Warm Reception Seen For LBJ by Workers

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (UPI)—President Johnson is expected to get a warm reception today in the politically potent Union Auto Workers in his first appearance before the labor coalition since becoming Chief Executive.

Johnson was scheduled to fly from Washington this morning and address about 9,000 UAW delegates.

The convention got a taste of politics Sunday when union president Walter P. Reuther asked a move to give the UAW's endorsement to Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy for the Democratic vice presidential nomination.

"Will support Johnson Reuther, who is sure to support Johnson for a four-year term in the White House, has expressed a preference on running mate. Some of his aides are known to favor Hubert H. Humphrey, Democrat."

"We could do nothing more to get Bobby Kennedy in the race for vice president under these circumstances," Reuther said to delegates. "Sometimes your best friends are your worst enemies."

John McCarrell, president of UAW Local 544 in Pittsburgh, triggered Reuther's comment by telling the convention that Reuther should make it known he will not accept anyone but an attorney general as Johnson's running mate.

Convention's Business

Reuther said that was matter of the Democratic convention and he noted that Johnson would have a great deal to say about the choice.

"I suggest we stick to our business," Reuther said in ruling McCarrell out of order. The exchange came after

Cold Front Expected To Blow Into Pampa

A moderate cold front was expected to move into the Pampa area late today with occasional blowing dust and a few snow flurries tonight and Tuesday.

The weatherman said there would be increasing wind velocity late today and that the wind would continue blowing tomorrow.

Today's high was moving toward the upper 50s this afternoon. The change to colder tonight was expected to send the mercury into the low 20s. Tomorrow's maximum should reach no higher than the upper 40s.

Skies were clear for most of the Panhandle this forenoon, but light rain fell in Central Texas ahead of the new mass of cold air.

Overnight low temperatures ranged from 37 degrees at Doherty to 66 at Brownsville. Pampa's low was 41.

The five-day forecast called for below normal temperatures in the Panhandle and central part of Texas with above average temperatures in the south.

Prayer Walk Fails To Stir Alabamans

A Negro minister toured downtown Birmingham on a prayer walk Sunday. He went virtually unnoticed by police.

The minister, Rev. Nathaniel Lindsey of the unaffiliated United Methodist Alliance, a group of local Negro ministers, said he will continue his walks around the downtown area for the next five days and invited other ministers to join him.

"A wall of prayer is being erected around the downtown area," Lindsey said.

A spokesman for the Integrationist Alabama Christian Movement for Human Rights said picketing of two Birmingham department stores would continue today.

Picketing in Birmingham began anew last Thursday after a six-months' layoff. Negroes charged that white leaders had failed to keep promises made in last year's mass demonstrations.

Twelve pickets were arrested and seven of those were scheduled to go on trial today on charges of violating a city picketing ordinance. The other five pickets were juveniles who were turned loose without charges.

Jacksonville, Fla.: Leaders of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People have called for an investigation into "the real reasons" why the mayor swore in 496 firemen as "special law officers to keep the peace" in current civil rights demonstrations. Mayor Haydon Burns announced the action Saturday.

Mahwah, N.J.: Negro demonstrators from New York City picketed the mountain home of a Negro landlord Sunday, charging him with refusing to make improvements in their Harlem tenement apartment building.

Frankfort, Ky.: Thirty-three civil rights demonstrators have (See INTEGRATION, Page 3)

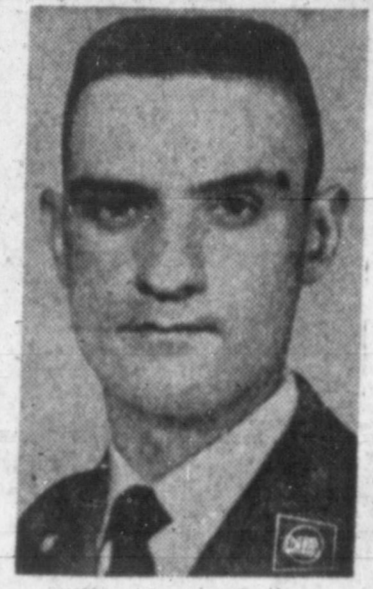

Release May Aid Relations

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A Soviet promise to release two American airmen held in East Germany kept alive today hopes for improving relations between the United States and Russia.

Secretary of State Dean Rusk said the Soviet Union had promised to free the two fliers, sometime today. They were aboard a U.S. RB66 reconnaissance bomber shot down in East Germany on March 10.

The two Air Force officers are Capt. David I. Holland, 35, of Holland, Minn., pilot, and Capt. Melvin J. Kessler, 30, of Philadelphia. There had been fears the Communists might accuse them of spying at a "showcase" trial.

A third crew member of the RB66, 1st Lt. Harold W. Welch, 24, of Detroit, Mich., was returned to U.S. authorities Saturday. He received a broken arm and broken leg when he parachuted from the plane.

Rusk's statement that the Russians had promised to free Holland and Kessler was made Sunday in a nationwide television interview.

The announcement came four days after the United States had warned Russia that delay in releasing the fliers "clearly jeopardizes possibilities for expanding areas of United States-Soviet cooperation."

Rusk said release of the American fliers was "not an exchange." But he said President Johnson had ordered additional steps "to insure that this sort of accident does not occur again."

Baptists Due Bible Action

OKLAHOMA CITY (UPI)—Resolutions favoring voluntary prayers and Bible reading in public schools are expected to be introduced at the 15th annual session of the North American Baptist Association which opens here Tuesday.

Also expected to be introduced are resolutions opposing federal aid for parochial schools and supporting separation of church and state, religious liberty for all people in all countries and the American free enterprise system.

About 3,500 North American Baptists from 25 states and four foreign countries are to attend the three-day meeting.

Rev. D. L. Wadley of Dallas, association president the past two years, will preside. Keynote speaker will be Rev. Charles O. Strong, an instructor in the General Baptist College, Conway, Ark.

Percy Quits Ruby Defense

DALLAS (UPI)—Trial lawyer Percy Foreman of Houston resigned today as Jack Ruby's chief defense counsel because there were too many other people involved in the case of the condemned slayer.

Foreman had been hired only last Friday to replace outspoken Melvin Belli of San Francisco. He had visited Ruby, the slayer of accused assassin Lee Harvey Oswald Sunday in the county jail.

Foreman, the most successful and prominent criminal lawyer in Texas, indicated difficulties with the Ruby family.

"I'm not accustomed to representing five or six people," he said.

"Jack Ruby and I get along fine. But due to the fact that the family is a close-knit corporation, I just think I could make my time more valuable elsewhere."

Ruby has two other lawyers, Joe Tonahill of Jasper and Phil Burleson of Dallas.

Pampa-Borger Baseball Today

Pampa High's baseball team will host Borger at 4 p.m. today in Optimist Park instead of tomorrow as previously scheduled (see story on sports page).

Pampa athletic director Weldon "Birdog" Trice reported this afternoon that the Borger officials had called due to the weather report which threatened snow for tomorrow and the two schools had agreed to move the game up one day in order to get in as many tilts as possible.

Pampa already has had its opening game with Hereford last week cancelled because of bad weather. There will be no game played tomorrow with the next scheduled baseball a doubleheader at Hereford Friday afternoon.

US Expresses Regrets Over Village Attack

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (UPI)—The United States today expressed regret to Cambodia about last week's attack on a border village by Vietnamese troops accompanied by U.S. advisers. But it denied the Americans were directly involved.

The U.S. Embassy, however, was reported to be speeding the departure of American dependents from Phnom Penh to avoid incidents because of the U.S. connection to the raid.

Sixteen Cambodians were killed Thursday when South Vietnamese troops, accompanied by the U.S. advisers who aid them in their war against the Communist Viet Cong guerrillas, attacked the Cambodian village of Chantrea by mistake. It is four miles across the border from South Vietnam.

Today, the U.S. Embassy made public a letter to the Cambodian government from Secretary of State Dean Rusk detailing the American role.

Investigation showed that "an American adviser was present with Vietnamese ground forces and that following the bombing attack about four Americans briefly landed from a helicopter with Vietnamese officers who were engaged in locating the scene of action," the letter said.

"When it became clear to Vietnamese commanders that an error had been committed, Vietnamese armed forces and American personnel promptly withdrew.

"No American personnel were engaged in any firing or directly participated in military action during the incident," it added.

"In light of these facts I should like to express... the profound regret of my government that an attack in Cambodian territory should have taken place... and that American personnel should have been present during the action," it said.

"It was the worst incident in the recent stormy history of Vietnamese-Cambodian relations, and although the Saigon government also expressed its regret, it caused the indefinite postponement of talks aimed at improving these relations."

Scientist May Aid In Smoking Fight

PALM BEACH SHORES, Fla. (UPI)—A cancer scientist says science may develop a chemical protection for cigarette smokers against cancer.

Dr. Charles Huggins, director of the Ben May Cancer Research Laboratory at the University of Chicago, said tobacco smoke causes cancer. He said the cancer-causing property in the smoke is the aromatic hydrocarbon compound, benzo a pyrene.

He said compounds of the same chemical family might neutralize its cancerous power in body chemistry and thus protect smokers.

Dr. Huggins Sunday addressed the sixth annual seminar for science writers, sponsored by the American Cancer Society.

US Court Says Cuba Act O.K.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Supreme Court ruled today that U.S. courts must treat as valid Fidel Castro's nationalization of American property in Cuba.

As a result, Cuba can legally collect \$175,000 realized from the sale of some sugar belonging to a seized American company. The case will have a bearing on many others with millions of dollars at stake.

Since Congress has frozen all Cuban funds in this country, however, the Castro regime cannot get its hands on the money. The 8 to 1 decision will have a bearing on numerous other court challenges here to Cuban nationalizations. The government reported 37 cases in New York alone.

Justice Department Upheld

The Cuban decision upheld the position of the Justice Department, which argued that generally speaking U.S. courts must recognize as valid acts of a recognized foreign government affecting ownership of property in that country.

This is known as the "act of state" doctrine. The department contended that U.S. foreign relations could be adversely affected if U.S. courts made judgments in this area.

Today's case dealt with Castro's seizure of a shipload of sugar on Aug. 6, 1960, in Jucaro Harbor. The sugar belonged to one of 26 companies seized by the Castro regime on that day.

A New York commodity broker, Farr, Whitlock, & Co., had already contracted to sell the shipment to a customer in Morocco. The firm went ahead with the deal and realized \$175,000. On order of a New York state court, these funds were placed in escrow for the stockholders of the original owners, most of whom live in the United States.

Bank Filed Suit

The Banco Nacional de Cuba, financial agent of the Castro government, sued to recover the money.

Federal District Judge Edward J. Dimock dismissed the suit and was upheld by the 2nd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

The second circuit said Cuba violated international law when it took the property and therefore did not have legal title to the funds.

Justice John M. Harlan spoke for the court today in a 39-page opinion.

Additional \$14,685 Pledged in Drive

An additional \$14,685 in pledged investments toward the \$200,000 goal sought by the Pampa Industrial Foundation, Inc., fund campaign was placed on the books today at a coffee meeting of campaign workers.

The total brought the amount pledged thus far to \$125,766, or some 63 per cent of the amount sought.

The general investments section of the campaign reported \$3,885 in pledges during the morning coffee at the Coronado Inn.

The advance fund section had \$5,800 in new pledges while the executive committee reported \$5,000 as its pledge, bringing the coffee meeting to a successful close.

Frank Culbertson, one of the executive committeemen, made the announcement of the \$5,000 pledge before Fred Neslage, general chairman for the drive, introduced the coffee session's chief speaker, Don Cain.

Cain outlined the tax deduction status of the campaign, reminding workers that the Foundation is set up as a non-profit organization and could be used as a business deduction, if a person investing was in business,

More Delays Due on Cyprus

NICOSIA, Cyprus (UPI)—With Greek and Turkish Cypriots reinforcing battle positions, the United Nations peace force today appeared subject to more delays in its missions as buffer between the warring communities.

Forces of both the Greek Cypriots and the Turkish Cypriots were moving in heavy reinforcements on the northern end of the Kyrenia Road and entrenching new gun positions along the strategic artery.

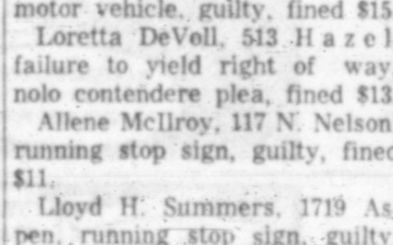

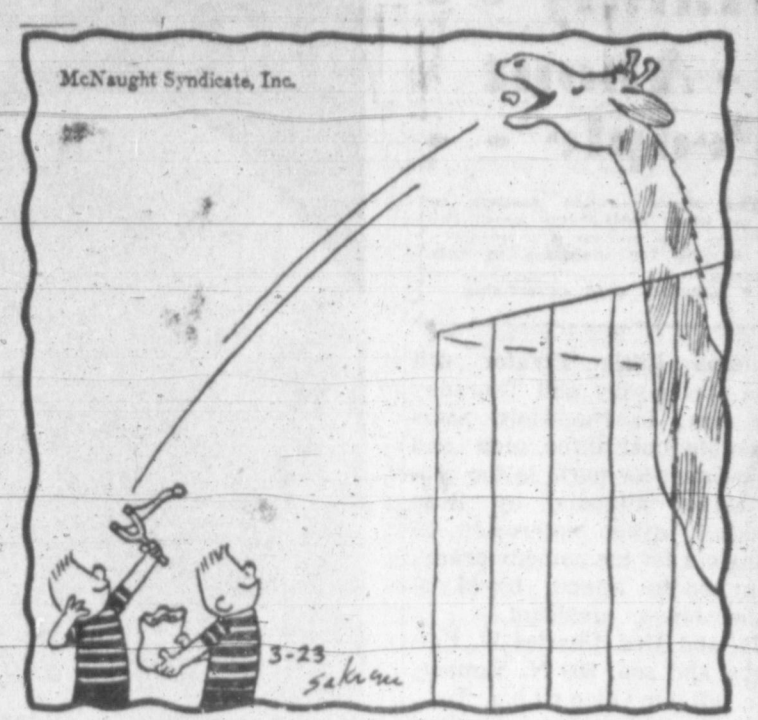

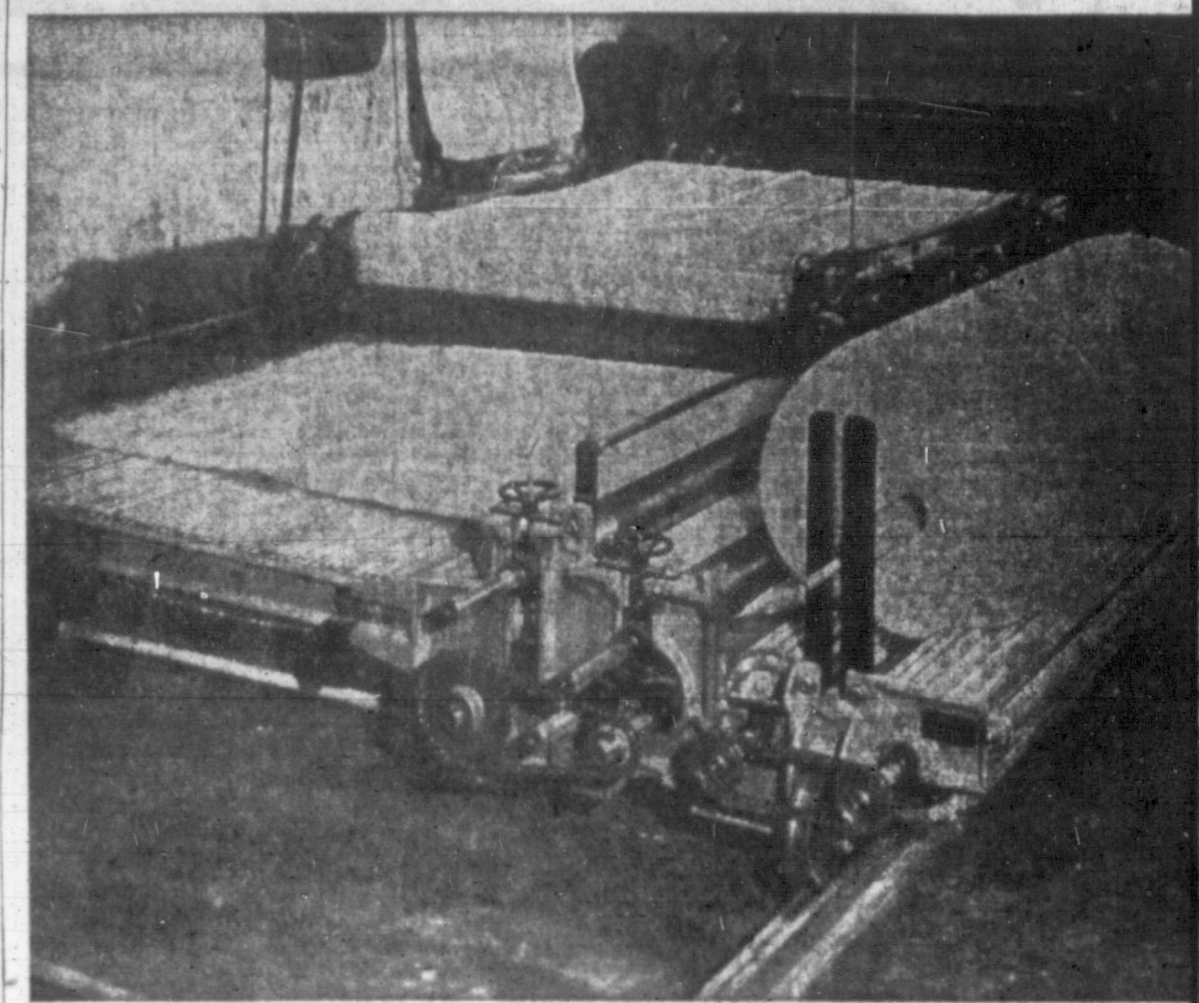
