Other Cases Linked to Accused Kidnaper

NEW ORLEANS (UPI)—FBI agents sought today to link Joseph Francis Bryan Jr., accused kidnaper of a Tennessee child, with the disappearance of other children.

Bryan, a former mental patient, was being held in \$150,000 bond on charges of kidnaping 8-year-old Dennis Burke of Abolito, Tenn., who has been returned unharmed to his parents.

Another of Bryan's alleged victims, 10-year-old John Robison of Mount Pleasant, S.C., was found dead in a mangrove swamp near Hialeah, Fla. March 31. He was riding his bicycle near Mount Pleasant.

Bryan, 25 and a sandy-haired man of New Jersey and former convict in Nevada, was chained and cuffed before Commissioner Fritz Windt here Wednesday.

He asked for an attorney and a doctor gave him until Monday to get one. His bond was \$150,000.

Bryan, speaking in mumbles, Windt stated that he had been contract with his parents in Lubon Park, N.J., and "I'll let them get me a lawyer."

The FBI said it is investigating possible links between Bryan and other missing boys, specifically the disappearance

Mother Makes Plea For Child's Return

CHICAGO (UPI)—The mother of Paul Joseph Fronczak made a tearful plea of "please return our baby" today to the woman who stole her day-old son from her arms in a maternity ward four days ago.

Mrs. Fora Fronczak, 28, made her first public appearance since the kidnaping of her baby in the maternity ward of Michael Reese Hospital by a woman posing as a nurse Monday. An intensive investigation by hundreds of policemen and Federal Bureau of Investigation agents has failed to turn up a trace of a clue.

Mrs. Fronczak, an attractive, dark-haired woman, wept as she begged the unknown woman to bring her baby back.

"I ask for the baby to be well taken care of and brought back," she said. "Please return our baby. He was everything that we had of our hopes for the future."

"Just so he's taken care and brought back. That's our only hope and prayer."

Hopefully, she said "in a matter of time maybe the woman will be good enough to bring the baby back."

Mrs. Fronczak was wearing a blue-checked bathrobe when her husband, Chester, 34, wheeled her chair before reporters and television cameras in the maternity ward lobby. She fingered a crystal Rosary constantly as she spoke. Her husband, an aircraft mechanic, sat next to her and kept his arm around his wife's shoulders.

Mrs. Fronczak said she had only a vague memory of what the kidnaper looked like. There was a resemblance between the woman in white and the police artist's portrait which has been transmitted to police departments around the country, she said, but she couldn't give an exact description.

Police joined Mrs. Fronczak in hoping that a "baby-hungry" woman had taken the child and would return him in good health. Police Capt. William Murphy issued a plea of his own to the kidnaper: "You have had the baby three days. By now you must realize you should return this infant boy to his mother's arms. You must undo what you have done. Call us. Help us return the baby."

Lost Boy's Body Found

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (UPI)—Police Chief Harold C. Smith announced today that the body of 7-year-old Lewis (Hackie) Wilson has been found a few miles south of Venice, Fla.

The boy had been missing since March 23.

Official reports said that Joseph Francis Bryan Jr., captured in New Orleans Tuesday and accused as the kidnaper of one child and the killer of another, had been seen in St. Petersburg on the same day.

Sarasota County Sheriff Ross E. Boyer said Bryan also was "definitely placed" in the Venice area on March 24.

Bryan was captured in New Orleans with an 8-year-old boy he is charged with abducting from his Tennessee home. He also is accused of kidnaping a 10-year-old South Carolina boy in February. The latter's skeleton was found March 31 at Halandale, near Miami.

The Wilson boy last was seen about two blocks from his home as he returned from school. He was the son of a St. Petersburg fireman.

Today's search was centered in an area where a man identified as Bryan called for assistance March 24 to get his car pulled free from sand.

Step-up Expected Over Racial Issue

Federals Press Slavery Case Against Farmer

Negro Charges White Employer With Pistol-Whipping, Peonage

FLORENCE, S. C. (UPI)—Federal prosecutors pressed their slavery case today against a tobacco farmer accused of pistol whipping a lanky 44-year-old Negro and sending him bleeding to work in the fields.

The Negro, Max Roy McKenzie, pointed a finger at Robert Moultrie Cook, a swarthy 48-year-old white man, in the courtroom Wednesday as the man who held him in peonage.

It was the first peonage case to be tried in South Carolina in nearly half a century and U. S. Attorney Clyde Robinson said he planned to conclude the government's case today.

Cook has denied that he held McKenzie in bondage. He was indicted last fall on two counts. One of them a charge of having McKenzie arrested a week after he allegedly beat him with a pistol to maintain his hold on the Negro.

McKenzie told his story to the FBI after getting out of jail on bond paid by Cook. He had been arrested on a charge by Cook that he had sold parts from a car on which he still owed money to Cook.

McKenzie said Cook had required him to promise to work at the farm as long as Cook wanted him to so he could get out of jail.

The Negro admitted under cross examination that he returned to the Cook farm as a worker on two occasions after his release. But he said he did so to be with his wife, who remained at the farm as a laborer.

McKenzie's wife, Sara, and two of his three stepsons, Henry B. Singletary, 17, and Jack Edmondson, Pampa

Charles Singletary, 15, testified that Cook attacked McKenzie with a pistol when he refused to work on the afternoon of Saturday, May 26.

McKenzie, his voice hesitant with nervousness, quoted Cook as saying "you're gonna work or I'm gonna kill you." The Negro and his family said Cook tried to shoot McKenzie but the gun would not fire.

"I was begging him not to kill me," said McKenzie. "He grabbed the gun by the barrel and began hitting me over the head." He said he went back to work with his head bleeding because "I was scared he was gonna kill me."

Police Continue Search for Baby Taken From Mom

CHICAGO (UPI)—Police renewed their desperate search for the kidnaper of little Paul Joseph Fronczak today armed with a new sketch of the woman believed to have snatched the baby from his mother's arms.

The sketch was composed from descriptions of the mysterious woman who posed as a nurse to kidnap the infant from Michael Reese Hospital Monday, the day after he was born.

Authorities said the sketch was "almost as good as a photograph."

Police and federal agents continued to express optimism about their chances of finding Paul Joseph alive. Their strongest hunch was that the kidnaper either had an overpowering maternal urge or had recently lost a baby.

John Lewis, a top official of the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee, was one of those arrested Wednesday. He was dragged away to a patrol wagon after leading about 300 whites and Negroes in a chanting street demonstration after being turned away at a restaurant.

At Jacksonville, Fla., where demonstrations turned into violence a month ago, a bi-racial committee adopted a NAACP-backed resolution Wednesday calling for the immediate integration of local public accommodations.

Copies of the resolution, adopted on a voice vote by the 21 Negro and 15 white members of the committee, will be sent to the mayor and county governing agencies.

It recommends that "hotels, motels, restaurants and other facilities serving the public generally, immediately and co-operatively desegregate and accept the patronage of those persons otherwise acceptable without restrictions based solely on race, color or national origin."

Elsewhere: Notasuga, Ala.: Six Negro students were scheduled to receive desks today in the unchartered portion of the Macon County school system which was partially destroyed by fire that police said was the work of an arsonist. A special federal three-judge panel ordered that classroom space be made available.

St. Louis: Authorities said Wednesday that a fugitive warrant would be issued for the arrest of Bari Arlene Burton, a member of the NAACP youth council in Omaha, Neb., on a concealed weapons charge. Miss Burton was arrested in a St. Louis hotel-Saturday.

Princess Irene, Husband Off On Honeymoon
ROME (UPI)—Princess Irene of the Netherlands and her bridegroom, Spanish Prince Carlos of Bourbon Parma, were off on a secret honeymoon today, away from the hectic atmosphere that surrounded their controversial wedding.

The couple slipped quietly out of their hotel Wednesday night after a noisy reception and left by car for an undisclosed destination.

Trouble Centers in Nashville

Negro leaders at Nashville, Tenn., planned to step up efforts today aimed at total desegregation in this mid-South city hit by three days of mass demonstrations.

Fifty demonstrators were arrested Wednesday, running the total to 97 taken into custody since the demonstrations started Monday. Twenty-five persons, including seven policemen, have been injured in scuffles arising from attempted sit-ins in segregated restaurants and in street incidents.

Three major civil rights movements are represented in the demonstration, including the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee and the Southern Christian Leadership Conference.

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The reception was a virtual political rally for the Carlist Spaniards who support the claim of Prince Carlos' father, Prince Xavier, to the vacant Spanish throne.

Before a cheering throng of 50,000 in Srinagar, capital of disputed Kashmir, a Kashmiri politician voiced words to which the United States could utter a fervent "amen."

"We will not have peace or security in the subcontinent," he said, "until the problem of Kashmir is settled and India and Pakistan live in friendship."

It is a goal urgently sought by statesmen of the United States, Britain and the United Nations over 17 years but one which constantly eludes them, keeping India and Pakistan at the brink of war and poisoning U.S. relationships with both.

The speaker was Mirza Mohammed Afzal Beg, in Kashmir politics second only to the man beside him on the platform, Sheik Mohammed Abdullah, the "Lion of Kashmir."

Released From Prison

Both men just had been released from prison where they spent more than 10 years for advocating self-determination for Kashmir against the will of India.

For Indian Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru, Abdullah's release had been a calculated risk but one that apparently had gone wrong.

The cheering throngs which jammed streets and pelted Abdullah with flowers, proved that he had lost none of his appeal and his words proved that neither had he changed his mind.

It was nonsense, he declared, for India to claim Kashmir as an undetachable part of India.

And below him the crowds chanted: "Long live Abdullah our demand—plebiscite... self-determination—our right."

His words also had their echo in New Delhi to which Abdullah had been invited by the ailing Nehru.

Opponents Shout Reply

In the scorching heat outside India's Parliament, irate demonstrators shouted their reply: Kashmir is India's... Abdullah wake up."

Officially, India's stand on the Kashmir problem long since has been taken and Nehru's influential minister with port-folio, Lal Bahadur Shastri repeated it when he said that Kashmir's accession to India in 1947 "is irrevocable and the present relationship between India and Pakistan will have to continue."

Two thirds of predominantly Moslem Kashmir is held by India and the other, poorer, third by Pakistan under a cease-fire line established by the United Nations in 1948.

No one today can be quite sure what Nehru hoped to gain with Abdullah's release. Nor can it be sure whether Abdullah's ambition is independence or alliance with Pakistan or India. But his mere presence places Nehru on the horns of a new dilemma, and the people of Kashmir anticipate a change.

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — The stars of two recently cancelled television shows today headed the list of nominees for this year's Emmy awards.

Richard Boone of the "Richard Boone Show" and George C. Scott of "East Side-West Side" were nominated Tuesday along with Dean Jagger (Mr. Novak), David Janssen (The Fugitive) and Dick Van Dyke (The Dick Van Dyke Show) for best actor in a series.

Scott created something of a sensation in 1961 when he asked that his nomination for an Academy Award for "The Hustler" be withdrawn, saying he had no intention of campaigning for the award.

The Emmy awards will be handed out May 25 at the 16th annual presentations.

Five comedienne — two of them winners of the movie Oscar awards — are up for honors for best performance by an actress in a series.

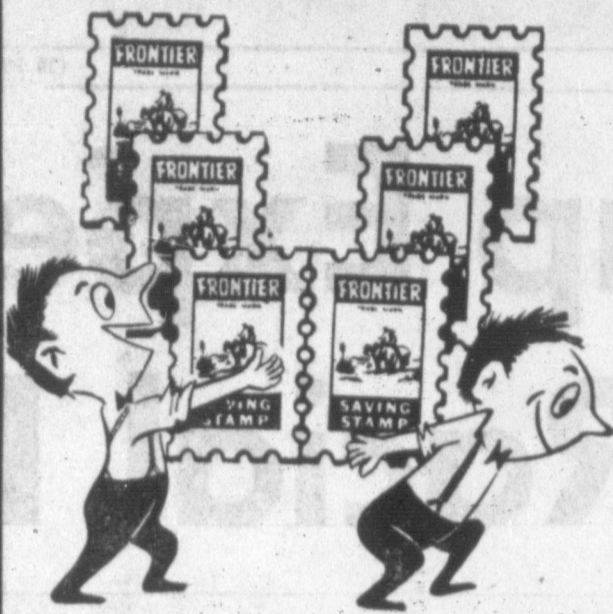

Department of Agriculture Announces Results of Survey

The Pampa housewife's chances of getting an accurate weight on foodstuffs at her local grocery store were four times better this year than they were in 1962, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

And the Pampa motorist is assured of getting a full measure of gasoline as a result of a city-wide weights and measures survey made earlier this month by inspectors of the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Commissioner White said a total of 113 grocery store scales were checked for accuracy in Pampa and only 2 were found incorrect. Of this number, 1 of the scales was giving an over measure of food and 1 scale was weighing short.

Some 335 gasoline pumps were also calibrated for accuracy and 320 of them were correct, White said. Of the inaccurate units, 6 pumps were giving too much gasoline and 9 were giving too little.

White emphasized that all the incorrect devices were required to be repaired and sealed during the survey, regardless of the kind of error.

"We find very few cases of deliberate fraud," said Commissioner White. "Most violations are the result of careless maintenance. Essentially, our inspection program is not a police action to ferret out criminals, but rather a service of government to see that equality prevails in all commercial transactions."

The state survey showed 94

Pre-packaged foods such as meat and frozen commodities cause the most difficulty, White pointed out. Meat has a tendency to shrink and lose weight after packaging. The customers should ask that a package be re-weighed at the checkout counter to make certain they are getting all the meat they are paying for, he added.

During the Pampa survey, a total of 1020 pre-packaged foods were weighed by the inspectors. Some 302 of the marked weights were incorrect, with 202 of the packages over tolerance and 100 under tolerance.

White explained that some packers give an overmeasure of goods in an attempt to make allowance for possible shrinkage. Also some frozen goods pick up frost which accounts for the goods having more weight than is marked.

Inspectors require that underweight packages be re-marked correctly before they leave the store. Overweight packages are handled individually, depending on the cause. If the package has absorbed additional moisture, the original weight is retained to prevent the housewife from paying for frost or accumulated water.

Commissioner White said the Pampa survey was a part of the regular state-wide check of all weights and measures devices made by his department.

MAY SALAD (4 salads)

1 pound fresh asparagus
1/2 large head iceberg
1 orange, peeled and sliced
4 thin strips orange rind
1/2 c. real mayonnaise
2 T. orange juice

Break or cut off asparagus stalks as far down as they snap easily. Wash in cold water, brushing with a soft brush to remove sand. (If desired, remove scales with a vegetable parer, then brush to remove sand.) Arrange stalks in 2 layers in a large skillet. Sprinkle with 1 teaspoon salt and add 1 inch of boiling water. Boil, covered, 12 to 15 minutes or until lower part of stalks are just tender. Lift out of water with perforated pancake turner. Chill. Rinse and dry iceberg lettuce, then cut 1/2 head into 4 wedges. Arrange lettuce and bundles of chilled asparagus on a large flat plate or in individual salad plates. Add a strip of orange rind to each asparagus bundle and garnish with thin slices of orange. Blend mayonnaise and orange juice and serve as dressing for salad.

Hoffa Cuts Himself Off of Union Funds

WASHINGTON (UPI)—James R. Hoffa appeared this week to be losing the iron grip he has held on the leadership of the 1.5 million-member Teamsters Union.

The beleaguered Teamsters boss Monday cut himself off—at least temporarily—from further use of union funds to pay his heavy legal bills. He made the move after his right to have the union pay his legal bills was challenged by other Teamsters officials.

In labor circles this challenge to Hoffa was regarded as one of the strongest threats to his leadership in many years. Hoffa, who has been convicted of jury tampering and sentenced to eight years in prison, is now on trial in Chicago on charges of defrauding labor-management trustees of a Teamsters pension fund.

Raises Issue
Teamsters vice president John J. O'Rourke had demanded that the international union stop paying Hoffa's legal expenses until its 15-man executive board can decide whether this conforms with federal law. Hoffa ordered the suspension of legal payments until a legal expert un-

connected with the union can review the matter and decide. The expert has not yet been chosen.

O'Rourke, an executive board member and Teamsters leader in New York City, said he was advised by Teamsters general counsel Edward Bennett Williams that such payments were not lawful.

The test of Hoffa's strength may come if he seeks approval for the payments under the Teamsters' constitution.

Must Approve Payments
Under a new provision adopted in 1961, the international union is authorized to pay—expenses for investigation, attorneys and "and other necessary expenditures" in any case where a union officer is charged with violations of law and the executive board approves the payments.

Hoffa would have to win a majority vote from the board to have the payments continued if O'Rourke pressed the issue to a showdown vote.

Another teamsters vice president, Harold J. Gibbons of St. Louis, said he felt Hoffa would call a special meeting of the board to consider the question raised by O'Rourke.

Newspapers OK
Gordon McLendon
HARLINGEN (UPI)—The Freedom Newspapers of the lower Rio Grande Valley came out editorially today for Gordon McLendon over incumbent Ralph Yarborough in the Democratic race for the U.S. Senate nomination.

In an editorial appearing in The Valley Morning Star at Harlingen, The Brownsville Herald and The Valley Evening Monitor at McAllen, the newspapers said:
"McLendon is... the sort of man 'conservative' Democrats have been looking for. He stands for those measures which would increase the sphere of individual freedom and curtail and even cut back the force of the federal government."

British Hit LBJ's Dog Treatment
LONDON (UPI)—The British press and dog-lovers Wednesday joined in full hue-and-cry over President Johnson's playful act of pulling his pet beagle up by its ears to pose for pictures. One newspaper said it could hurt Johnson politically.

But Bernard Zorkman, chairman of the Canine Defense League, spoke up for the President.
"I don't believe that a beagle comes to any harm by picking it up by the ears," said Zorkman. "Their ears are particularly strong. Most people know how to handle their own dogs best."

However, in a country where even members of the royal family have been criticized for hunting birds and beasts, and the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals is a potent pressure group, the story was front-page news.

Virtually every London newspaper, with the exception of the Communist (Daily Worker), printed stories, pictures and editorials on the incident.

Allies Worried About French Action on NATO

PARIS (UPI)—Allied officials appeared concerned Wednesday that France might follow up its withdrawal of naval officers from North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) commands by moves affecting French forces in Germany.

The French government announced Tuesday that it has withdrawn all 10 senior French naval officers from NATO commands, on the ground that there were no longer any sizable French units under them.

President Charles de Gaulle had pulled French naval units out of the NATO Mediterranean fleet in 1959. Three months ago, he removed the bulk of France's Atlantic fleet and English Channel units from NATO control.

Only five French submarines in the North Sea still operate under NATO. The rest of the French navy is under purely French command.

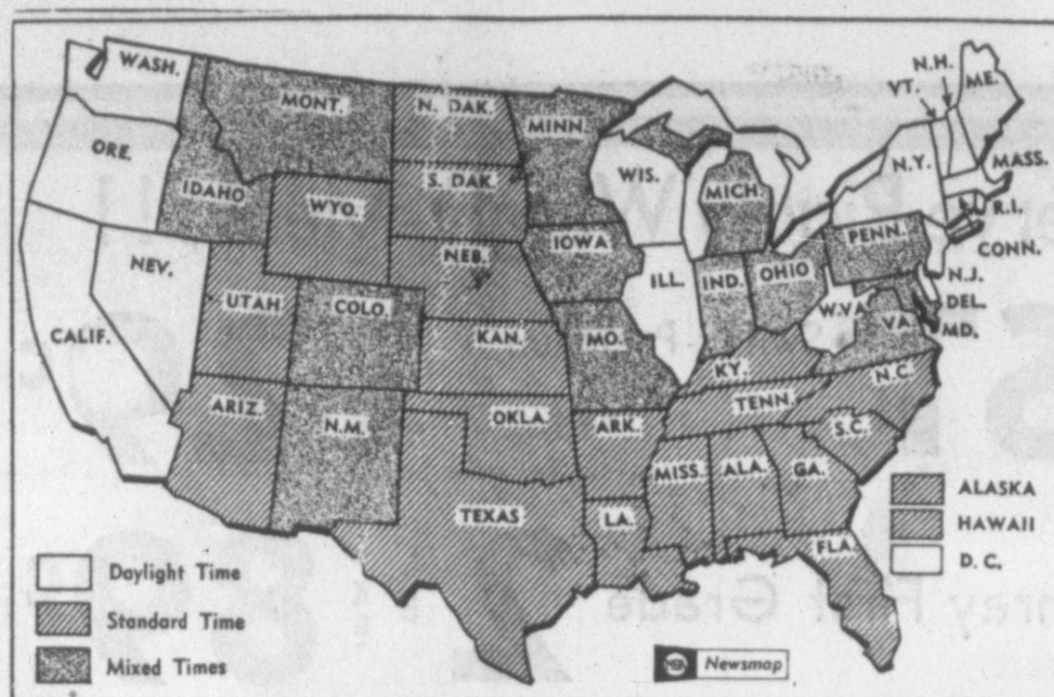
NATO officials appeared concerned about the future of the two and one-half French army divisions and three air force nuclear fighter wings under NATO command in West Germany.

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Johnson Says Further Cut in Tax Likely

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson says that if the 1964-65 tax cut is a success there may be another in the offing "a few years down the road."

But, said the Chief Executive Tuesday night, "we can move on this second round of tax reduction only if we behave ourselves this year."

Johnson told a White House dinner party of more than 100 of the nation's top business executives "we can't let our costs creep up — and we can't let our prices creep up," or inflation will wipe out the gains of the two-year, \$11.5 billion tax cut now in effect.

"It is too early to make firm promises on further tax cuts," Johnson said, but if the present tax cut is a success "as I have every reason to believe it will be — in building production, creating jobs, raising profits, and generating revenues to balance the budget — THEN I see another tax cut a few years down the road."

Johnson called on business to hold the line on prices in order to protect the economy from an inflationary spiral.

He plans to ask labor leaders again this week to keep wage demands in line with average productivity gains for the economy as a whole.

"The job is up to you, it's up to labor, and it's up to us in the government," Johnson told the business group.

The group included Roger M. Blough, board chairman of U.S. Steel Corp.; Henry Ford II, chairman of Ford Motor Co.; Crawford H. Greenwalt, chairman of E. I. Du Pont de Nemours & Co., Inc.; David Rockefeller, president of Chase Manhattan Bank; Frederick R. Kappel, board chairman of American Telephone & Telegraph Co. and others.

Re-Trial Set for McCarthy Ex-aide

AUSTIN (UPI) — The Court of Criminal Appeals today reversed and remanded for a new trial the conviction of a former Texas Railroad Commission employe.

The court said the state had failed to prove a conspiracy between L. D. Murphy of Tyler and Longview oilman E. W. Scates to bribe commission engineer Robert Mathews to make false reports on a slanted oil well.

Murphy had been sentenced to two years in prison for his part in the alleged bribe.

The state contended Murphy, who resigned as a commission engineer just before the slant-well scandals broke in 1962, and Scates had a joint bank account from which they paid Mathews \$1,000 to make a false directional survey of an Upshur County well in which Murphy and Scates had an interest.

Mathews testified that Scates gave him \$1,000 for falsely reporting that the well was not deviated.

In an opinion by Judge W. A. Morrison, the high court said the state failed to produce evidence to corroborate Mathews' testimony. The court said that since Mathews was an accomplice witness, such corroborating testimony was essential.

The case was sent back to Upshur County for retrial.

Police Study Baby Cases

FORT WORTH (UPI) — Juvenile authorities this week attempted to discover the cause — if any — of a recent rash of baby abandonments in Fort Worth.

Two Negro boys, aged about 1 and 2 years old, were discovered Tuesday lying on a bare filthy mattress on the floor of a dark, nearly empty house. No parents have been found.

Their discovery brought to four the number of child abandonments in less than a month. Monday a three-hour old infant was abandoned at Harris Hospital. She was in good condition.

March 31, a seven week old infant boy was left in a parking lot. He is now in the Lena Pope home for children.

Police said that in the past, one or two children had been abandoned, on the average, per year.

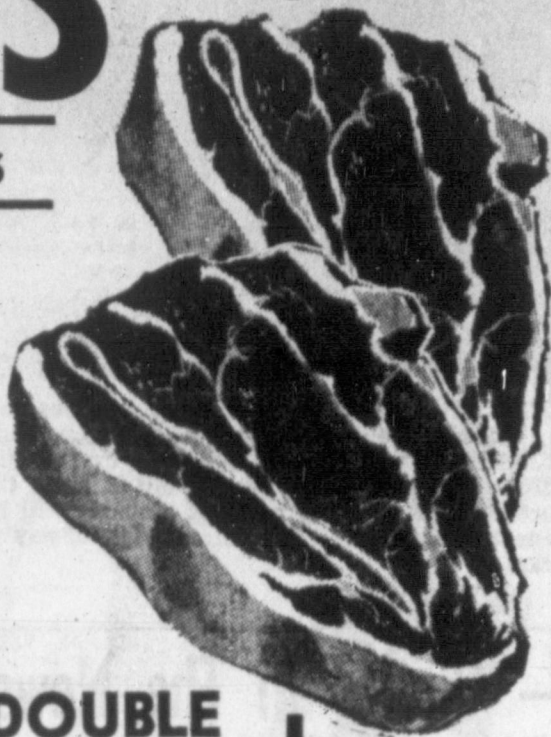

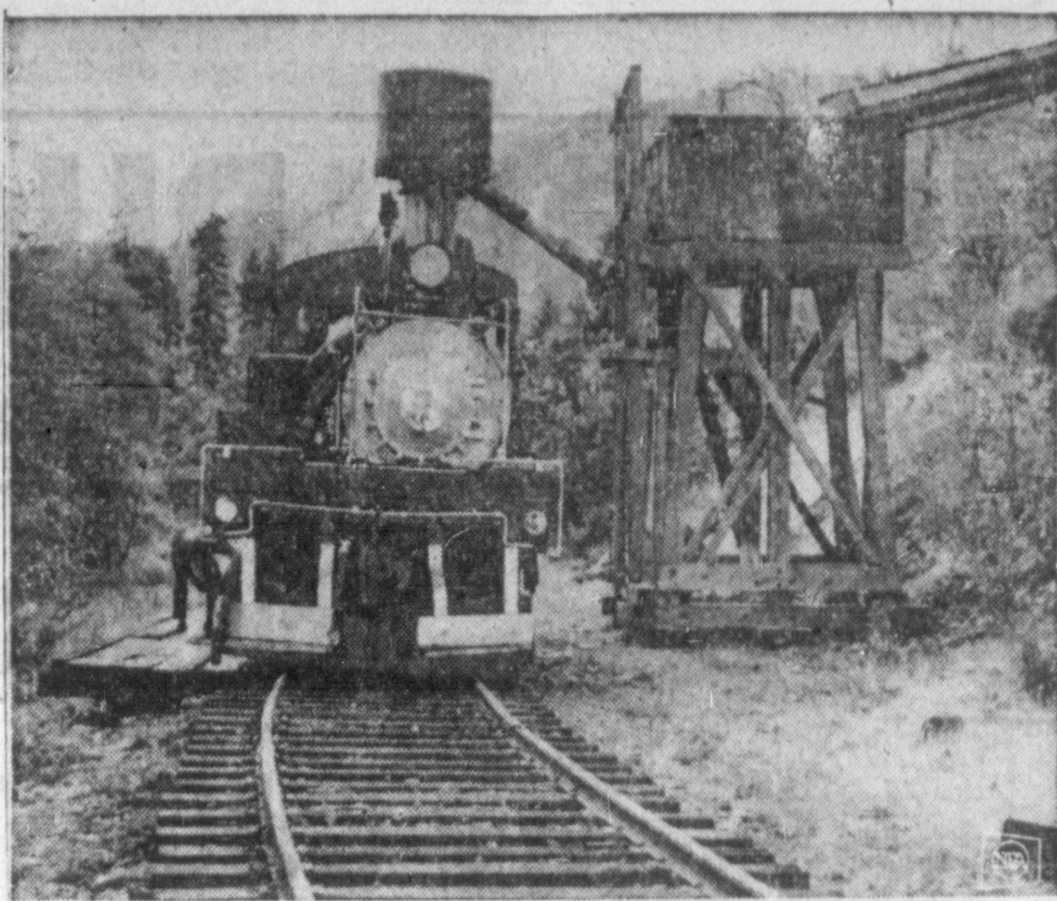
The plane landed at London Airport after dropping down for a landing approach to Northolt military airbase. The big jet startled residents around Northolt since only much smaller military craft generally use the field.

And he said he wouldn't buy a \$2 ticket either.

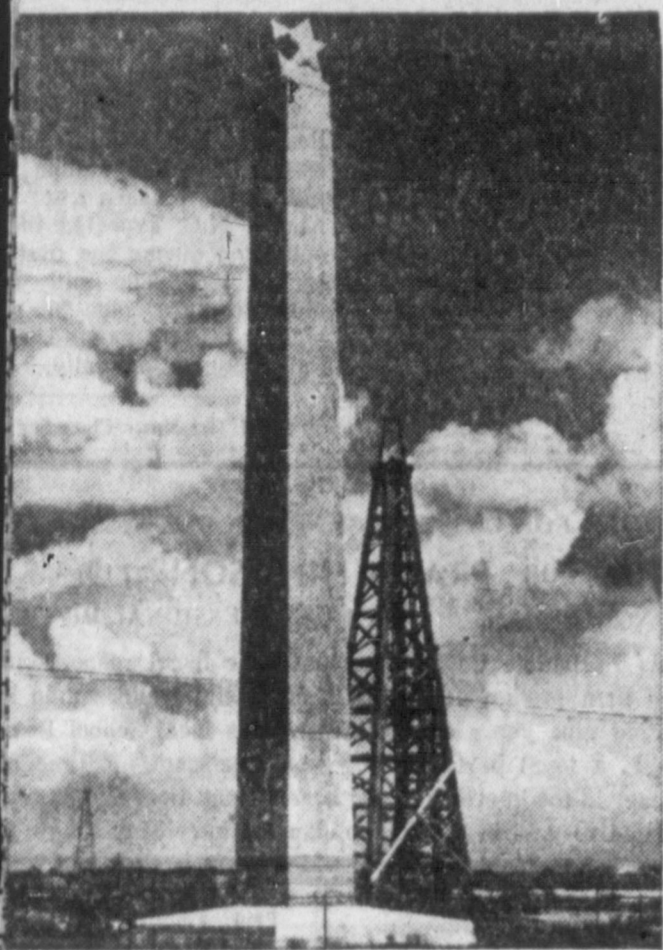
"I've seen enough of it from the outside," declared the miffed Commissioner Barnes during a radio interview.

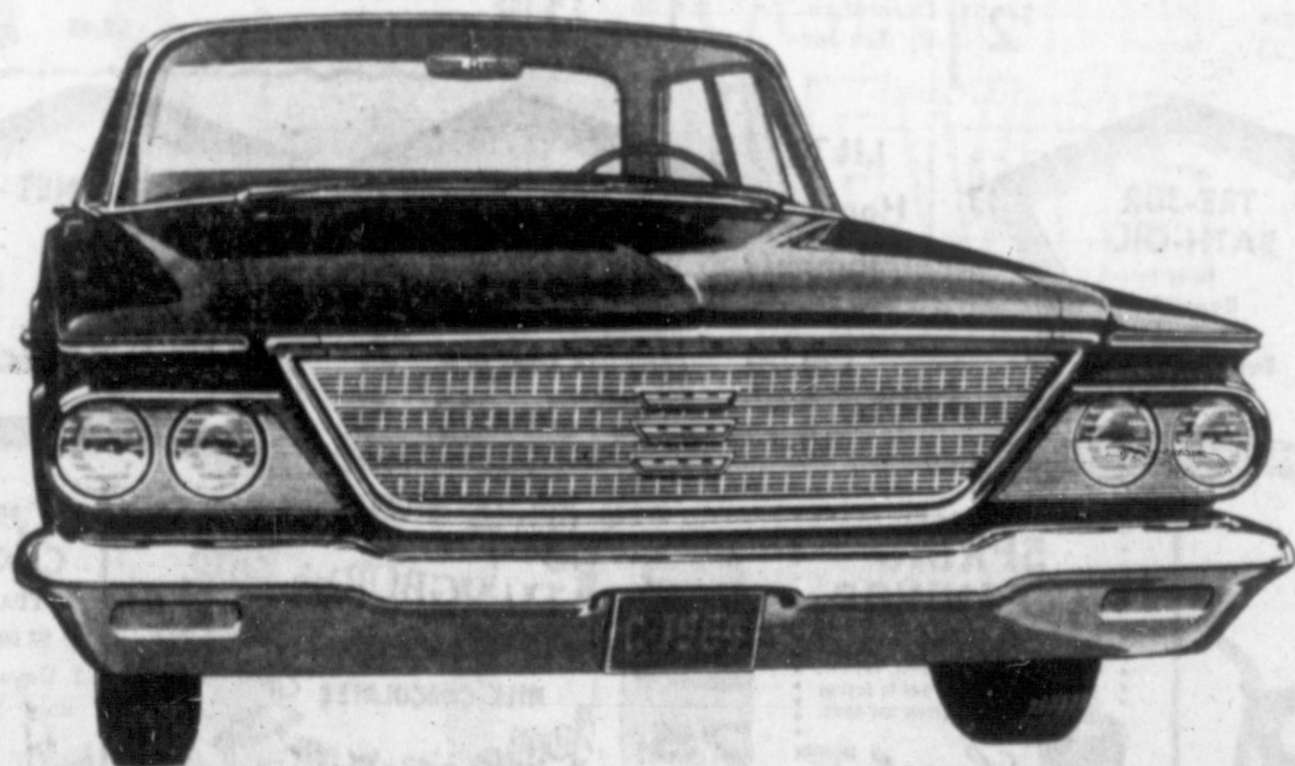

Re-Trial Due in Slant Hole Case

NEW YORK (UPI)—The retrial of Roy M. Cohn, former Communist-hunting aide of Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, on charges of perjury and obstruction of justice was scheduled Wednesday for June 9 by Federal Judge Dudley Bonsal.

Bonsal said there will be a hearing sometime next week on an application by Cohn's co-defendant, Murray S. Gottesman for severance and a separate trial on two charges of perjury. Gottesman, an attorney, claims his trial with Cohn was prejudicial because of the great publicity attending the first trial.

The charges against the two men stem from an alleged plot to help four stock swindlers escape indictment in 1959 in the Continental Dye and Chemical Co. stock fraud case. The first trial of Cohn and Gottesman ended in mistrial April 19 during jury deliberations because of the death of a juror's father.

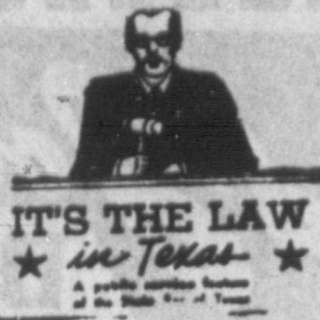

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

New Provisions in Driver Safety Responsibility Law
To make the Texas Safety Responsibility Law as effective as possible, the 1963 Legislature enacted several amendments. The strengthened law became effective January 1, 1964.

To protect your driver's license and motor vehicle registration, you should know the following facts about this new law:

If any accident in which a person is killed or injured or where there is damage to the property of any one person to an apparent extent of at least \$25 or more, the operator of every motor vehicle involved is required within 10 days to report the accident in writing to the Texas Department of Public Safety. If the accident involved death, personal injury or damage to one person's property of at least \$100, the accident then comes under the Safety Responsibility Act and its requirements must be met. Accident report forms can be obtained from any law enforcement officer.

The Department of Public Safety is required by the new law to suspend the driver licenses and all motor vehicle registration plates of both the operator and owner of vehicles involved in an accident coming under the Safety Responsibility Law UNLESS:

Evidence of liability insurance coverage in the minimum amounts of \$10,000 where one person was injured or killed, \$20,000 where more than one person was injured or killed, and \$5,000 for property damage is reported to the Department of Public Safety, OR a release signed by damaged or injured persons is filed with the Department of Public Safety. Other evidence of financial responsibility is covered by the new act. In addition, the operator and owner must file proof of financial responsibility for the future and maintain it for five years.

**Public Affairs Slip
 Above Entertainment**

By RICK DU BROW

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — The
 chief fact of this week's Emmy
 nominations is the overwhelm-
 ing confirmation by television
 that the public affairs people
 have relegated the entertain-
 ment-makers to the servants'
 entrance.

Last year, for the first time,
 a documentary, "The Tunnel,"
 was named as the season's
 best program. In the current
 nominations, four of the five
 candidates for "program of the
 year" are in the news-docu-
 mentary field.

They are: "The Kremlin";
 "The Making of the President,
 1960"; "American Revolution of
 '63," which was a three-hour
 prime-time study of the deseg-
 regation problem; and the first
 "Town Meeting of the World,"
 a transoceanic linking by com-
 munications satellite of interna-
 tional figures for discussion.

In a sense, even the fifth
 candidate, the "Blacklist" seg-
 ment of "The Defenders" se-
 ries, was a sort of dramatized
 tract of a once-blazing issue. It
 dealt with the inability of an
 actor to get parts because of
 past political affiliations. The
 nomination of the program for
 the highest Emmy award
 amounts to a strong statement

by the television academy on
 the overall subject.

Furthermore, another public
 affairs effort, "The Saga of
 Western Man," nominated in
 other categories, might well
 have been added to the pro-
 gram of the year candidates.
 The four-part show offered the
 hours entitled "1492," "1776,"
 "1898" and "1964."

Unless one takes this year's
 Emmy entertainment awards
 seriously, it should be no par-
 ticular surprise that such
 shows as "East Side-West
 Side" and the Richard Boone
 anthology, which gathered a
 fistful of nominations, have
 been canceled. Similar non-
 sense has occurred before —
 Bob Newhart comes to mind.
 And the ratings are still king,
 despite the congressional inves-
 tigation of last year.

Unpleasantly noticeable is
 the mere handful of nomina-
 tions for entertainment specials
 — chiefly because fewer of any
 distinction are being tried, and
 this trend will get worse next
 season. The weekly serials are
 the vast majority of candi-
 dates this year.

Finally, one wonders when
 the academy is going to get
 around to recognizing excel-
 lence in the field of sports cov-
 erage with full honors.

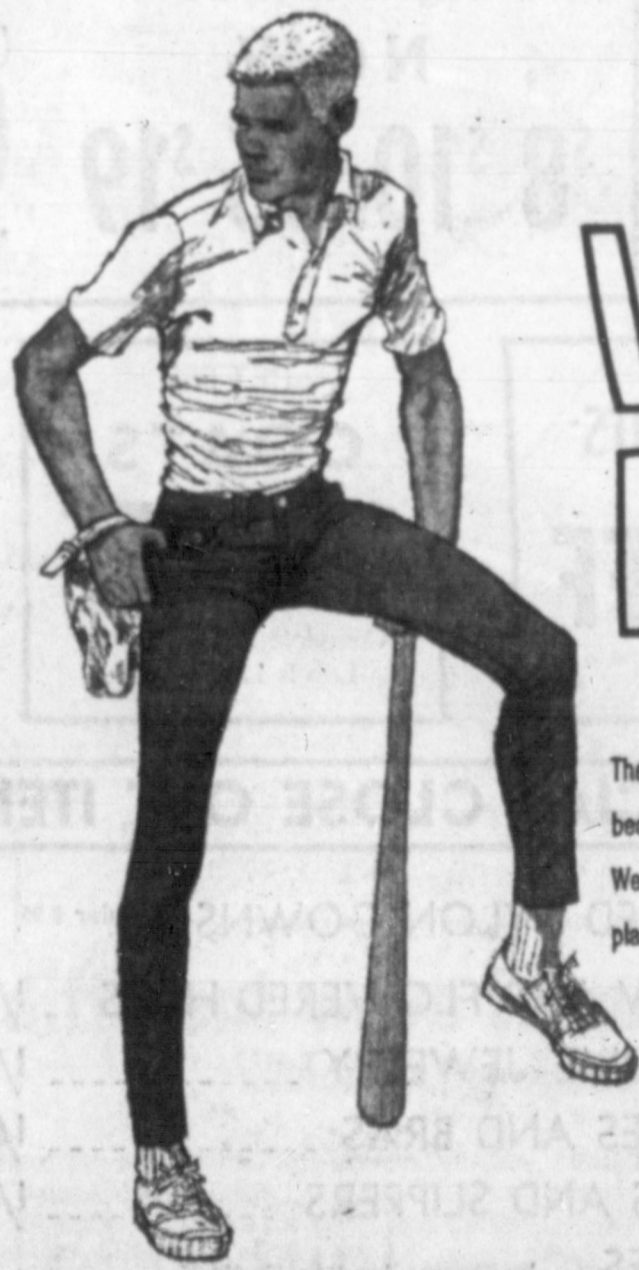

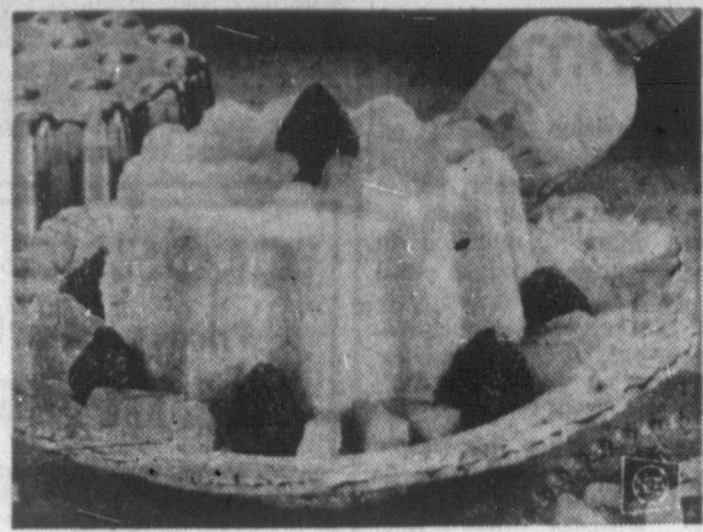

1 c. cooked rice
1 c. whipping cream
Pineapple Strawberry Sauce
Combine gelatin and sugar. Stir in pineapple juice. Place over low heat, stirring constantly, until gelatin is dissolved. Cool slightly. Stir in cooked rice. Chill until consistency of unbeaten egg white. Fold in whipped cream. Turn into 5-cup mold. Chill several hours until firm. Unmold. Serve with Pineapple Strawberry Sauce.

PINEAPPLE STRAWBERRY SAUCE
1 (1-pound 4 1/2-ounce) can pineapple tidbits
1 T. cornstarch
1/2 c. sugar
1 T. brandy, cointreau or lemon juice
1 c. strawberries
Combine undrained pineapple with cornstarch and sugar. Cook over moderate heat until sauce is clear and slightly thickened. Remove from heat. Add brandy. Chill. Just before serving, stir in whole or halved strawberries.

Book Reviews Highlight 20th Century Forum Meet

Mrs. Arthur Teed, using the book, "When The Cheering Stopped", the last years of Woodrow Wilson, by Gene Smith, presented the extraordinary story of Wilson's last years in the White House, and the part played by his wife when the nation was without a president able to perform his duties, during a recent meeting of Twentieth Century Forum Study Club.

Mrs. Donald Hauck and Mrs. John Sweeney, 916 Christine, were hostesses.

Mrs. Felix Vendrell introduced the speaker who outlined the story of the devoted first lady who centered her whole life in her husband and committed her worst errors out of mistaken loyalty.

According to Mrs. Teed, President Wilson suffered a thrombosis and the long 17 months began when the president became completely isolated from the world by his wife and his doctor. No one was allowed to see him. Senators, cabinet members, the vice president and others were left in the dark and the president's orders were scribbled in his wife's handwriting.

It was during these months that the Senate decided there would be no American entrance into the League. At the end of his term, Wilson left the presidency seemingly a broken, bitter and defeated man, with only the memory of a nation's cheers. "Yet," said Mrs. Teed, "Before his death crowds gathered daily in front of his home on South Street, Washington. This adulation has placed Wilson among the great presidents."

Mrs. Calvin Jones gave an interesting review of the book, "Madame Curie" by Eva Curie. Mrs. Jones said "Eva Curie, in the introduction of her book writes this of her mother, 'She was a woman; she belonged to an oppressed nation; she was poor; and she was beautiful. A powerful vocation summoned her from her motherland of Poland, to study in Paris, where she lived through years of poverty and solitude. There she met a man whose genius was akin to hers; she married him and their happiness was unique. By the most desperate and arid effort, they discovered a magic element, radium. This discovery not only gave birth

to a new science and a new philosophy; it provided mankind with the means of treating a dreadful disease. At the moment the fame of the two scientists was spreading through the world, grief overtook Marie; her husband was taken from her in an instant. But in spite of distress and illness, she continued to develop the science they had created together."

Mrs. Jones continued outlining the book with the fact that Marie Curie bore a resemblance on the day of her death to the young girl, the poor student, Marya Sklodowska. A hard and long and dazzling career had not succeeded in making her greater or less in sanctifying or debasing her. Einstein said, "Marie Curie is, of all celebrated beings, the only one whom fate has not corrupted."

Palmer, Nicklaus Rate Co-favorites

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI) — Arnold Palmer and Jack Nicklaus, golf's golden boys, were listed as co-favorites to capture the West's answer to the Masters—the \$65,000 Tournament of Champions opening today.

Palmer and Nicklaus, burning up the Desert Inn Country Club course Wednesday in a practice round, were listed as 2-1 after Nicklaus went round in six-under-par 66 and Palmer a 68 in the final round.

But what impressed the bookies was the fact that Palmer was out driving Nicklaus nearly every hole — and straight down the middle. "I'm hitting the ball real good," said Palmer after the round. "But I have played only three rounds since the Masters, and naturally, my putting isn't as good as it should be."

Every way the bookies look at it — and the players, too — they turn to Palmer and Nicklaus and just about exclude the rest of the field despite the fact that at one time or another during the past year every men in the 29-player contingent here had to win a tournament to qualify for this event.

The others with solid backing in the legal bookie places are Billy Casper at 7-1; Tony Lema, 8-1; and Gary Player and National Open champion Julius Boros at 10-1.

The others range as high as 50-1 on Jack Rule, the strong youngster who became eligible here by capturing the St. Paul Open.

Nicklaus, the defending champion, fashioned his 66 practice round Wednesday despite one ball out of bounds and two three-putt greens. "It's going to take straight driving on these narrow fairways," said Player, "and that fits Palmer and Nicklaus, the way they are hitting the ball."

"And it is going to take bold putting on these greens. And that fits Palmer and Nicklaus again."

First prize here is worth \$12,000 — all in silver dollars. The government has announced a shortage of silver dollars, but the sponsoring Desert Inn Casino looked ahead and had an order in for the 12,000 shiny new cartwheels.

Amazin', Says Willie Mays

CHICAGO (UPI) — Wondrous Willie Mays had seven words today to pessimistically describe the best start he's ever had with a bat in major league baseball.

"Amazing, ain't it?" he said. "But it won't last."

Mays battered Chicago Cubs starter Dick Ellsworth for two hits in three appearances at the plate Wednesday, punched another single off reliever Wayne Schurr and finally grounded out against Don Elston in his last appearance for a three for five day.

The 600 performance for the game, a 4-0 win for the San Francisco Giants for their first shutout of the year, elevated Mays' batting average for the season, 11 games so far, to .488, tops in the National League.

In addition, he drove in two runs, one with a first inning triple when he scored himself as well, to boost his league leading total runs batted in to 20.

"I can't explain it," Mays said cheerfully. "Sure, it's the best start I ever had. But it won't last. I know that. I don't think I've ever gone through a year without a slump, and I won't this year. But it's amazing, ain't it?"

Floyd-Machen Fight in July

NEW YORK (UPI) — Floyd Patterson and Eddie Machen, seeking a shot at Cassius Clay's heavyweight title, have signed for a 12-round July bout in Sweden.

The bout will be held in Solna Stadium July 5 and co-promoter Edwin Ahlquist of Sweden predicted a sellout crowd of 45,000 at Wednesday's signing.

"Cassius Clay will have to fight the winner of our bout," Patterson said. "He's in boxing to make money and that will be the only really big money fight."

"I think the bout in Sweden is the real challengers' bout," Patterson, who lost his title to Sonny Liston, said he will leave for Sweden May 20 to begin preparations for a series of exhibition bouts. Machen plans to leave the first week in June. Machen added.

Cloninger Misses No-Hit Game, But Milwaukee Still Overjoyed

The game in which Tony Cloninger missed no-hit fame may be the one in which the Milwaukee Braves finally realized a \$100,000 investment.

The Braves have been waiting for the 23-year-old Cloninger to come through ever since they signed him to a six-figure bonus contract in 1958, but the lack of a good curve ball to go with his sizzling fast ball always prevented Tony from achieving the goal set out for him.

It wasn't until the Braves dealt veteran World Series hero Lew Burdette to the St. Louis Cardinals last season that Cloninger began to get a regular turn on the mound. And it wasn't until Wednesday night that they saw the young fireballer realize his potential with his near - no - hitter.

Cloninger allowed only one hit — a clean single by Willie Stargell with two out in the seventh inning — as the Braves scored a 1-0 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates.

There had been doubt right up to the moment of the game's start that Tony would pitch at all. He suffered a painful bruise on his left foot when he fouled off a pitch onto it during batting practice, but he insisted on going to the mound.

The Braves gave Cloninger the only run he needed in the third inning when Denis Menke doubled, was sacrificed to third by Cloninger and scored on a single by Felipe Alou. The victory was the Braves' fourth in their last five games and vaulted them into third place in the National League.

Willie Mays wacked out three more hits to raise his average to .488 as the San Francisco Giants downed the Chicago Cubs, 4-0. The Los Angeles Dodgers defeated the Houston Colts, 7-2, and the St. Louis Cardinals beat the New York Mets, 4-3, in 11 innings in other NL games. Philadelphia at Cincinnati was rained out.

Marichal Wins Third Mays went 3-for-5 and drove in two runs to pace a nine-hit attack that brought the Giants' Juan Marichal his third straight win of this season and his ninth straight dating back to last year. Marichal struck out six and walked three in eight innings before turning over the ninth-inning mop-up duty to Bob Shaw.

The Dodgers scored their fourth straight win after being held hitless by Don Nottebart for 6 2-3 innings by tallying six runs in the last three innings to give Nick Willhitte his first win. Wally Moon, Willie Davis and John Werhas had two hits each for the Dodgers while John Bateman connected for a two-run homer for the Colts.

Relief pitcher Larry Bearnarth walked home the winning run with the bases filled in the 11th inning as the Cardinals overcame a 3-0 deficit created by Tim Lincecum's three-run first-inning homer. Key blows in the St. Louis comeback were singles by Curt Flood and Ken Boyer and Bill White's third homer of the season.

Sherry Gives Tigers AL Pennant Chance

Larry Sherry has turned back the clock five years to give the Detroit Tigers the lockup relief pitcher they feel will make them an American League pennant contender.

The Los Angeles Dodgers' World Series pitching hero of 1959 — he finished all four games which the Dodgers won from the Chicago White Sox — was acquired by the Tigers in an inter-league transaction early this year.

At the time it was pure speculation by Detroit General Manager Jim Campbell but now it looks like pure genius.

Although never able to relieve dependably for the Dodgers following his '59 series heroics, Sherry has delivered for the Tigers in sensational style.

He's relieved in four games and in a total of 10 2-3 innings allowed just one solitary hit and not a single run.

Wins Second Game Sherry did a two-inning scoreless hitch against the Los Angeles Angels on April 17, hung three goose eggs on the Angels on April 21, and didn't permit a hit in 1 2-3 innings against the Minnesota Twins on April 25. He came through Wednesday night with a four-inning one-hit performance and came off with his second victory of the season when Don Demeter's 10th-inning homer gave the Tigers a 5-4 triumph.

Demeter, acquired in the deal that sent pitcher Jim Bunning to the Philadelphia Phillies, went into the game hitting .162. His homer enabled the Tigers to move into a second-place tie with the Twins, 37 percentage points behind the first-place Cleveland Indians.

The Baltimore Orioles rallied to down the Boston Red Sox, 4-2, and the Los Angeles Angels defeated the Washington Senators, 5-1, in the other AL games. Cleveland at Minnesota and Chicago at New York were rained out.

Jackie Brandt's two-run seventh-inning double off relief ace Dick Radatz gave Wes Stock his second win of the season for the Orioles. A crowd of only 1,199 saw Dick Stuart drive in a run with a sacrifice fly to lift his league-leading total to 13 for the year. Dave Morehead suffered his second straight setback for the Red Sox.

Rookie Bob Lee pitched one-hit ball for seven innings to win his first game behind an Angel defense that included three double plays. Tom Satriano had three singles in three at bats and Joe Koppe connected for a key triple for the Angels.

'Poor' Liston Wants Fight DENVER (UPI) — Former heavyweight champion Sonny Liston said he would go up into the Colorado mountains Monday to begin training for another fight this year — possibly with Cassius Clay.

"I got to fight again this year," Liston said. "I haven't got nothing, not a quarter. The government has it all and I don't understand it. They're holding it for taxes, but I don't see how they can take a man's whole pay for taxes."

Liston, whose forte is not usually talking, made the statements Wednesday in a speech before the Denver Bronco's Quarterback Club. It was his first scheduled public appearance since he lost his title to Clay Feb. 25 at Miami Beach.

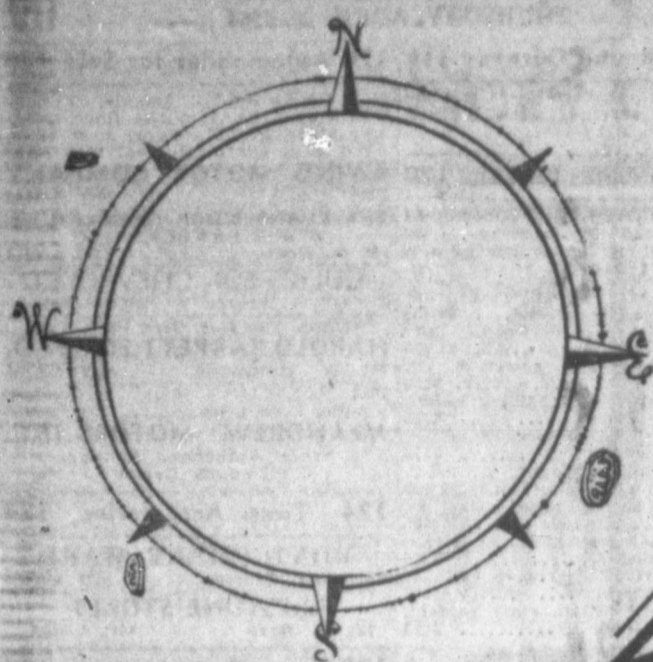
