



McNamara Hopeful After Viet Nam Trip

'No Magic Formula,' Reports Secretary

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara said today on his return from South Viet Nam that every responsible official there believes the war against Communist guerrillas can be won "if the proper effort is made."

McNamara cautioned that "there is no magic formula for winning the anti-guerrilla struggle" and that "the path to victory may be hard." But he attempted to convey full confidence that the battle can be won.

McNamara and Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, made a full report at noon EST to President Johnson on the results of their five-day, first hand inspection of the critical Viet Nam war situation.

The McNamara party arrived shortly after daybreak on their flight from Saigon via Honolulu where they stopped off for a brief conference with the U. S. Pacific commander, Adm. Harry D. Felt.

On his arrival here, the secretary told newsmen: "In the entire week, I did not talk to a single responsible official who was unable to agree that, if the proper effort is made, the war can be won."

He refused to say what possible changes in American support for the South Vietnamese that he might recommend until after he has talked to the President.

McNamara said the trip had a twofold purpose:

—To appraise the political, economic and military situations in South Viet Nam.

—To determine what additional actions, if any, are needed to strengthen the South Vietnamese in their war against the Communist Viet Cong.

\$28,150 Pledged In First Report Of Fund Drive

Advance Investments Group Makes Heavy Dent in \$200,000 Campaign

Pampa's Industrial Foundation fund-drive got off to a good start this morning when the Advance Investment Group reported a total of \$28,150 had been raised toward the \$200,000 goal. It was the first check-in coffee of the group in the Citizens Bank Hospitality Room.

Fred Neslage, general Foundation chairman, presided at the meeting and commended members of the five teams on a splendid start.

There was much enthusiasm among team captains and individual members when the total was announced.

Today's report included the following:

Team No. 1, A. A. Schuneman, captain, \$16,000; Team No. 2, Floyd Imel, captain, \$500; Team No. 3, Gordon Lyons, captain, \$3,750; Team No. 4, Dr. Joe Donaldson, captain, \$6,550; and Team No. 5, Paul Crossman, captain, \$1,350.

Chairman Neslage announced that First National Bank of Pampa had set the pace for Pampa businesses supporting the Foundation with an investment of \$15,000.

The Foundation group at today's meeting heard an inspiring talk and received much praise from Harry Clark of Austin, executive director of the Texas Industrial Commission.

Clark said Pampa is to be congratulated upon its Industrial Foundation Plan.

"You are among the cities in Texas now raising their industrial promotion funds from private sources," Clark said.

"Texas is one of only five states in the United States that does not use tax money for industrial development promotions," Clark said.

Clark said Texas spends 1.5 cents per capita per year for industrial development purposes, the lowest in the nation. Mississippi, for instance, spends 50 cents per capita, he stated.

Today's coffee was the first in a series of report meetings on the Industrial Foundation progress. The next report meeting for the Advance group is scheduled for 10 a.m. Monday in the First National Bank.

Police Minus Clues in Hunt For Hagler

PORT LAVACA, Tex. (UPI) — Sheriff's officers, police and Texas Rangers were without clues today to the whereabouts of David Fred Hagler, 46, once accused of trying to fake his own death by killing and burning another man.

In Dallas, Judge J. Frank Wilson was expected to set a trial date today on a second forgery charge against Hagler, who forfeited a bond Wednesday when he failed to appear for trial on a similar forgery charge.

Dredgers Thursday pulled the wreckage of Hagler's rented light plane from the Matagorda Bay where it crashed Tuesday, Sheriff D. B. Halliburton said the plane was "in excellent shape."

It was found in shallow water about a half mile from shore and 20 miles southeast of Port Lavaca, on the lower Gulf Coast.

Hagler rented the plane in Corpus Christi Tuesday and he and Mrs. Loretta Anderson, 48, of Eules, Tex. took off but crashed about 60 miles from the airport.

Halliburton said he believed Hagler and Mrs. Anderson waded to shore because he found a man and woman's footprints on the beach. Mr. and Mrs. Arturo Torralba, who live nearby, said a man and woman with wet clothing gave them a damp \$20 bill to drive them to Port Lavaca.

Torralba said he left the two at different hotels.

Mrs. Anderson told police conflicting stories of leaving Hagler clinging to a wing of the plane and of swimming to shore and being rescued.

Her husband, Jimmy H. Anderson, has since taken her from a hospital.

Hagler was charged with slaying an unidentified man in Sulphur, Okla. in 1954 and burning the body. But he was acquitted.

The omni-directional radio range, popularly called a "VOR" is easily recognized by its unusual shape. Enclosed in a 16-foot high plastic cone, it is mounted on top of a 10-foot high building. From safely inside the protecting plastic cone, the "VOR" antenna sends out static-free radio signals 150 miles in all directions.

Special instruments in an aircraft flying overhead pick up these signals and, at a glance, the pilot can tell if he is on or off his course.

U.S. Rep. Walter Rogers was due in Pampa late today for a busy schedule of events before traveling to Shamrock to attend St. Patrick Day program.

Soviets Eye Charges for U.S. Airmen

BERLIN (UPI) — Soviet authorities are investigating the "personal responsibility" of three U.S. Air Force officers shot down over East Germany on an alleged spy mission, an East German government spokesman said today.

"In order to file charges, one must have evidence," the Foreign Ministry spokesman told UPI.

He said it is "unlikely" the three Americans who were shot down Tuesday will be tried by an East German court. He said it is not yet determined if the Soviets have a "legal right" to try the airmen.

The spokesman said the three Americans are now in Russian custody and undergoing questioning by Soviet officials.

They fell into Russian hands when their RB66 reconnaissance bomber was shot down Tuesday after accidentally crossing into East Germany on a routine training flight.

U.S. officials said the plane veered over East Germany inadvertently while on a training mission over West Germany from its base in France. The Soviets called it a deliberate "spy flight."

Final Witness Testifies in Ruby's Trial

By H. D. QUIGG — DALLAS (UPI) — The final witness at Jack Ruby's murder trial testified today that the slayer suffers a "particular, very rare" non-convulsive type of epilepsy.

Dr. Frederick A. Gibbs of Chicago, whose theories were challenged in advance by prosecution psychiatrists, testified for the defense after a last-minute midnight flight here as the trial approached its Friday the 13th date with the jury.

Backing the defense contention that Ruby was in a "spell" and not responsible when he shot Lee Harvey Oswald, the tall, craggy-faced physician said:

"Ruby has a particular, very rare type of epilepsy—one that does not manifest itself in convulsive seizures, but in other ways."

Gibbs was the 66th and last witness at the trial now ending its fourth week.

Prosecution psychiatrists had denied that the electroencephalogram (brain wave) tests administered to the 52-year-old nightclub owner indicated serious abnormality. They rejected the contention that Ruby suffers from psychomotor epilepsy causing "blackouts."

Chief defense attorney Melvin Belli asked Gibbs whether the ailment showed up clearly on the brain wave tracings.

"It was clear," Gibbs replied in a deep, calm voice.

Ruby, looking more tense than usual, walked into court and gave an affectionate glance at his sister, Mrs. Eileen Kaminsky of Chicago, who sat in the spectator section.

Farm Income Lags; Texas Ranks Third
WASHINGTON (UPI) — Cash receipts by farmers for livestock in 1963 were about a half billion dollars below 1962, according to the Agriculture Department's review of the farm income situation. Texas ranked third nationally.
Cash receipts for all farm marketings in 1963 totaled a whopping \$36.2 billion. This was about \$325 million, or 1 per cent, more than in 1962. An increase volume of marketings more than offset a slight drop in farm prices.
Ranked on the basis of total cash receipts from marketing in 1963, California was first and Iowa second, the same as in 1962. Estimated receipts for California were \$3.43 billion and for Iowa, \$2.53 billion.
Texas was third with \$2.49 billion.

Reds Block Return Of Downed Airmen

WIESBADEN, Germany (UPI)—The Russians today blocked American efforts to find and help three American airmen shot down over East Germany Tuesday despite a demand for their prompt return to the U.S. Army commander in Europe.

Gen. Paul L. Freeman made a request in a letter sent Wednesday night to Gen. I. I. Akubovsky, the Soviet commander in Germany, saying he wanted the three U.S. Air Force officers "returned as soon as possible."

It was announced at U.S. Army European Headquarters in Heidelberg that three search parties "were sent to the scene where the RB66 twin-jet reconnaissance bomber was shot down by a Soviet fighter when it strayed into East Germany."

But a spokesman at the U.S. Embassy in Bonn said: "As far as we are aware, the teams have not yet been permitted by the Russians to approach the crash site nor have they been given any information on the whereabouts and condition of the crew."

In Moscow, meanwhile, the Soviet government ridiculed an American suggestion that the ill-fated plane might have been laced off course by radio jamming and false signals sent out by the Russian.

U.S. and Panama Near Agreement On Relations

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States and Panama were reported very near an agreement today to restore diplomatic relations and open talks on the Panama Canal and other issues.

Announcement of the agreement could come today. However, diplomats said the understanding still could bog down at the last moment.

The agreement would call for restoring diplomatic relations, which Panama broke last January, followed in 30 days by talks on U.S.-Panama issues.

These talks, informed sources said, would be conducted by U.S. and Panamanian emissaries empowered to "discuss and negotiate" issues.

A dispute over these two words — "discuss" and "negotiate" — caused collapse of efforts that nearly resulted in an agreement between the two countries Jan. 15. At that time, Panama wanted to "negotiate," but the United States was willing only to "discuss" the 1903 Canal Zone treaty.

Mediators of the Organization of American States (OAS) were still working Thursday night on the detailed language of the latest proposed agreement.

Riots broke out along the border between Panama and the U.S.-controlled Canal Zone Jan. 9 over the issue of whether the Panamanian flag could fly at a high school in the Canal Zone.

Panama later ordered U.S. Embassy personnel out of the country.

A five-member OAS team was appointed last month to investigate and mediate the dispute. The mediation team consisted of representatives from Mexico, Brazil, Costa Rica, Paraguay, and Uruguay.

Diplomatic sources said Thursday night the United States and Panama had narrowed their differences to a point where an agreement could be expected within 24 hours. They said an announcement would be made simultaneously by the White House and the Panamanian presidential palace.

Satchmo Has Message for 'Them Cats'

NEW YORK (UPI) — "Well, you just tell them cats who are trying to push me out the door that there's nothin' wrong with the ole ticker or anything else."

It was the big jazz cat himself, Louis (Satchmo) Armstrong denying reports of his own death.

"It's weird, man, weird," said the 63-year-old jazz trumpet player and rasp-voiced singer in a telephone conversation from his bed at Beth Israel Hospital. "Ole Satch" is undergoing treatment for a leg ailment and the hospital says his condition is "satisfactory."

Reports of his demise allegedly were broadcast by a radio station.

Armstrong entered the hospital last week suffering from phlebitis—an inflammation of a vein—in his left leg.

His physician, Dr. Gary Zucker, said Thursday that Armstrong should be ready to leave the hospital in a few days.

Runaway Ohio River Pushes Downstream

The mighty and muddy Ohio River, swollen by record rains and teaming with debris, pushed downstream today toward its third highest crest of the century.

Cincinnati and Louisville braced for the full fury of the runaway river while farmers and townfolk all the way to the Mississippi watched the rising water stream over their cropland and through their streets.

Upstream the crisis was over but the damage was done. Displaced families started moving back into their water-logged homes in parts of Pennsylvania, Ohio and West Virginia.

The American Red Cross said 110,000 persons had been affected by the flooding streams and rivers and a state-by-state check showed more than 47,000 had been driven from their homes.

Army engineers said the flood damage could exceed \$200 million.

The Ohio was expected to crest at more than 14 feet above flood stage at Cincinnati early this morning. A peak of 18.3 feet above flood stage—third highest of the century—was forecast for Louisville later in the day.

National Guardsmen and volunteers finished off the sealing of the massive floodwall at Louisville Thursday and helped scores of families from their river-threatened homes.

About 3,000 persons fled their homes in the suburbs, beyond the protection of Louisville's floodwall. Red Cross shelters housed more than 300 persons.

In Washington, the Small Business Administration designated flood-ravaged sections of seven states as disaster areas, including parts of Ohio, Kentucky, Indiana, Illinois, West Virginia, Pennsylvania and Missouri.

With rivers starting to recede in the uplands, the danger zone shifted downstream to northern Kentucky, southern Indiana and southern Illinois.

Democratic Chief Blasts Criticism Of GOP Group

AUSTIN (UPI) — State Democratic chairman Frank C. Erwin said Thursday he has no intention of quitting his post as a member of the University of Texas board of regents.

Erwin, answering criticism by the University Young Republican Club, insisted he "was working for the best interests of the university before the Young Republicans were born."

The 44-year-old Austin attorney was asked to resign by the Young Republicans Tuesday night only a day after he was promoted from secretary to chairman of the State Democratic Executive Committee.

"They didn't recommend me or appoint me to the regents and I don't intend to resign," Erwin said of the critical students.

Lee McFadden of Dallas, noting "the regents have acted with political motivation in the past," said the Young Republicans don't "want U.T. to become an extension of the Democratic party."

Erwin was appointed to the board of regents by Gov. John Connally last year.

Miss Susan B. Anthony started the spark for women in

public office today. The panel discussed the role of women in politics from Susan B. Anthony to Margaret Chase. Women have only had a voice in the policy of making our government since 1920. Mrs. Thelma Holman of Panhandle, was dressed in a costume depicting the late 1870's in her portrayal of Susan B. Anthony.

She pleaded with women to register to vote. She managed to get 50 women registered, and the news medium made the act of women registering seem very much like a crime.

Horace Mann admonished Susan Anthony that only those who protected their country by fighting should be permitted to vote. Miss Anthony replied that she would fight as he had fought in the war "at the end of a goose quill".

In spite of her vigorous campaign for women suffrage, Miss Anthony had been dead for 14 years when the nineteenth amendment came into effect.

Attention was directed to women who have held high public office with Miss France Perkins in 1930 as secretary of Labor. Others have been Oveta Culp Hobby, secretary of health; education and welfare; Clara Booth Luce as ambassador to Italy; and Ivy Baker Priest as secretary of the treasury. Mrs. Smith, senator from Maine, now running for the presidential position on the Republican ticket, was cited as the most eminent woman now in politics.

Mrs. Smith is known for her hard work and high attendance for 1500 roll call votes in the Senate. Mrs. Smith opens the door for women in politics in this generation as Miss Anthony did in her generation.

Move to Boost Bobby Stirs Wisconsinites

MADISON, Wis. (UPI) — A movement to boost Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy for the vice presidency had Wisconsin Democrats in a turmoil this week.

A high-ranking Wisconsin Democrat told United Press International that veteran party professionals had moved into the dairy state on behalf of Kennedy for a behind-the-scenes bid to win over the state delegation for the attorney general for vice president.

The source told UPI this movement was on a much more professional level than the Draft Kennedy Committee formed here earlier this week by two Milwaukee businessmen.

The Wisconsin primary does not allow for a write-in vote. Gov. John Reynolds, after a meeting with President Johnson in Washington Wednesday, said a write-in drive for vice president was "a little asinine."

The entry of Alabama Gov. George Wallace into the state's April 7 presidential primary on the Democratic side has already hampered party attempts to patch up differences and present a unified front for the election.

Corbin is Head
The highly reliable source told UPI that the national movement to boost Kennedy for the vice presidency was being headed by Paul Corbin, until recently an employe of the National Democratic Committee.

Corbin, who helped organize support here for John F. Kennedy in the 1960 primary which started the late President on the road to the White House, was reported to be in Wisconsin today.

One published source said Johnson personally ordered Corbin's dismissal from the staff of the National Democratic Committee because of Corbin's reported work in the write-in campaign which gave

the attorney 14,548 votes in New Hampshire. This report of Corbin's dismissal was denied in Washington by Democratic National Chairman John M. Bailey.

Another report quoted an unidentified associate of Robin to the effect that Corbin had not been asked to leave his national committee post.

Devotes Full Time
UPI's source said Corbin was devoting full time to organizing the national movement to boost Kennedy for the vice presidency.

The source said party professionals hope to influence the Wisconsin delegation to go to the National Convention in August committed to Kennedy for vice president.

The information of the "Draft Robert F. Kennedy for Vice President of the United States Grass Roots, Ground Swell Committee" here Tuesday was not connected with the activities of the party professionals.

The source said formation of the committee "caused embarrassment to all pro-Kennedy people in Wisconsin."

"It was not the right time," the source said. "It was premature."

The informant said professional Kennedy supporters hope to quell any enthusiasm generated by the Draft Kennedy Committee and also work behind the scenes to line up members of the state delegation on Kennedy's side.

The public is invited.

Two-Day Open House Set at Nursing Home

A two-day open house program for the 100-bed Twilight Acres nursing home will get under way at 2 p.m. Saturday. The \$250,000 structure, which covers a five-acre area, will be open to the public from 2 p.m. until 4 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday.

Mr. and Mrs. James A. Davenport will handle the operation, which was started in October at a groundbreaking ceremony. Twilight Acres is located three blocks west of Highland General Hospital on Kentucky St. and has some 50 rooms with a 100-bed capacity.

Mrs. Davenport will be administrator for the home, which is similar to nursing homes constructed in Corpus Christi, San Antonio, Lubbock, Amarillo and Temple.

The one and two bedrooms are furnished in four different styles — hospital, French Provincial, Early American and Contemporary. All rooms are painted an off-white and the furnishings vary in colors.

Mrs. Davenport, while extending an invitation to the public to visit the building, said the staff would try to make the new home, a "place where our guests can be made to feel they have a home in which to live."

Mrs. Davenport said she felt the new nursing home would be of interest to everyone since it will utilize the most modern equipment and service for residents of the home.

"We intend to expand our staff as we need to according to the number of persons we have here," she said.

This is the second such nursing home that the Davenports

have operated in Pampa. The general shape of the home is that of a square U. The two arms of the U contain the rooms and nursing stations. The remainder houses the reception area, office, chapel, family dining room, lounge area, dining area and kitchen.

Half baths are shared between two rooms with entrances from each room. Buttons to summon nurses are located by each bed and in the bedrooms.

A few rooms have adjoining baths with tubs. Mrs. Davenport said only patients who can bathe themselves in safety will be assigned rooms with tubs.

Each wing has a drive-in shower where wheel chair patients can be rolled into the shower and bathed without leaving the waterproof wheel chair.

Each wing also has a bath with an all tile tub, where patients may take tub baths. Each tub is also equipped for whirlpool therapy.

Carr Set to File On Redistricting

AUSTIN (UPI) — Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr said Thursday he hopes to file a motion in a Houston federal court Friday seeking to delay redistricting until after the 1964 elections.

Carr said he is not sure the motion and supporting brief will be ready, but wants to file it Friday if possible.

The three-judge federal court ruled last October that Texas' present congressional districts are unconstitutional because they do not give sufficient representation to urban voters.

The court said the state's 23 congressmen would have to be elected at-large unless the state redistricts before this year's elections.

The state appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court, which early this month upheld the Houston court but gave the state until April 1 to seek a delay permitting this year's elections to go on as scheduled.

Carr is expected to ask the court to grant a stay keeping its decision from taking effect until after the elections.

BUYS OWN STOCK

NEW YORK (UPI) — Glen Alden Corp. has announced it is buying all 713,000 shares of its own stock tendered by stockholders under an offer which expired March 9. The company said it will pay \$14 a share. The total purchase price is nearly \$10 million. The move will reduce the number of outstanding shares to about 4,800,000.

Federal Pay Raise Rejected by House

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House, heading the old axiom that politicians should never raise their pay in an election year, has rejected a salary boost for congressmen and 1.7 million other federal employes.

On a 222 to 184 roll call vote, in which each member had to answer to his name, the House Thursday killed a pay raise bill that would have hiked the salary of a member of Congress from \$22,500 to \$32,500 a year and added \$540 million to the government's \$12 billion yearly payroll.

The vote against the pay raise bill was a stunning victory for the House economy bloc, but even the strongest opponents of the measure did not claim that their arguments turned the trick.

The bill was killed because the House agreed to face the issue on a roll call vote. On the showdown, a majority of the members refused to go on record in an election year in favor of a 45 per cent pay increase for themselves when the federal budget deficit is \$10 billion. Up to that point, the bill had survived repeated attacks during nonrecord votes.

The upset was engineered by Rep. H. R. Gross, R-Iowa, the well-known economist, who solicited and got sufficient support to put across his demand for a roll call vote.

On the roll call, 136 Republicans and 86 Democrats opposed the bill while 149 Democrats and 35 Republicans supported it.

The 1,400 senators, House members, judges, cabinet members and other top officials who lost \$10,000 pay hikes were not only losers on the vote. Their pay hike would have cost only a small part of the total package.

About 1.7 million civil servants and postal workers would have received about \$320.8 million in raises ranging from 3 to 22 per cent under the bill. But the rank and file boosts went down the drain with the increases for their bosses, and there was only faint hope that the result could be reversed.

Hoffa Defense Lawyers Turn To Appeals After Conviction

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. (UPI) — James R. Hoffa's defense forces turned to appeals battles today in their effort to prevent the 51-year-old Teamsters president from serving eight years in a federal prison.

Hoffa, convicted on two counts of tampering with jurors, was sentenced to four consecutive years on each count Thursday, and fined \$10,000 by U.S. District Court Judge Frank Wilson.

Hoffa immediately asked for a new trial, contending that U.S. marshals gave gifts to the eight-man, four-woman jury which convicted him after a marathon trial here ended last week.

Wilson, who gave defense attorneys 10 days to prepare appeals motions, took the new trial requests under advisement.

Will Continue Fight

Hoffa flew to Miami immediately after sentencing. He said on arrival, "I have been in fights all my life . . . I'm going to win this one and I'm going to show the world I'm right."

The Teamsters president and three codefendants were convicted of attempting to fix jurors during Hoffa's 1962 conspiracy trial at Nashville, which ended in a mistrial with a deadlocked jury.

Wilson handed down three year terms to the others, former Nashville local President Ewing King, Detroit Teamsters official Larry Campbell, and Nashville Negro handyman Thomas Ewing Parks.

Hoffa had faced a maximum sentence of 10 years. The others four years.

Hoffa, free under \$75,000 bond told Wilson prior to sentencing, "I stand here today and state I am innocent."

"You stand here convicted," said Wilson, "of seeking to corrupt the administration of justice . . . of tampering with the very soul of this nation."

Make Appeals

In response to a final question by Wilson, Hoffa said, "I understand the sentence perfectly and I will take my appeals."

Defense attorney Jacques Schiffer, of New York, who was cited for contempt of court by Wilson and sentenced to 60 days in jail and a fine of \$1,000, said he too would appeal.

Hoffa's chief defense counsel James Haggerty filed the new trial motion, charging that a U.S. marshal was seen wrapping gifts on the night of Feb. 21 while the trial was in progress and was heard to say the

Promising Movement Started by Methodist

Religion in America

Bob Kochtitzky is a soft-spoken young Methodist from Jackson, Miss., who believes that "thousands of laymen want to go beyond writing checks" in serving the cause of Christ.

With virtually no resources except his own cheerful faith, he has launched a promising new movement called "Laymen's Overseas Service"—LAOS for short.

LAOS offers Protestant laymen an opportunity to serve abroad as short-term missionaries at their own expense.

It started on a very modest scale last summer. Ten volunteers—three men and seven women—went to Bolivia to contribute eight weeks of work to Methodist hospitals and schools.

Most of them were teachers, but the group included a carpenter and two secretaries. They not only worked without salary; they also paid their own transportation costs and living expenses.

This year LAOS plans to send at least 50 volunteers to Peru, Honduras, Chile and Bolivia.

Many of them will stay for six months or a year. The group includes physicians, dentists, nurses, medical technicians, teachers, a dietitian, a librarian, a stenographer and a bookkeeper. They range in age from 18 to 75.

"Next year," Kochtitzky said in an interview, "we hope to send two or three hundred volunteers abroad, and to include some of the mission fields of Asia and Africa."

He explained that LAOS has concentrated on Latin America so far because "transportation costs are lower."

He said a volunteer from the eastern part of the United States would need about \$900 to underwrite the total cost of a

six-months term of service in a Latin American country.

"In some cases, their local churches contribute part of the cost," he said. "But many of them pay all of it out of their own pockets."

About a third of the volunteers to date have been Methodists. The other two-thirds come from Presbyterian, Baptist and other Protestant churches.

Dr. W. Neil Record, assistant to the president at Wayland Baptist College, Plainview, will be the guest minister at both services Sunday at Central Baptist Church.

Dr. Record is a native of Arizona. He was pastor of First

Baptist Church in Tulsa for 12 years. He joined the staff at Wayland on August 1, 1963. His work at the college include student recruitment, student and alumni placement and former student relations.

SMU Mustangs 'Dark Horses' At West Texas

ODESSA (UPI) — Southern Methodist will be a factor in the race for the team title in the West Texas Relays university division Friday although Baylor and Houston have divided the two top outdoor meets so far this season.

Sprint strength which carries over into the relay events will give SMU its chance against Houston, Baylor, Texas, Texas A&M and Abilene Christian in the wide open race for the title ACC won last year.

Houston was the surprise winner of the Border Olympics crown last week with SMU out of the field, while Baylor won the Southwestern Recreation meet a week earlier with Texas and Texas A&M absent.

The West Texas meet, however, features the 440 and 880-yard relays, the one mile relay, the sprint medley and distance medley relays and SMU's great pair of Billy Foster and John Roderik will make the Mustangs favorites in three—and possibly four—of these.

Texas Tech and North Texas State also are in the university field.

In the college division, Lamar Tech rules the favorite to unseat Howard Payne in a field that also includes strong Texas Western and East Texas State as contenders. Texas Southern, which won at Fort Worth and Laredo, will not be competing here.

Competition got under way today in the high school division with 50 teams divided into two classes.

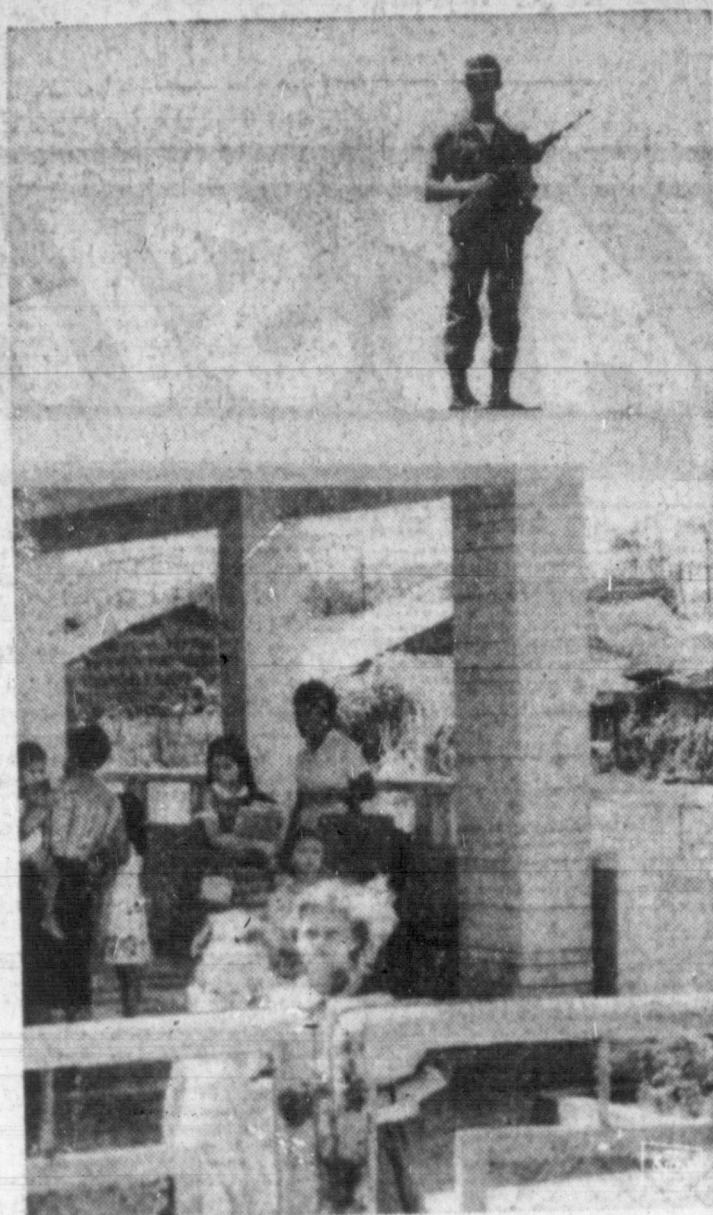

There has been no dissent from the claim by Sen. Barry Goldwater that he goofed in his New Hampshire presidential preference primary campaign. The senator was clobbered in March whereas it was reasonable to believe in January that he was comfortably a front runner. Perhaps the Goldwater goof was his proposal that Social Security should be voluntary. The old folk could not be expected to like that. They know their Social Security money does not come from their own contributions during their earning years. Their pensions come from the contributions of younger employed men and women who are being taxed today for their support.

The working man and woman now paying a percentage of earnings as a Social Security tax knows that succeeding generations of workers will be taxed when the current crop of workers is retired. Under a voluntary system the current workers would have no assurance that the next generation would continue to pay us. There would not be much incentive for voluntary Social Security payments to support the old folks if there was no assurance that you would be paid off when it comes your turn.

That is why the senator's proposal was sharply countered by assertions that it would bankrupt the Social Security system. There are a great many old folk in New Hampshire. Nearly 9 per cent of New Hampshire's population is over 65-old enough to be receiving Social Security checks under old age survivors and disability insurance system. The national average is 7.1 per cent. In California it is 6.6; Nebraska, 8.7; Oregon, 8.3; Florida, 8.5; South Dakota, 8.2.

It is obvious, therefore, that the Social Security retirees could be molded into a substantial voting bloc, for or against. What could mold them more firmly against a candidate than a proposal suspected of looking toward the bankruptcy of the Social Security system? Goldwater may be able to explain his Social Security proposal in terms which would reassure the pensioners. But if he made any such explanation in New Hampshire, the word didn't get around.

The senator could protect himself from a lot of misinterpretation if he would limit himself in each speech to a single subject and explore that subject fully so there would be no misunderstanding of what he meant. This is peculiarly true in the area of the graduated income tax.

Foreign Commentary

Even Konrad Adenauer, West Germany's former chancellor, seems to be developing some suspicions about his great and good friend President Charles de Gaulle.

Looking beyond the French president's recognition of Red China, Adenauer said in a speech in Bonn it was possible that De Gaulle might also reach an understanding with the Soviet Union damaging to Germany and the West.

"One must take note," he said, "that a Soviet representative has been in Paris and talked with the French."

It was Adenauer who, in one of his last major acts in foreign policy, signed with De Gaulle in January 1963, the Franco-German treaty of cooperation. The agreement provided specifically that the two governments would "consult before any decision on all important questions of foreign policy."

Not Consulted

In the case of Red China, this De Gaulle failed to do.

"It would have been better," Adenauer said, if De Gaulle had discussed his move in advance with his NATO partners.

Adenauer, whose admiration for De Gaulle is considerably greater than that held by Ludwig Erhard, his successor, made his criticism comparatively mild. And he concluded by saying he was sure De Gaulle would stand by his

pledge to support a reunified Germany.

His remarks, however, echoed uneasy comment in German newspapers which have been pointed in their criticism of De Gaulle's failure to live up to terms of the Franco-German accord and in speculation that ultimately he might feel it expedient to recognize two Germanys.

To Visit Moscow

The Germans have noted that Edgar Faure, the former French premier who spearheaded the way to recognition of Red China, soon will be in Moscow.

Nikolai V. Podgorny, a member of the Presidium of the Soviet Communist party, recently visited Paris and talked with De Gaulle as noted by Adenauer's reference to a "Soviet representative" in France. The warmth of his farewell statement was considered to go beyond normal diplomatic courtesy.

De Gaulle believes every great leader should surround himself with an element of mystery.

But as he wraps himself in splendid isolation, he also arouses the suspicions of those who should be his friends.
