


The Supreme Court ruled today that U.S. courts must treat as valid Fidel Castro's nationalization of American property in Cuba.

As a result, Cuba can legally collect \$175,000 realized from the sale of some sugar belonging to a seized American company. The case will have a bearing on many others with millions of dollars at stake.

Since Congress has frozen all Cuban funds in this country, however, the Castro regime cannot get its hands on the money. The 8 to 1 decision will have a bearing on numerous other court challenges .here to Cuban nationalizations. The government reported 37 cases in New York alone


