## Red Commerce Top Subject For Leaders

President, Douglas-Home Hold Different Views on Red Trade

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson and British Prime Minister Sir Alec Douglas-Home have been debating whether a fat Communist is better than a lean one. The issue has nothing to do with the physical build of Nikita Khrushchev compared with any other Red leader. It deals with Western trade with the Communist bloc, particularly Cuba.

## Sun Breaks Through to Start Thaw

Pampans slid to work on icy streets this morning, the sun broke through the clouds about 10 a.m. and a general thaw resumed after an overnight freeze. Most of all, area residents were happy that the weatherman's predictions of three to five inches of snow failed to materialize. Only a few flakes fell in Pampa shortly before 8 o'clock last night. The weatherman said the snow front stalled in northern New Mexico and Colorado. Locally, the battle of the slippy streets gradually was being won by city street department workers. They have been fighting the snow and trying to get rid of it for more than a week. Much of the snow melted yesterday. Snow clearing equipment continued the job of spreading it out last night and this afternoon's sun and rising temperatures were expected to put another big dent in snow piles. Low temperature in Pampa last night was 24 degrees and the high was expected to reach near 40 this afternoon with another low tonight in the mid-20s. ## Investigators Take Four Counts to OAS

NEW YORK (UPI)—Inter-American investigators found Communist Cuba guilty of four counts of aggression against Venezuela, UPI learned today from diplomatic sources. The Venezuelan charges against Cuba, filed Dec. 3, 1963, with the Organization of American States (OAS) and substantiated by a five-nation investigating team, include: —Subversive propaganda sent to Venezuela from Cuba. —The training of Venezuelan guerrillas and terrorists by Cuba. —Cuban financing of insurrectionary acts in Venezuela. —Cuban dispatch of arms

and instructions to the Venezuelan underground for subversion and terrorism. The report of the investigators runs about 30 pages and includes several hundred pages of annexes and documents. The final draft is being prepared in Washington now and should be distributed before the end of the month.

### Studying Report

After member nations had had a chance to study and digest the investigative commission's report, the OAS council may meet to act directly on or to summon a conference of hemisphere foreign ministers. The OAS, acting as a body under the provisions of the 1947 mutual aid pact of Rio De Janeiro, then could apply one or more of the following sanctions against the Castro regime:

—Withdrawal of ambassadors; —Rupture of diplomatic relations; —Rupture of consular relations; —Partial or total interruption of economic relations of rail, sea, air, postal, telegraphic or telephone communications—or, the use of armed force against Cuba.

There has been only one prior instance in the history of the inter-American system of collective sanctions recommended in line with the Rio pact. In August, 1960, the foreign ministers of 20 American nations voted at Venezuela's request to break diplomatic relations with the Trujillo regime in the Dominican Republic, suspend trade in arms and war materiel and a partial economic boycott.

### Investigating Nation

The five-nation committee which investigated the Venezuelan charges against Cuba comprised Argentina, Colombia, Costa Rica, the United States and Uruguay.

It spent a week in Venezuela (Dec. 8-15) in an on-the-spot investigation of the Venezuelan charges. On its return to Washington, a 10-page cable was sent Cuba at Brazilian insistence advising Cuba of the nature of the Venezuelan charges and inviting a written reply to them although Cuba was expelled from the OAS family of nations a year ago.

The Cuban reply was a torrent of vilification including Castro classification of the OAS as a "ministry of colonies" for the United States. The rejection by Cuba of the OAS invitation left the way open for publication and distribution of the investigators' report. The evidence against Cuba submitted by Venezuela and on which the OAS investigators based their findings on the four counts included, among other things:

—100 Hours of Tape: Subversive propaganda. 100 hours of magnetic tape of Castro and other anti-Venezuelan Communist broadcasts from Cuba. —Cuban training of Venezuelan terrorists. Documents showing more than 60 key members of the Venezuelan Communist party and its card-carrying affiliate, the Revolutionary Movement of the Left, as having received subversive training in Cuba since 1960. The training in Cuba in guerrilla warfare in the past two years of more than 400 Venezuelans.

NEW YORK (UPI)—Bach, Beethoven and Brahms will never sound the same again in Carnegie Hall, music lovers. The Beatles were there Wednesday night and they broke the acoustics. Yop. Yes. Uh-huh.

The shrieks that met these four Englishmen piled higher and higher until they wormed their way into the plaster. Probably next time music is played in Carnegie a leftover howl will be jarred loose and strike a first violinist.

Their damage done, the Beatles leave for Miami, Fla. today to tape one television show and prepare for a live one Sunday in living noise.

Carnegie Hall, which opened on May 5, 1891, has never heard anything like it and neither had a pert usherette in a green uniform who selected her occupation because she likes classical music. She said she thought the Beatles "are funny," but she wasn't laughing.

The Beatles performed twice.

## School Trustee Election Called by Pampa Board

The Pampa school board went to executive session shortly after noon today following a regularly scheduled meeting at which the board officially called trustees' election.

The executive session, which is listed on the board's agenda, pertained to a number of personnel problems, according to school Supt. Jack Edmondson.

The board officials set the final date for filing of bids on new uniforms for the Pampa High School band and replacement of a number of junior high school uniforms. The bids will be opened at 4 p.m. March 10 at a special board meeting at which time the board will eliminate all but three or four of the better bids and refer these to a committee appointed by Superintendent Edmondson composed of the band directors for all three schools, High School Principal Cameron Marsh and a member of the Pampa Band Boosters Club. The committee will make recommendations as to the quality of the material and the board will take action at a later date, possibly the March 12 regular meeting.

Voters will cast ballots for two places on the present board to fill the vacancies to be left by the expiring terms of President R. D. Wilkerson and Board Secretary John Gikas.

## School and Press Unity Urged

A noted Texas educator and former newspaper reporter Wednesday lashed school officials "from elementary to school board level" for failure to co-operate with news media "to inform the public."

Dr. DeWitt Reddick, director of journalism at the University of Texas, told the Daily News that "any school official who fails to denote the importance of a newspaper in education today is foolish."

Reddick made the remarks following a dinner honoring the 85 Career Clinic consultants at the Pampa Hotel dining room yesterday.

REDDICK TOLD a reporter that "your job is to inform the public. Educators must understand that a newspaper has to have sources of news to be able to get this done."

"If they close the door, shutting out a newspaper, that paper cannot report the facts," he said. "In shutting out the press, the schools

therefore hurt their public relations program and no sound educational effort can be sold that way."

Reddick said he had heard of the "closed door policy" of the Pampa Board of Education regarding executive sessions. He said this policy was "not in the best interest of a sound educational program."

Reddick made his remarks within earshot of several school leaders, including Superintendent of Schools Jack Edmondson, while making final arrangements to leave for Amarillo to address the four high schools in that city on journalism.

"THERE ARE hundreds of things a newspaper can do to help the schools," the journalist declared. "It is profitable for everybody concerned if they will co-operate. If this is done, the educational program is aided, the paper is helped and the public is happy."

Reddick said he was not interested in what a school board could or could not do regarding meetings, pointing out that this was established in a statewide policy manual on school board procedures.

However, the Texas educator said he felt that school executives and teachers should "seize upon every method possible" to enlarge the public's knowledge of the school system in a community. He listed school board members as part of the executives of a system.

"IT'S VERY simple. If he is teaching a language, then the teacher must be able to discuss events in Panama or Cuba, let's say, as well as the language being taught," he declared.

"The students must be aware of what is going on around them, the walls of the classroom must be removed, and it is through newspaper reports, that much of this can be done," he said.

each month and all sessions will be limited to one hour. Breakfast will be served at 7 a.m. and adjournment is scheduled promptly at 8 a.m. to give business and professional people plenty of time to get to their offices and places of business.

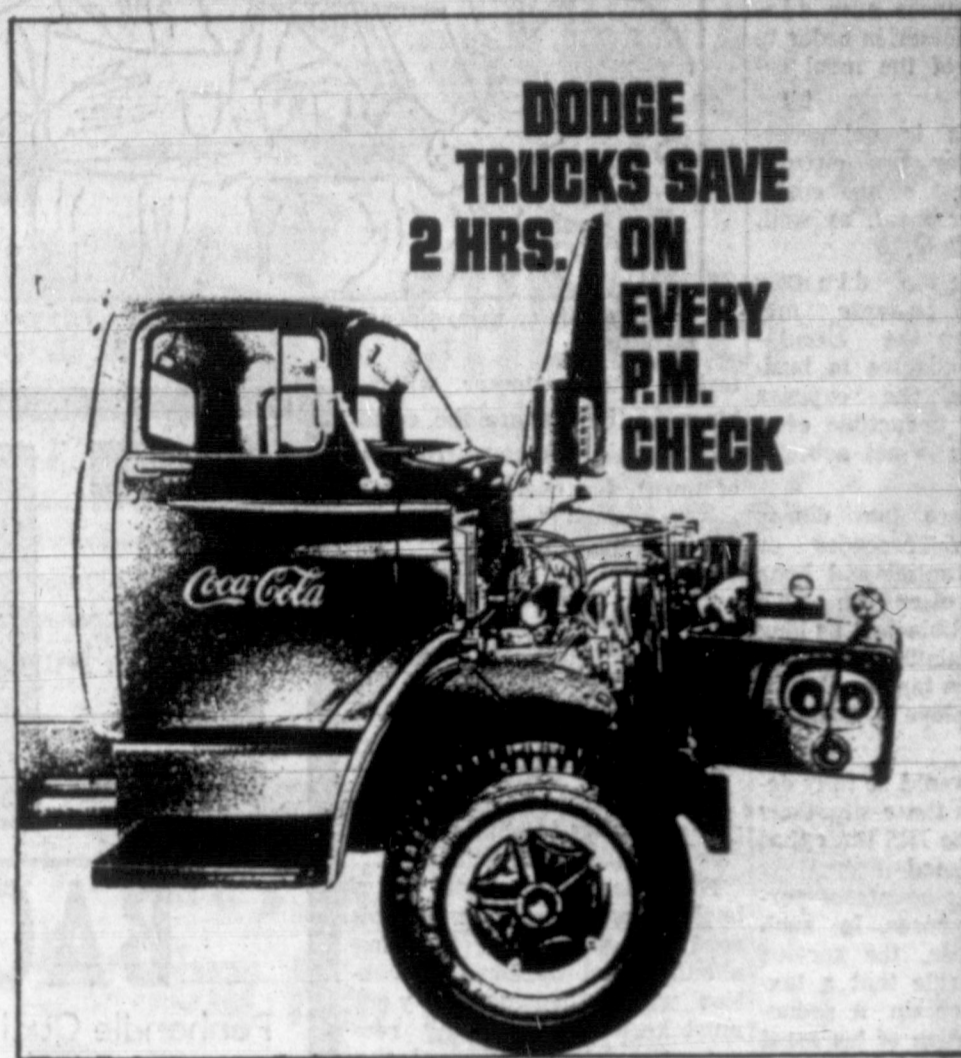

# Is Wife's Dinner Deductible?

There was a widespread feeling for a while that under the new entertainment deduction rules, you would have to talk direct business over dinner with a customer in order to have the cost of the meal deducted.

However, this is not necessarily so. Under two circumstances, the cost of the customer's and your meal, as well, may be deductible.

First, where the dinner qualifies as a business meal—that is, where the circumstances are conducive to business discussion, the expense of the meal is deductible even though business is not actually discussed.

Second, where the dinner either directly precedes or follows a substantial and bona fide business discussion the dinner is deductible just as long as this "entertainment" is associated with the taxpayer's (including an employee's) trade or business.

Your dinner would be fully deductible in both these situations except where the IRS finds that you have claimed deductions for substantial amounts of personal living expenses. In such an "abuse" case, the service will press the rule that a taxpayer cannot obtain a deduction for the portion of his meal cost which does not exceed an amount he would normally spend on himself.

How about the customer's wife's dinner when she accompanies her husband? And your wife's dinner if she accompanies you? Are these deductible under the new law?

First, the customer's wife's expenses must qualify as ordinary and necessary business expenses under the old law. That is, the taxpayer must have a clear business purpose rather than a personal or social purpose in incurring such an expense. If it is impractical under the circumstances to en-

ertain the customer without his wife (i.e., where the customer and his wife come from out of town), the customer's wife's expenses would generally be in the deductible category.

Second, your wife's expenses are deductible if she joins you, the customer and his wife because the customer's wife is present.

But remember, after July 31, 1963, you must have complied with the new record-keeping rules to obtain any of the entertainment deductions.

Example: In the case of a business meal or a meal directly preceding or following a substantial business discussion with a customer you must keep the following records: the date of the meal, the address of the restaurant, and the amount of the expenditures for the meal, the name, title or other designation of the customer sufficient to establish his relationship to you and the nature, time, place and duration of your business discussion. Also remember, if any single expenditure is for \$25 or more you must have a receipt from the restaurant as additional substantiation.

## Coal Turbine Test Success

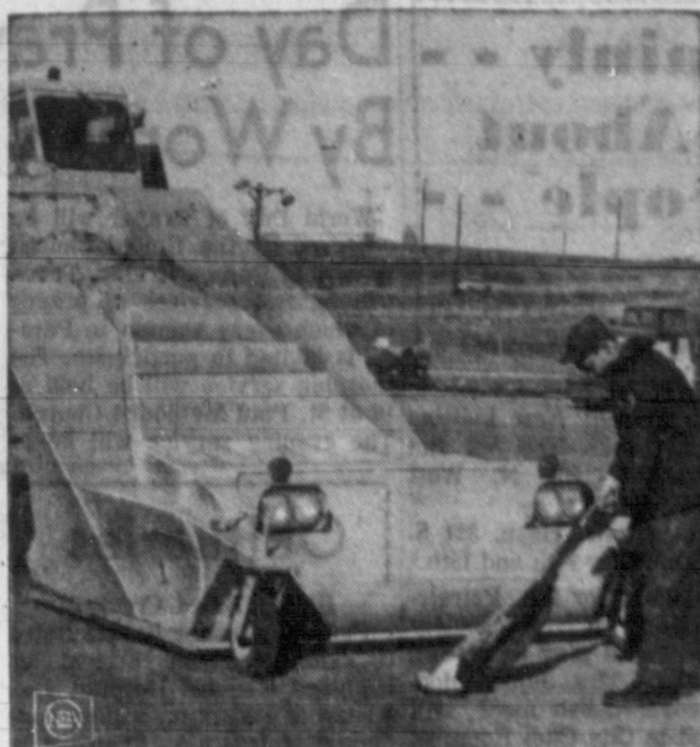

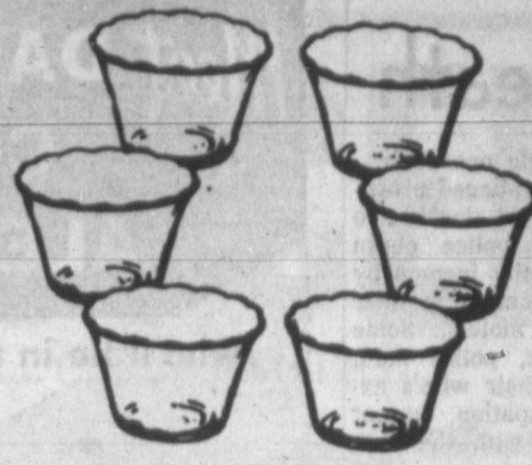

## Autopsy Awaited in New York Fire Death

MINEOLA, N.Y. (UPI)—Nassau County police today awaited an autopsy report in the fiery death of a key witness in a suburban housewife sex ring probe.

Suicide was definitely ruled out in the death of Edmond M. Nugent, 49, whose charred body was found in his burning automobile Tuesday.

Nugent, a part owner of the Jericho Lounge in Jericho, was described by Nassau County Dist. Atty. William Cahn as a "very important figure" in the investigation of an alleged \$200,000 a year call-girl operation. Cahn, who ruled out suicide as cause of death, said:

"We do not know whether it was accidental or homicidal, but we do know that he was alive and breathing when the fire broke out."

Officials awaited pathological reports before rendering an official verdict of the mysterious death which occurred at a crucial point in the suburban sex ring investigation.

Cahn said Nugent was a prospective defendant in the vice scandal. The district attorney said Nugent had signed a two-page statement admitting he had "acted as a steerer" for one of the 14 women now free on bail as a material witness

in the love-for-sale operation. Involved in the alleged prostitution ring are at least five housewives who police claim added to the family income by entertaining customers in their homes and local motels. Some of the husbands, police said, were aware of their wife's extra marital occupation, and at times sat home with the children while their women plied their part-time trade.

## Ling-Temco Firm Gets Contract

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Ling-Temco-Vought of Dallas will build a new supersonic attack plane, an improved version of the Vought F8 Crusader, to replace the Navy's Bantam bomber, the Douglas A4E Skyhawk.

The Navy announced Tuesday the firm won out over three other bidders who each proposed improved versions of their own aircraft.

Vought's new plane will be in the 1,000 mile an hour class and have a range of 3,000 miles. It will carry a heavy load of non-nuclear weapons and be used by the Marines as well as the Navy.

Because of its improved range, the new plane will be able to stay over battlefields longer in support of ground troops.

The craft will resemble its predecessor, with sweptback wings set high on the fuselage, but the fuselage will be much fatter to accommodate a bigger engine.

The plane will carry its weapons—bombs and rockets—under its wings.

### Notes From Wall Street

NEW YORK (UPI)—Reuben Rose & Co., Inc. says "despite the sharp rise in the market, it is readily apparent that the number of issues declining have clearly outpaced those advancing."

"Perhaps one answer might be found in the high degree of institutional participation during the past year with the public for the most part remaining on the sideline. The Dow-Jones industrial average has mirrored more accurately the quality of the securities participating rather than the quantity. The economic outlook remains bright with steel and paper production as well as retail sales remaining at high levels. The market, however, is not without problems. The recognition of Red China by France, the shooting down of a U.S. training plane and the recent coup in Viet Nam pose urgent questions as to future foreign policy. We maintain that while the long term trend of stock prices remain up the odds are currently in favor of a near term correction."

Harris, Upham & Co. says selectivity in making new commitments should remain the rule. If the industrial average were to experience an upside move to 800-810, chances of correction would appear somewhat greater."

NEW YORK (UPI) — Thomson & McKinnon says "the market, in terms of the Dow-Jones industrial average is at new all-time highs. Sentiment is in a bullish mood, thus the demand for strong stocks of growing companies should expand over the months ahead."

"When and where the rise will meet effective resistance is not easily predicted. February historically is a cautious month for stocks, yet this year it is proving to be contrary indeed. The 800 level in the Dow-Jones industrials — claimed by technicians to be an upside barrier — is just a step away, thus a crossing of this line may provide the excuse for corrective action."

Bache & Co. notes January was a banner month for investors as many major companies raised their dividends as they expressed their confidence in the outlook for business prospects. This recurring action appears to have placed securities on a firmer foundation. Taking into consideration the tax cut and anticipation of increased capital expenditures, we look for expanded earning power and higher security prices in the future."

J. W. Sparks & Co. notes that approximately half of the general list of securities on the New York Stock Exchange have failed to participate in the upward movement of the averages over the last year. We maintain that the market is of a rotative nature and until this action is exploited we would expect a substantial decline."

Among them was a sheet of 120 New Zealand railway stamps, issued last year but with the red coloring and value missing. Because of these defects, the spokesman said, the stamps were worth nearly \$232 each.

### Washington Window

The time bomb buried in President Johnson's political future is ticking away in the Northern cities where race relations seem not to improve but to deteriorate.

It is one of the inconsistencies of politics that Negroes are complaining angrily against racial discriminations in these Northern communities among which New York City is conspicuous. New York is the capital city of civil rights. Yet New York's non-whites were in the streets this month in support of a strike against the public schools.

Cleveland, Philadelphia, Chicago and other great urban centers whose politicians espouse civil rights equally with God and country also have been under Negro pressure for more and better housing, jobs or school integration. There have been racial troubles in suburban areas.

These racial frictions probably are antagonizing some white citizens in areas where Democratic candidates for local, state and federal office have been accustomed to overwhelming support. The question raised is: How many are antagonized and against whom.

Could Lose Votes

President Johnson evidently intends to appear before the voters in this presidential campaign as the unqualified champion of Negro civil rights. That could lose him some white votes in those Northern areas where Negroes have been most aggressive. The unknown factor in this 1964 presidential election is what has been the political impact in Northern cities of the Negro demand for northern equality.

It is an absurdity of politics that the great industrial cities and states of the North happily elect congressmen and presidents who are committed to all-out integration but incline to balk at the all-out integration of their own communities. It is obvious that such an attitude among any large number of Northern white voters would raise some basically important political questions, such as:

Do Northern white voters compel their political candidates to advocate all-out civil rights or do the whites merely accept such candidates whose civil rights positions are dictated by Negro voters?

Will militant Negro campaigning for civil rights in the areas of housing and education so antagonize Northern whites that they will tend to reject civil rights politicians?

Trends Noted

Some trends in this direction — mere trends — were noted in last November's local and state elections. Perhaps there was more than a trend in Boston, Mass., where the NAACP had been agitating against alleged segregation in the public

schools. It became an angry controversy, Boston school committee member Mrs. Louise Day Hicks boldly denied NAACP charges. Mrs. Day was re-elected to the school committee, leading the entire city ticket. She polled nearly 20,000 votes more than Mayor John F. Collins who also was re-elected.

Some analysts of various 1963 election returns detected clear evidence of a white voters' rebellion on civil rights issues. To some others the evidence was not so clear. That something was stirring in the North seemed to be evident enough, however, and it could be the ticking of that time bomb in Lyndon B. Johnson's future.

Notes from the foreign news files:

## Tough Talk

Word from London is that President Johnson can expect no firm talk from mid-airing British Prime Minister Alex Douglas-Home when he visits Washington this week. Douglas-Home is likely to be unyielding in the face of Washington objections to British trade with Cuba and Communist countries. It can be anticipated that he will make his mind plain on Malaysia because Britain is known to have reservations about the deal worked out by Atty. Gen. Robert Kennedy in Southeast Asia.

## Optimism

In Manila also there are signs that the complex problems which have caused the Malaysia dispute will be resolved in any ministerial or summit meetings. None of the three countries, the Philippines, Indonesia or Malaysia, appears willing to change its stance. Philippine President Diosdado Macapagal will visit Indonesia for his talks with Malaysian Premier Tengku Abdul Rahman in Phnom Penh and will get the red carpet treatment. Indonesian officials will attempt to sell in on the advantages of good relations with Indonesia and against any premature reconciliation with Malaysia.

## Common Front

Reports from Brussels, headquarters of the European Common Market, warn that Common Market countries and other European nations may attempt to gang up on the United States tariff negotiations beginning in Geneva in May. West German economics minister Kurt Schmuder made the first move at week in a suggestion that Britain and other non-Common Market representatives hold early talks on the ministerial level. Britain so far has not risen to the bait, but the United States will have to watch that she does not give away more than she gets in the way of tariff cuts at Geneva.

## Beagle Invasion

If United States listeners go by the "mersey sound beat" of the British Beatles in a big way, an invasion of similar British beat groups may be anticipated. There are plenty of similar style combinations itching to break into the big time dollar earnings, several of them not far below the Beatles on British charts.

## Meets with Russian

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Soviet Ambassador Anatoly F. Dobrynin met for half an hour Tuesday with Llewellyn E. Thompson, the State Department's senior adviser on Russian affairs.

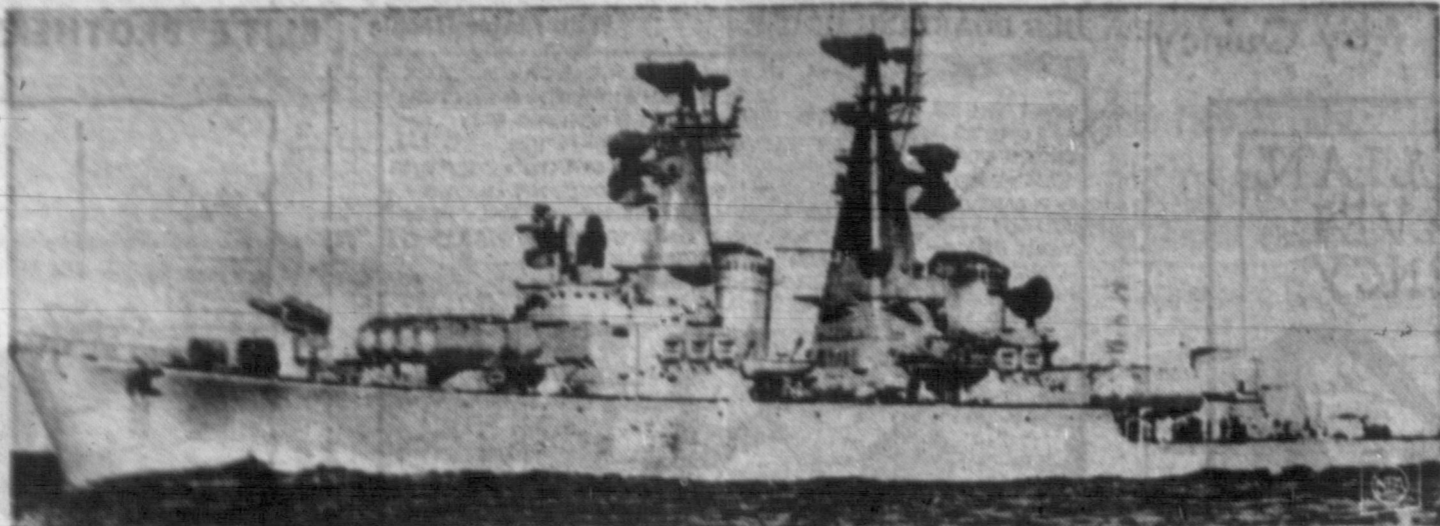
The department said that Thompson had asked for the meeting with Dobrynin. A spokesman said only that Thompson wanted to discuss "a number of things" with the Russian envoy.

## Tahoe Railroads

LAKE TAHOE, Calif. (UPI) — At one time, five different railroads were located along the shores of Lake Tahoe, but only one ever connected with any other railroads.

## CRANE COUNT

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Interior Department said today that 33 rare whooping cranes are spending the winter at the Arkansas National Wildlife Refuge on the Texas Gulf Coast. The birds, comprising the world's largest flock of wild whoopers, made the 2,500-mile flight from summer nesting grounds near Great Slave Lake in Canada's Northwest Territories last fall.

## HEADLIGHT TIP

By failing to agree with the city Wednesday on terms of a new lease for Municipal Stadium, Finley defied the league's order of Jan. 16 for him either to sign a lease here by Saturday or face expulsion from baseball.

So, unless either the city or Finley unexpectedly yields in the stalemate over a two-year or a four-year lease, the nine other owners who make up the league's membership have only two courses of action.

They can:

—Either take steps to kick Finley out of baseball and deprive him of ownership of the Athletics.

—Or back down from their initial, unanimous stand and let him transfer the franchise.

No matter which alternative they choose, they face a battle in court.

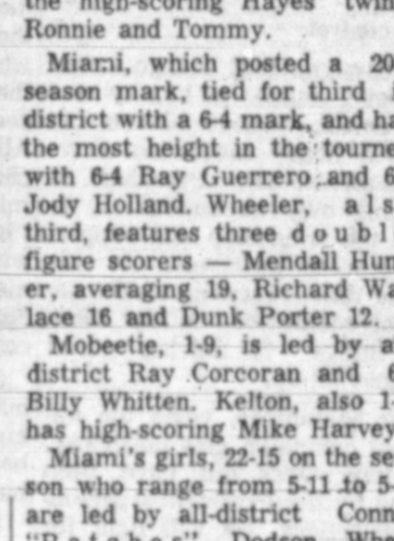

## Politics Is a Discipline

What will be the depth of indignation in the Joe Kilgore Affair? There is much head-shaking and tut-tutting among voters of all persuasions. "Can you imagine, one says, 'what kind of shape we're in when one man - even if he's President - is powerful enough to force a candidate out of the race for the United States Senate?'" More head-shaking and tut-tutting. But among the professionals, it's a different story. They aren't starry-eyed about politics. None of this business of politics being the "art of governing." Politics is a discipline, just like the Marine Corps or the profession of surgery. You do what you must, when you must and to whom you must. You are a Democrat or a Republican. You enjoy the respectability of the party. If you called yourself a Jehosophat instead of a Democrat, who'd vote for you? Right. So you owe the party something if you want to share its good name and going business value. In some cases the party may contribute funds to your campaign, provide workers or other services. When you need help, you ask the party. First they'll tell you they don't have a dime to spend on you. But if you're important enough, they'll find the money. In return, as a professional you're expected to submit to party discipline, even if you're handed the pistol with a single bullet in it, as Joe Kilgore apparently was. He'll be able to make a living. Does he want to be a judge or an ambassador or something like that? Take care of it, will you, fellows? No? Well, give him one of those citations of service and put him on the list to come to the next barbecue at the ranch. What's next on the agenda, boys? Harsh hard, cruel and something less than Sunday School ethics involved here. That's the way of politics (the "art of government") and the professionals will shed no tears. Indignation is the foolish reaction of us just plain voters.

## Turn Out Them Lights!

We got a little amused the other night as we watched teevee and listened to the President tell how he was saving a couple thousand bucks a month by turning out some lights in the White House. Mr. Johnson made a pretty big deal of this money-saving gesture. One can't help but think that these lights, if not needed, should have been turned off long ago and without a public announcement to newsmen and cameramen. It should be routine practice. To "make hay" publicly with this ploy in saving in government spending seems to border just a bit on the ridiculous side. All of us try to keep the monthly light bill down by turning off lights when not needed. There's nothing wrong with that, but we don't shout it from the rooftops. Democratic National Committee Quietly Changing To Johnson Image

WASHINGTON - The Democratic National Committee is undergoing a full-scale facelift - from Kennedy to Johnson control.

This significant change-over is being made quietly and piecemeal, without fanfare, but with a steady succession of replacements. The President is leaning over backwards to retain the friendship and support of Kennedy partisans. At the same time, recasting of the national committee "in the Johnson image" is moving ahead without let-up.

By September, when the national campaign gets underway, all key places will have been filled by the President's personal selections. He will fight for election wholly with his own organization.

Major changes that already have taken place and others in the offing are:

CHAIRMAN JOHN BAILEY will stay through the nominating convention in late August, chiefly because he is widely known in party circles and presents no problems. He lacks vigor and drive, and does little beyond filling the office. On the other hand, he causes no trouble and does whatever is asked of him. What happens to Bailey after the Atlantic City convention depends on the political situation at that time. He may be kept a while longer, or be replaced.

TREASURER RICHARD MAUGIRE is slated to depart next month after the big February 27 fund-raising dinner in Miami. This long-time lieutenant of the late President gets along cordially with Johnson, but both feel this all-important place should be filled by the President's own man. White House insiders say a likely choice is Erle Coker, World Bank official and strong 1960 Johnson supporter.

CLIFTON CARTER, long-time Texas intimate of the President, who is taking over the desk and reins of Stephen Smith, brother-in-law of the late President. Under Kennedy Smith was the real boss of the National Committee, and Carter will fill the same role for Johnson. Unassuming, able and completely devoted to the President, Carter is a perfect choice for this backstage function.

## Kennedy Men Hold Course Being Charted by LBJ

By BRUCE BISSAT WASHINGTON (NEA)—There is not now, nor is there likely to be, a special band of men devoted to preserving the "Kennedy entity" in politics apart from the current fortunes of President Lyndon B. Johnson. High-standing members of the Kennedy circle say no such course ever has been contemplated. They consider it unwise, impractical and unfair. Says one in the White House: "When you stay on in this building, your loyalty has to be to the man downstairs." It is perhaps proper to make this point anew, since things keep popping up to feed the endless speculation that Johnson and the Kennedy group are basically incompatible and hence in the grip of centrifugal forces. The Boston-Austin axis has been buzzed at by harassing elements from the moment it was born in Los Angeles in 1960. But the tactics always have failed. Today Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy's name is on the minds of many Democratic politicians looking to the fall. Yet no evidence exists that either he or any who have been in long, close bond with him and the late John F. Kennedy have any wish to build a sort of "second force" in Democratic politics. This says nothing, naturally, about any future personal political goals the attorney general may develop. Nor does it limit Sen. Edward M. (Ted) Kennedy's activity incident to his re-election bid in Massachusetts. The point, again, is that the Kennedy men continuing in government are serving the new man. One aide's view of it: "The reason I can do this is that Lyndon Johnson was a per- fact vice-president for John F. Kennedy." Kennedy evidently realized from the start that his link with Johnson would be assaulted. Friends say he was determined to bind it tight. Mindful of Johnson's pride and stature as a three-decade veteran in Washington, the late President passed the word to him early in 1961 that he could have unlimited access to his presence without prior notice or appointment. Johnson did not in fact avail himself of that privilege but generally sought appointments in regular fashion. Kennedy, it is said, went much beyond this. In the toughest language of which he was capable, he ordered broadcast throughout the White House the word he would fire any staff man who in any way disparaged either the vice presidency or the man who held it. He understood what it had meant for Johnson, long a wielder of power, to have taken a job without power. It would be foolish to imagine that thereafter total love and understanding flowed and was maintained between the Kennedy and Johnson people. But Kennedy's tough message put a big damper on any serious attempts to separate the two men. One informant says that in the end it was the hardheaded political pragmatism of both men that prevented any rift. They knew the realities of their position. The contagion of that practical relationship seems to linger on. With Johnson now at the top, the Kennedy men are in his service. How that will be performed, in the White House and the campaign, will make some of 1964's most interesting news.
