

ls Wife's Dinner Deductible?

There was a widespread celing for a while that under he new entertainment deduction rules, you would have to talk direct business over dinner with a customer in order to have the cost of the meal deducted.

However, this is not necessarily so. Under two circumstances, the cost of the customer's and your meal, as well, may be deductible.

First, where the dinner qualifies as a business mal -that is, where the circumstances are conducive to busi-

Coal Turbine Test Success WASHINGTON (UPI) - Sec-

retary of Interior Stuart L. Udall said Tuesday an experimental coal fired gas turbine, developed by the Bureau of Mines at Morgantown, W. Va., has completed its first tests successfully.

Udall hailed the successful test as opening a possible new market for the sagging coal industry. Tests on the coal fired turbines began in Morgantown last August.

The interior official said the tests showed that definite progress has been made in reducing erosion of the turbine blades by hot ash particles in the gas stream.



WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Interior Department said today that 33 rare whooping cranes are spending the winter at the 115 Arkansas National Wildlife Refuge on the Texas Gulf Coast. The birds, comprising the world's largest flock of wild whoopers, made the 2,500-mileflight from summer nesting grounds near Great Slave Lake in Canada's Northwest Territories last fall.





fessional nurses to be members, to keep pace with the newer trends of nursing which in turn prepares members to better serve the pub-


