# Johnson Outlines Manpower Policy

## President Urges Congress Action

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson called on Congress today to provide both resources and the resourcefulness toward better utilization of the nation's manpower supply. Johnson outlined what he called "an active manpower policy" in a report to Congress required annually by the Manpower Development Training Act of 1962.

Congressional action is needed on several proposals, complemented by "two new major administrative actions," he said.

Johnson said Congress must see to it that:

- Youth unemployment is not allowed to grow unchecked.
- Poverty is attacked.
- Education is strengthened.
- Areas of high unemployment are revitalized.
- Frequent use of overtime work is examined critically to determine if it is being used to avoid adding more jobs.
- Racial discrimination is stamped out.
- Unemployment insurance is extended and the benefits increased.
- Protection under the Fair Labor Standards Act is extended.

On the administrative front, Johnson said he has asked his advisory committee on labor-management policy to "undertake a study of impact of automation and technological change on workers, union and firms." He also said there will be a continuing top-level assessment of the relation of the government's programs and the nation's manpower assets and needs.

The President said he is establishing a committee including the principal federal executives administering programs which significantly affect manpower.

The committee will assist in appraising "the implications of major government programs and policies for our national manpower needs and resources, the interrelation of government programs to manpower requirements and other sectors of the economy, and the present and prospective manpower resources and requirements of the nation."

Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz, who also submitted a manpower report to Congress, said programs now completed, in operation or about to get under way will affect 200,000 workers who had been unable to find jobs.

But both Johnson and Wirtz said this was not enough.

"Unemployment did not improve in step with the strong economic advance in 1963 because our labor force grew more rapidly than in earlier years at the same time that new technology was raising productivity and changing demand for skills," Johnson said.

He said the labor force expanded by 1.1 million last year and annual increases are expected to be even greater in the future.

"As we look ahead," he said, "annual growth in the latter years of the 1960s is unlikely to step up to over 1.4 million, a third larger than last year and nearly twice the number of additional workers we had to absorb annually in the preceding half decade."

To meet this challenge, he said, "there must... be an active manpower policy—to complement our new national attack on poverty."

## Ex-Fighter Testifies For Ruby

DALLAS (UPI) — Former world welterweight boxing champion Barney Ross testified today that his boyhood friend Jack Ruby was a frenzied screamer.

"He would almost turn purple and walk away from us" in Chicago boyhood brawls, the key defense witness said.

Ross, a World War II hero who developed and broke a narcotics habit, testified in support of the argument that Ruby was insane when he shot Lee Harvey Oswald.

Defense counsel Melvin Belli asked Ross whether Ruby, as a spectator and friend, blacked out at ringside during a San Francisco fight when Ross was badly mauled and was out on his feet for five rounds.

A prosecution objection blocked the answer.

"How did Jack appear when you finally finished the fight," Belli asked.

"He was white as my shirt-shaky and kept asking me how I was," Ross replied.

Ross, a year older than Ruby at 53, said their close friendship continued from boyhood "till I was 32 or 33."

He painted a picture of Ruby as "patriotic, a good hustler," but never profane.

Outside the courthouse, a husband-and-wife evangelist team picketed the trial with signs denying insanity is a defense for murder.

The defense sought a mistrial last week because leaflets were passed around the corridor outside the courtroom designed to keep Ruby from giving the nation's 1.8 million epileptics a bad name.

The Ruby murder trial entered its fourth week with famed attorney Melvin Belli reading a barrage of psychological and psychiatric testimony. Belli, who is so steeped in the medical aspects of the law that intimates call him "Doc," seeks to prove that the unstable Ruby snapped into a robot state of unawareness and insanity when he killed Lee Harvey Oswald, accused of assassinating President Kennedy.

But the stripper, Penny Dollar, and the fighter, Barney Ross, were scheduled first, at the opening of a short morning session in Judge Joe B. Brown's Criminal District Court No. 3. Court was to recess at 11 a.m. until 1:45 p.m. for the funeral of Glenn W. Byrd, county clerk and longtime Dallas County public servant.

Miss Dollar, 21, was brought here from another county, where she was jailed on charges of possessing "dangerous drugs and marijuana." Her real name is Patricia Ann Kohn. She once worked for Ruby at his Carousel Club here.

Belli said she would testify that "Jack one time had a taxi-driver down beating his head on the concrete, and when they pulled him off he said, 'Why did I do that?'"

## Helicopter Official Crashes

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (PI) — An armed American helicopter escorting U.S. Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara on a jungle battlefield inspection crashed today, killing two crewmen and injuring two others.

U.S. military sources said six members of McNamara's staff watched in horror as the helicopter plunged into swampy terrain just after the defense secretary had landed near a village on the Cambodian border.

McNamara was making a tour of the jungle battlefields of the delta where U.S.-backed Vietnamese troops are fighting communist guerrillas.

114 Yanks Killed

Military sources said two crewmen of the helicopter were killed and its pilot and copilot were seriously injured. The crash brought to 114 the number of Americans who have died in battle or related incidents in South Viet Nam since 1961. Another 80 Americans have died of other causes.

A U.S. spokesman had announced earlier that one Air Force officer was killed and one U.S. Army man wounded in weekend battles with the communists.

Today's helicopter incident occurred near Hoa Hao village in An Giang Province, about 90 miles southwest of Saigon.

McNamara and his party were there by helicopter in the area of an inspection of the communist-dominated Mekong delta. He was accompanied by Lt. Gen. Nguyen Khanh, head of South Viet Nam's military government.

Rice Producing Area

The delta, south of the capital, is Viet Nam's richest rice producing area but the communists control much of the countryside and have been increasingly active in their attacks on the remaining government-controlled district.

McNamara has made four trips to South Viet Nam since a U.S. buildup began in 1961 and observers here are beginning to look on his visits as a sign the guerrilla war is waning.

"Each time McNamara comes out here it's a little worse than the last time," one American said Sunday when a secretary arrived.

## Bus Detours to Save Man's Life In Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — "Hang on," yelled bus driver C. L. Smith to his passengers, and he took his bus almost five miles off his route to a hospital. One of the nine passengers had just suffered a heart attack.

The attending physician said Smith's action Saturday probably saved the life of Warren Benoit, 55, of Los Angeles.

"I knew he wasn't drunk," Smith said. "I was afraid there wouldn't be time to call and wait for an ambulance. That man needed help."

The 27-year-old Metropolitan Transit Authority bus driver, still concerned about the rest of his passengers, said, "I didn't have to back-track for any of them." Smith resumed the schedule several blocks past the point where he left the route and made up lost time before the end of the run.

## Former Marine Arrested After Threat on LBJ

NASHUA, N.H. (UPI)—A 32-year-old former Marine "sharp shooter" was being held today on a charge of threatening to assassinate President Johnson.

Norman J. Estes of Nashua, who had received a general (less than honorable) discharge from the Marines, was seized by police Sunday as he walked near city hall. He offered no resistance, police said.

Police Chief Paul J. Tracy said Estes signed a statement admitting he wrote two letters to Washington and Boston year-old former Marine "sharp-shooter" threatening the President's life. Tracy said Estes admitted he planned to buy a rifle with an income tax refund check, and employment in Washington and then wait to shoot Johnson.

## Escapees, Ex-Convict Held In Wheeler on Auto Charge

WHEELER — Four men, two wanted as escapees from a state prison in Michigan, were being held here today on charges of transporting an automobile across a state line with the knowledge that it was stolen after their arrest at Miami in Roberts County Sunday.

The men, ranging in age from 19 to 35, were to be questioned by Federal Bureau of Investigation agents in Amarillo during the afternoon while Top O' Texas officers attempt to piece together one of the more unusual crime cases in this area in some time.

Held for prison break are Donald Alford Bigelow of Muskegon, Mich., and Leonard Clarence Raymond Koch, both 20, of Clinton, Ind.

Sheriff Walter Adams of Canadian, who has led the investigation since highway department personnel found an automobile abandoned near the Canadian River bridge in Hemphill County, identified the men.

Adams said the two men had climbed over a fence at the Indiana Reformatory in Michigan on March 4, stole a 1963 Dodge station wagon and began their journey across the nation en route to California.

On the way, the two men picked up Bud Sharper, 21, Flint, Mich., who was thumbing his way across Missouri at the time. They also picked up a 35-year-old man, who Adams said is not involved with the other men in a series of gasoline thefts across the Midwest.

Adams said the men used an Oklahoma credit card and "lots of luck" in keeping the automobile moving across the Missouri and Oklahoma area without creating trouble.

Their luck ran out in Shamrock, got worse in Hemphill County and faded completely in Miami.

Bigelow, who was driving the car, was stopped by Highway Patrolman Bill Lusk near Shamrock Saturday night for a routine check. Lusk found the man had no driver's license.

Lusk placed Bigelow in jail and then allowed the other three men to proceed when they told him that an uncle in Amarillo would pay the other man's fine after being notified of his trouble.

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# Select Suits For Quality As Well As For Fashion

Select your new spring suit wisely and you'll have a garment to wear with pride for many seasons. For, there is nothing like a fine suit when it comes to long wear and styling that lasts.

To help you in making the right selection, here are some tips from the National Board of the Coat and Suit Industry.

First, of course, you want a suit that is becoming. There is no need to be restricted to ultra-conservative lines if you want a "high fashion" style as there are always many variations of one design.

Secondly, be sure you select a suit that fits into your way of life. Consider where you will wear your suit most often, and make your choice accordingly.

Third, even if you are able to afford a suit to meet all occasions, you want each of those suits to give you your money's worth in fashionable wear.

Check the seams of the suit — if the garment is unlined, see that the seams are smoothly finished and the edges either turned back and stitched or bound with a bias of linen fabric.

If the material contains a pattern such as plaid, make sure the pattern matches at seams, along the collar and pockets.

If the suit is lined, check to see that the inner shell fits the outer garment smoothly with a slight ease or fullness to allow for give and shrinkage.

**FINEST FABRICS.** Wool is always a good choice for a suit, and there are many different types and uses of wool primarily in the weave.

Woolen fabrics can ordinarily be classified in three groupings: the heavier, nubby cloth; the smooth, sturdy yarns such as worsteds; and the soft, sometimes velvety surfaces.

Worsted yarns are smooth, firm and compact. Their characteristics are crisp, firm, and with a smooth surface. Many of the new lightweight wools with a cracker-crisp feel are worsteds.

This group of smooth, sturdy fabric such as worsteds include covert, serge, gabardine, broadcloth, rep and whipcord.

The heavy, nubby cloth includes boucle, chinchilla, flannel, homespun, melton, shetland, tweed, and chevot.

The soft, sometimes velvety surfaces include duvetyne, fleece and velour.

In addition to wool, suits can be found in man-made fibers, stretch fabrics, leather and vinyl, and in blends. There are also the "specialty" fabrics of vicuna, cashmere, guanaco, camel and lama. And, of course, there are suits of cotton, linen, silk, etc.

**Other Considerations** The fourth thing to look for in buying a suit is the comfort. Check sleeves and armholes to make sure they are not too tight. Move about in the garment and make sure it gives with your body. Also, if you will be wearing a heavy blouse or sweater under the jacket, try the jacket on with such a garment.

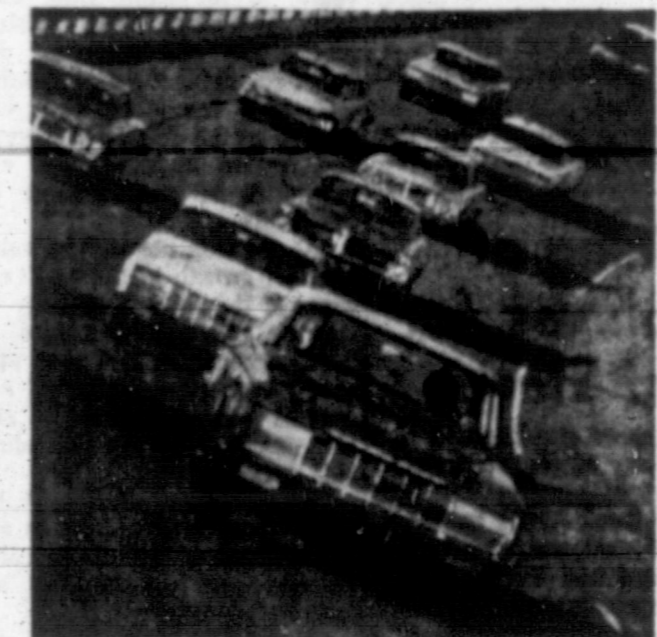
