





Says

DR. WAYNE BRANDSTADT Q-Does the tuberculin test show whether the tubercle bacillus is present anywhere in the body?

A -The tuberculin test shows whether or not a person has had enough contact with the tubercle bacillus to build up an immunity to it. If a person's test is positive, it may mean that he has some active tuberculosis, but is in the process of overcoming it. Far more often, it means that the battle has been won and all the soldiers have gone back to their families. In medical school we used to say. "Give us this our daily tubercle bacillus." Mild exposure, if repeated often, is the best way to keep up the body's resistance to the disease. But even the resistant person can get the disease as a result of an overwhelming exposure. Fortunately we now have effective antituberculosis drugs that greatly facilitate the treatment of this disease. Q-What would cause me to continue to have a sour stomach even after surgical removal of part of my stomach? A-Unless you have a peptic ulcer, in which case the acid-forming glands in the stomach would put out too much acid, an overabundance of acid in itself would not cause any symptoms. On the other hand, if you regurgitate sour stomach contents after meals, this would taste sour even if the concentration of the acid were normal. The cause of such regurgitation may be eating too fast, worry or nervous tension, failure to chew your food thoroughly or an allergy to one of the foods eaten. There are many antacids that you can take for temporary relief. If you have a great deal of trouble, you should have your doctor determine steps to eliminate it. Q-You recently said that a tumor of the thymus is sometimes the cause of myasthenia gravis. What kind of test is given to determine whether you have a tumor of the thymus? A-The thymus is a gland of uncertain function. It is now believed to be an important factor in helping the child develop immunity to various infections. It attains its largest size at puberty. after which it dwindles and almost disappears. It is located between the thyroid and the heart. Unless a thymus tumor is very large, it is likely to go unrecognized. When the thymus is enlarged, an X-ray of the chest may reveal displacement of other structures in that region. Even then it is hard to tell whether the gland is larger than normal because the dimensions of this gland are so variable.

Earnest Money Contract Should Cover Details of **Real Estate Purchase** The signing of a contract of ale is an extremely important tep in the purchase of a home. Once buyer and seller have igned, they are bound by the rovisions of the contract. heir respective legal rights in e transaction are thereby set nd determined. If the contract poorly and hapazardly drawn, harvest of regret may be eaped at a later date.

Sales contracts are often calld by other names, such as earest money contracts, binders, eceipts, etc. All of them are or the same purpose and alnost without exception involve he deposit of money by the uyer. Some require the seller o put up a good faith deposit. 'he fact that such deposited ums are usually to be forfeitd in event the depositor later ails to go through with his pecified contractual obligations ends additional weight to the often-stated admonition that no contract should be signed withut complete understanding as o its terms.


But many home purchasers and sellers) rush to sign a hastily-prepared contract with very little knowledge of its conents. The pressure of time, the informality of the occasion, the asual appearance of the conract, and perhaps the fact that partially-printed form is used nay contribute in causing the true importance of the act to be overlooked. At any rate, many tre lulled into a lapse of good business judgment.

Every significant detail of the bargain should be crystallized in nmistakable terms in the conract of sale. Land and fixtures lescribed. A complete descripon of the property by lot and lock, or by metes and bounds, a must, the street number beg inadequate by itself.

The price to be paid must, of ourse, be specified, along with nethod and terms of payment. a certain-sized loan is a preequisite to the buyer's ability o complete the purchase, this fact should be noted. Sad indeed is the prospective purchaser who loses his earnest money when a contemplated loan transaction falls through, his contract requiring payment of the entire consideration in cash.

The sales contract should also state the quality of the title to be conveyed to the buyer and the type of title evidence to be furnished.

The buyer's individual cir cumstances and desires may require that various matters not mentioned above be provided for in the contract. All too often people try to squeeze a sales contract to fit this type of printed form on hand, omitting or leaving to easily misconstrued or forgotten or al agreement many vital provisions. Do not fall into the "pitfall of the printed form." Too many unfortunate entanglements have been announced by clients to lawyers. with the words, "I have just signed a receipt for a house on Blank Street. Will you take over now and see that every-thing is O.K.?"
