

Two Arrested in McLean Facing Burglary Counts

Woman Held in Pampa Jail After Wheeler Auto Chase

WHEELER — Charges of burglary with intent to commit theft were filed today by County Attorney Guy Hardin of Shamrock against two Springfield, Mo., men after their arrest in McLean early Sunday morning for the Wheeler County sheriff's office.

Sheriff Bus Dorman said Harold Lee Breeden, a former Gray County resident, and Charles Ray Geren, 25, Springfield Mo., were being charged in connection with the March 23 burglaries of three Mobeetie firms and the attempted break-in of a fourth.

Breeden, Geren and a 44-year-old woman, who is being held in Gray County jail at Pampa, were arrested following a chase through the back roads of Wheeler County Saturday night that ended in McLean when a city officer apprehended the trio.

District Attorney Bill Waters, in Pampa, said officers presented enough evidence to bring the charges in the burglary of the Santa Fe Dept. Lewis Leonard's Farm Supply Store, the Mobeetie Drug Company and the attempted burglary of Atkins Grocery.

Waters directed Dorman to take the two men to Shamrock before Hardin for filing of charges and setting of bonds. Dorman said he and Deputy Sheriff Doyle Ramsey had been spending "the past three weeks sitting up with Mobeetie" since the four burglaries had occurred. Dorman said he went to Mobeetie Saturday night to stakeout the drug store as part of the effort to catch the burglars.

"I felt all along they might come back because all that was taken was \$4 and four cartons of cigarettes and a bunch of tire tools, screwdrivers and stuff like that," Dorman said.

About 10:30 p.m. Dorman parked near a pickup truck when he noticed a strange automobile driving down the main street. He followed the car out Highway 152 East and lost it as it dropped over a small dip in the road. When the sheriff drove over the hill, the car was turning around, heading back to Mobeetie.

Dorman stopped the automobile for routine check and one of the men told him they were seeking a service station and he directed them to one in Wheeler. The automobile drove away. Dorman following without his lights on.

The car made a left turn off the highway, onto a dirt road, and Dorman gave chase, put in ARRESTED, Page 3

Senator Blasts Russians

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., said today the Soviet Union is waging "a relentless campaign of repression" against Jews, despite official Kremlin denials of anti-Semitism.

What the Kremlin denies, Javits said, is that the Soviet government is "sensitive" to world opinion on this subject, and may let up on persecuting Jews if confronted by "a great wave of indignation."

Javits' remarks were contained in a speech prepared for a national conference called by 24 leading U.S. Jewish organizations.

Judges to Decide Contempt Cases

Candidacy In Doubt At Lefors

LEFORS — A former Pampa resident, who moved to this Gray County community six months ago, today was the center of a question over his status as a write-in candidate in Tuesday's city council election.

Leon Howell, bookkeeper for Pampa Concrete, moved his family to Lefors from Pampa in October of 1963. In late January, he decided to seek a post on the Lefors City Council and filed for election in the April 7 municipal vote.

Howell was informed by Mayor Leonard Cain that his name cannot appear on the ballot because he lacks three days being a resident of Lefors six months. Under Texas law a person must be a resident of the state a year and the city six months before he can seek office or vote.

Howell is running as a write-in candidate against five persons who have filed for the three city council posts. They are J. C. (Red) Jernigan, Ben White, Paul Blankenburg, Ed Brock and E. G. Fenno, none of whom are currently councilmen.

Howell went along with plans to seek election as a write-in candidate, but today he is faced with a more serious problem. Cain reports that Howell's name cannot appear as a write-in candidate and any ballot carrying his name would be invalid if cast in the election. He would be eligible April 10.

Barnett, Johnson Bids Turned Down

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Supreme Court by a 5-4 vote today rejected the bid of former Mississippi Gov. Ross Barnett and present Gov. Paul B. Johnson Jr., for a jury trial in their criminal contempt case.

This means that the contempt charges will be decided by the judges of the 5th U.S. Circuit Court.

The charges stemmed from the activities of the two officials in the fall of 1962 when James H. Meredith, a Negro, was attempting to enroll in the University of Mississippi.

The 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals directed the Justice Department to bring the contempt action.

Barnett, then governor, and Johnson, then lieutenant governor, were accused of violating a circuit order prohibiting all state officials from interfering with Meredith's admission. On Sept. 25 Barnett, who was then governor, stood in the doorway

of an office in Jackson, Miss., and kept Meredith from registering.

The two were also charged with failing to preserve law and order on the campus at Oxford which exploded into rioting after Meredith's admission.

The Fifth Circuit certified the jury issue to the Supreme Court after a tie vote.

Engineer Killed in Arizona Rail Crash

WILLIAMS, Ariz. (UPI) — The Santa Fe passenger train Grand Canyon crashed into a huge rockslide Sunday killing the engineer and sending 19 other persons to the hospital.

Twelve cars on the Los Angeles-bound train were derailed when the Grand Canyon plowed into tons of rocks that had slid onto the tracks in a narrow canyon pass 20 miles west of here. At least half the derailed cars overturned.

Railroad officials said 100 passengers were aboard the 16-car train, being pulled by five diesel units.

Dead was engineer G. H. Crawford of Winslow, Ariz.

Fireman W. M. Laucke, also of Winslow, was listed as in critical condition at Williams Hospital. Railway expressmen C. F. Johnson, 55, San Gabriel, Calif., and Anthony Turnette, 59, were in serious condition.

Brakeman John Wesley Guffey, 57, Needles, Calif., suffered a broken ankle.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur: An Old Soldier Fades Away

NEW YORK (UPI) — A soldier of the long gray line, Douglas MacArthur of Samar, St. Mihiel, Bataan, Corregidor, Inchon — and a thousand campfires on a hundred battlefields — was home today, in death, in the city he once called the greatest in the world.

The withered body of the old fighter and statesman lay in custody of the Army he loved, watched over by members of the armed services of which he was the senior ranking officer.

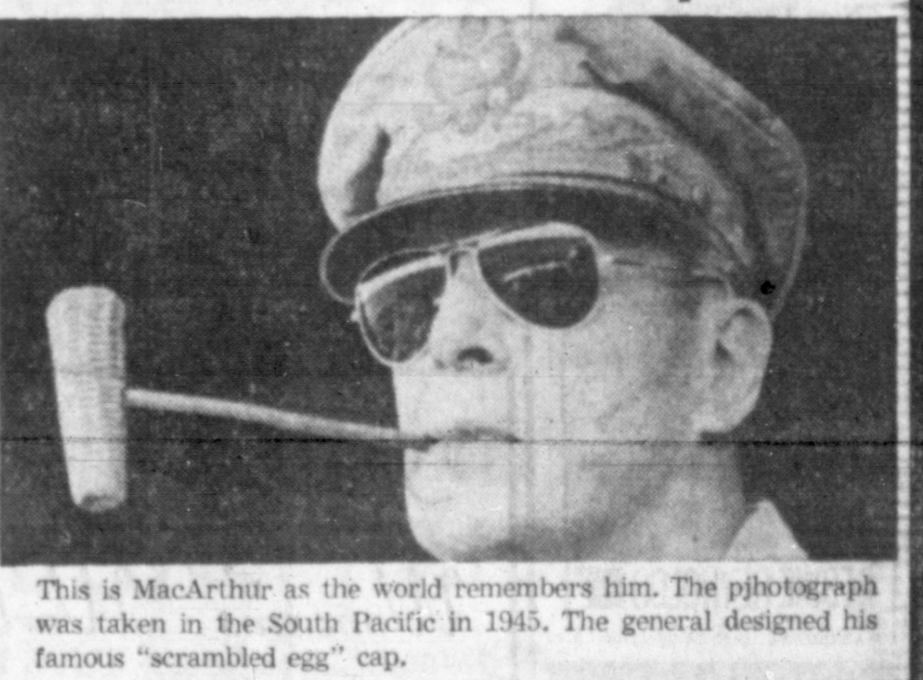
It was received by Lt. Gen. Garrison H. Davidson, commander of the First U.S. Army and was to remain for the day at a funeral chapel only two blocks from the starting point of General MacArthur's triumphal homecoming parade here 12 years ago.

It was on city hall steps in that parade — New York's biggest, with 7½ million persons cheering the general on — that MacArthur began his speech, "This is the greatest city in the world."

He had said that New York "is my home by choice." Sunday night he came home again. The cortege that traveled through the night from Washington arrived here shortly before 11 p.m., eight and one-half hours after his death in Walter Reed Army Medical Center.

It was in Washington, the city of his death, that he told Congress 13 years ago — while a (See OLD SOLDIER, Page 5)

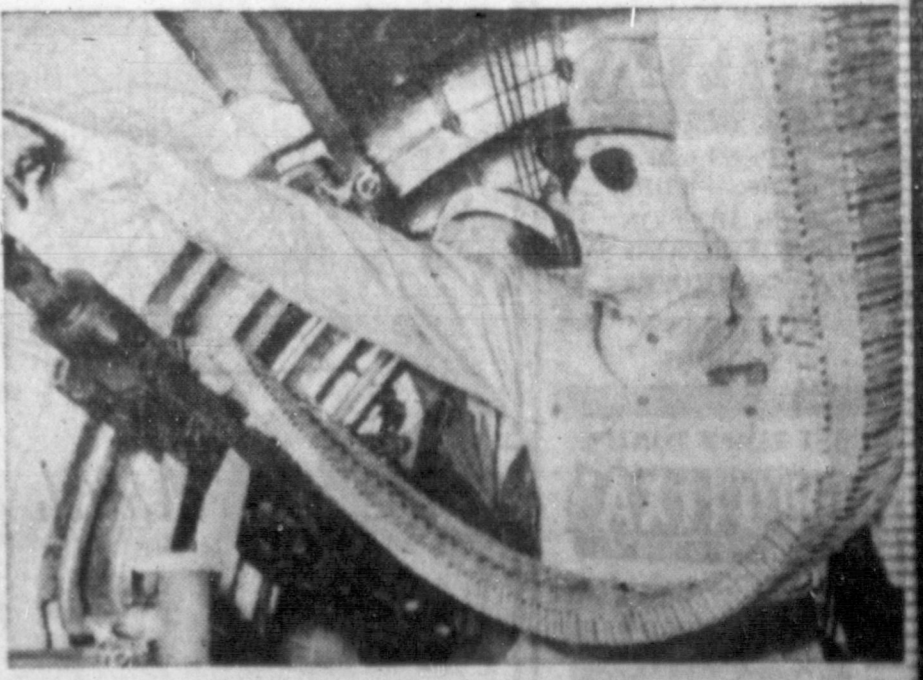
- 1880—Born Jan. 26, at Little Rock, Ark. Army barracks.
- 1903—Graduated from West Point with highest academic average.
- 1914—Accompanied U.S. expedition which seized Vera Cruz, Mexico.
- 1918—Wounded and gassed in France and promoted to brigadier general by Pershing.
- 1930—Appointed Army chief of staff, youngest in history. Routed bonus marchers from Washington in 1932.
- 1935—Loaned to the Philippines by Roosevelt to organize military defenses there.
- 1941—Recalled to active duty as major general and given a Pacific command; after Pearl Harbor he withdrew to Bataan.
- 1942—Evacuated Bataan in March with wife, son and staff officers, declaring, "I shall return."
- 1945—Named commander of all U.S. Army forces in the Pacific; received surrender of Japan on Aug. 14 and named by Truman to command occupation forces.
- 1950—Commanded campaign against North Koreans when they crossed the 38th parallel dividing Korea.
- 1951—Removed from command by President Truman. Returned to the United States to defend his position before Congress.

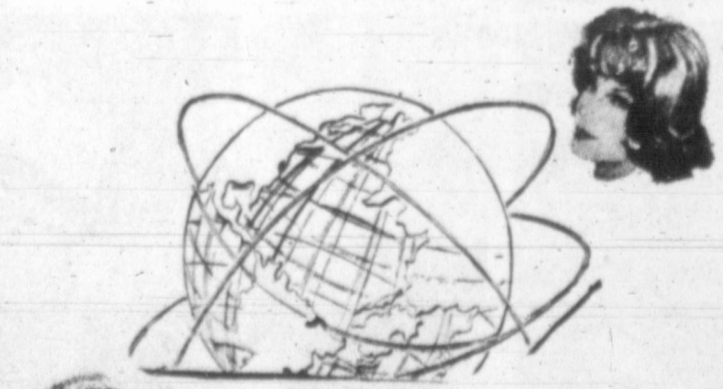

Important Decisions Wait Congress Action

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House returned today from a one week Easter recess faced with important votes on the administration's new wheat-cotton bill and expansion of the food stamp plan.

The first business before the House was debate and a vote, probably Wednesday, on a bill to authorize enlargement of the government's experimental food stamp program which is largely supported by urban representatives. When action is completed on this legislation, Democratic leaders will bring up the wheat-cotton bill.

Approval of the farm measure may hinge on whatever action is taken on the food stamp program. Supporters hoped to pick up urban support for the wheat-cotton measure in exchange for votes on the stamp plan.

Under the existing food stamp program, the Agriculture Department is spending about \$51 million annually to supplement the diets of 380,000 low-income consumers in 22 states.

The House bill would establish permanent legal authority for the program, which is now operated with funds from a farm surplus removal account, and would authorize the federal spending to rise gradually to \$200 million annually by June 30, 1967.

State Patrol Car Gets 'Shake Down'

Pampa motorists driving by the Gray County Courthouse Saturday night were slightly shaken up to see two highway patrolmen "searching" one of their own units.

The "search" was begun when Patrolman Paul Geiser reported to Sgt. J. W. Wilson that he had lost his paycheck.

The two officers "tore" the squad car apart, but no check. They began back-tracking Geiser's patrol duty for the night. It took something like three hours, but eight miles out on the Borger Highway the officers hit pay-dirt.

Lying on the pavement where it had fallen from his pocket when Geiser stopped an automobile, was the paycheck.

"This was unheard of when I was a student," he said. "Now nine children out of 10 who come into the hospital, who are usually desperately ill, go into remission, and to all intents and purposes, regain their health, go back home, go back to school and so on, at least for a time."

Optimistic Report Released on Cancer

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The National Cancer Institute has given Congress an enthusiastic report on the fight against leukemia, the so-called cancer of the blood, it was disclosed today.

Dr. Kenneth M. Endicott, director of the institute, called in testimony before a House appropriations subcommittee for "all out effort toward the goal of a cure" for the disease. His testimony was made public today.

Endicott said that improvement in treatment had increased the remission rate for children with acute leukemia to about 90 per cent and had "dramatically increased the periods of their remissions and consequently their life expectancy."

"The progress in research that had led to this stage has been one of the most rewarding experiences thus far in the long and determined fight against cancer," Endicott said in a statement supporting the institute's \$140 million budget request.

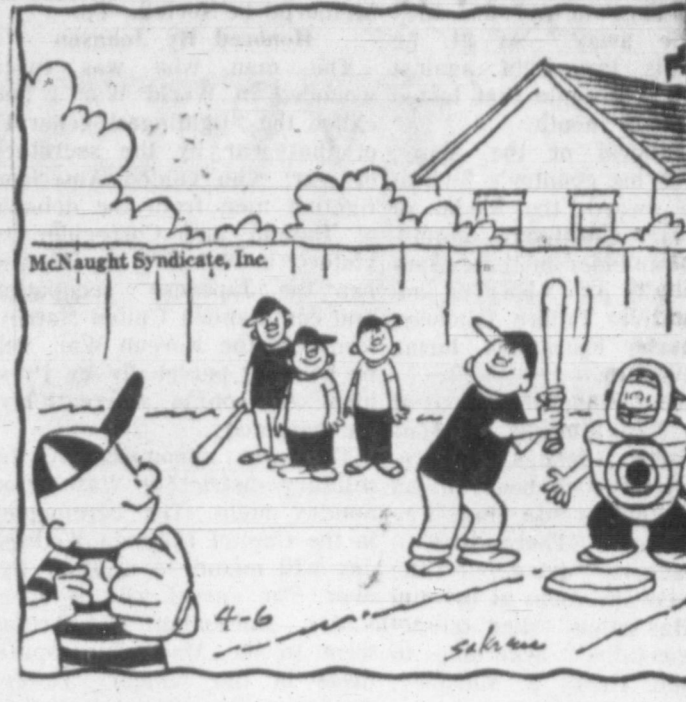

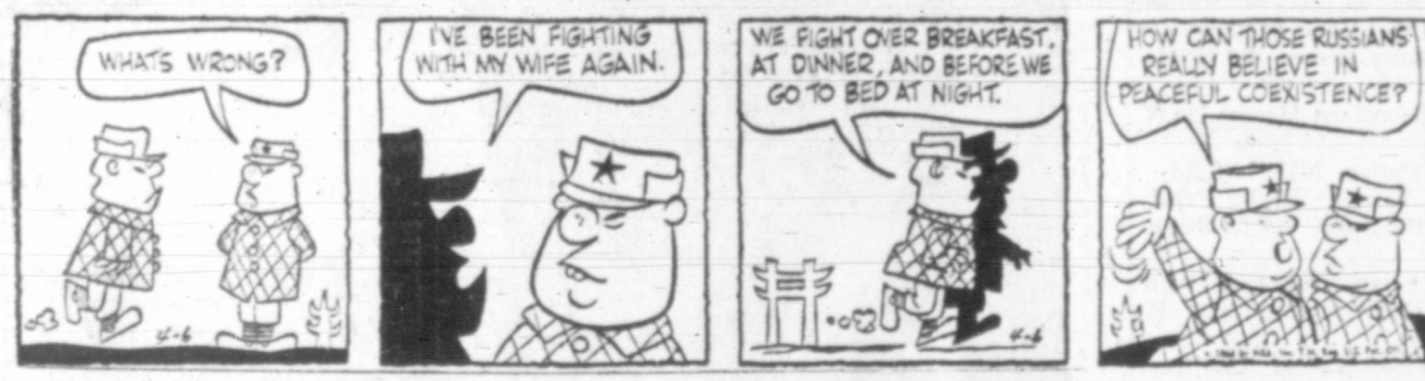

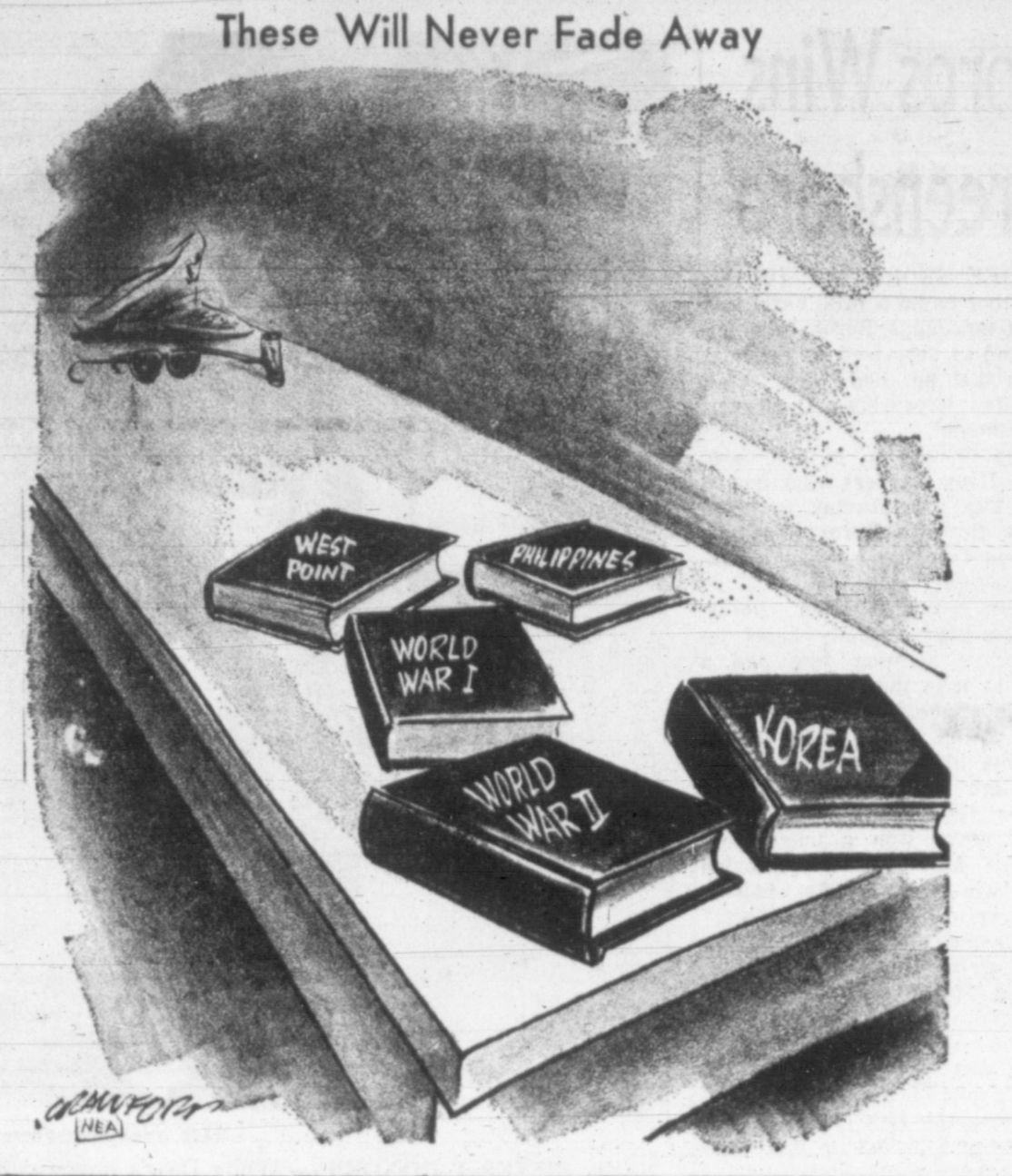

Computer 'Watchdog' Considered

By RAY CROMLEY WASHINGTON (NEA) — If the Congress and President Johnson want to save money, there's a door open to them. Some key management officials in the U.S. government privately estimate there's between \$500 million and \$1 billion dollars a year of inefficiency and overlap in the administration of the federal government in Washington. They assert:

There is no uniform system of accounting throughout the major departments and agencies. Keeping separate personnel and pay records is wasteful duplication. These could be combined on modern computers.

The Billy Sol Estes scandal shook the Department of Agriculture and led Secretary Orville Freeman to set up an independent inspector — general system responsible only to him. There's need, these management men say, of such a powerful, independent civilian system in the State and Defense departments and other major agencies.

When new, important job openings crop up, there's no adequate way to find the best-suited men. A government-wide computer system could cull out the dozen, two dozen or so men best qualified wherever they worked. Then the administrators could make their selection.

Each department obtains its own computers, and its own systems. Systems used in one agency don't mesh with those in another.

We have a lot of protest from some segments of the cattle industry about the high volume of meat imports from Australia. Here are some facts which I have obtained that would be of interest to cattlemen as well as everyone. Our trade with Australia looks something like this.

In 1962 we exported to Australia \$399 million dollars worth of goods. A breakdown on this shows we sold them \$86 million dollars worth of industrial machinery; \$17 million electrical machinery; \$39 million automotive parts; \$22 million unmg. tobacco; \$20 million manmade fibers; \$18 million chemicals and a host of other items. Over \$81 million dollars worth of miscellaneous items in addition to some items not mentioned above.

We imported from Australia only \$288 million dollars worth of products. Of this amount \$152 million was meat imports; \$45 million of unmg wool products. Other items include sugar, steel mill products, certain metals, furs, hides and lobster.

The facts are, we sold them \$111 million more dollars worth of products in 1962 than they sold us. Australia is one of the few foreign nations not receiving foreign aid from the United States.
