None. It's right behind says the Goodyear Women's Service Bureau.

It's the season when dogs shed their winter fur, men and women shed their coats, and the youngsters shed their shoes.

Running about in naked footies, according to the Bureau, isn't too awful. Sometimes it's therapeutic for feet's sake. However, in the interests of accident prevention and good health, it's suggested that parents urge children to heed these rules:

—Don't let them go barefoot all day long. Shoes should be worn at least a part of the day for support.

—Have them walk only in sandy or grassy places. Gravel, creeks, ponds, streets, tennis courts and public buildings hold down-to-earth dangers ranging from rusty nails to lurking germs.

Great-Grandma Shows A Flair For Politics

EL PASO, Tex. (UPI)—At the age of 80, Mrs. Lydia M. Stark of El Paso can look back on a brief but successful political fling that still has some of her opponents wondering what hit them.

A retired school teacher, Mrs. Stark could not understand why El Paso County had to have a superintendent of schools—especially since the county had no schools.

Over the years all county schools had, one by one, gone into independent districts. But the county school superintendent's office remained in existence, costing taxpayers \$22,900 a year.

In 1962 Mrs. Stark, noting that School Superintendent John T. Bean, a Democrat, had announced for re-election, made her challenge.

She announced for the office as a Republican. Her platform: to abolish the superintendent's office within 90 days after her election.

An amateur in politics, Mrs. Stark, then 78, and a great-grandmother, found herself campaigning against a man considered one of the ablest

Democratic politicians in El Paso.

Few courthouse politicians gave her a chance, particularly since Republicans have been so few in El Paso that they reputedly held their conventions in a telephone booth.

Mrs. Stark was elected superintendent by a vote of 17,711 to 14,129.

After taking office she immediately took steps to abolish the post. Her attorney advised her that it would be necessary to get 6,000 names to a petition calling for a special election to eliminate the of-

fice. In short order, Mrs. Stark signed up 6,000.

Meanwhile, the Democrat delegation representing El Paso in Austin, the state capital, decided that if the superintendent's job was to be abolished they, the Democrats, ought to get some of the credit. They pushed through a bill abolishing the office by legislative action—45 days after Mrs. Stark took the post.

"Any way we got the job done," Mrs. Stark said. "I carried out my campaign platform."
