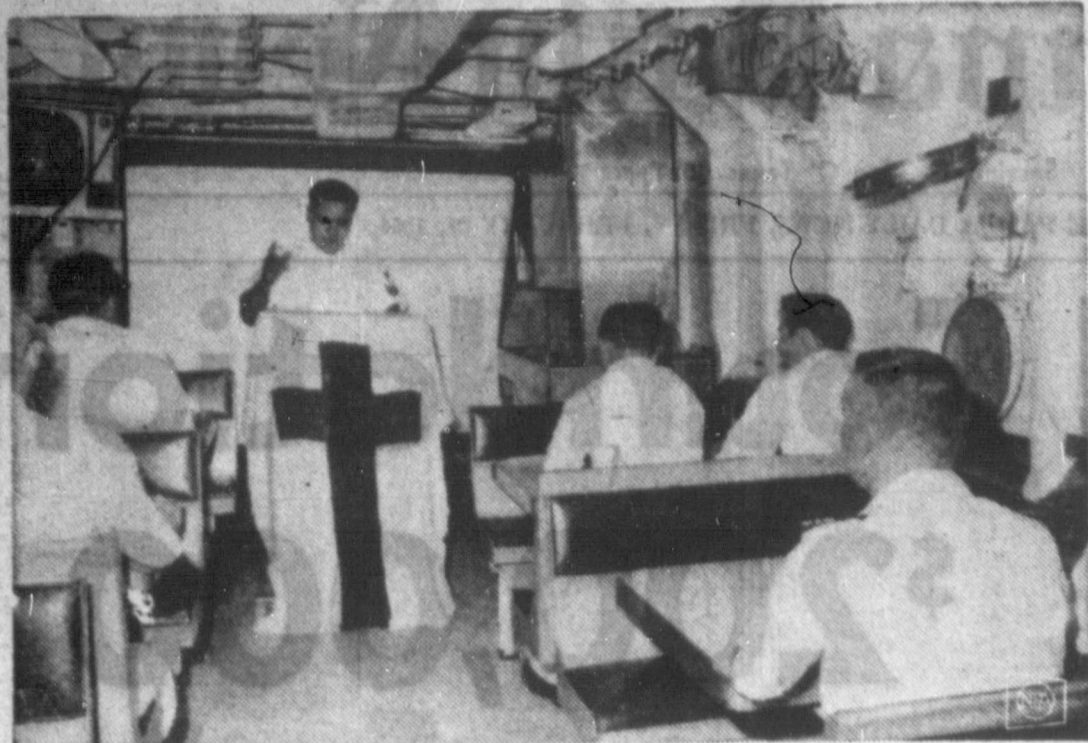
MILWAUKEE, Wis. (UPI)—The footstep clicked down the long, steely quiet corridors of Audubon Junior High School occasionally they stopped in front of a door. Then they moved on again. It was one of the longest hours of Principal Phillip H. Geil's 63 years as he matched step for step with an angry man waving a shotgun. And during the whole trek of fear, Geil placed himself between the young man and the classrooms to protect the children inside. Demands Girl's Release For that hour the entire building turned off, doors locked, his echoing to the footsteps of eight men as Robert Reiswitz, 18, Milwaukee, held the principal and six policemen at bay. The terror began when Reiswitz walked into the principal's office with the gun and demanded that his 15-year-old girl friend be released from class so he could "drive her to California." Geil refused. The youth leveled the shotgun at him and ordered him into the corridor outside the school office. Other school personnel called police, shut off the dismissal bells and on the public address system broadcast an alarm and warning to lock classroom doors. Geil and the boy paced the corridors, the boy peering through windows in search of his girl. At one point school authorities brought the girl out to plead with Reiswitz to surrender.

TASCOSA, Tex. (UPI)—Tough little Cal Farley says let the penologists and sociologists go hang. Trust kids, he believes, and don't expect any miracles.

Farley is a short man with a nose that veers to the right, a souvenir of his days as a pro boxer, and wrestler. When he talks, he leans back and hikes a leg over an arm of his leather chair.

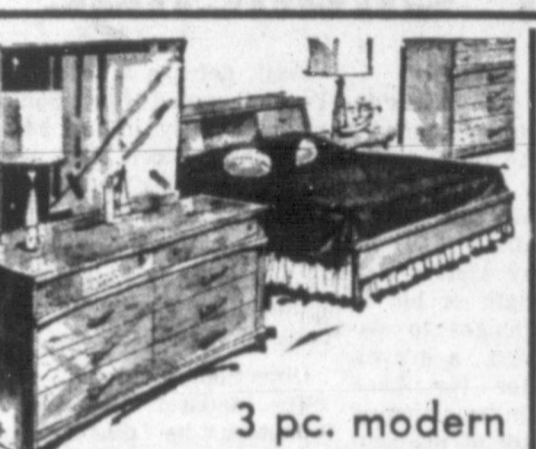

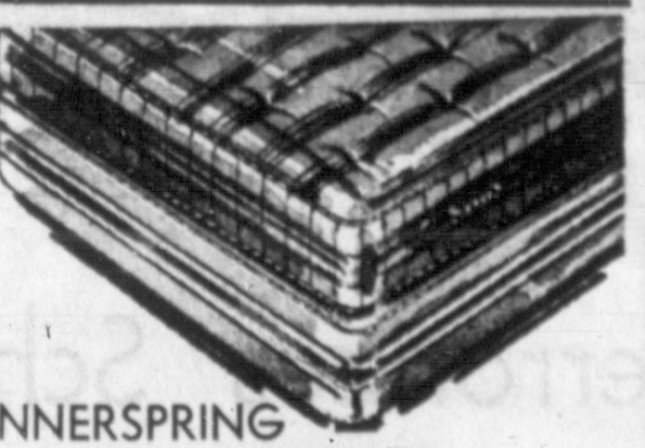

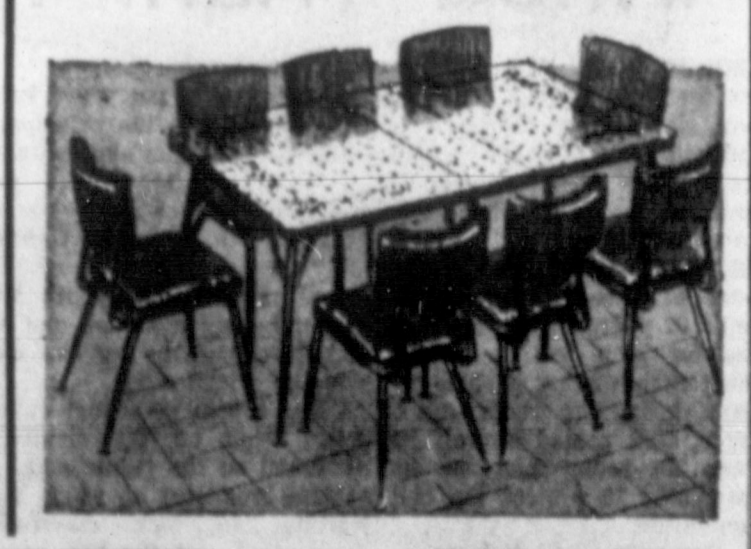

(Continued From Page 1) or repair any building or improvement for the use of any manufacturing, industrial, scientific, educational or business enterprise in Pampa or vicinity, and to accumulate and lend money for these purposes.

15 Directors Culberson said the corporation is not organized for profit or personal gain and this statement is covered in the charter to be presented in Austin.

He said that the foundation would have 15 directors, who will be elected by shareholders at a one vote for every \$25 subscription into the foundation.

Culberson said a temporary group of directors had been named, but the actual election of a full-time group would be forthcoming within 90 days.

He explained that in the work to obtain the Form-O-Uth plant in Pampa, three men, Aubrey Steele, Ed Myatt and Culberson, purchased a total of 26.5 acres of land on which the garment plant would be located, leaving 21.5 acres to be developed as an industrial site.

He said that the funds for the purchase were made available through Pampa banks because "they believed in this project and wanted to help."

The land was purchased for \$25,000 and the deeds signed Thursday in a meeting at Wichita Falls, he said, attended by Don Cain and Myatt.

"We are obligated to \$125,000 for purchase of the land and construction of the building for Form-O-Uth. It is our hope to see this amount, plus enough to

Sea Survivors Head for Port NEW YORK (UPI) — Gary craft headed for port today with 20 survivors and the dead captain from the storm-battered British freighter Ambassador, leaving at sea 14 missing seamen, presumably drowned.

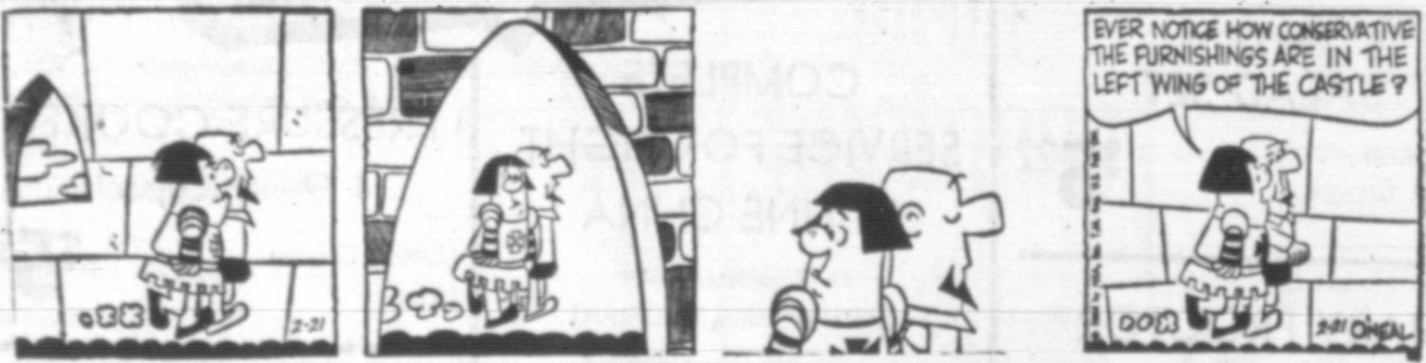

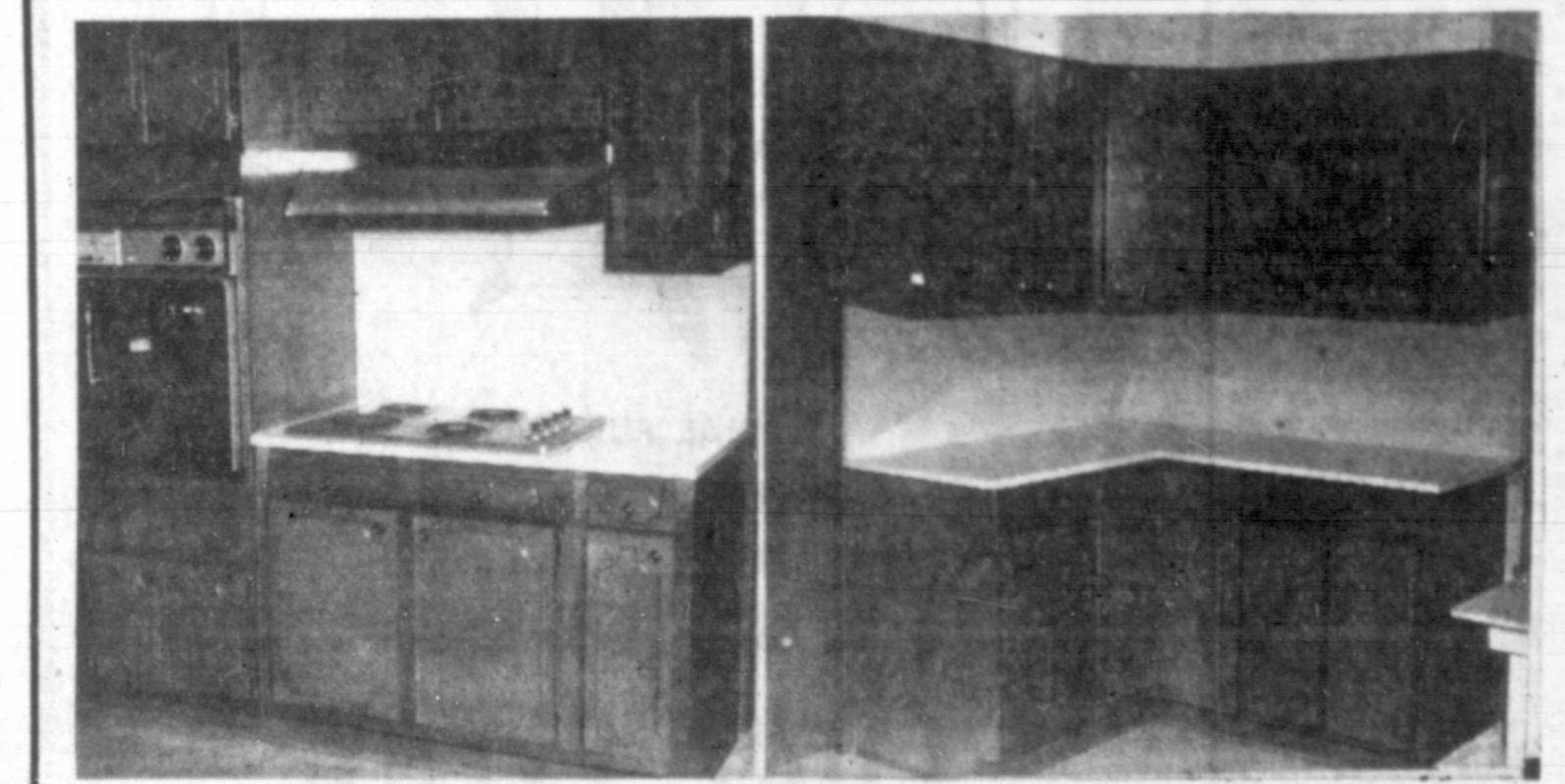

Scranton New Target In Presidential War

New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller and Arizona Sen. Barry M. Goldwater belabored each other's views Wednesday while organized labor trained its guns on another GOP presidential possibility — Pennsylvania Gov. William W. Scranton.

Rockefeller flew to New Hampshire to begin yet another campaign swing through the state with the nation's first presidential preference primary.

Already on the vote-seeking trail in New Hampshire were Goldwater and former Minnesota Gov. Harold E. Stassen, who arrived Monday night. In remarks prepared for delivery at Rochester, N.H., Wednesday, Rockefeller said

that the so-called "voluntary" Social Security system suggested by Goldwater was "unworkable" and would "bankrupt the Social Security system."

"Social Shambles" Rockefeller said Goldwater's notion would create a "social shambles" instead of Social Security and "take away the protection of our senior citizens."

Far away from New Hampshire's frigid hills, in Miami Beach, the AFL-CIO high command launched a sharp attack on Scranton and accused him of attempting to "sabotage" the unemployment insurance system through his proposals to trim jobs benefit rolls.

The attack on Scranton came in a resolution adopted by the labor federation's 29-man executive council Tuesday. AFL-CIO President George Meany said he doubted Scranton ever would receive endorsement for political office in light of his recent recommendations for revamping Pennsylvania's jobless payment program.

Hits McNamara's Stand
Goldwater's fire was concentrated principally on Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara during a busy round of speeches and handshaking tours Tuesday at Lebanon, N.H.

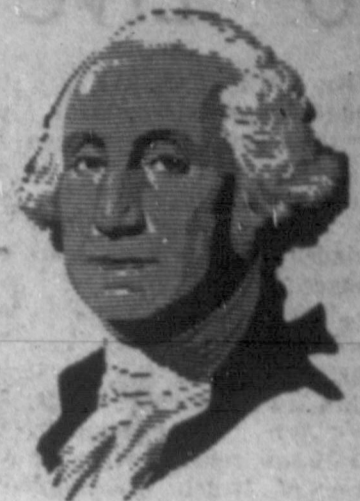
He termed "stupid" McNamara's statement that U.S. missiles are more reliable than the nation's bombers. Goldwater said the statement showed that McNamara was placing more faith in an untested weapon than one that has been tried, like bombers.

But later in the day at Newport, N.H., he defended his recent statement that the United States should send a detachment of Marines into Cuba to restore the Guantanamo naval base's water supply.

Rockefeller had criticized the statement as "reckless." "Was it reckless to send an entire fleet out to protect ourselves during the missile crisis?" Goldwater said. "I do not think so."

He called for a return to the "speak softly but carry a big stick" policies of President Theodore Roosevelt.

 It was Jesus Christ, however, who gave men the most succinct statement of what it means to be righteous.

One day a lawyer came to Him, and asked:
 "Teacher, what is the great commandment in the law?"
 Jesus answered without hesitation:
 "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the great and first commandment."
 "And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself."
 "On these two commandments depend all the law and the prophets."

Once in a great while, a teacher has managed to sum up the demands of the moral law in a few memorable words.
 The Ten Commandments, which Moses transmitted to the children of Israel, represents one of the first and best of these summations. But it is by no means the only one in the Bible.

"Red Runs the River," the Civil War production of "Unusual Films," of Bob Jones University will be shown at Skellytown Community Church at 7:30 p.m. Saturday.

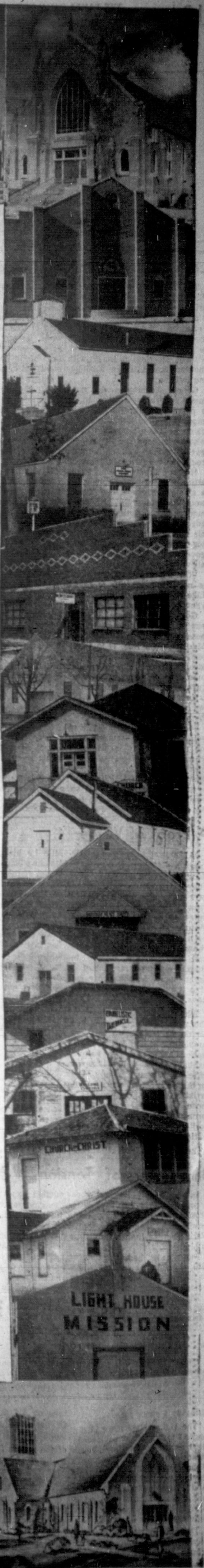

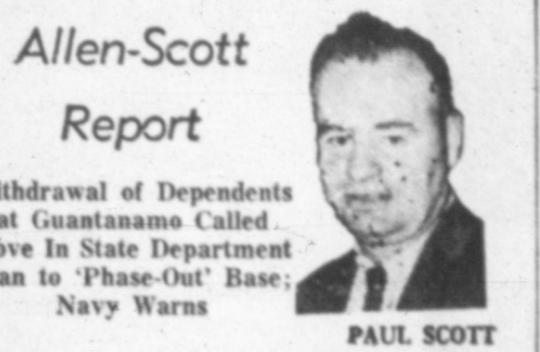

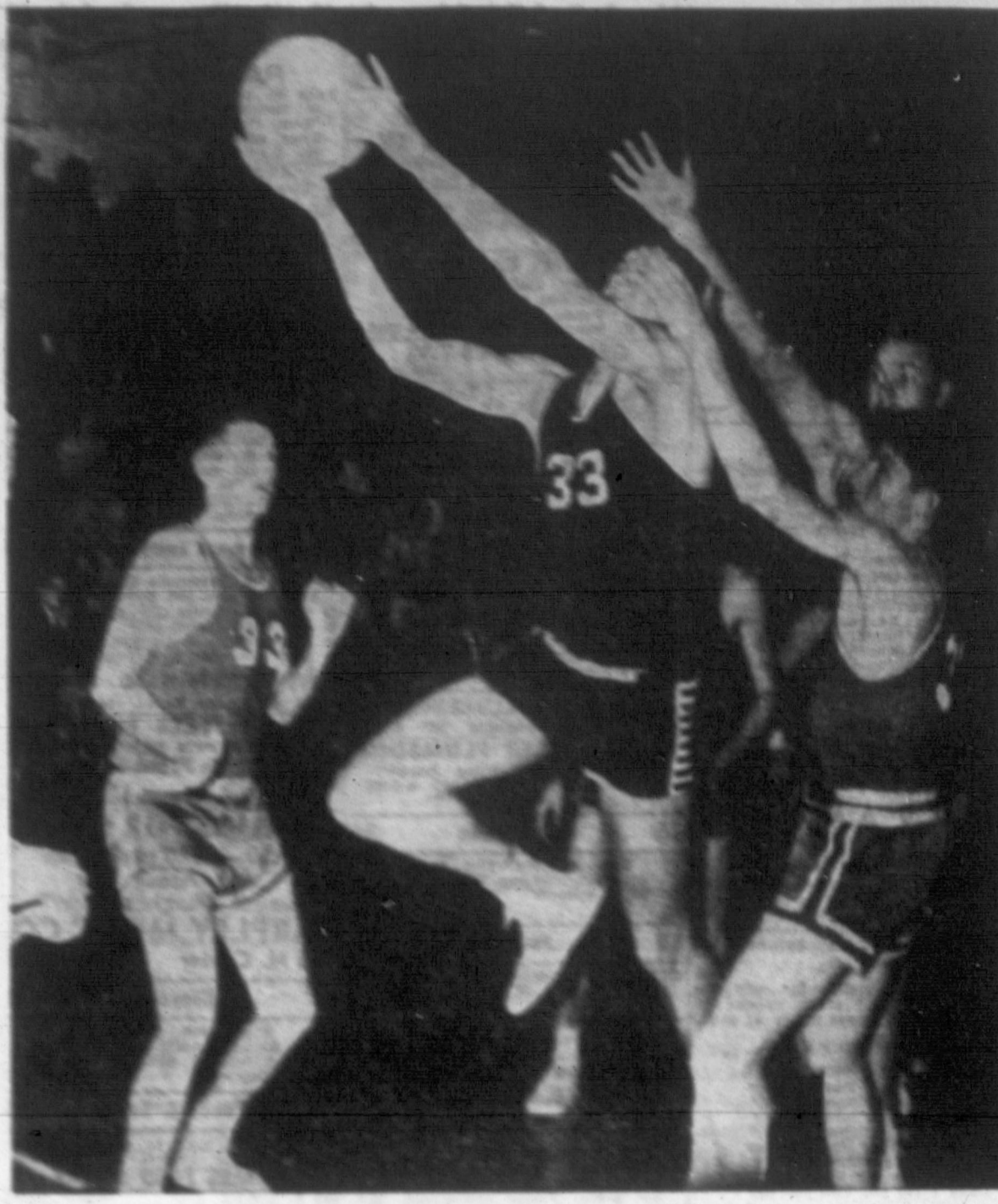

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Officers Ride 'Lonely Road' In Effort to Honor Badge

It is 3 a.m.

The telephone on the night-stand jangles, once, twice, three times. Automatically a hand reaches from the bed and lifts the receiver.

A voice on the other end unhappily says, "I hate to wake you, but there's been an accident between Pampa and Lefors. You want the call?"

And one of the Texas Highway Patrolmen from the Pampa district mutters yes and crawls out of a warm bed to ride the lonely road to Lefors.

The "lonely road" is a better description of a policeman's life than the highway between Pampa and the Gray County community of Lefors.

EVENTS OF THE recent weeks in several Top O' Texas communities has brought attention from all walks of life on that "lonely road" — a law enforcement officer travels every day.

The 3 a.m. telephone call happens often in the lives of highway patrolmen all over the state — they grow to expect a call at any time because of the continuous war on highway mishaps and death they are fighting.

City policemen are in a little different picture, but they too drive "the lonely road."

Pampa and Gray County officers work 24 hours a day to protect the public, if possible, and city officers are on duty around the clock to do the same.

This is done for an average of \$350 per month, counting city salaries and state salaries with a happy medium selected.

WHO ARE THESE men and what do they do?

The average law enforcement officer is a typical person who is married and has at least two children. He attends church and Sunday school as often as possible, tries to be active in civic affairs and holds a deep urge to protect the public.

The officer is a guy who takes things to heart, but tries not to show his emotions when they are tried by some tragic event.

Pampa area officers face things like this: An average of 12 fight calls every weekend.

Wrestling with an over-abundance of drunks during a pay weekend.

Working some 15-20 accidents per week and then getting up from their beds to come to court, in an effort to assist prosecutors trying a case.

HELPING CHANGE somebody's tire, pushing another car or two off by hand, working through the mud, snow and sleet to get nurses to the hospital, workers to home and generally help clear the streets so that city employes may shovel the snow away from streets.

The duties range from bouncing along rough streets

and alleyways checking buildings, bars and occasionally running a parked car with a couple of young "sprouts" home.

High Patrolmen drive the long stretches of highways around Pampa, trying to prevent accidents, issuing warnings where needed and citations to more flagrant cases. Come ride with one of these men and see what happens in the course of the night.

LEAVING THE courthouse at 4 p.m. with Sgt. J. W. Wilson, the first item of business is a ride up U.S. 60 at the speed limit, taking an occasional break to talk with a gas station attendant, truck driver or a plain motorist who needs information, or just passing the day's conversation.

By nightfall, the roads have become longer and lonelier. The patrol car moves at a steady pace, in and around Pampa, riding until every corner of the area has been touched, if possible.

It looks like a dull night until a car drives by, weaving slightly, and the officer turns around to check it out.

Quick inspection provides enough evidence that the driver has been drinking and is dangerous on the road. He is placed in custody with the usual protests and threats of "you don't now who I am, I'll get your job."

THE PRISONER IS taken to county jail and booked to await filing of charges the next morning.

Back on the road the officer goes. Three speeders, tickets given, four other contacts made.

The hours move from 8 to 10, from 10 to midnight and by 1 a.m. it's quitting time.

Sergeant Wilson and the other men of his area reach their homes by 2 a.m. and are asleep about 2:30 a.m. — most of the time.

But they may be working a serious traffic accident until 6 a.m.

Or they may fall asleep for 30 minutes when the phone jangles.

They rise and go without question because of the badge they wear and the pledge to uphold the law.

It's a lonely road that law enforcement officers travel.

HITS \$60 BILLION

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The nation's Gross National Product — the sum total of all goods and services produced — hit an annual rate of \$60 billion by the end of last year, though the actual 1963 total was about \$58 billion.

The Commerce Department said Thursday that the fourth quarter increase was nearly \$11.5 billion, the largest quarterly advance of the year. The Gross National Product was up \$30 billion from 1962.
