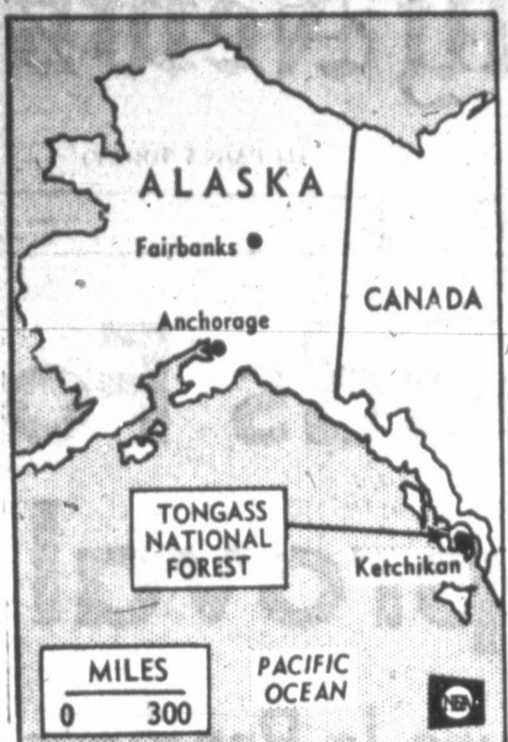

Police are investigating both incidents.

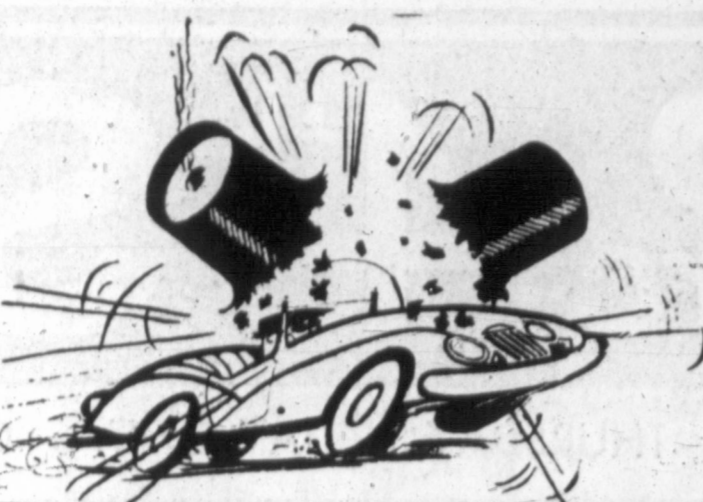

### Operation Motorcide Scheduled by Police

While the drivers of Texas are making plans for 4th of July trips, the Texas Department of Public Safety is getting ready for "Operation Motorcide", a three day vigil of tabulating all traffic deaths in the State. Major Harry Hutchison, Regional Commander of this area for the D.P.S., reported today the State is approaching the midpoint in the year amid definite indications that traffic deaths will hit an all time high again in 1964.

### Local Factory May Employ 200 Women

Employment at the Marie Foundations Factory here in Pampa has reached almost 100 persons, it was reported today by company officials. The factory, which is owned by the Form-O-Lith Corporation, has been in their new site on West Kingsmill for about two months. The factory began operations with 45 employees and have added approximately 4 each week to reach the present total of 100.

"At the present location we can employ about 240 women and once we reach that total," said Dale Greenhouse, manager of the factory, "we can expand our facilities." "We are adding employees as fast as we can train them," he said, "and by the end of the year we hope to have 200 women employed."

Applications for employment at the factory are made at the Texas Employment Commission. Also, touring the factory this week is Juanita Brooks, head designer for the Marie Foundation, from Los Angeles, Calif. Mrs. Brooks is making her first official tour of the factory in the new location.

### Newly Wed Couples Killed in Plane Crash

NANTUCKET, Mass. (UPI)—Married Saturday. Honey-mooned Sunday and Monday. Dead Tuesday.

Charles R. Cavanaugh, 28, of Englewood, Colo., a research assistant at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and Mary C. Corbett, 27, of Boston's Dorchester section were married Saturday at St. Brendan's Church in Dorchester.

At just about the same time, Everett R. Jones, 40, of Warwick, R.I., and Beverly Patron, 32, of East Providence, R.I., were being married at Calvary Baptist Church in Providence.

By chance they both decided to honeymoon on this popular resort island just off the Massachusetts coast. They both chose the same establishment and were given rooms next to each other.

The Cavanaugh's arrived by ferry, with their car. The Jones flew here, with the husband, a part-time commercial pilot, at the controls of the single-engine Beechcraft. The honeymooning couples quickly became friends.

On Monday, Cavanaugh mentioned that he and his bride were going to take a boat trip the next day to Martha's Vineyard. The Jones agreed to accompany them, but insisted they should fly there.

Tuesday morning the two couples flew to Martha's Vineyard and took a two-hour tour of the island in a rented car.

After lunch they climbed back into the plane and flew back here. But they never made it. As the plane reached the island it apparently ran out of gas. The motor sputtered. Jones circled an abandoned golf course apparently looking for a spot to land.

Suddenly the plane nosedived from a height of 100 feet. It crashed on the rolling hills of the golf course, killing both couples.

The only blue-eyes member of the family with black hair, beautiful white skin and a neat figure, Luci has an individualistic streak, a warm lovable nature, and explosive temper and a mind of her own.

Seeking an identity for Luci is the main force in her life at the moment.

Luci always has been a stand-out, especially for her parents who treat her with kid gloves. As an understanding mother, Mrs. Johnson said her daughter is not always "flexible" but has a "deep sense of obligation" and feels she has been

set up as some kind of model for America's youth.

The President also regards Luci with admiration and says she is the kind of daughter any father would want to have.

There is nothing Luci cherishes more now than her teen-age right to rebel. But she is totally aware that she is in the public eye, and she carries the burden well.

Popular and much in demand for public appearances, she mounts a platform like a pro and can make a speech at the drop of a hat. She is an extrovert, wants to be loved and describes herself as "impulsive."

"I'm a high-strung person who likes to be happy," she says.

She speaks of her need for "privacy" in the pained tones of a grown-up. But her friends have free access to the White House and her boyfriend, Jack Olson, 18, of Maiden Rock, Wis. an elevator operator at the capitol, drops by nearly every evening to keep her company in the third floor solarium teen room.

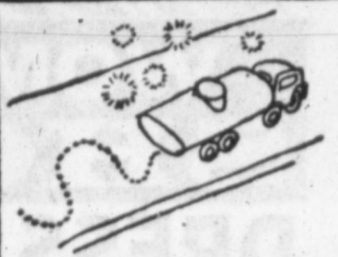
**SCIENCE SKETCHES**



**AN EXPLOSIVE PROBLEM** in New York, a costly and embarrassing tendency for Manhattan women's nylon stockings to disintegrate, has been attributed to dynamite. The city's Air Pollution Department says the unhappy ladies are the victims of an unusual condition resulting from blasting when a layer of warm, humid, dusty air is held close to the ground by a layer of cold air. Nitrogen oxides released by the exploding dynamite produce nitric acid droplets which feed ravenously on nylon. The gallant department has issued an order prohibiting blasting when this condition prevails.



**"ACOUSTIC parameter logs,"** a new technique developed by Pan Geo Atlas Corp., Houston, for discovering oil and natural gas, is said to come closest to man's dream of "seeing" hydrocarbons deep within the earth. **Foreign Commentary**

According to the blueprint, this should be a day of celebration and thanksgiving for the republic of the Congo.

The fact that on this fourth anniversary of Congolese independence the Congo finds itself in the grip of revolt and chaos, anxiety and fear shows how far the builders have departed from the blueprint.

As the last of 20,000 United Nations troops depart the Congo, revolt large and small tears at the provinces of Kwilu, Kivu and North Katanga.

In four years, U.N. peace-keeping efforts cost \$408 million with approximately \$171 million of it coming from the United States. And peace and stability in the Congo still are measured in terms of years away.

Independence in the Congo did not have an auspicious beginning.

Scarcely had King Baudouin of Belgium proclaimed the Congolese free than Patrice Lumumba, the country's first premier, launched a bitter attack against the "humiliating slavery" of Belgian colonialism.

"...the ironies, the insults, the blows that we had to submit to morning, noon and night because we were Negroes."

The history of the Congo has indeed been full of ironies, of promises made and broken, of a tremendous United Nations effort and a withdrawal today with peace not yet secure, and, at the beginning, of a huge and strategic territory whose economic base had been established without the necessary accompaniment of education and political responsibility.

Not the least ironic is the gathering now in Leopoldville, the capital, of names familiar in the first days of independence when first the new republic seemed destined to fly apart by its own violence.

...Moise Tshombe, who in the early moments of Congolese independence decided he wanted no part of it and established himself as president of the mineral-rich secessionist province of Katanga. He fought three wars against the United Nations and Congolese troops, and lost.

...The former self-styled King Albert Kalonji who declared himself king, emperor and god of the "independent diamond state" of Kasai Province.

...And finally, Antoine Gizenga, once the favorite African son of the Soviets and former leftist president of Orientale Province.

...Lumumba, whose mantle Gizenga has attempted to take over. Of the early ones, Lumumba is the important one not present. He died while imprisoned under the care of Tshombe. It was no great loss to the West, only the way of his dying which came about allegedly while trying to escape.

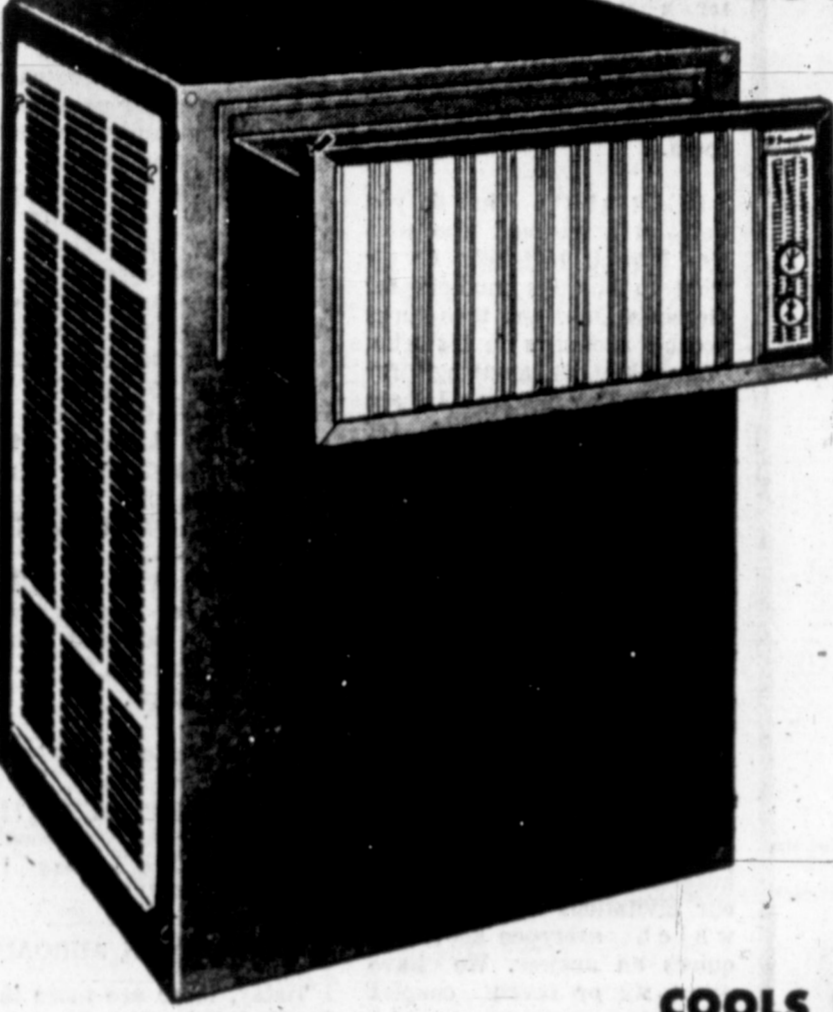
Among the other three there is no less of the ambition which drove them earlier.

Their aid is sought now by the Leopoldville government of Premier Cyrille Adoula and President Joseph Kasavubu only in the desperate need for help against Communist-supported revolts in both East and West and mounting unrest among disillusioned tribesmen.

At the time he promised to take her out four times a day and this was the condition on which we let him have her. But he has broken the bargain. He's like pulling teeth to get him to take her out even once a day. My husband thinks that we should give the dog away if he refuses to do what he promised.

ANSWER: He promised too much, maybe. My advice is to reduce his dog-outing to one time a day and to reduce it without either anger or contempt.

Don't run off with any notion that I am advocating soft-headed indulgence of your child. I am not. I am advising you to help him down from the high horse from which he made you an approval-seeking pledge on which he can't deliver.

The chronic promise-breaker invariably pledges us the most glittering benefits. Like the 9-year-old who grandly pledges himself to take his dog out four times a day, the adult promise-breaker has to grandly pledge himself to pay

his whole bill of \$200 by next Monday. It is simply not within his power to offer us \$25 on his \$20 bill. For he makes us promises, not to keep them but to command our grateful admiration.

Once he has received our admiration, reality compels him to remember that he can't pay us by next Monday. Anticipating our criticism, he begins to get angry at us and to cook up reasons that will justify his mistreatment of us. In no time at all he has us blamed for his failure to keep his word and, as your child is doing right now, fusses and carries on at us as though he owed us nothing.

I don't want to see this kind of slipperiness encouraged in your youngster. So revise his commitment to a humbler, less showy one which he can keep. It will be unnecessary for him to elaborate alibis for his inability to maintain the first one.

He himself has been unable to propose reducing his pledge to one dog-outing a day. That is because he is already afraid that the humbler offer would be unacceptable, arousing your contempt and exposing him to noble sermons on the virtue of keeping promis-

# Pampans Host 43 Students Who Represent 25 Nations

Forty-three American Field Service students representing 25 nations captured the hearts of many Pampans while they visited with local families for two nights and a day enroute to Washington D.C. where they will depart for their native lands.

The visiting high school students from various parts of the world arrived Monday evening by chartered bus and were met by their host families at the Coronado Inn. The first evening was left free for the youths and local families to get acquainted and for resting after the tiring bus trip.

Tuesday the youths had breakfast and lunch in local homes and then started a series of scheduled activities at 1 p.m. First on the agenda was a choice of a ranch tour or a tour of the Pampa Celanese plant. Following the tours they met for a swim period.

Host families brought the 43 students to Coronado Inn at 8:30 a.m. today to meet the chartered bus which left about 9 o'clock. They stop tonight at Bartlesville, Okla. The students will be received by President Johnson when they arrive in Washington and a final meeting of all this year's American Field Service students will be held to evaluate their year in the United States.

The final U.S. bus tours are set up for 2,882 students from 59 countries who concluded a year of study in the U.S. to introduce them to communities and regions of the country

other than where they attended school. The trips also give an estimated 100,000 Americans a chance to meet boys and girls from all over the world.

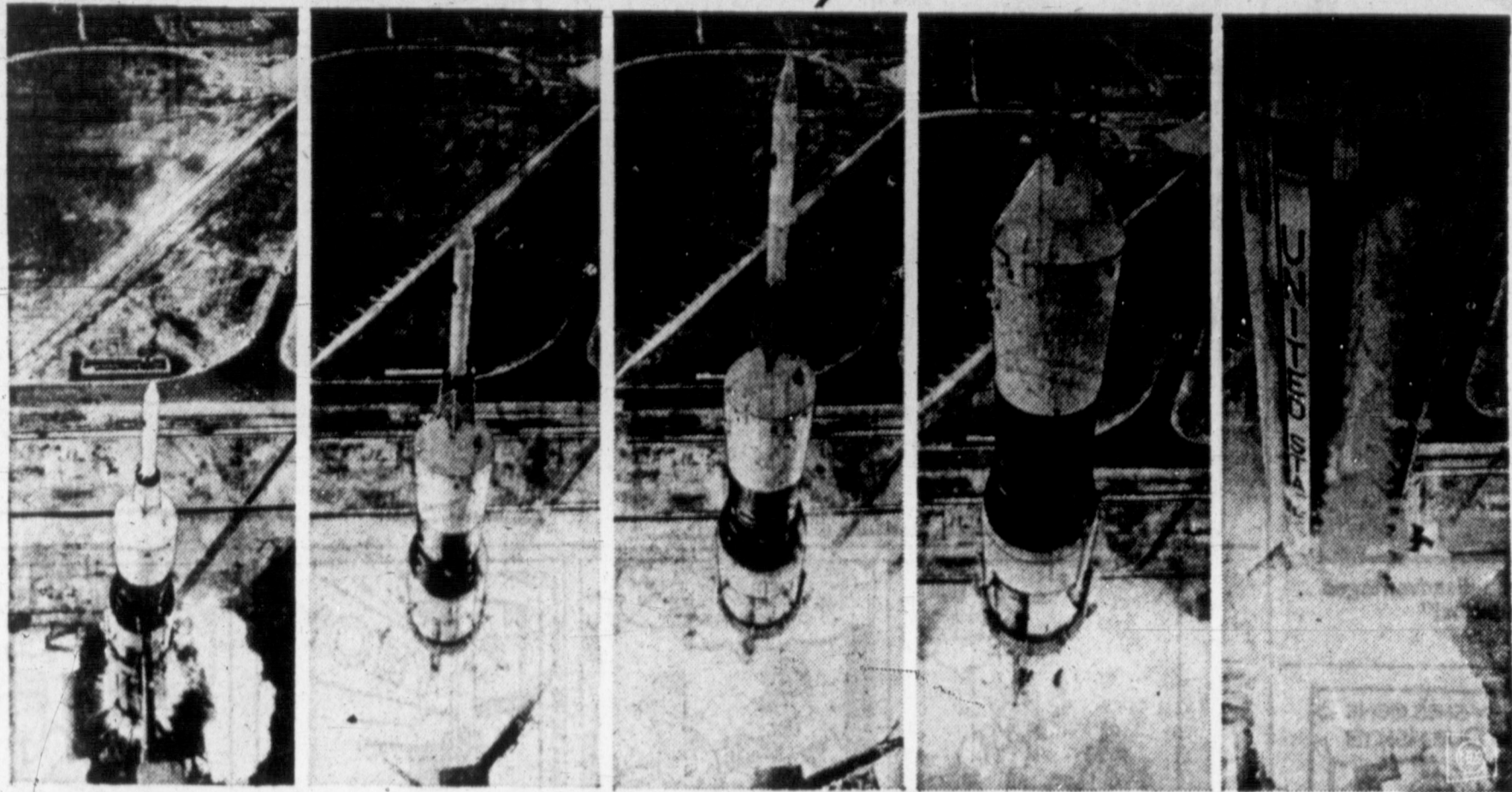

## Washington Window

Add Virginia (12 electoral votes) to the states in which President Johnson is in bad trouble. LBJ has trouble in Virginia regardless of civil rights. These observations are prompted by Sen. Harry F. Byrd's June 25 denunciation of the Johnson administration's big spending planned deficit program. Byrd protested against the steadily rising federal debt limit to \$324 billion so his administration could borrow more billions. Byrd voted against it.

The political implication of Byrd's reference to Johnson's planned deficit spending is that LBJ is in bad trouble in Virginia.

The senator is head man of the Virginia Democratic organization. It is quite possible that he will withhold his endorsement from Johnson. That probably would lick LBJ in Virginia.

There is a possibility, too, that Byrd might endorse Johnson, even though most gently. That chance arises because Virginia Republicans last week decided to put up a candidate to oppose Byrd for the Senate in the November election. That could create a situation in which the senator would have no alternative but to a campaign for the entire Democratic ticket.

Sen. Byrd disagrees altogether with LBJ's civil rights policy. His disagreement on government deficit spending and debt is equally great. Last week Byrd protested in the Senate against needless federal spending, planned deficits and debt. He wants to reduce spending and has explained precisely how and where he would cut.

The senator's position is substantially in accord with Johnson's own policy statement of Nov. 30, 1963, eight days after the assassination of John F. Kennedy. The new President then was adjusting for public inspection the image of the fiscally conservative Lyndon B. Johnson, conservator of the public funds. The image was widely applauded. LBJ's statement was as follows:

"I have pledged that the executive branch will be administered with the utmost thrift and frugality; that the government will get a dollar's value for a dollar spent; and that the government will set an example of prudence and economy."

Byrd said Johnson's long time planned deficit spending program breached that policy. The senator seems sometimes to agree with what LBJ says but to disagree with what he does. For example, Sen. Byrd would endorse without qualification one of the conclusions stated in Johnson's January, 1964,

## Labor Problems Plaguing Common Mart

BRUSSELS (NEA) — "The Eurocrats come, and the Eurocrats go. I, personally, have attended the funerals of quite a few of them. They were the victims of overwork."

Thus does Dr. Theodor Holtz, 39, leader of a recent walkout here at the European Common Market headquarters, sum up the situation which is forcing its administrators and clerks to resort to strike action or to quit their jobs.

The Common Market is not alone in experiencing the mass exodus. The other two European communities — Euratom, and the Coal and Steel Community — are also being deserted in droves.

In fact, the turnover among Eurocrats is one of the most serious problems now facing the Six — France, Germany, Italy, Belgium, Holland and Luxembourg — which have pooled their

economic resources to form these supranational communities.

In addition to overwork, low salaries, lack of promotion and the geographic isolation of Brussels are reasons given by the Eurocrats for quitting their posts.

The Common Market is harvesting a rich crop of coronaries as a result of its all-night sessions whenever a crisis arises. This is particularly true among employees of the agricultural section, where the pressure is greatest.

The funerals of which Holtz speaks are not uncommon, according to other sources. Neither are nervous breakdowns and duodenal ulcers.

As a result, a wave of unrest is sweeping the 8,000 employees who work for the three European communities. This culminated not long ago in a two-hour work stoppage in support of the demand for an 8 per cent overall pay increase.

During the strike the high authority of the Coal and Steel Community was forced to cancel because no translators were available.

The majority of the Eurocrats belong to the Federation of European Civil Servants, which is an independent union. But the strike was supported by other labor groups.

"The fight has only just begun," says Dr. Holtz, who, as staff committee chairman, led the recent walkout.

Among the other labor weapons which the Eurocrats are using in their demands is a go-slow movement, or "working to rules," which could paralyze the Common Market's operation.

"At least 600 executive posts are now filled by men who ordinarily would be working in a junior capacity," Holtz declares.

"The Eurocrats," he says, "are really orphans. We have no democratic representation, no congressmen to whom we can write our grievances. We are bound hand and foot to the council of ministers, which means, in effect, the finance ministers of the six countries concerned. And there is no democratic control over them."

Holtz is also concerned over the health problem posed by overtime at Common Market headquarters. "The Eurocrats work flat-out," he explains. "They are under constant strain, partly due to the fact that they are transacting business in four different languages."

"It takes only a couple of all-night sessions to finish them off when they are in this exhausted condition."

"The Eurocrats come here full of enthusiasm and believing in the ideal of European integration," says Holtz. "For the first three years they find the work interesting, then they start looking for another job. Either that, or they are carried out feet-first. Not many of them will reach retirement age at this rate."

From the United States came Mrs. June Merrifield of Torrance, Calif., who won a trip to Sweden and an invitation to the wedding on the television program, "Queen For a Day."

The archbishop of Sweden, Dr. Gunnar Hultgren, conducted the simple 40-minute private ceremony in the country church in both English and Swedish.

Princess Margaretha met Ambler, an executive in a London transport company, during one of her frequent stays in England.

Meanwhile, the European communities are finding it hard to recruit qualified personnel because of low salaries, according to Holtz. Secretaries fluent in at least two languages are hard to come by, he claims. So are executives with the necessary professional standing and international outlook.

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## Stock Market Hits New High in First Half of the Year

NEW YORK (UPI)—Judging from the index figures, the stock market has had a good first half of 1964.

Standard & Poor's index of 500 stocks, representing on a value basis about 90 per cent of all the stocks on the New York Stock Exchange, has hit new highs while reaching the half-way mark for the year, a rise representing a half-dozen points above its closing mark for 1963.

Dow-Jones average of 30 industrial stocks has hit new record levels in the 830-point area, up nearly 68 points from its close of 1963. The D-J industrials gained 110.85 for the entire year of 1963.

The over-the-counter market has scored gains during the first half of the year, according to index figures of the National Quotation Bureau.

# Jackson Likes Heat, Puts It On

The heat's on Larry Jackson and that makes things almost perfect.  
The 33-year-old Chicago Cub righthander currently has his best jump on the 20-victory season—which has been predicted for him every year since he broke into the major leagues in 1955, but which he has never been able to achieve.  
"I've never been able to help a ball club before May," admits the forthright hurler, whose victory total has ranged from 13 to 18 the last eight years. "I'm a hot weather pitcher. The hotter the better. It makes me concentrate more."  
The mercury was in the mid-80s Tuesday in Chicago and a delighted Jackson was even hotter as he missed the National League's second perfect game within a 10-day span by a single pitch.  
Jackson hurled the Cubs to a 1-0 victory over Cincinnati and the only Red who didn't wilt under Jackson's spell was Pete Rose, who singled cleanly into centerfield to open the seventh inning. Jackson dispatched the Reds with only 85 pitches in one hour and 40 minutes—the fastest game of the National League season—to register his 10th victory against five defeats.

Joe Jay was the tough-luck loser, allowing only two hits—both by rookie Jim Stewart—in dropping his first decision to the Cubs since July 29, 1961. Stewart's single in the sixth inning scored Dick Bertell who had walked and moved up on a sacrifice.  
Jim Bunning (8-3), who turned in a perfect game 10 days ago against the Mets, limited the Houston Colts to five hits in hurling the Phillies to an 8-1 victory over Ken Johnson (6-7).  
Johnson, who lost a no-hit effort to Cincinnati earlier this season, was the victim of three outfield errors by the Colts in the first inning when the Phillies scored five runs, only one of them earned. John Herrstein paced the Philadelphia at-

## McKinley is Beaten, B.J. in Semi-Finals

**WIMBLEDON, England (UPI)** Fred Stolle of Australia gained revenge for his final round defeat last year by upsetting defending champion Chuck McKinley of San Antonio, Texas, today, 4-6, 10-8, 9-7, 6-4, in the semifinals of men's singles in the Wimbledon tennis championships.  
The bookmakers had installed McKinley, second seeded, as a 7-4 choice over the sixth seeded Stolle. Stolle had beaten McKinley in their only two meetings outside of Wimbledon last year.

McKinley, the top-ranking player in the United States from San Antonio, Texas, defeated Stolle in straight sets last year to capture the Wimbledon title. In 1961, the five-foot, eight-inch Texan lost to Australian Red Laver in the finals.  
Top-seeded Roy Emerson of Australia was heavily favorite to beat unseeded Wally Bunting of West Germany in the other semifinal. But Emerson was burdened by a good memory of last year's championships when Bunting eliminated him in the quarter-finals.

Billie Jean Moffitt of Long Beach, Calif., reached the semifinals of the women's singles Tuesday by crushing Ann Haydon Jones of Britain, 6-3, 6-3. However, she was left as the only U.S. survivor as fifth-seeded Nancy Richey of Dallas, Texas, lost to Lesley Turner of Australia, 6-3, 6-4.  
Miss Moffitt, seeded third, next meets top-seeded Margaret Smith of Australia on Thursday. In the other semifinal, second seeded Maria Bueno of Brazil will play Miss Turner, the fourth seed.

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## Walter Rogers Reports: Smoking and Health

Once again we are confronted with this question: Should not the Congress, composed of the people's elected representatives, make the decisions when sweeping, substantial Government regulation seems to be called for in the public interest?

This week, the House Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce, of which I am a member, began hearings on the relationship between smoking and health. The hearings were called to determine whether any action by the Congress was needed in the interest of safeguarding public health — and if such action was found to be needed, what approach would be the most desirable.

On the third day of the hearing, the Federal Trade Commission announced that it would impose new regulations on cigarette manufacturers. As of January 1, 1965, under the FTC ruling, packages of cigarettes will have to bear a warning label that cigarettes are hazardous to health and may cause death. A similar warning must be contained under the FTC order, in all cigarette advertising beginning July 1, 1965. If the warning label on cigarette packages seems to be serving the purpose of alerting the public to smoking hazards, the FTC will consider requests to abandon the rule as it applies to advertising.

Thus, while the wheels of legislative process were beginning to turn toward seeking a solution to the problem, the FTC took it upon itself to settle the matter by exercising its rule-making authority, by administrative fiat. The FTC issued the rules under authority granted to it by the Congress to safeguard consumers by preventing dissemination of false or deceptive advertisements of food, drugs, cosmetics, and therapeutic devices. Not that the FTC ruling came as a complete surprise; in January, after the Surgeon General's Advisory Committee had issued its now-famous report on "Smoking and Health," the FTC served notice that it would study possible regulations.

I believe that cigarette packages should carry a clear warning of smoking's potential dangers. I had introduced one of the eleven bills being considered by the Commerce Committee in its hearing. My bill would require that cigarette packages carry this plainly labeled warning: "Caution: Cigarette Smoking May be Hazardous to Your Health." While advocating warning labels, I believe that the decision as to whether this approach is proper and in the public interest should be made by the Congress, not by appointed officials in the Federal Trade Commission. The eleven bills

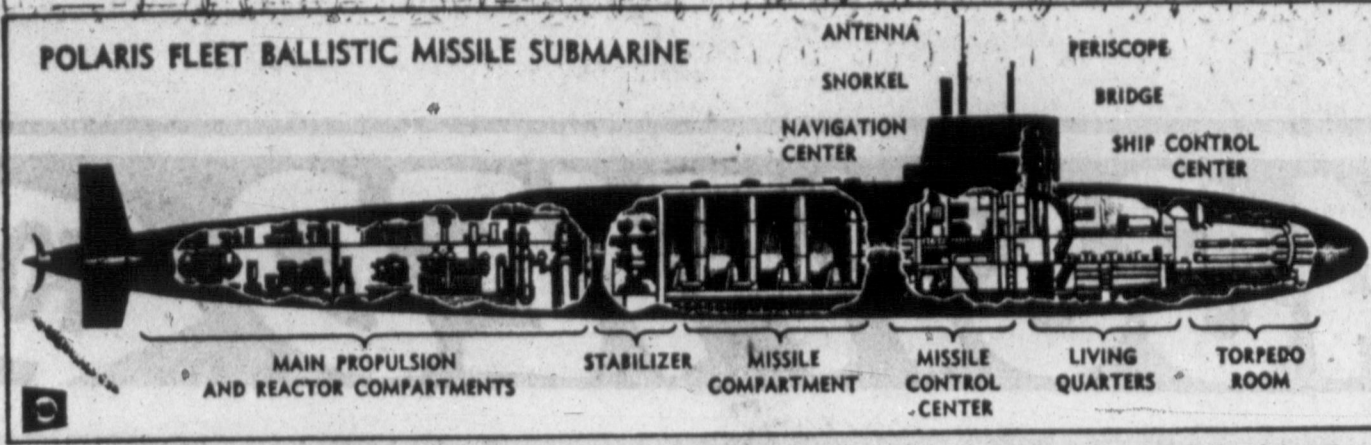
before the Committee proposed seven different approaches to the matter, of which mine was only one. The legislative process — full committee hearings followed by debate on the floor of the House and Senate — is designed to insure adoption of the best possible solutions, in keeping with the desires of the American people as expressed through their elected representatives.

The point is this: Whether or not its decision is a sound one, each time a regulatory agency issues rules having massive impact on American citizens, one further step has been taken to diminish the authority of the people's direct voice in the conduct of government affairs, through their Congress.

Dr. Luther Terry, the Surgeon General, underwent extensive questioning by the Committee. I asked him whether forms of tobacco other than cigarettes also endanger the users' health. Said Dr. Terry, "There may or may not be a health hazard associated with cigars and pipe smoking. I don't think I know enough to say today." Cigarettes have caught the brunt of science's search for tobacco-based health hazards because two-thirds of American men and one-third of American women are regular smokers of cigarettes. Next up for the same kind of study may be pipe and cigar smoking, tobacco chewing, and snuff dipping and sniffing. And if these prove to be or not to be public health menaces, perhaps similar attention should be given to excessive consumption of alcoholic beverages, candy, and coffee. After that, I suppose, the public health people could turn their attention to the No. 1 public health menace in the United States — careless driving.

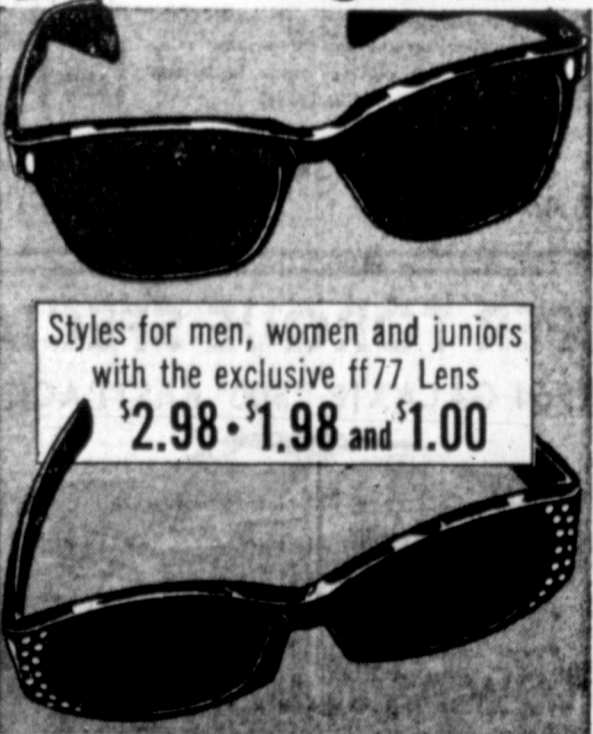
