Romanian Escapee Describes Sting Of Communist Rule

A princess by birth, aniarm clock by choice. That's the description of Catherine Caradia, a 75-year-old woman whose home is a suticase loaded in the tack of a bus.

In Muleshoe Thursday, the short grey-haired woman was here-as she has been all across the United States-preaching the evils of Communism, the virtues of freedom and the necessity for Americans to "wake up to the things that have happened in other countries to keep them from happening here."

Adams is checking many fields each day and chemicals are being applied in fields where infestations warrant such con-

Bailey county and surrounding area farmers are gravely concerned about the greenbug situation and the questionable problem as to using chemical control.

"Greenbugs are presently heavily indesting numerous grain sorghum fields on the High Plains, However, the overall situation does not warrant control measures at this time," Lyndon K. Almand, area entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service reports.

"In fact, spraying at this time would also drastically reduce the populations of beneficial insects which are beginning to build up, he points out. These insects should be given a chance to work in reducing the number of greenbugs.



The new light "floods" for 2,500 feet, is 6,000 watts and runs off a 50 kilowatt portable generator setup, designed to be pulled behind a pickup. The lights themselves, three of them in a cluster, are mounted on a turrett on the back of a pickup which travels the route of the boat along the shore. 




