



Nikita Khrushchev denounced Stalin as a "half-mad powercrazed despot ... a murderer, an ignoramus, a military bumbler.'

A new minimum wage law was to increase the buying power of eight million Soviet workers by \$25 a month.

A decree by the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet revoked previous decrees prescribing punishment for workers who left their jobs without permission and provided for the release of those jailed under the decrees.

It was heady medicine for the Soviet people after years of rigid Stalin control.






