## Accidents Hike Toll Over State

Automobile accidents and drownings took most of the lives lost to violence in Texas over the weekend — including two persons drowned when an amphibious auto sank in the Gulf of Mexico.

A count by United Press International showed 31 dead, including 18 in highway smash-ups and 7 drowned.

Drowned when the sea-going car capsized were auto salesman Grand Edward Israel, 26, of Buffalo, N. Y., and June Anderson, 21, of Corpus Christi. Israel was demonstrating the car Saturday in heavy seas about 150 yards off Padre Island near Corpus Christi. A heavy wave flung it over.

### Two Saved

Mrs. Sally Meeks Powell and 6-month-old Brian Keith Anderson, son of the dead woman, were saved.

Travis Paul Allen of Cleburne died Sunday of injuries received when his station wagon smashed broadside into a truck. Seven others were injured, including Allen's wife and four children aged 3 to 11.

In rushing blood for transfusions to the victims of that accident, a state police car was involved in an accident, and a Johnson County deputy sheriff suffered a heart attack in a separate incident and was hospitalized in satisfactory condition.

### Small Boy Killed

A 10-year-old Lubbock boy Samuel Cartwright was struck by a car and killed near Reese Air Force Base Sunday.

Two unidentified men in a small foreign car were killed in a head-on crash two miles east of Henrietta on State Highway 287 Sunday night. Investigators said they were burned beyond recognition but were believed to have been military men, possibly from Sheppard AFB near Wichita Falls, because of uniforms found.

Inez Rindon, 11, and her sister Cynthia, 8, waded hand-in-hand into Austin's city lake Sunday, stepped into a deep hole and drowned. They were on a family outing.

## JFK Slaying Commission Eyes Rumors

DALLAS (UPI) — As policemen frantically loaded the wounded Lee Harvey Oswald aboard an ambulance in the Dallas City Hall, one newsman who had just watched Jack Ruby shoot him turned to another and said:

"If he dies without talking, there are going to be new rumors about the assassination popping up every week for years."

He did. There are. And that apparently worries the Warren Commission.

Charged with providing an unchallengeable account of "black weekend" in Dallas, the commission hopes to wind up its work by the end of the summer.

And the concluding phase, said a commission member, will be devoted to tracking down the rumors that still cluster around the sudden and violent death of John F. Kennedy. This will probably mean more visits to Dallas by commission members.

The commission member, Sen. John Sherman Cooper, R-Ky., said he expects this final part of the commission's work to be done in two or three months.

## Demonstrators Set New Action In Tennessee

NAACP Announces Intentions To Continue Nashville Activity

Civil rights demonstrators planned to begin their third week of protests at segregated restaurants in Nashville, Tenn., today in a campaign that has resulted in almost 200 arrests.

The demonstrations will continue until a public accommodations bill is approved by the city council," Mrs. C. E. McGruder, president of the Nashville branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), told UPI Sunday.

"We will step up our demonstrations this week and they will continue indefinitely," Mrs. McGruder said.

About 30 Negro and white demonstrators gathered at a Negro Baptist Church in Nashville Sunday and conducted an orderly march on the city hall.

At Cedar Falls, Iowa, students at the State College of Iowa and faculty members scheduled a "silent march and mail-in" civil rights demonstration for today.

At Manhattan, Kan., pickets charging racial discrimination planned to continue to march outside two barbershops. The pickets claim the shops refuse to accept customers of all races.

At Enfield, N. C., Sunday, two voter registrars in Halifax County, scene of a concentrated registration drive by Negroes, resigned and the Halifax voter movement requested that a Negro be appointed to fill one of the posts.

Hundreds of Negroes, who number whites 32,000 to 26,000

## Three More Arrested In Viet Bomb Plot

Saigon (UPI)—Police arrested three more persons today in connection with a Communist bomb plot against Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara.

McNamara, who arrives Tuesday, will make another inspection check on the progress of the U.S.-supported war against Communist guerrillas. Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, arrived here today.

Vietnamese police said the three persons taken into custody today admitted their part in a plan to blow up a bridge between Saigon airport and the city at the time when McNamara's motorcade was scheduled to pass over it. Two terrorists were arrested Saturday night while laying wires to 50 pounds of explosives under the bridge.

Authorities identified the two men arrested Saturday as Nguyen Huu Loi, 21, and Nguyen Van Thoi, 24. Police said both claimed they were hired for the job and promised \$400 if the plot was successful.

# 71 Killed in Air Crash at Manila

## Balloonist Sets Seven Records

MINNEAPOLIS (UPI)—Tracy Barnes, who rose 37,700 feet in a home-made balloon to smash seven world records, was firmly back on the ground today and apparently planned to stay there.

Barnes, a 25-year-old former paratrooper from Wayzata, Minn., bettered the record for his type of balloon, Class 3A, that had been set by Russia's Boris Nevernov in 1940. Nevernov rose to 23,286 feet.

Barnes also broke six larger balloon records.

Barnes' ascent began shortly after dawn Sunday as his mother, who lives in Peoria, Ill., looked on. The flight took 2 1/2 hours and a gentle breeze blew him from Southport Airport, near here, into Wisconsin, 80 miles away.

"I've hardly ever seen better balloon weather. It was absolutely quiet up there," he said.

"The loudest sound was the clock in the gondola ticking away. There was a little turbulence but nothing violent."

Barnes said his balloon reached its record altitude 55 minutes after takeoff. It floated eastward at some 30 miles an hour.

"The temperature got down to 55 below zero outside but never was colder than 40 above inside," he said.

Although the gondola contained no heating equipment, it was covered by a plastic foam lid that helped hold Barnes' body heat in the craft.

Barnes said he dropped nearly all of his lead shot ballast, keeping only enough for a safe landing.

"The landing was smooth. I hardly felt a thing," he said.

Barnes said he did not plan any more flights.

## Crash Survivors In Peru Reported Out of Danger

LIMA, Peru (UPI)—Two survivors of an air crash which killed 46 persons were reported out of danger today in a hospital here. A third escaped the mishap unharmed.

The plane, an Argentine military transport, crashed on a coastal sand dune Friday night as it approached for a landing here in heavy fog.

Airport officials said the pilot apparently began his approach too low.

The four-engine DC4 was on a flight from Buenos Aires via Antofagasta, Chile. All 49 persons aboard were Latin Americans except for a Spanish nun. Most were Argentines.

U.S. District Judge Alexander Holtzoff, acting at the request of the nation's railroads to quell a series of work stoppages across the country, issued a permanent injunction to prevent strikes by members of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen & Enginemen (BLFE).

Holtzoff said union members who fail to report to work without a lawful excuse may be fired or considered to have resigned their jobs.

The federal judge declared that the courts could not tolerate defiance of an arbitration award dealing with cutbacks in firemen's jobs. He said the award, handed down under an act of Congress, was now the law of the land.

Leaders of the BLFE have declared the walkouts against more than a half dozen railroads were unauthorized but were triggered by "extreme" interpretations of the arbitration award.

A spokesman for H. E. Gilbert, president of the firemen, said after today's ruling he hoped all the firemen stay on the job until we get this thing settled. We hope the carriers will refrain from extreme application of the award, too."

The commission meets at 8:30 a.m. Tuesday in the regular meeting room on the main floor of City Hall.

The attraction at the meeting is expected to be discussion of Pampa's new dog control ordinance which comes up for third and final reading.

City Manager Harold Schmitzer, who has been receiving pro and con mail on the proposed dog legislation for the past couple of weeks, predicted the commission room would be filled with persons for and against the ordinance.

Commissioner L. P. Fort, one of the backers of the ordinance, said he would present to the commission information pertinent to the dog control legislation that he has received from the Division of Veterinary Public Health of the State Health Department at Austin.

## 12 Survivors in Critical Condition

MANILA (UPI)—A U.S. military transport plane carrying 83 American service personnel crashed tonight during a rainstorm a half mile short of the runway at Clark Air Force base in the Philippines, killing 71 persons.

The 12 survivors were in critical or near-critical condition at the Clark base hospital 60 miles north of Manila, an Air Force spokesman said.

The Philippines disaster raised to 167 the total number of persons killed in a series of air crashes since last Thursday.

The Air Force spokesman said there was no hint that the four-jet C135, a military version of the Boeing 707 jetliner, was in trouble prior to the crash.

The spokesman said it was not known immediately what caused the crash, which occurred as the big jet transport, carrying 73 passengers and 10 crew members, was coming in for a landing after a flight

from Travis Air Force Base, Calif., via Hawaii. A spokesman at the Travis base originally said there were dependents as well as servicemen aboard the flight. But Travis issued a revised statement later saying only military personnel were aboard. An Air Force spokesman in Manila, Maj. John Rademacher, also said there were no dependents on the plane.

The crash occurred at 7:15 p.m. (7:15 a.m. EDT). Rademacher said a medium to heavy rain was falling at the time the jet ripped into the ground just outside the perimeter of the sprawling Air Force base.

The Manila air control center said that runways at Clark field were closed for an hour and 20 minutes following the crash.

The Philippines news service said residents of Anonas village, near the crash scene, reported they saw mangled bodies of the victims scattered about a rice field. It said the aircraft broke up upon contact with the ground.

The ill-fated flight originated at the Travis base in California at noon EDT, Sunday. The C135 stopped over for about two hours in Hawaii before continuing on the last leg of the flight to the Philippines. Travis is a major terminal for Military Air Transport Service flights.

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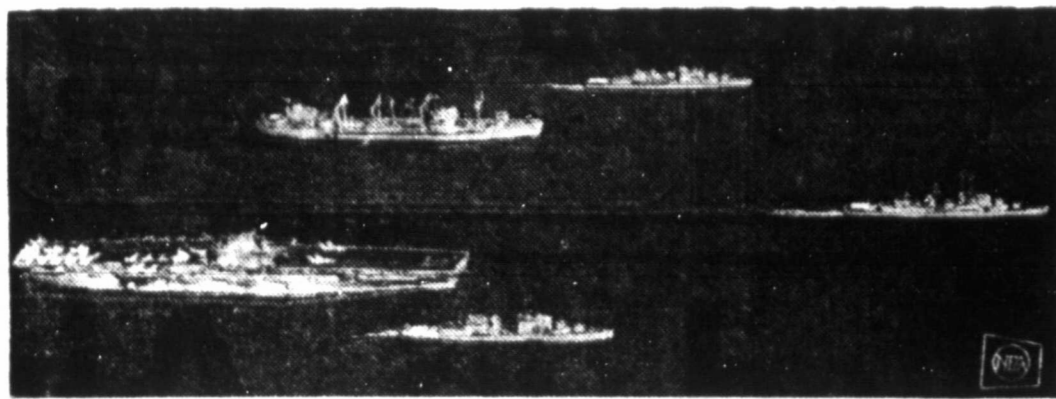

## Pastures Major High Plains Problem With New Grass Tests

Pasture grasses are rapidly becoming of major importance in both the High Plains and Rolling Plains.

Midland Bermuda grass which has proven its adaptability over the past few years along with Indiangrass and Switchgrass which have long ago proven their adaptability are the principal grasses being established.

High producing pastures do not just happen. They are planned and managed for. There are no shortcuts in establishing high producing pastures. There are some ten "musts" to consider in establishing high yielding improved pastures.

1. Soil must be highly productive. A shallow, eroded soil can store only limited moisture and fertility. If the soil produces low yields from cultivated crops, it likewise may be expected to produce relatively low yields in grass.
2. Must select adapted species of grasses. There are many grasses adapted to the Texas Panhandle. However, many of these do not respond favorably to fertilization and — or irrigation.
3. Must have proper seedbed. Many failures to get grass established can be traced to improper seedbed preparation. If the seedbed is considered adequate for the planting of grain sorghum, then it is adequate for grass planting.
4. Must have good planting material. High quality seeds may cost more in the beginning but in the long run they have proven less expensive. There is little loss in liveability of Bermuda grass sprigs when they are planted immediately after digging. If the sprigs are to be transported any distance, dampen and cover them and get them in the ground as soon as possible.
5. Material must be planted at the proper time. Failures to obtain stands after July 1 are quite common since the grass has insufficient time to establish an adequate root system

and, in many instances, winter-kills.

6. Must control weeds. Any plant that competes with improved pasture grass is a weed. Effective methods of control may be herbicidal sprays, cultivation, or even controlled grazing depending upon the species of weed competition.
7. Must fertilize properly. Vigorous growing grasses such as Midland Bermuda grass, Switchgrass and Indiangrass respond to fertilizers in many ways. The water requirement per ton of forage produced will be reduced about one-third on well-fertilized pastures as compared to non-fertilized. The tonnage will be much higher and the feed value will be almost doubled.
8. Must allow plants to establish before grazing. Since grass plants receive approximately 95 percent of the elements for growth taken from the air through the leaves and the elements are transported to the roots as "stored food," it is all important that the grass be allowed to keep its leaves until established in order to carry on the manufacturing process.
9. Must follow a timely and proper irrigation plan that will provide about one-third inch of water each day.
10. Must properly use the grass after it is established. Research and experience have shown that Midland Bermuda grass should be grazed no closer than five inches, and tall grasses such as Indiangrass and Switchgrass no closer than 12 inches during the growing season. Since over 80 percent of the total feed value of a grass is above the proper use height, one only risks the disappointment in reduced yield if it is not properly used.

## Gray County Enters Drive To End Brucellosis Threat

Dr. R. G. Garnett, executive director of the Texas Animal Health Commission, announced the receipt of Gray County petition for Type II Brucellosis Control.

Proclamation No. 229 by the Governor has been issued and a hearing has been set for July 13 at 9:30 a.m. in the office of the Texas Animal Health Commission, Sam Houston State Office Building at Austin.

All those in favor of or in opposition to the designation of this county as a Type II Brucellosis Control Area are invited to attend. If no opposition is presented, Gray County will be designated as a Type II Control Area effective Aug. 12, 1964.

## Gasoline Price War Flares Again

Peace in Pampa's gasoline price war didn't last long.

After nearly two weeks of price cutting during which regular gasoline sold for as low as 17 and 18 cents a gallon, the war ended last Wednesday and the price went back up to 30.9 cents a gallon.

Saturday, however, signs came back out in front of gasoline stations announcing that regular gasoline was on sale again for as low as 20.9 cents a gallon. At most stations today the price was 21.9 cents.

In practically all stations the price of high test gas was reduced equally and was selling at about 4 cents more per gallon than the regular brand.

Service station operators said they had no explanation for the quick renewal of the price war other than a resumption of the quarrel between majors and independents.

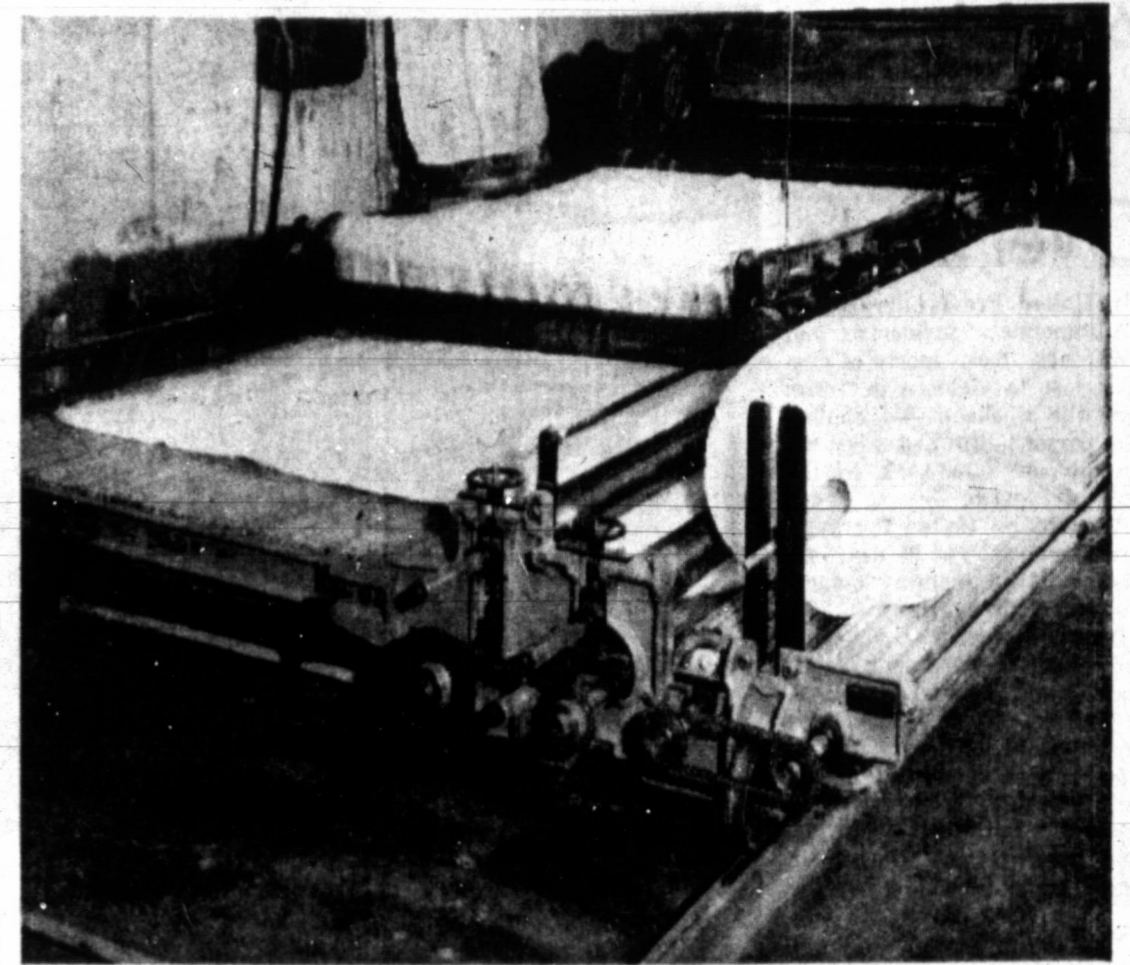

## Plane Crashes; 49 Aboard

LIMA, Peru (UPI)—An Argentine military transport plane with 49 persons aboard crashed into a coastal sand dune Friday night, scattered flaming wreckage into the sea. Three survivors were rescued a mid charred bodies Saturday, but the other 46 persons aboard were presumed dead.

Navy rescuers said the three survivors — all badly injured — were being treated at the naval hospital north of Lima. They were identified as a small boy and girl and an Argentine adult.

The Argentine Embassy said all three survivors were Argentinians. The embassy identified the adult as Oscar Ahumada, 29, Argentine air force mechanic and a crewman aboard the plane, and the children as Graciela Marta Gastaldi and Jorge Enriquez.

The naval hospital said the two children were out of danger but that Ahumada's condition was critical.

No motor vehicles are allowed inside the walls of the city of Dubrovnik, Yugoslavia, according to the Encyclopaedia Britannica.

Several bodies were found scattered along the sand dune on Santa Rosa Beach, naval rescuers reported. They said it was doubtful there would be more survivors.

An oil slick and debris from the plane was seen in the sea.

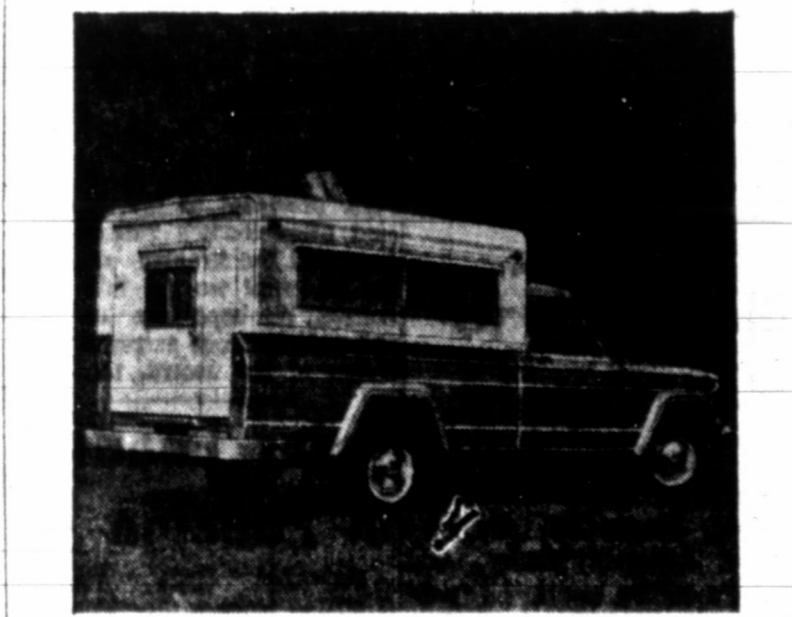

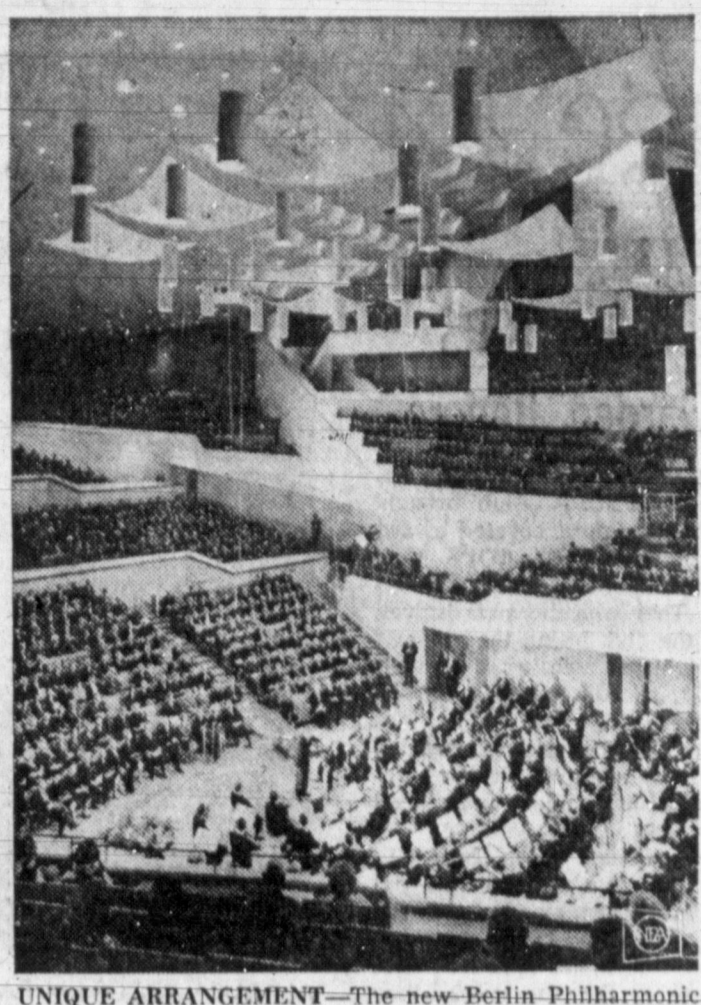

## A Tree Called Altrusa Is Club Program Topic

"A Tree Called Altrusa", an original script by Mrs. Irene Smith and Miss Ila Pool, was brought to the Altrusa Club of Pampa in play form during a recent dinner meeting of the group at Coronado Inn.

Members taking part in the presentation were Miss Pool, Miss Rosemary Lawlor, Mrs. Mary McDaniel, Mrs. Doris Fisk and Mrs. Aileen Moore. Starting with the organization of the Pampa club in 1952, the script depicted growth and stabilization of the local branch of the organization.

Because the tree never starts growing during its lifetime, this symbol was chosen by the authors to symbolize Altrusa.

Since 1917 when the idea of Altrusa Clubs was born in the mind of professional women, the tree, known as Altrusa, has grown from its seedbed in Nashville, Tenn. It has become incorporated as a national organization to afford a main channel through which executive business and professional women, representing a wide variety of occupational fields but with a similar civic and altruistic motivation may work.

The Altrusa Club with a classified membership of business and professional women, may be compared to a tree, which has the main parts: roots, trunk and branches with leaves.

The roots are the International segment which operates smoothly and inconspicuously in the background.

The trunk of the tree consists of Altrusa members, the main body. Size and strength is determined by the number and interest of members.

The bark or outer covering of the tree serves in a definite purpose in guiding the growth upward in a uniform pattern.

The board of directors could be called the bark. Growing out from the trunk, the membership, encircled in bark, the board of directors

or committees, through which all programs, activities, and projects of Altrusa are channeled.

What makes this tree so beautiful? It's the leaves and fruit. The work of the roots, the trunk and the branches would be of no value if they did not produce green leaves and fruits of assorted shapes and sizes. The fruits of the Altrusa Club of Pampa are evident in the many services it has spearheaded and executed.

Just as a tree grows, Altrusa can grow — through unity, with each part dependent on the others to form strength and successful endeavors.

Mrs. Irene Smith, program leader and chairman of the constitution and by-laws committee was in charge of the presentation.

A song, "Only God Can Make A Tree" was presented by Mrs. Mary McDaniel and Miss Rosemary Lawlor in conclusion of the program.

The serving tables were decorated with branches of trees following the theme of the program.

Mrs. Emily Coston presided over the meeting which was attended by 34 members of the club.

## The Doctor Says

There are several ways to lose weight. Exercise is one, but it has limitations. It takes a lot of exercise to lose a pound, and the exercise stimulates your appetite.

So, although I strongly advocate exercise for physical fitness, I cannot take it seriously as a means of reducing. This applies also to mechanical exercisers, massage and steam baths. Many persons who are obese have taken up cigarette smoking. This merely replaces one health hazard with a worse one. For that reason I would urge even an overweight person to give up smoking.

Surgical removal of part of the stomach was tried for a while but it was found that the patient, although he was not able to eat as much at a time, ate often and got the same number of calories he was taking before the operation. 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### Wallace Takes Bid To Eastern Shore

BALTIMORE (UPI) — Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace today carries his Maryland presidential primary campaign to the Eastern Shore community of Cambridge, where racial violence flared last summer.

The scheduled 8 p.m., EDT, speech in Cambridge was one of two planned by the segregationist governor as he headed into his final week of campaigning for the May 19 primary. He was to address a Baltimore women's club at noon, EDT.

A group of civil rights demonstrators in the racially tense town met briefly at midnight last night and sang "freedom" song, but police reported they were orderly. About 20 persons gathered in the Negro sections to join the singing but dispersed about an hour later.

Wallace, who said Sunday in two television interviews that he did not expect his appearance in Cambridge to cause any incidents, was assured he

would get maximum police protection.

About 400 Maryland National Guardsmen were ordered to Cambridge over the weekend for stand-by duty, and city officials assured Alabama troops Saturday that Wallace would receive maximum security. The town has been under limited martial law since last June's disturbances.

Wallace is running against Sen. Daniel Brewster, a standing in for President Johnson, in the Maryland race. Wallace said that he would consider it a victory if he got 5 per cent or more of the vote. There have been estimates he might win 30 per cent or more.

In his television appearances on Washington stations Sunday, Wallace said he did not want to cause trouble in his Cambridge appearance. He said, "I'm not running that kind of campaign. There is no violence or hatred in my heart for Negroes."

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson today signed an executive order exempting the director from the civil service regulation that would have required him to retire on his 70th birthday next January.

Hoover showed no sign that he was thinking of retirement. The veteran agent acknowledged that Communists had had "some success" in attempts to ease its way into civil rights organizations. But, he said the party has had "many failures" trying to influence Negro rights movements.

"Let me first emphasize that I realize that the vast majority of Negroes have rejected and recognized communism for what it is," Hoover said.

"(But) Communist interest is not based on such noble ideals as improving the status or condition of the Negro in this country."

### New Cautions Taken By President Guard

The nation's No. 1 crime fighter emphasized that the Secret Service still was in charge of security arrangements involving Johnson, but that it had asked the FBI to provide men to aid in the difficult task.

Hoover vigorously denied that there had been a lack of cooperation between the Secret Service and the FBI in the past and called any report of a rift between the two law enforcement agencies "totally without foundation."

## Yankees Hot On AL Trail

American Leaguers who laughed when Yogi Berra was appointed manager of the New York Yankees are crying "help" today.

Because the Berra-led Yankees are riding a five-game winning streak that has carried them into a virtual tie for first place in the American League scarcely a week after they seemed to be wandering about in a fog.

The Yankees swept to within 17 percentage points of the first place Chicago White Sox Sunday when they beat the Cleveland Indians, 12-2 and 3-2 in 10 innings. The victories completed an old-fashioned Yankee four-game sweep which dropped the Indians all the way from first to fourth place.

A crowd of 28,694 at Cleveland saw Roger Maris drive in five runs with a homer and two singles and Bobby Richardson hit five singles in the first game. The Yankees pulled out the nightcap in the 10th inning when relief pitcher Ted Abernathy's wild throw enabled Bill Stafford to score on a play that could have been an inning-ending double play.

The White Sox defeated the Los Angeles Angels, 5-3, the Baltimore Orioles defeated the Detroit Tigers, 2-1 and 7-1, the Minnesota Twins downed the Kansas City Athletics, 6-3, and the Boston Red Sox won, 9-4, after a 13-4 loss to the Washington Senators in other AL games.

Ron Hansen hit a three-run homer and J. C. Martin also homered for the White Sox, who have a 12-6 record compared to the Yankees' 13-7 mark. Hoyt Wilhelm shut out the Angels for the last two innings but the victory went to Eddie Fisher, who worked the middle four frames. Dick Simpson and Jim Fregosi boomed for the Angels.

Milt Pappas yielded four hits in 8 1-3 innings to win his first game of the season and Wally Bunker, pitching for the first time since his one-hit debut, allowed nine hits in the nightcap to complete Baltimore's sweep. Willie Kirkland and Norm Siebern drove in two runs each for the Orioles in the second game.

The Twins beat the Athletics for the second straight game as Don Mincher hit a three-run homer and rookie Tony Oliva weighed in with three hits. Camilo Pascual was tagged for 12 hits but hung on for the nine innings to register his third win. Oliva raised his average to .441.

Bill Skowron hit two homers and Don Zimmer had a homer and a triple to lead the Senators' 14-hit attack that carried Claude Osteen to his second win. The Red Sox bounced back in the nightcap, however, with a 14-hit attack that included a two-run homer by Carl Yastrzemski, triples by Gary Geiger and Tony Conigliaro and three singles by Eddie Bresnold.

## 49er Owner Dies Sunday

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — A Solemn Requiem Mass will be said Wednesday for Vic Morabito, managing owner of the San Francisco Forty Niners, who died of a heart attack early Sunday morning.

The 45-year-old club owner succumbed at St. Mary's Hospital after being stricken at his home. At the bedside was his wife, Elizabeth, and other members of the family. Vic Morabito was the younger brother of Tony Morabito who also died of a heart seizure at Kezar Stadium in October of 1957 during a game with the Chicago Bears.

Like his brother, Vic had vainly tried to make the Forty Niners into a champion. The team closed out its worst season with a 2-12 record last December under Coach Jack Christensen.

Where Tony Morabito was a controversial and dynamic individual, Vic stayed in comparative seclusion and rarely talked to the press. Both men had several rifts with sportswriters as the Forty Niners went from coach to coach in an effort to find a winner.

Vic was operating his family's ships service business when Tony founded the Forty Niners in 1946 and hired Buck Shaw, the famed Santa Clara coach, to take over the team. The younger Morabito subsequently joined the Forty Niners as co-owner with his brother.

## SWC Large Enough, Strangers Unwanted

LUBBOCK, Tex. (UPI)—The Southwest Conference, its members will have you know, is just big enough. No outsiders need apply, thank you.

"A maximum conference membership of eight is excellent," faculty representatives concluded at their annual spring meeting last weekend in Lubbock.

"A larger number would be unwieldy, particularly in football."

The immediate effect of the pronouncement was to dash all hopes of the University of Houston as of joining this year. The long range effect means a permanent limitation on the size of the loop.

Of course, Conference Secretary Howard Grubbs agreed, members could always rescind their unanimous resolution against expansion at a later meeting.

The Lubbock meeting will stand out in years to come as perhaps the liveliest in the conference's history to date.

For one thing, more charges of recruiting violations were considered than in other years. And the punishment for the infractions was the severest ever handed out.

The University of Texas, which produced the nation's top college football team last fall, was put on indefinite probation. The faculty committee—the conference's governing body—agreed to lift the probation next May, however, if the Longhorns showed evidence of a satisfactory revision on its procedures and practices in the recruiting of prospective athletes.

Harder hit was Southern Methodist University which was given two years' probation and denied participation in all post-season football games. The Mustangs will still be eligible for the conference championship but they must wait the full two years before their probation may be reviewed.

The slap on the hand received by Texas, it should be pointed out, amounted to only a reprimand. The Longhorns can still play post-season bowl games.

An unknown factor right now, however, is what action, if any, the NCAA might decide to take. The cases do not automatically go to the higher body for review. But it may, if it wants, step in and hand out stiffer penalties.

Two other schools—Texas Tech and Baylor—were reprimanded for permitting representatives to visit schoolboy athletes more than twice to try to sign them up.

Two other violations reported to the faculty committee failed to come up for action because they have not been thoroughly investigated.

More than a little irony was involved in the SMU probation. SMU football coach Hayden Fry charged months before the meeting that other conference schools discouraged athletes from going to SMU by spreading rumors the Dallas school was going to be placed on probation.

As one observer put it: "It looks like the other schools knew what they were talking about, doesn't it?"

## Hard-Luck Craig Loses To Mets!

Roger Craig can't remember walking under any ladders or breaking any mirrors, yet there's no doubt that the slim St. Louis righthander carries with him a peculiar curse.

It all started three years ago when the newly-minted New York Mets acquired Craig from the Los Angeles Dodgers in the National League expansion pool. And only a soothsayer can tell when it will end.

In his two years of toil and trouble with the Mets, Craig won just 15 games and lost 46 despite pitching some of the best baseball of his life. He lost games so cruelly it would have broken a lesser man, and last year he tied the National League record of 18 losses in a row. He also lost five games by 1-0 margins, which tied the major league record for suffering by a pitcher.

But Craig was seemingly delivered from such tortures when the Mets peddled him to the Cardinals during the off-season, and he immediately justified this belief by winning his first two decisions. Sunday, however, Craig came back to New York to once and for all sever all ties with his former torturers and teammates, who had handed him most of those 46 defeats.

Did It Again  
Alas, the merciless Mets did it again, thumping Roger 4-1 with the three-run outburst in the eighth inning which included home runs by Rod Kanehl and Frank Thomas. It was the same old story for Craig, who got too few runs and suffered an all too familiar late-inning malady.

The Mets, however, managed to play more like Roger remembered them in the second game of the doubleheader as the Cards shelled rookie Jerry Hunsley, making his first start in pro ball, and veteran Tom Sturdivant, making his debut as a Met, for 14 hits and a 1-0 victory.

In single games, the Dodgers drubbed the Giants, 9-1, and the Reds blanked the Phillies, 2-0. The Pirates split with the Braves, winning the nightcap, 6-5, after losing the opener, 11-5, and the Cubs divided with the Colts, taking the first game 4-3 and bowing in the second game, 4-1, in other National League doubleheaders.

Drysdale Gets Fourth  
Don Drysdale went the distance for his fourth win of the year and mammoth Frank Horwath socked his 10th homer in the Dodgers' conquest of the Giants, which broke a Los Angeles streak of three. Drysdale limited the league leaders to six hits, including a pair of doubles by Willie Mays, who drove in the San Francisco run and extended his hitting streak to 17 games.

Veteran Joe Nuxhall became the first lefthander to beat the Phillies this season when he shut out Philadelphia on four hits. Chris Short struck out 11 Reds in eight innings but was victimized by a passed ball which eluded catcher Gus Triandos on a third strike and cost him a run.

Hank Aaron homered and singled in the seventh inning of the opener as 12 Braves went to bat and seven runs scored to insure the Milwaukee victory. But Willie Stargell's single with two out in the ninth drove home Bob Bailey with Pittsburgh's winning run in the second game.

"Unless there is evidence of an overt act, such as fraud or a 'fixed' fight, it has always been our (WBA) position to sustain the decision of the officials," Greene said at Paterson, N.J.

## Goode Resigns, Takes Taft Post

LEFORS (Spl) — Head football coach Dunny Goode has resigned at Lefors High School to take the athletic directorship and head coaching job at Taft, Texas.

Goode, a veteran coach who has been at Lefors three years, handed in his resignation to Superintendent of Schools Harry Garrison this week end and it was officially announced this morning.

"I hate to leave Lefors," said the popular Goode, "but this is a big step up and I can't pass up the opportunity." Taft, located near Corpus Christi, is a Class AA school, with an enrollment just a few short of Triple-A. Lefors is currently Class A, but drops to Class B next fall.

"These are wonderful kids here and I really hate to leave them," said Doefel Dunny, "frankly, I think they will win despite who the coach is, they have that kind of spirit."

Goode, his wife, Betty Ann Green, formerly of Pampa, and five-year-old son Eric, will move to Taft June 1.

Goode, an all-state griddle at Midland, set several records in college that still stand. A halfback at Hardin-Simmons University from 1950-53, Goode still holds the NCAA record for most times rushing in a season, holds five school records, and in his senior year, was second in yards gained rushing in the nation with 1,398.

Upon graduation, Goode went into the U. S. Army, and in 1956, became backfield coach at Canadian. In 1959 he went to Andrews and in 1960 became freshman coach and defensive backfield varsity coach at HSU.

In 1961 he came to Lefors. During his three-year tenure, the Pirates won one district title and produced two all-state players, Scott Dunham, now at Panhandle A&M, and Phil Woodring, slated to play for the University of Houston next fall.

Goode's proudest achievement was at Lefors are the seven players who have received major college scholarships in football.

Superintendent Garrison said this morning "I hate to lose him... we all hate to lose him, but we are happy that he is moving up." Garrison said that the position is open and the Lefors School Board will accept applications for the post beginning immediately. Goode's is the second head coaching post at Lefors open, basketball coach Dale Prescott having recently resigned to move to Oklahoma.

## Casper Cashes Colonial Check

FORT WORTH (UPI) — Round Billy Casper, cashing in the biggest check (\$14,000) of his career for the Colonial National Invitation golf crown, headed for his second deep sea fishing — today as pro golfer's No. 4 all-time money winner.

The 32-year-old Casper, hitting "only one bad shot all day," fired a steady 34-36-70 final round Sunday for a one-under-par 279 total that pushed him four strokes out front of runner-up Tommy Jacobs and six ahead of third-place Gene Littler.

"I'm going home (San Diego, Calif.) and then head for La Paz (on Lower California's Pacific Coast) for some deep sea fishing," Casper said after his 72-67-70-70 tour of Colonial Country Club's demanding 7,122-yard, par 35-35-70 layout.

The check, \$2,000 larger than his previous high of \$12,000 for the 1950 National Open, boosted his 10-year earnings as a pro to \$312,905.66 and put him in the No. 4 lifetime earnings spot behind Arnold Palmer, Julius Boros and Doug Ford, leading him past Sam Snead and Dow Finsterwald.

Casper and Finsterwald, who won \$3,160 here as one of five tied for fourth place at 287, became the fourth and fifth pros to join the exclusive \$300,000-plus club for all-time winnings. Finsterwald now ranks No. 6 with \$302,105 behind Snead's \$311,790.54.

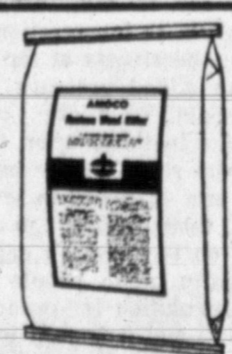
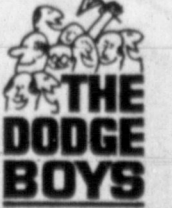

DIA Data on Russian Troops, Technicians, Missiles in Cuba Far Less Soothing Than CIA Withdrawal 'Leak'

WASHINGTON - Russia stills are still manned by Soviet personnel. The DIA estimate compares present Russian strength, with that in October-November 1962 as follows:

The DIA also reports that Soviet technicians and specialists are in full control of 12 coastal missile stations now guarding crucial sea approaches. These powerful installations would be a serious threat to an attacking amphibious force.

In recent weeks the Russians have withdrawn what U.S. experts characterize as "experimental" SA-3 and SA-4 missiles and their operating units.

However, two important points are noted: (1) These withdrawals in no way reduce the tremendous overall strength of the anti-aircraft forces; (2) there is no concrete evidence of the whereabouts of the SA-3 and SA-4 missiles.

Only positive information in DIA hands is photographs obtained by U-2 reconnaissance flights showing that two of the "experimental" missiles which their radar equipment have disappeared from their sites, and a statement Ambassador Anatoly Dobrynin reportedly made to Ambassador Llewellyn Thompson, State Department expert on Russia, that these missiles have been "withdrawn."

Psychology Dictates Weapon Use

WASHINGTON (NEA) - The psychologist is coming into his own in the Pentagon.

The Navy, Air Force and Army now have groups of researchers quietly determining what military weapons, strategy and maneuvers have the greatest psychological effects before and during wars and guerrilla operations.

The aim is to discover better ways to prevent the Reds from starting wars, to worry them and to quelling wars they've started and to scare them away from escalating conventional wars into all-out nuclear struggles.

Some of the thinking has been winning favor among the upper brass in the three services. It will be considered in the months ahead for application to South Viet Nam, Western Europe and other global trouble spots.

### JFK Stamp Design From Top Artists

The John-Fitzgerald-Kennedy memorial postage stamp was created by one of the nation's top design firms. Postmaster General John A. Gronouski announced, as photographs of the stamp design were made public last week, according to postmaster O. K. Gaylor.

The 5-cent stamp will be issued nationwide May 29, the 47th birthday anniversary of the late president. First day ceremonies for the stamp will be in Boston. It is a blue-gray stamp in horizontal format, with an initial print order of 250 million, double the customary production of commemorative stamps.

Gronouski described the Kennedy stamp as "the most carefully planned stamp in postal history." He said that a seven-man team in the New York design firm of Raymond Loewy and William Smith had worked exclusively on the project from Jan. 16 to March 17, when the design was approved.

The stamp combines an informal portrait of Kennedy and a reproduction of the eternal flame on the Kennedy grave. Circling the stamp is a quotation from the inaugural address of 1961: "... and the glow from that fire can truly light the world."

This is the design that Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy and members of the Kennedy family chose from a portfolio of 16 proposals submitted by the Loewy-Smith organization.

Mrs. Kennedy also saw unselected designs that artists-professional and amateur - offered to the Post Office Department. More than 100 of these were sent to Mr. Gronouski by citizens ranging from grandmothers to young children. Many of the accompanying letters began, "I am not an artist, but..."

Post Office Department files bulge with letters from all over the world asking that a John Fitzgerald-Kennedy stamp be issued.

Within hours after the assassination of President Kennedy on November 22, 1963, artists in the Bureau of Engraving and Printing were rough sketching preliminary designs for a memorial stamp.

### Airline Ticket Theft Suspect Shot by Officers

NEW YORK (UPI) — A suspect in a multimillion-dollar racket involving the sale of stolen airplane tickets was shot to death early today by detectives trying to arrest him.

A million dollars' worth of tickets were recovered from the suspects' car.

The man was identified as Vladimir Jezina, 23 of New York. He was described as an associate of John V. Hendricks, 42 of New York, who was arrested May 2 in the ticket case.

Police said Jezina was shot to death in a midtown parking lot as he tried to escape from four detectives.

Detectives said Hendricks, who operated a travel bureau in a midtown Manhattan hotel, forged tickets and sold them to persons who would seek refunds for them from the airlines.
