

Experts Warn of Possible Damage By Cotton Pests

-Cotton entomologists in the lower Rio Grande Valleywhich usually produces the nation's first cotton- warned farmers today to treat their cotton with insecticides or face

The Cotton Pest Control Association (CPCA) reported many of the boll worms and bud worms now in cotton are already half grown and getting harder to kill. Boll weevil populations also were reported mounting rapidly and fleahoppers have been a problem all

The problem was blamed on drying up corn fields, which pushed boll worms out of corn and into green cotton.

The CPCA said many farmers had already "procrastinated beyond the danger point and lost a lot of cotton." It added that what cotton was still on the plant could be

The CPCA recommended a program of regular five-day application of insecticide, using a broad spectrum material that would control all insects. Six to eight applications would be required to bring the crop

"Fields that were not properly inspected or were not controlled in early season under the recommended program have suffered a severe loss of set to fleahoppers," a spokesman said. "It will be pointless to control some of these fields now-since there is little or no cotton on the plants and no possibility of making any before plow-up.

He admitted there are very few ruined fields, but said there were enough to point up the effectiveness of control measures.

Officials foured the Valley this week and reported good crops could come from the fields that used the recommended control measures. But, neglected fields were already ruined, the CPCA said.

Sale of Bonds Shows Increase In Southwest

DALLAS (UPI)- Texas and the Southwest may be leading the country in sales of U. S. Savings Bonds, T. Guy Wood, area manager for the savings bonds program, said Saturday.

Wood said that whereas bond sales in the annual spring drive are down about 3 per cent in the rest of the country, they are up about 5 per cent in the Southwest.

Through April, new bond sales in the drive in Texas' four largest metropolitan counties were - Dallas, \$6,350,522; Tarrant, 5,263,964; Harris 6,010,685 and Bexar 5,799,178.

"In the course of the whole year, we will have sales of \$22 million in north Texas, including \$18 million in Dallas County," Wood said. "We are running a little ahead of our \$18 million goal in Dallas County."

Wood said many persons are asking for the new \$75 bond that bears a likeness of the late President Kennedy. He said there appears to be better cooperation throughout Texas on bond sales.

In Dallas County, 100 business executives made calls on 1,600 companies to try to bring them into the payroll savings plan.

"Many companies are going back into the payroll savings plan," Wood said. "I think it is because of the convenience to their employes to save under this plan."

He noted that newspapers and radio and television stations through the country have contributed \$50 million worth of space and air time to the drive.
