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Foreign News Commentary

 One of the tragedies of Cyprus is that Greek and Turkish Cypriots are dying in a struggle which should be settled by the ballot box.
 Unfortunately, in what now can be called a full-scale civil war, differences have gone far beyond any such logical solution.
 And, whether the 1960 constitution giving Greek and Turkish Cypriots the right of veto over one another ever was a workable one also is a matter now of unimportance. So deep have gone the hatreds that certainly it won't work now. The only workable solution seems the extreme ones.
 A war which neither wants remains a possibility between Greece and Turkey, with NATO, already torn by disagreement, a further possible victim.

U.N. In Middle
 In the middle, in a not unfamiliar situation, is the United Nations.
 It would take an optimist indeed to believe that the U.N. can in any way meet the three-month target date it originally gave itself to find a compromise solution.
 On the one side is the Greek Cypriot majority of more than 400,000 led by President Archbishop Makarios. Makarios demands revision of the constitution to eliminate the Turkish veto.
 And on the other is the Turkish minority of less than 100,000 fearful of losing its minority protection and demanding partition of the island.

No Longer Local
 But a conflict which should remain a local one already goes far beyond its island boundaries.
 Thousands of Soviet-built weapons find their way to the hands of Greek Cypriots through the United Arab Republic of President Gamal Abdel Nasser, not so much for Nasser's love of Makarios but for his hatred of Turkey.
 The U.S. Embassy is bombed and Americans are threatened.
 British troops, accepted by Makarios in the role of peace-makers, find themselves the targets of snipers' bullets.
 United Nations forces, their own role imprecise, find themselves accused of favoritism on both sides.

In this battleground of politically fixed positions in the role of compromiser has been thrown an affable Finn named Sakari Tuomioja. Tuomioja is an intelligent man and an optimist. He has need to be. His last U.N. job was in Laos.

Campaigners List Expenses, Flood Office With Reports

AUSTIN (UPI)—A flood of last-minute filings of candidate expenses Monday clogged the secretary of state's office with the reports of at least three major campaigners still unaccounted for.

Sybil Dickinson, aide to Secretary of State Crawford Martin, said she believed most of the reports were in but had not yet processed those of Gov. John Connally and Senate candidates George Bush and Gordon McLendon.

Statements were to be filed or postmarked by midnight Friday, but many arrived by mail today since the office was closed Saturday.

- John C. White, agriculture commissioner, \$12,440 in gifts received; payments \$12,299.96; debts incurred \$204.
- Jack Creighton, Republican candidate for governor, gifts \$2,600; payments made \$2,600.
- Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, Democrat, gifts \$17,490; payments made, \$15,183.93.

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr, Democrat, gifts received \$1,225; payments made \$1,031.

Robert S. Calvert, Democrat, comptroller of public accounts, gifts—none; payments made \$1,000.

Jesse James, Democrat, treasurer, gifts received \$200; payments made \$1,425.

Fred Newman, Republican, treasurer—no gifts, no expenses.

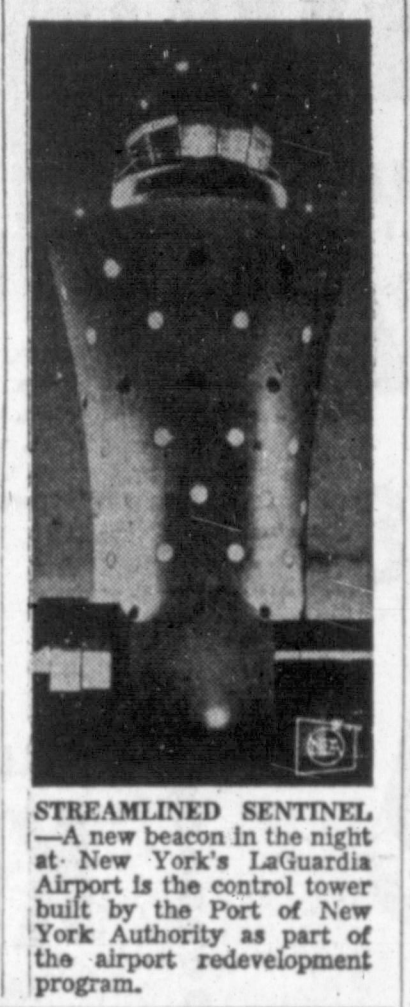

Yarborough Plans Statewide Telecast

U.S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough has scheduled a statewide telecast Tuesday night in his running battle with Democratic primary election challenger Gordon McLendon.

The senatorial candidates stepped up their campaign pace entering the final week of the race.

Over the weekend, McLendon challenged Yarborough to take a lie detector test concerning an alleged \$50,000 gift to the senator from convicted Billie Sol Estes. McLendon interviewed two men who claimed they saw Estes give Yarborough the money.

Yarborough answered with an accusation that McLendon was conducting a campaign of character assassination and scheduled the Tuesday telecast for further rebuttal.

'Calls for Exposure'

"I intend to call on honest Texas citizens of good character and good reputation to expose the infamy of the falsehoods broadcast against us," Yarborough said in a message from his Austin headquarters.

McLendon, speaking to a gathering of Harris County precinct chairmen said:

"We can now expect Yarborough's henchmen, who are desperate with defeat at hand, to make every possible unscrupulous attempt to discredit officer Fonville and Sgt. Keeton."

He referred to Midland policeman James Fonville and retired Army Sgt. Ernest Keeton of Pecos, the men interviewed on McLendon's statewide television hookup Saturday night.

Many of the state's thousands of candidates took Sunday off—their final day of rest before the election Saturday.

Large Vote Due

Upwards of 1.5 million Texans are expected to vote on local, county, state and national offices in the Democratic and Republican primaries.

Voters in the GOP primary also will name their favorite in a presidential "straw vote" popularity contest.

Candidates listed on the ballot include Arizona Sen. Barry Goldwater, Maine Sen. Margaret Chase Smith, New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller and former Minnesota Gov. Harold Stassen.

Gov. John Connally, in a swing through the lower Rio Grande Valley Sunday, predicted he would win handily over his Democratic foe, Houston lawyer Don Yarborough.

Talks at Brownsville

The governor, in a speech at Brownsville's high school band day, called for a crusade against illiteracy and school dropouts.

"Our goal should be that the young people of today will inherit a state richer in opportunity, higher in living standards and greater in human progress," Connally said.

He made two television tapes in Harlingen, then held a brief press conference at McAllen in

Presbyterians to Discuss Closing All-Negro Units

MONTREAT, N.C. (UPI)—The Presbyterian General Assembly was scheduled to take up proposals this week that would eliminate all-Negro presbyteries in five southern states and several measures designed to withdraw the denomination from the National Council of Churches.

All Negro presbyteries are now located in South Carolina, Mississippi and most of Alabama, Louisiana and Georgia.

Under the proposals scheduled for consideration, the Negro presbyteries would be merged with all-white presbyteries in the states.

A spokesman said that "at least a half a dozen" proposals to withdraw from the National Council of Churches would come before the delegates today.

Some 453 commissioners representing more than 4,000 churches in 16 southeastern and southwestern states are attending the six-day meeting which concludes Tuesday.

HEART ATTACK DEATHS

Each year, approximately 60,000 men die prematurely in the United States of heart attacks associated with cigarette smoking. The death rate from this cause is approximately equal to the estimated number of men who die prematurely of all other diseases associated with smoking, including lung cancer, according to the American Heart Association.

Geurin and Lick were among 25 employees honored for having completed a quarter of a century with Northern. A total of 211 employees have received similar recognition since the annual dinner was initiated.

Both men were presented with an inscribed gold watch and a cash bonus by Board Chairman John Merriam and President W. A. Strauss. They also will receive an extra paid vacation.

Geurin and Lick have spent their entire 25 year careers with the company at Skellytown.

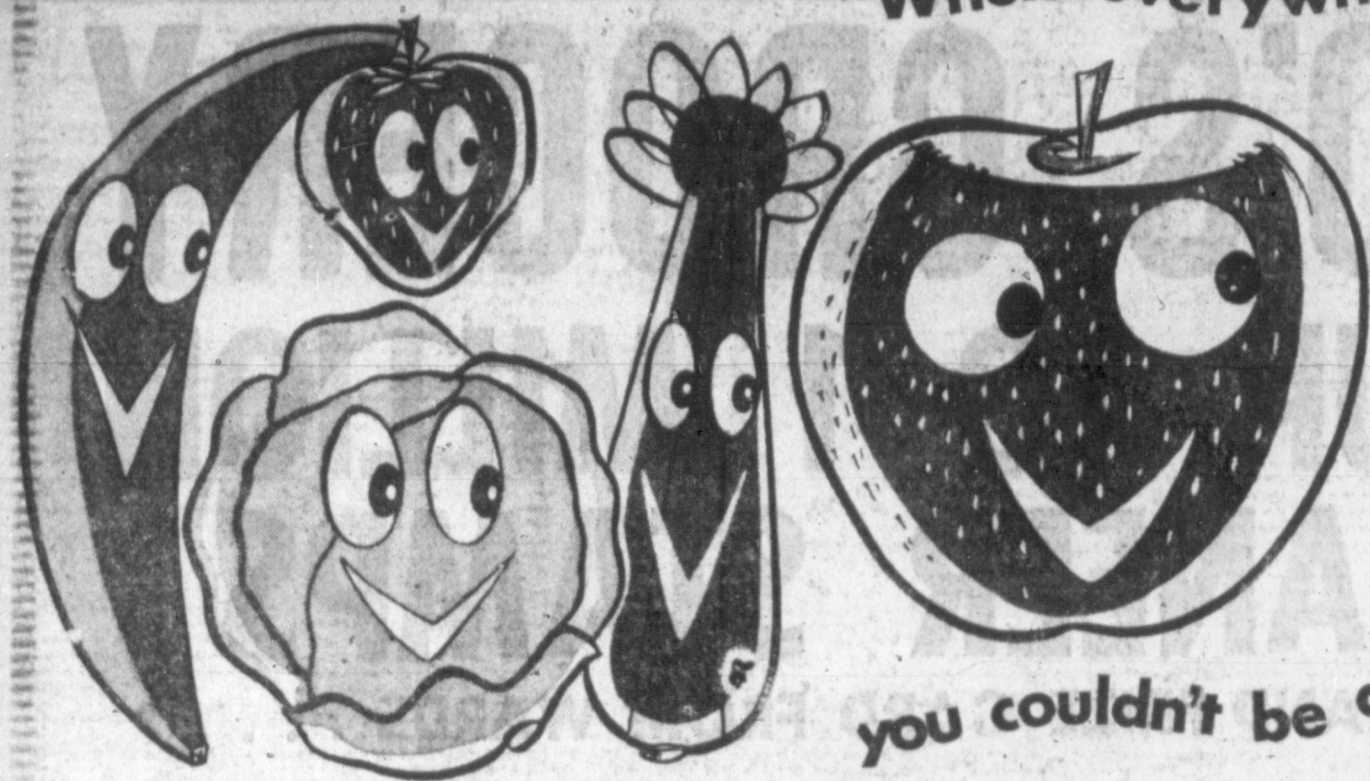

BOSTON (UPI) — Top interest in the Massachusetts primary today was centered on presidential write-in votes.

A defeat for Lodge or a small vote for the "favorite son" would be a severe setback and could stop his campaign drive.

Also of interest will be the number of write-in votes received by New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller, former Vice President Richard M. Nixon and Pennsylvania Gov. William W. Scranton.

A light vote, between 10 and 20 percent of the state's 2.7 million registered voters, was expected despite the Lodge-Goldwater contest and two tied ballot controversies.

Cloudy and cool weather with chances of occasional rain showers in the late evening was predicted.

The bellwether presidential polling in Lodge's home state could increase or slow down the drive to win the Republican presidential nomination for him.

Bearing On Kennedy
An unusual twist on the Democratic ballot could have bearing on the political hopes of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy.

HARRISBURG, Pa. (UPI)—Gov. William W. Scranton's popularity in his home state focused attention today on Pennsylvania where an intensive write-in campaign launched by his supporters sparked the state's primary election.

Scranton has maintained the lack of a sharp GOP statewide contest will restrict the party's turnout and the difficulties in writing in names will mean an "even lighter" vote in this division.

**POLLY'S
POINTERS**

DEAR POLLY — When watering house plants such as vines that climb a pole, use a pacer cup with small holes punched in the bottom. It may be placed on top of the pole so the water feeds through slowly and can soak into the pot. Liquid fertilizer can be given to plants in this manner. — A. K. R.

FURS — This I like. I have one particularly bushy point that requires quite a bit of water and how often I have made a mess by trying to water it too fast. I made only three holes in the cup and went to something else while the water dribbled through with no overflowing and no mess. — POLLY

DEAR POLLY — Patterned Argyle socks are often criss-crossed by single lines of color which require their corresponding number of dancing hobbins. I reduce the number of hobbins by omitting the crisscross lines. When the main design is finished, I embroider these lines with a small blunt upholstery needle. This lessens the annoying tangling of so many hobbins and makes these lines, on the right side, stand out better. The wrong side looks much neater and less bulky, too. — FREDA

DEAR POLLY — I am just 11 years old but I have a hint. When I give a gift to a little child, I spell his or her name with shiny pennies on top of the package. They can be taped or lightly pasted to the package. — GAIL

CHICAGO (UPI) — Glass-door accidents are becoming so widespread that many localities have adopted building codes requiring use of safety glass in doors.

The American Medical Association estimates about 40,000 persons try to walk through glass doors, walls and picture windows each year. Almost 6,000 require hospitalization for severe cuts and blood loss. More than two-thirds of the victims are males, but children between 5 and 14 also are involved frequently in such accidents.
