## US Jets Help Rally Forces

### U.N. Diplomats Discuss Asia Peacekeeping Role

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UPI) — Diplomats here discussed possible ways today of putting into effect U.S. Ambassador Adlai E. Stevenson's suggestions for a U.N. peacekeeping role in Southeast Asia. Washington's willingness to have the United Nations participate in affairs of the strife-ridden area encompassing Laos, Viet Nam and Cambodia was regarded here as the most significant development in Stevenson's policy review before the Security Council Thursday.

### Newsman's Proposal Termed Good Idea

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. J. William Fulbright, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, praised as "a very worthwhile proposal" a suggestion by United Press International Foreign News Analyst Phil Newsum to admit Communist Chinese newsmen to the United States as a first step toward taking news reporting out of the cold war.

Newsum, speaking in New Britain, Conn., Thursday night, proposed permitting Red Chinese newsmen to enter this country and challenging Peking publicly to admit American reporters to the China mainland. He urged that the matter of U.S. newspapermen going to Red China be extricated from negative cold war diplomacy and restored to the positive field of independent journalism. Newsum's proposal to admit Chinese journalists had no reciprocal strings attached.

### GOPs Meet To Fix Ideas On Rights

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Senate Republicans meet today in an effort to complete their review of bipartisan civil rights amendments the leadership hopes to introduce Monday.

There was some question whether the task could be finished in one more sitting, but Democratic Whip Hubert H. Humphrey, Minn., said the bipartisan package probably would be offered Monday anyway.

Senate leaders were resigned to the expectation that Republicans unwilling to embrace key points of their package would offer their own amendments on the floor. These then could be acted on either directly or through tabling motions at some later point.

The Senate, under a slow-down schedule designed to let committees get in some other work, was called to meet at noon EDT for the 61st day of civil rights debate.

Humphrey-voiced confidence that early next month the Senate would be able to muster the needed two-thirds vote to curb southern debate against the House - passed bill.

### Pampan Missing Off Navy Ship

LT. (jg) Joe G. Cooke, 25, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Cooke, 429 Pitts, was reported missing today after an accident at sea yesterday during a Navy training flight over the Pacific.

Cooke was a U.S. Navy fighter pilot stationed aboard the aircraft carrier Bon Homme Richard. The carrier was home-based at Manila in the Philippines.

According to the telegram received from the Navy last night, Lieutenant Cooke's plane apparently crashed into the sea after taking off from the carrier.

### Communist Offense Slacks Off in Laos

VIENTIANE, Laos (UPI) — Neutralist Gen. Kong Le today was reported rallying his battered forces on the edge of the Plain of Jars with the help of reconnaissance obtained by U.S. jet planes.

The Communist Pathet Lao offensive on the plain appeared to be slackening, but the Reds claimed they fired on the U.S. jets over Laos.

Kong Le was said to have about four battalions left at Ban Ma, his third command post since the Communist offensive began last weekend.

Scattered neutralist troops were fighting their way to Ban Ma for regrouping and others were slipping through Communist lines.

The use of American jets for reconnaissance in Laos was disclosed by the State Department in Washington Thursday. A State Department spokesman said the jets are keeping close watch on attacking Red forces and reporting on their intentions and dispositions.

The International Control Commission (ICC) has encountered difficulty making inspections in territory controlled by the Pathet Lao, and the Polish member has refused to participate in the commission's work without Pathet Lao approval.

The Communists claimed they had fired on two American jets over two towns held by the Reds.

With the Communist drive apparently slowing down, political observers in Vientiane speculated that the Pathet Lao was ready to turn its military gains to advantage at the conference table. The observers noted that Pathet Lao propaganda broadcasts have stressed the rightist coup of April 19, and have claimed the subsequent rightist-Communist union of forces as a violation of the 1962 Geneva agreements.

### LBJ Appeals To Youth To 'Aid Society'

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (UPI) — President Johnson appealed to young people today to build a "great society" by restoring American cities, preserving natural beauty and improving the quality of education.

The Chief Executive promised to assemble the "best thought and broadest knowledge from all over the world" for a series of conferences aimed at charting a course toward a better life.

Johnson said in a speech prepared for graduation exercises at the University of Michigan that new methods of federal-local cooperation — "creative federalism" — must be found to attack pressing social problems.

The President planned to fly to Ann Arbor from Washington to receive an honorary doctor of civil laws degree and address 5,000 graduates. An estimated 90,000 persons were expected to hear him speak in the Michigan Stadium.

Johnson's said in his prepared remarks that the United States has an opportunity to become a "great society" as well as a powerful and wealthy nation during the next 50 years.

"It demands an end to poverty and racial injustice — to which we are totally committed in our time," Johnson said. "The challenge of the next half century is whether we have the wisdom to use our wealth to enrich and elevate our national life — and to advance the quality of American civilization," he said.

Not Complete Answer  
Johnson said the government has many programs to deal with the problems of cities, natural resources and education but does not have the full answer to those problems.

"But I do promise this," he said. "We are going to assemble the best thought and broadest knowledge from all over the world to find those answers."

## Presbyterians Choose Negro As Moderator

### Southern Baptists Refuse to Endorse Church Integration

A Negro was elected moderator of the United Presbyterian Church Thursday at the group's General Assembly at Oklahoma City.

The Rev. Elder G. Hawkins of the Bronx New York, won over the Rev. A. Ray Cartledge of Erie, Pa., a white minister, by a vote of 465 to 368. Hawkins serves a congregation of varied racial and economic background.

The United Presbyterian Church has a membership of 3.5 million.

In Atlantic City, N.J., Southern Baptists refused to endorse racial integration of churches during their General Assembly Thursday. The group, representing 10.1 million persons, voted instead to permit each church to handle racial matters as it sees fit.

Federal Judge Sidney Mize took under advisement at Jackson, Miss., Thursday legal attacks on segregation in three Mississippi communities. He promised a ruling "as soon as I reasonably can" in suits seeking desegregation of Jackson, Biloxi and Leake County public schools.

### Conference Set on Trial For Ruby

DALLAS (UPI) — Judge Joe B. Brown today ordered a conference of prosecution and defense lawyers on Monday to discuss a sanity trial for condemned killer Jack Ruby.

Brown did not say whether psychiatrists would be present. However, reports of state and defense psychiatrists, as well as a report by court-appointed psychiatrist Dr. Robert L. Subblefield, will be available for consideration.

Brown, who presided at the trial of the slayer of accused assassin Lee Harvey Oswald, said he might set a sanity trial date on Monday. Such a trial would be held before a jury.

Earlier this week, Brown said a sanity trial was likely for the 54-year-old slayer.

### Paper Says Panel Will Call Agent

CHICAGO (UPI) — The Chicago Tribune reported today that the Warren Commission probably will seek the testimony of an indicted Secret Service agent who charged drunkenness and laxity among agents guarding the late President Kennedy.

The newspaper also said it learned from an unidentified commission member that the commission plans to go to Dallas to interview Jack Ruby and investigate reports of heavy drinking by agents the night before Kennedy was assassinated three months ago.

The disclosures closely followed charges made by Abraham Bolden, 29, a former member of the presidential bodyguard.

Bolden, the first Negro assigned to the presidential detail, has been indicted for allegedly trying to sell a government report to a man charged in Chicago with taking part in a half-million-dollar counterfeiting ring.

Following his arrest, Bolden held a news conference at which he claimed he was being framed by his superiors because he intended to tell the Warren Commission about general laxity among agents guarding Kennedy's life at Hyannis Port, Mass.

He said Secret Service agents at Hyannis Port in 1961 had beer and whisky for breakfast, showed up for duty "half drunk" and sometimes were absent from their assigned posts.

### Lady Bird Needles Republican Critics

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson returned to the White House today with stories for President Johnson on her see-for-yourself poverty tour of the Kentucky backwoods.

After visiting remote mountain hollows and tenant farmer cabins, the First Lady said her whirlwind tour had been "a great day."

Mrs. Johnson also found time to hit at her Republican critics. Taking her husband's advice, she needed Republican Congressmen Marion G. Snyder, Ky., and David Martin, Neb., who said tenants on some of the First Lady's own Alabama land were living in "shocking squalor."

"Some people are suddenly worried about the tenant farmers who live on my farm in Alabama," she told the Kentucky Federation of Women's Clubs Thursday night. "I'm glad they are concerned. I've been worried about these families for a long time."

Mrs. Johnson said "if there had been a poverty bill 30 years ago, those cotton farmers would have been retrained to a new skill rather than remaining on in an economy that time has passed by."

Earlier, Mrs. Johnson jauntily hiked up a mountain road to meet the Arthur Robertsons and their seven children "who live up a hollow."

Robertson discussed tobacco raising, cattle breeding and varmint hunting with Mrs. Johnson as though he had known her all his life.

Mrs. Robertson, a young woman in her 30s, was "too nervous" to carry on much of a conversation with her elegant visitor. Her 4-year-old daughter, Judy, just yawned.

### Turk Cypriots Kill UN Guard

NICOSIA, Cyprus (UPI) — An official United Nations spokesman confirmed Thursday that shots that killed a Finnish U.N. soldier northwest of Nicosia Wednesday came from Turkish Cypriot positions.

Finnish radio operator Juhani Matikainen became the first U.N. soldier killed since the peace force units began arriving on Cyprus March 27 to try to restore order between feuding Greek and Turkish Cypriots.

"It was established by the United Nations that all firing was coming from Turkish Cypriot positions," the U.N. spokesman said.

The spokesman said Matikainen was struck by three bullets fired at a range of about 70 to 80 yards during a "fairly heavy" exchange.

The leader of the nearby Turkish Cypriot village of Kanli Keuy apologized for the incident. A U.N. spokesman said the Turkish Cypriot liaison officer with the U.N. forces, Umit Suleiman, also apologized.

Informed sources said angry Finnish troops cleared the Turkish Cypriots from at least one ridge after the slaying, but it was not known whether there were any Cypriot casualties.

**WON'T PASS CUP**  
RYDE, Island of Wight (UPI) — Alderman William Ramage took office as mayor of Ryde Thursday and broke the 94-year-old tradition of inviting councillors to drink from the borough loving cup.

"It may be traditional but it is most unhygienic," said Ramage, who is a chemist and chairman of the Public Health Commission.

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## Connally Urges OK of American Kills Tosses Grenade in Viet Vendor Care Issue

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI) — Gov. John Connally Wednesday night urged delegates to the annual convention of the Texas Hospital Association to vote in favor of the vendor care constitutional amendment that will appear on the November election ballot.

He said it will provide for an estimated 3 per cent of the elderly people who "want and need medical aid but still are not receiving it."

"It is essential that Texas this fall adopt the constitutional amendment extending the vendor care program to those not on old age assistance but who do not have sufficient income to take care of their medical needs," he said.

### Wall Street In Review

NEW YORK (UPI) — Reynolds & Co. says that as long as the "bears" are unable to attract more volume on the downside and the rail average continues to advance, "it does not seem as if there is too much risk for the industrials."

"In our opinion," Reynolds says, "the prevailing investment atmosphere is still conducive to the attainment of worthwhile capital gains."

Thomson & McKinnon states that the basic trouble with the stock market lately is that "people are thinking a little too much in terms of statistics which are a measurement only of the past and fail to reflect, except in rare instances, what truly can be one of the most exciting and dynamic periods in the economic history of the U.S."

Bache & Co. says the current strength in rail stocks undoubtedly reflects the inherent strength of the economy. Pointing to the April jump in durable goods orders, Bache states "we would expect the industrial stocks to enjoy the same prosperity being experienced by the rails in the months ahead."

CHELMSFORD, England (UPI) — Francis Davidson, 24, who had been banned from driving for a total of 83 years, had the figure upped another 20 years Thursday after pleading guilty to seven charges. They included driving a stolen sports car 100 miles an hour during a police chase.

HONG KONG (UPI) — An attempt to present Arthur Miller's play "Death of a Salesman" in Chinese will be made here by Chung King-fai, Yale-trained drama instructor at the Hong Kong Baptist College. Miller has approved the Chinese language performance.

"Yet its staff and personnel never let the situation get out of hand, never allowed the excitement of the moment to overcome reason and responsibility, and never permitted anything to disrupt the hospital's normal, day-to-day service to the people of Dallas."

Connally said the transition of moving the governor's headquarters from Austin to the hospital temporarily was "an unusual test of the normal operation of any hospital."

"Jack Price and his staff found the space, the desks, the file cabinets and everything else my people needed to function in a temporary office," he added.

Connally called the state's medical care program "the right approach" and noted that Texas ranks first in the nation in the number of aged citizens covered by health insurance—72 per cent compared to a national average of 60 per cent.

The governor spoke at the closing session of the four-day convention. The hospital group chose T. H. Morrison Jr. of the Valley Baptist Hospital in Hartlingen as its new president.

Morrison told the Texas Hospital Association he would work toward continued public education in shortages of hospital personnel, the problems of the indigent and the problems of area-wide planning.

Other officers selected were W. B. Foster of the Bexar County Hospital District as president-elect; David H. Hitt of Baylor Medical Center, Dallas, vice-president; and Gordon Epperson of the Driscoll Foundation Children's hospital in Corpus Christi, treasurer.

Connally also singled out Parkland Hospital in Dallas for special praise. He spent 13 days at the hospital after being wounded on Nov. 22 by the assassin who killed President Kennedy.

"Few hospitals in our land have ever faced the intense pressure Parkland was subjected to on Nov. 22 and in subsequent days," Connally said.

**Four Trapped Tots Die in Home Fire**  
CALAIS, Maine (UPI) — Four children were killed early Thursday when trapped in an upstairs bedroom by a roaring fire that swept their two-story wooden frame home as their parents slept.

The dead were identified tentatively as David Corbett, 7, Mark, 5, Tammy, 4, and a 2-year-old child. All were children of Mr. and Mrs. Ross Corbett of this Canadian border town. Corbett and his wife escaped the flaming house.

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (UPI) — A young terrorist tossed a grenade into a U.S. Army truck Thursday in the latest violence against Americans in South Viet Nam.

An American soldier escaped the attack unhurt and shot the terrorist as he tried to flee on a bicycle. The grenade was concealed in a load of bread. The Vietnamese assailant, who was hospitalized with a head wound, was believed by officials to be an agent of the Communist Viet Cong.

Fontenot was alone in an ambush in the hills of the northwest of Saigon. The enlistment man was the 19th American to die in action in South Viet Nam since the United States stepped up its aid to the government's fight against the Viet Cong in January, 1961.

The U.S. Army reported Wednesday that another American was killed and a second wounded by Communist gunfire.

# Delayed Vocations Help To Fill Clergy Shortage

The clergy shortage would be even worse than it is were it not for "delayed vocations."

This has happened to many of the great figures of the Christian ministry. To pluck just one example from the ancient history of the church, St. Augustine was 37 years old, and had a professional career as well as a good deal of profane living behind him when he was ordained a priest in 391 A.D.

# Matthew Provides Sunday Sermon Text

The theme for the morning worship service at the St. Paul Methodist Church will be "Reflections of the Light" with the scripture basis from Matthew 5:14-16, given by the pastor Rev. Jack Riley.

Many prominent clergymen of our own day are products of delayed vocations. James Francis Cardinal McIntyre, the Roman Catholic archbishop of Los Angeles, started his studies for the priesthood at the age of 31. The Rt. Rev. James A. Pike, Episcopal bishop of California, was a successful attorney before he entered the ministry. The Rev. Dr. Theo. H. Palmquist, pastor of famed Foundry Methodist Church in Washington, D.C., is a former advertising man.

Mrs. Donald Walberg will be the organist and direct the choir for the worship service. "How Lovely are Thy Dwellings" by Little will be sung by Mrs. Jack Riley. Beginning this Sunday evening the Carol Choir led by Mr. and Mrs. Bob Eubanks and the Chapel Choir led by Mrs. Lois Fagan will be dismissed for the summer.

Survey Shows Importance  
The importance of delayed vocations as a source of clerical manpower was underscored by a recent survey which showed that 15 per cent of the students now in Episcopal church seminaries are over 32 years of age.

# New Sermons Starts Sunday

To illustrate the position the Church of the Nazarene holds in the "main stream" of Christianity, the local pastor, the Reverend Carson N. Snow Jr., is beginning a series of Sunday morning sermons using a passage of Scripture used by famous men of the past and adapting the theme of their message to his own style of presentation. Messages of famous men such as Martin Luther (Lutheran), John Wesley (Methodist), J. A. Gossip (Presbyterian), Phillips Brooks (Episcopal) and Horace Bushnell (Congregational) will be used and adapted. It is believed that at the conclusion of this series those hearing the sermons will appreciate more fully the position of the Church of the Nazarene as a church in the Wesleyan tradition.

Only unmarried men — with rare exceptions — may enter the Catholic priesthood, and this fact may tend to reduce the number of delayed vocations in the Catholic church. Even so, there are enough to create a special educational problem, and Richard Cardinal Cushing, Catholic archbishop of Boston, has opened the first national seminary for older men at Weston, Mass., about 15 miles from Boston. It is called the Pope John XXIII Seminary. Why does a man decide to enter the ministry after he has passed the normal student-age and is already successfully engaged in a secular career that promises far greater material rewards?

Parents in the community who have children are invited to send or bring them for this training.

Laymen who ask this question usually expect the answer to be in terms of a shattering personal experience, a particular moment of vivid drama in which a man suddenly becomes aware of an imperative divine command.

Can't Pinpoint Call  
It does happen that way, once in a while. But men who have responded to a delayed vocation usually have great difficulty in pinpointing the particular time or place when they first became conscious of a call to the ministry.

### A DIVINE PARADOX

"Whoever cares for his own safety is lost; but if a man will let himself be lost for my sake, that man is safe." Luke 9:24, NEB.

This Scripture text is nonsense to most people, for it seems to be contrary to common sense. The man who professes to govern his life by common sense insists that we must provide for our own safety and security. He, in almost pious tones, talks about the supposed advantage of "enlightened self-interest;" about the wisdom of looking after his own security and leaving everyone else to do the same. But if I take the words of Christ seriously — and I must — I am forced to conclude that self-interest and Christian living are mutually exclusive. One simply prevents the other. Only if we learn this lesson can we begin to live as Christ intended that we should.

There are several principles included in this statement of Christ:

First, a man must deny himself. Usually, we treat ourselves as if self was the most important thing in the world. If we are to follow Jesus we must let self be crucified—obliterated, and forget that self exists.

Then, a man must take up his cross. This is simply a willing acceptance of all that comes in connection with our serving Christ. It involves our willingness to suffer ridicule, persecution and even death for the sake of Christ. Remember, I said that this was willing acceptance of those things. It is not simply the bearing of the normal hardships of life, but taking them up of our own accord.

Finally, a man must spend his life, not hoard it. Here we must be willing to live contrary to the whole of the world's standards. The questions are not, "How much can I get?" but, "How much can I give?" Not, "What is the minimum I can get?" but, "How much can I give?" Not, "What is the safe sum work permissible?" but, "What is the maximum possible?" The Christian is given life, not to keep for himself but to spend for others.

Let us ask ourselves if we are Christians or if we are simply living according to the principles of "self-interest" that is the damning philosophy of this world.

Thursday night he allowed only one earned run—a home run by rookie Gates Brown—before being lifted for a pinchhitter in the eighth inning.

Chuck Hinton drove in three runs and Ed Brinkman contributed a home run as the Senators spoiled the AL debut of Jack Hamilton, former Philadelphia Phillies hurler.

The streaking Baltimore Orioles, winners of six games in their last seven and 11 of 14, defeated Kansas City, 7-6, to pull to within 15 percentage points of the pace setting Chi-

cago White Sox. Boston tripped Los Angeles, 8-7, in an afternoon encounter and the other AL teams were not scheduled.

Wins Fourth Straight Baltimore bonus rookie Wally Bunker won his fourth straight game without a loss, although he ran into trouble in the eighth when Manny Jimenez hit his first grand slam homer.

The blow came off Stu Miller, who relieved Bunker with three bases loaded.

Rocky Colavito hit his 11th home run in the fourth inning to tie Harmon Killebrew of Minnesota for the league lead in that department. Brooks Robinson had three hits and drove in three runs and Boog Powell plated two more for the Orioles, who took advantage of 10 Kansas City walks.

Carl Yastrzemski tripled home the winning run in the sixth inning to break a 6-6 tie and give Boston a three game sweep over the slumping Angels. Butch Heffner, Boston's third pitcher, was the winner and Willie Smith, the fourth of six pitchers paraded to the mound by manager Bill Rigney, was the loser. Ed Bressoud hit the only home-

er for Boston.

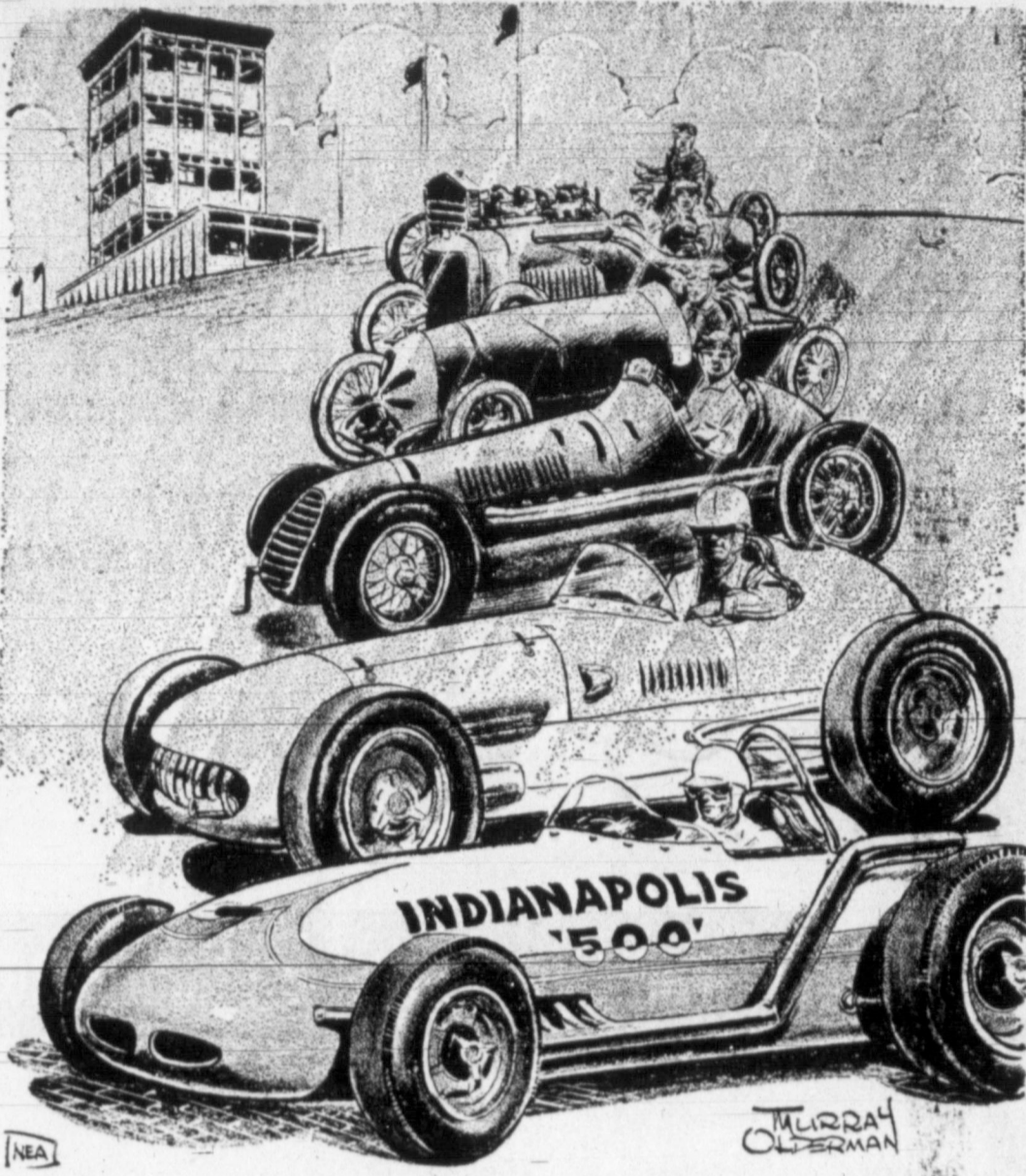

St. Loo to Build Field ST. LOUIS (UPI)—Construction of a \$20 million sports stadium was scheduled to begin here Monday, following the announcement Thursday that contracts had been signed.

However, there was some question whether the St. Louis football Cardinals would share the stadium with the baseball Cardinals.

Bill Bidwill, football Cardinals president, told the St. Louis Post-Dispatch Thursday that the football team had not signed the binding 30-year lease. Bidwill was in New York for a National Football League meeting.

NEW YORK (UPI)—The answer to the hottest question in professional football once again is "no," and that's the way it will remain according to National Football League Commissioner Pete Rozelle.

Another plea was made Thursday for inter-league competition between the old-line NFL and the American Football League, this time in the form of an all-star game. And once again the proposal was flatly rejected by Rozelle.

Carl Lindemann Jr., vice president of NBC sports, which recently signed a five-year contract with the AFL beginning in 1965, sent identical telegrams to Rozelle and Foss Tuesday night.

Rozelle, speaking from New York, where the NFL was concluding its three-day spring meeting, stated: "In reply to your wires, the National Football League has no interest in your publicized proposal. Plans were made several weeks ago with the Kennedy family for NFL participation in the Kennedy Memorial Library fund as part of the more than one million dollars in annual contributions to worthwhile charities made through NFL games."

Rozelle referred to an exhibition game between the Philadelphia Eagles and Detroit Lions scheduled for Franklin Field, Philadelphia, Aug. 23, proceeds of which will go to the Kennedy library.

Foss, attending the AFL spring meeting in Kansas City, told Lindemann, "we accept your proposal as outlined and will look forward to implementing our position with the all-out cooperation which such an idea and event so richly merits."

By United Press International Billy Williams and Willie Mays commiserated today over the futility of it all.

Willie broke out of an 0-for-10 hitting slump with two home runs Thursday, drove in three runs and scored three times to put the San Francisco Giants back in first place in the National League race with a 9-4 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies.

Nevertheless, Willie lost his batting leadership, which he had held all season.

Williams grabbed the batting lead away from Willie by clubbing a double and two singles and driving in a run against the St. Louis Cardinals Thursday night to boost his batting average to .402. Mays is hitting .397.

However, Williams' slugging went for naught as his Chicago Cub teammates bowed to the Cards, 10-3.

Raps N.L. Pitching Williams started his torrid hitting first day of spring training, and except for one 0-14 streak in the season has terrorized National League pitchers. Williams has been on the verge of a 300 season ever since he was named rookie of the year in 1961 and head coach Bob Kennedy feels his prize lefthander will pass the mark this season because he has learned to hit to all fields.

Reliever Hal Woodeshick saved his eighth game to give Houston a 3-1 victory over Pittsburgh and Sandy Koufax struck out 11 to pitch the Los Angeles Dodgers to their 11th straight win over the New

York Mets, 6-1. Cincinnati and Milwaukee had the day off.

Mays broke a 4-4 tie with his 16th home run of the season to launch the Giants on a four-run outburst in the fifth inning against Johnny Klippstein. Mays had slugged his 15th in the first inning with a man on off rookie Rick Wise. Bob Bolin, the third Giant hurler who allowed only one hit over the last six innings, was the winner.

Hobbie Drops Second Bill White and Tim McCaver each hit a two-run homer for the Cardinals and Doug Clemens added a bases loaded triple to saddle Glen Hobbie with his second defeat in two decisions. Ray Sadecki was touched for 12 hits but completed the game to even his record at 3-3.

Koufax has struck out 10 or more batters in 53 games and needs only one more to equal the major league record held by Rube Waddell and Bob Feller. The victory was the eighth for Koufax over the Mets without a loss and gave him a 4-3 season mark.

Dick Farrell posted his sixth win against a single loss for the eighth-place Colts with help from Woodeshick, who entered the game in the ninth inning with Pirates on first and third and got Roberto Clemente to line into a double play and struck out Gene Freese.

Smoky Burgess stole his second base in nine seasons to lead on the Pirates' only run, scoring on a single by Bob Bailey.

Peril to Press Seen In Rights Bill

Senator John Tower of Texas has proposed an amendment to the pending Civil Rights bill exempting journalists from coverage under Title VII.

Senator Tower said his amendment would protect "the Constitutional principle of freedom of the press by precluding any bureaucrat from being in a position to order the hiring or firing of any writer or commentator on public affairs."

The amendment would apply to Title VII of the bill. It would add the following words on page 31, line 22 of the measure now pending:

"Except that any individual who is employed in an editorial capacity involving the preparation, selection, or presentation of the news, including, but not limited to, editors, editorial writers, journalists, photographers, announcers, and commentators, shall not be considered employees."

Tower said the bill, as now written, would bring almost every newspaper in the country, weekly and daily, under provisions of the proposed Equal Employment Opportunity Commission.

"Consider what might happen if a newspaper or station, or magazine turns down an applicant for an editorial writing position who happens to be a member of a minority group. Quite aside from the fact that the individual may not agree at all with the newspaper's editorial policy, a federal commission could decide that the newspaper discriminated in refusing to hire him on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin."

"This bill admits very clearly that the guilty employer — in this case a newspaper entitled to freedom of the press to express its views — could be required to hire this individual. Or the newspaper could be required to pay him back pay; or to train him in some way."

Military Members of U.S. Embassy in Cairo Restricted to Immediate Area, in Contrast to Free Travel by Reds

WASHINGTON — Military members of the U.S. embassy in Cairo are being subjected to an outrageous harassment.

Despite the fact that the U.S. has given President Gamel Nasser more than \$892 million in economic aid in recent years, the military personnel of the U.S. embassy in Cairo are restricted to the immediate vicinity of the embassy.

The officers and enlisted men can't even travel freely about the city, to say nothing about the rest of the United Arab Republic.

In glaring contrast, the numerous military members of the Russian and other Iron Curtain embassies, including Cuba's, have complete freedom of movement.

The harshly restrictive Nasser policy toward U.S. military personnel has been accepted in silence by the U.S. government. The State Department not only has not retaliated against this shocking affront, but hasn't even protested it.

And in Washington, the sizable military staff of the U.A.R. embassy goes about the capital and the U.S. without any restraints. They live and travel luxuriously, entertain frequently and lavishly, and enjoy the best the U.S. offers in comfort, pleasures and liberty.

These Nasser "military diplomats" never had it so good, and are making the most of it — in striking contrast to the studiously ignominious confinement imposed on their U.S. opposite numbers in Cairo.

Significantly, the U.A.R. is the one Middle East country armed with the Soviets' powerful SA-2 high-level anti-aircraft missiles. The U.A.R. is one of only four countries definitely known to have these deadly weapons — the others being Cuba, Indonesia and Red China.

FUTILE APPEASEMENT — Senator Ernest Gruening, D-Alaska, in bringing to light this shocking backstage situation, noted that approximately two-thirds—\$575 million—of the \$892 million given Nasser in economic aid has been extended in the past three years.

Further, that this aid is continuing. Last year it totaled \$198.7 million, and so far this year is almost as large — in grain shipments, for which Nasser pays in his own currency, and long-term loans at 4% of one per cent interest, with a moratorium on principal payment for the first ten years.

"In this manner," declared Gruening, "we have loaned Egypt immense sums, most of

have burned to death untold numbers of Yemenite men, women and children with Russian-made napalm bombs," said Gruening. "Hundreds of millions of U.S. dollars have been given to Nasser to help him wage this bloody and senseless war. And while people die in Yemen, our State Department apologizes for Nasser, continues to give him more dollars and aid, and calmly reiterates that Nasser is more moderate than he used to be."

Gruening flatly charged that Nasser, in addition to waging merciless war in Yemen, also is covertly opposing U.S. foreign policy.

"In the past year, Nasser has repeatedly attempted to circumvent U.S. foreign policy, wherever, whenever and however he could," asserted Gruening. "He has attempted to add fuel to the fires now raging in Cyprus. He has urged Libya to throw the U.S. off its military base in that country, a base constructed and maintained at immense cost to American taxpayers, and for which we have paid millions in blackmail to the government of Libya."

"How does one explain the silence of our State Department and the silence of our representatives in the United Nations in the face of these indisputable facts? The only explanation I can offer is that these authorities, through the years, have lacked the wisdom and the instinctual fortitude to stand up for the best interests of the United States. They have been so zealous in support of Nasser's moves that they have overlooked the basic fact that his insatiable self-aggrandizement works directly against the best interests of our country."

FOREIGN FLASHES — Rumania, in addition to sending a high-level so-called "economic mission" to the U.S., also has a similar group in Iran, a close ally of the U.S. Purpose of the mission to Iran is to negotiate a trade agreement. The new pro-Western government in Brazil has cracked down on an organization known as "Friends of the Soviet Union," which under the Goulart regime set up a number of branches throughout the country.

Noting that Premier Khrushchev has bestowed the two highest Soviet decorations on Nasser, Gruening caustically assailed State Department "appeasers" who consistently offer alibis and apologies for the turbulent U.A.R. dictator.

"They say Nasser has matured, that he does not mean what he says, that he would not take a rash step," said Gruening. "Why not? There are many in the administration charged with the conduct of foreign affairs who refuse to face the facts of life.

"Nasser is playing the Communist game. He is the Kremlin's stooge just as surely as if he had proclaimed it as loudly as has Castro. Ample proof of that is Khrushchev's war threats in the U.A.R. in recent days. The plain facts are that ever since Nasser adopted the policy of 'neutrality' in favor of Moscow, he has been pursuing the Soviet line and espousing Soviet policy."

As clear evidence of that, Gruening cited Nasser's "bloody war of aggression in Yemen." "Egyptian military forces
