

Encephalitis Spreads in Houston, Hits Plainview

22 Cases Reported On Plains

HOUSTON (UPI) — Sleeping sickness was still on the rise in Houston today and another epidemic has broken out at Plainview, hundreds of miles away in the Texas South Plains.

There were 22 cases of the disease in Plainview, including a two-month-old child who died of it Monday, when six new cases were reported.

Houston confirmed two deaths caused by encephalitis and 14 suspected deaths.

Dr. Joe Marshall, director of the Plainview Health Department, met with county commissioners yesterday to map out a program to spray insecticide to kill the carrier of the disease—the female culex mosquito.

Marshall said the six new cases were "acutely ill."

The American Medical Association (AMA) in Chicago said encephalitis kills an average of 450 Americans each year, a death rate per case well above polio, even before the introduction of vaccine.

A virus, it is a form of family diseases that attacks the central nervous system and brain.

The Houston outbreak was one of four in the world this year. It may kill as many as 24 persons before it is halted, said Dr. Joseph Melnick of the Baylor University College of Medicine.

Other places suffering epidemics have been Argentina and eastern Bolivia, with the worst outbreaks in their history, and Tokyo, which was hit with the "Equine encephalitis" strain.

Houston renewed its efforts to rid the city of the mosquito carrier, even using helicopters to spray insecticide dust over bays.

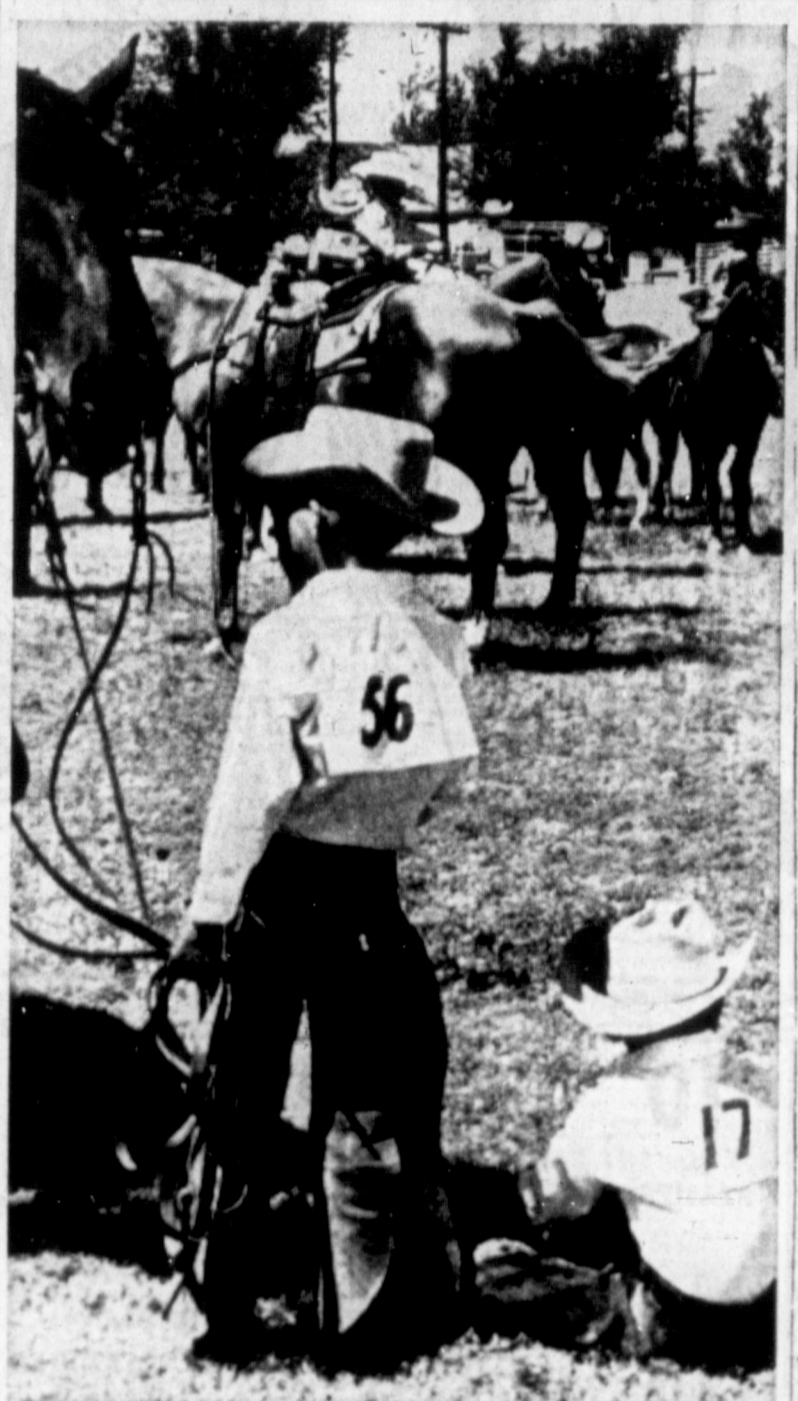
A laboratory set up by three officials of the U.S. Public Health Service was put into service to speed up tests to determine whether a patient has encephalitis or something similar.

Homeowners were asked to drain or change pools and to clean up standing water to prevent breeding places for the mosquitoes, which feed from sundown to dark.

Houston councilman Bill Elliott said the city should find out if there was undue delay in determining there was an epidemic, because last Thursday, when the outbreak was disclosed, there were already scores of people suspected of having the disease.

It was at first thought to have been meningitis.

Most of the patients were being treated at Ben Taub Hospital, a charity institution.

A huge street parade will move through downtown Pampa tomorrow to officially kick off the four-day Rodeo. The first performance of the rodeo will begin at 8 p.m. tomorrow night.

Rodeo dances with music by Lou Walker and his Western Playboys from Amarillo will be held in the National Guard Armory beginning at 9 p.m. each night.

Tickets for the rodeo may be purchased at the gate or bought in the Rodeo offices in the Chamber of Commerce.

South Viet Chief Resigns in Wake Of Student Riots

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (UPI) — President Nguyen Khanh resigned today as South Viet Nam was torn by student rioting and religious warfare.

The violence that continued even after Khanh quit had strong anti-American overtones.

Worst trouble center was the coastal city of Da Nang, 375 miles north of Saigon, where student leaders flamed American servicemen for causing riots that killed 19 and injured 70 others in religious battling that raged on into the night.

An American military spokesman in Saigon said the South Viet Nam government had moved troops and armored units into Da Nang to quell the rioting. It was the first government crackdown in six days of rioting.

The spokesman confirmed that American servicemen fired shots which caused a predominantly Buddhist crowd of demonstrators to stampede into a Roman Catholic village already smoldering with religious tension.

Vacation Ends for 6,000 Students

Summer vacation for some 6,000 students will come to an end tomorrow.

Registration in Pampa's 12 public schools will begin at 8:45 a.m. However, the first full day of school will not be held until Friday. Tomorrow, schools will be turned out at 11 a.m.

The students will attend 177 days of classes with the same holiday schedule to be observed as in previous years. First holiday will be Labor Day, Sept. 7.

Council Approves Social Security Vote for Firemen

A resolution requesting the State Welfare Department to call a referendum among Pampa city firemen to determine their eligibility for inclusion under the federal Social Security Act was approved today by the Pampa City Commission.

Firemen filed a request with the commission Aug. 11. The petition was signed by all 33 members of the department, Chief J. E. Winborne said.

The council's action in adopting the resolution marked the first step in the process to bring the firemen under social security coverage.

The second step, officials stated, will be the state's notice of the referendum, and then the actual referendum in not less than 90 days.

Pampa policemen already are under social security. Firemen been excluded until last July 2 because of participation in a state retirement fund.

Kennedy Announces For Senate

NEW YORK (UPI) — Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy, armed with the backing of most state Democratic leaders, announced today he will seek the New York democratic senatorial nomination.

Kennedy said he had talked to Democratic and liberal party leaders in the state during the past few weeks about becoming a candidate and added:

"I deeply appreciate their encouragement and their support, particularly that of Mayor (Robert F.) Wagner. I have decided to make myself available for the nomination at the Democratic state convention."

He said if he were nominated he would resign from the cabinet to campaign for election.

Pledges Full Devotion

"I shall devote all my effort and whatever talents I possess to the state of New York," he said. "This I pledge."

Mississippi Fails To OK Compromise

ATLANTIC CITY (UPI) — Democrats seeking a united front against Barry M. Goldwater were threatened today with a national convention floor fight over the seating of rival Mississippi delegations.

Party managers had hoped to settle the dispute peacefully and get on with the business of nominating Lyndon B. Johnson for president and ratifying his choice for vice president.

But the newly formed Mississippi Freedom Democratic party, composed largely of Negroes, rejected a compromise proposal which would give it no votes.

LBJ Remains Silent About V.P. Choice

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson is playing his political cards close to the vest and seems in no hurry to reveal his choice of a vice presidential running mate.

The President was insisting as late as Monday that he had not definitely decided the big unanswered question of the Democratic convention, it was learned.

He was said to have discussed the vice presidential choice Monday night with members of his official cabinet family, including Secretary of State Dean Rusk and Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara.

From available evidence Johnson was in an unshrinking mood about disclosing his choice, feeling he has ample time before the actual nominating session at Atlantic City. It was learned that Johnson, in the event of a Democratic victory in November, wants his running mate to have a larger, more responsible role in the conduct of government.

Pastore Calls GOP Plans 'Trojan Horse'

ATLANTIC CITY (UPI)—Sen. John O. Pastore called the Democrats to battle Monday night with an attack on Republican presidential nominee Barry M. Goldwater as a candidate with a "Trojan Horse" program.

In an outburst of old-fashioned political oratory the diminutive Rhode Island senator served up a mixture of scorn and praise in a 36-minute keynote speech to the 34th Democratic National Convention.

The Democrats loved every word. They interrupted with applause 53 times.

Pastore said the Republicans and their candidates were captives of reactionaries and extremists who offered the voters something akin to fanaticism while the Democrats offered experience and responsibility.

"And now they profess to offer a clear choice to the American people," he cried. "Oh, what a Trojan Horse!"

Pastore said the nation's electorate would respond in November by echoing the late President John F. Kennedy's call: "I need you, Lyndon Johnson."

The Democratic keynoter reserved his sharpest attack for extremists whom he described as "a sinister element" in political life.

"Six weeks ago, despite the efforts of responsible members of the opposition, reactionaries and extremists captured the Republican party — lock — stock — and barrel. And it captured their candidates too," Pastore declared.

"No matter how much the factions within the Republican party stumble over one another trying to define the word extremism to the American people, the union of responsible Republicans and reactionaries is absolutely irreconcilable."

Pastore cried "shame — shame" at the charge by the leader of the John Birch Society that former President Dwight D. Eisenhower was a "conscious agent of the Communist conspiracy."

'Tower Room' for Connally

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (UPI) — The sign in the lobby reads: "Gov. Connally's Office, Room 1337."

The neon marker outside says, "Haddon Hall" Hotel, but it might as well be: "Temporary State Capitol of Texas."

Lean, tall Texans, some 500 of them, have just about taken over this luxury hotel overlooking the Boardwalk and Atlantic Ocean. They are here for the Democratic national convention.

Everything is Texas-style—from the giant Texas hospitality room (everyone invited) that serves soft drinks and coffee 12 hours a day to the size of the delegation—217 delegates and alternates with 99 convention votes.

The Texas delegation held a cocktail party and buffet Sunday night, and 2,500 guests showed up—two and one-half times the expected number. Three serving lines passed out food well into the night while Gov. and Mrs. John Connally stood for three solid hours shaking hands with guests from throughout the United States.

They Grow Tall

A waitress, observing Connally's staff, gasped, "they sure grow them tall in Texas." This reporter, who stands 6 feet 6 inches, looked over the Texas caucus Monday and was surprised at how many heads were higher than his own.

Julien Reid, a press aid for the delegation, is 6 feet 5 1/2; Howard Rose, Connally's executive assistant is 6-4. George Christian, administrative assistant in charge of press relations, stands a mere 6-3. Connally is 6-1, and administrative assistant Bill Stinson is somewhat of a "midget" at an even 6 feet.

The governor's office is a suite of two rooms, temporarily divided into three that fills about 1,500 square feet, enough for a comfortable three-bedroom home.

Mrs. Maurine Ray and Mrs. Kay Garrett of the governor's staff answer the telephone just as if they had never left back home at Austin.

Tall Texans Take Over

Outside, there are the usual number of black Cadillacs and Lincolns you would expect to find around a Texas hotel, and a covered driveway lets guests alight untouched by rain or sun. They must walk only a few feet to reach the hotel's super cool air-conditioned lobby.

There's a sign in the elevator that somehow seems out of place for all the gracious, smiling ladies who make up the Texas party.

"Ladies," the sign says, "will not wear hair curlers in the lobby or lounge."

But the name on Connally's office suite might seem even more inappropriate. It says, "Tower Room."

Foreign News Commentary

PARIS (UPI) — The Atlantic alliance took some bad knocks in the Cyprus crisis.

Officials at the North Atlantic Treaty Organization's (NATO) headquarters here have not yet finished totting up the full damage.

But, even though it did not come to the worst — that is, war between NATO members Greece and Turkey — it already is clear that the alliance's strategic and highly vulnerable southeastern anchor position has been seriously undermined. The first, most obvious result is that Allied Supreme Commander Gen. Lyman L. Lemnitzer no longer can be sure of the effectiveness of Greek and Turkish forces under his command.

Return Units

Although Greece and Turkey returned to his control the units they pulled out during the Cyprus crisis, Greece has not sent back the 150 or so officers who made up roughly one-third of the staff of NATO's southeastern command headquarters at Izmir in Turkey.

That left only the American and Turkish officers in what is supposed to be a three-power command.

Furthermore, Lemnitzer must be having serious qualms as to just how far Greek and Turkish armed forces, could be counted on to fight alongside each other against the Communists.

Yet, aside from the U.S. Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean, the 12 Greek and 14 Turkish divisions are the West's sole means of defense at the southern end of the Iron Curtain.

On the political side, too, NATO officials have cause for anxiety.

Greece emerged from the Cyprus crisis embittered and disappointed. It was the Greeks who had to back down from the brink of war with Turkey. Rightly or wrongly, the Greeks blame the United States and Britain.

See Ominous Signs

Diplomats here see ominous signs that Greece now may edge increasingly towards a neutralist position or even to one of closer relations with Moscow.

An even more alarming by-product of the crisis was the way it opened the door to Russian meddling in the Eastern Mediterranean.

Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev, after some apparent initial uncertainty, took up enthusiastically Greek Cypriot President Archbishop Makarios' appeal for help. The next follow-up stage will be a visit to Moscow by Cypriot Foreign Minister Spyros Kyprianou.

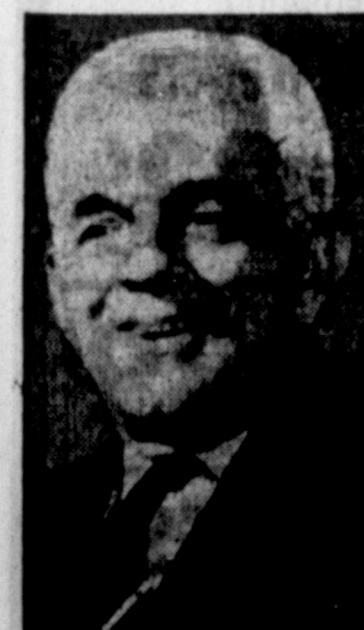
Thus, without having to do very much except ship some arms and perhaps some token economic aid, Khrushchev stands to realize a centuries-old dream of imperial Russia by gaining a toe-hold in the Eastern Mediterranean.

The picture from the NATO viewpoint is not a reassuring one.

Body of Man Found in Arkansas

SEARCY, Ark. (UPI)—The body of a man believed to be Roy J. Wright, a Texarkana bank official, was found Monday in a roadside park near Searcy.

Wright, vice president of the State National Bank of Texarkana, was being sought by the Federal Bureau of Investigation under a complaint charging he made a false entry in the bank records.

The complaint involved a discrepancy of \$243,786 in the state of Arkansas account at the bank.

The body was found by a passerby in a roadside park on U.S. 67 at the outskirts of Searcy. The White County sheriff's office said a hose was extended from the exhaust pipe of the car into the car window.

Wright had been missing since last Tuesday. He had been on vacation and was called to the bank that day in connection with the discrepancy. He arrived at the bank and then left to change clothes and did not return.

The discrepancy was discovered in routine correspondence between the bank and Orvel M. Johnson, legislative auditor.

Russians Warned On Interfering In Berlin Flights

MOSCOW (UPI)—The United States, Britain and France told the Russians Monday they will have to bear the responsibility for the "consequences" if they interfere with international flights in the Berlin air corridor, the American embassy announced.

An embassy statement said the warning was made in a note to the Kremlin.

The Western note came in reply to a June 20 Soviet note questioning the free use of the air corridor by Western airliners to and from Berlin to non-German destinations.

The Allied replies, said the embassy statement, "emphasized that the U.S.S.R. has a continuing obligation to ensure the safety of international and of all other Allied flights in the Berlin air corridors: The U.S.S.R. would bear the responsibility for the consequences of any attempt to interfere with or impair the safety of such flights.

The Soviets' June 20 note followed the announcement by a U. S. airline, Pan American Airways, that it was starting direct service between Berlin and New York.

Previously, Western airlines—Pan American, British European Airways and Air France—flew to and from Berlin only from and to such West German points as Frankfurt, Munich, Hamburg and Hannover.

CRASHES INJURE 46

DARTFORD, England (UPI)—Forty-six persons were injured Monday in two collisions involving three double-decker buses in Dartford and the nearby London suburb of Walthamstow.

Twenty-nine of the injured were given hospital treatment after two buses collided in Dartford. An eyewitness said the accident occurred when one of the buses tried to pull around a parked truck.

The second collision involved a bus and a truck at Walthamstow. Seventeen persons were injured.

Premature Septuplets Still-Born

UPPSALA, Sweden (UPI)—A 30-year old woman recently gave birth to still-born septuplets, Uppsala University hospital said.

Hospital authorities said the seven infants were born four months prematurely.

A hospital spokesman said the woman had been treated with hormones to correct an inability to become pregnant.

The report of the septuplets was first made in London, Sunday by Prof. Carl A. Gemzell, who developed the hormone treatment. He gave no exact date of the miscarriage and declined to reveal the name of the mother.

Gemzell said all seven were properly developed, though they were very small. He said he had found one similar case in medical literature dating back to 1894. In that case, all seven babies were born alive but all died within a few hours, he said.

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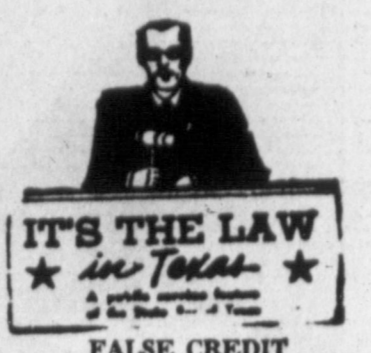
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Broadway-Hollywood Proves Long Hurdle

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — From New York to Los Angeles is 3,000 miles, but from Broadway to Hollywood is a shot into outer space. I mean far out-er. That weightless feeling is something to get used to. For me it's the second time around in a year. IT'S THE LAW
FALSE CREDIT
It's easy to buy things on time if your credit is good. But some people try to make their credit look good when it isn't. This can lead to the crime of "theft by false pretenses." In a recent case Sam Sudd wanted a new car just like his neighbor's. At the Super Car Agency Sam could buy his new car for \$300 down and \$6 monthly payments. The agency asked Sam to sign a credit report. Sam reported that he made \$650 a month, had a \$65 car allowance a month, and his wife worked for \$400 a month. Sam drove off with the new car. But when he fell down on his payments, the agency repossessed the car and found that Sam never did have the income he claimed. Truth was Sam was making only \$500 when he worked, and he had taken a leave of absence and had never gone back to his job. His wife had not worked for years. The agency complained to the district attorney, charging Sam with theft by false pretenses. Sam was guilty as charged. Though no one can be put in prison for debt, he can go to prison for fraud, if, when he "bought" the goods, he never meant to pay at all, any time. But it is no crime if he just happened to be broke but made no false claims. Using another's credit card without his permission is also a crime, just as it is to use one's own credit extensively, knowing full well that he cannot or will not make payment. 4,000 Hospitals Served by ARC Blood Centers

(Editor's note — This is the sixth in a series of articles on participating agencies of the Pampa - Lefors United Fund. The stories are accounts of functions or instances, written by the head of each agency, whereby the money donated to the agency through the United Fund has been put to use. The stories will appear every other day in the News.)

Red Cross collects more than 2 million pints of blood each year and this program costs the Red Cross \$12 million dollars per year. There are about 200,000 persons who donate blood to the Red Cross Blood Centers each year. There are 54 Regional Blood Centers in the United States and about 1,500 chapters take part in this program. There are 4,000 hospitals served by the Red Cross Blood Center.

There is no charge to patients by Red Cross for donated blood. Clinics and hospitals may share with Red Cross the cost of collecting and processing and distributing and may charge part to the patients. But never is any charge made to patients in military, VA or Public Health Service Hospitals.

The National Red Cross also has entered into the derivatives of the blood and gamma globulin with protien plastic a r e distributed to doctors in treating patients where there is a need. Pampa has had two such patients. One patient has received 2 cc of gamma globulin each week from the Nation Organization since March of 1961. This would have cost the patient \$22 a week making an expenditure of \$900.

The other patient who received GG regularly from the Red Cross Blood Bank is Greg Hutson, 6, of Pampa.

Gold Turns Brass For Ditchdiggers

NEW BRAUNFELS, Tex. (UPI)—Two ditchdiggers who thought they had found a Spanish treasure chest of gold, were mystified today because the gold turned out to be brass.

Frank Luna, 54, and Clarence A. Ruppel, 44, were digging a drainage ditch along a farm road about 10 miles southeast of town when suddenly their shovels clanked and there it was, made of copper and sealed with a solid brass bar.

Excitedly, the men pried off the bar and removed the lid. There, gleaming inside the chest, were what appeared to be 84 stacks of King Louis I gold pieces, dated 1724.

Underneath the coins were 84 stacks of 25 washer type coins each, threaded onto a metal spindle.

Value Undetermined

Although the men did not know the value of the coins, they were sure they had discovered a real treasure chest. They rushed into a jewelry store in New Braunfels, where a preliminary examination showed the coins were real. But to be sure, one King Louis I piece and a "washer" were taken to nearby San Antonio for further tests.

There it was discovered the coins were solid brass.

Albert Hirschfeld, president of the San Antonio Museum, said there was a possibility some of the coins were real. "We only tested one coin and one washer..." he said, but he indicated there was little chance.

Hirschfeld said he did not understand how or why someone would have gone to all the trouble and great expense to have the coins reproduced as perfectly as they were if it was just a phoney plan.

"The coins looked so perfect...I thought they had a fortune there," he said. "The chest looks just like an old rusty Spanish chest." He said if the King Louis coins had been real, they alone would have been worth about \$168,000.

Luna and Ruppel were not

only mystified, they were dismayed.

Everything had fitted together perfectly, even the fact that the chest was found near the El Camino Real, or King's Highway the trail the Spanish followed from Mexico City to Louisiana when they ruled the Southwest.

Congolese Start Offensive With Aircraft Cover

ELISABETHVILLE, The Congo (UPI) — Congolese troops with air cover today launched an offensive to recapture the Lake Tanganyika port city of Albertville in Northern Katanga Province.

Congolese pilots returning from the area said the rebels had panicked and were fleeing.

Congolese National Army (ANC) troops also were said to have penetrated as far as the Maniema Province capital of Kindu, 250 miles northwest of Albertville.

Fighting was reported raging in the center of Kindu.

But reports from Leopoldville, capital of the central government, said 80 rebel youths bribed their way out of jail and captured the Congo River city of Bumba Monday—extending rebel control 100 miles closer to Leopoldville.

Bumba, 250 miles northwest of the rebel stronghold of Stanleyville, is believed to be the furthest north the rebels have penetrated in their Communist-backed drive to overthrow Premier Moise Tshombe. The city is about 700 miles northeast of the capital.

GRANTS LICENSE

NEW YORK (UPI)—Chromalloy Corp. Monday announced that it has licensed Mitsui Com. Ltd. to sell its patented tool steel, Ferro-Tic in Japan and certain other countries. Terms were not disclosed.

Pan American Airways Throttled by Strike

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Transport Workers Union (TWU) struck Pan American World Airways early today, closing down the U. S. operations of the globe-girdling airline.

A union spokesman here said the strike went into effect "system-wide" at 2 a.m. EDT shortly after final-hour negotiations for a new contract collapsed. It was reported that union and company negotiators would meet again later today.

The TWU represents 17,000 Pan Am mechanics, ground crewmembers, stewards and stewardesses. A walkout was originally threatened for midnight Sunday but was postponed 24 hours to permit continued negotiations.

Seek Pay Increase

The union sought a 15 per cent pay increase, a 37½-hour work week and improved fringe benefits.

While Pam Am does not serve domestic routes, it handles a large share of U. S. passenger and freight shipments aboard.

A Pan Am spokesman at Los Angeles said the company planned "to try to move flights with supervisory personnel for as long as we can."

William F. Rossi, vice president of Local 506 of the TWU in San Francisco, said some 2,500 union members on the West Coast were affected by the strike. He said that Pan Am contract flights for the Military Air Transport Service (MATS) will continue without interruption.

Walk Off Jobs

About 1,200 TWU members walked off their jobs at Kennedy Airport in New York.

In London, a spokesman for the airways said Pan Am flights into the British capital were running behind schedule today because of the TWU slowdown that preceded the strike.

Before the strike went into effect, a round-the-world flight reached London eight hours late because of delays in San Francisco and Honolulu. An over-the-pole flight from San Francisco was four and one-half hours late and a New York jet was more than two hours late.

London Airport maintenance men worked normal schedules through the night. Some delays were experienced on outgoing flights because of the late arrivals from the United States.

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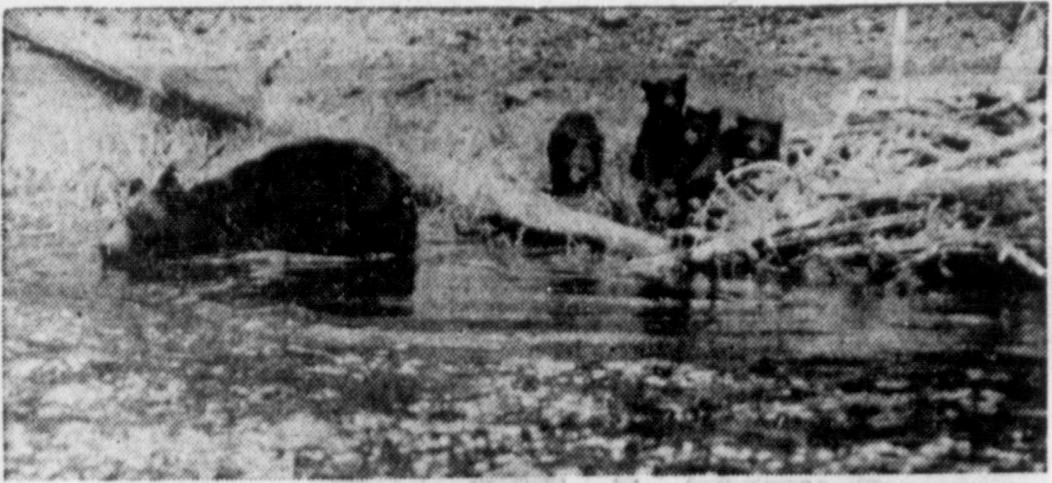

By HARRY FERGUSON ATLANTIC CITY (UPI) — Some of the things that already are afflicting delegates to the Democratic National Convention are headaches, homesickness, hangnails, hangovers, runs in stockings, aching feet, torn trousers, temporary loss of memory and onions on the breath. It is almost an irresistible temptation to male delegates to fall writhing to the convention floor and fake illness because in that event Mrs. Betty Jane White, a youthful brunette from Linwood, N.J., who looks like the third one from the left in a classy Las Vegas chorus line, will come running to the rescue.

ATLANTIC CITY (UPI) — If Carmine DeSapio shed a tear you couldn't tell it. Maybe the dark glasses helped. Anyway, his voice cracked a little as he had his last say. "I want to thank all of you for the warm friendship and kindness you have given me over the years," he told New York convention delegates who had just eased him out as the state's Democratic national committeeman.

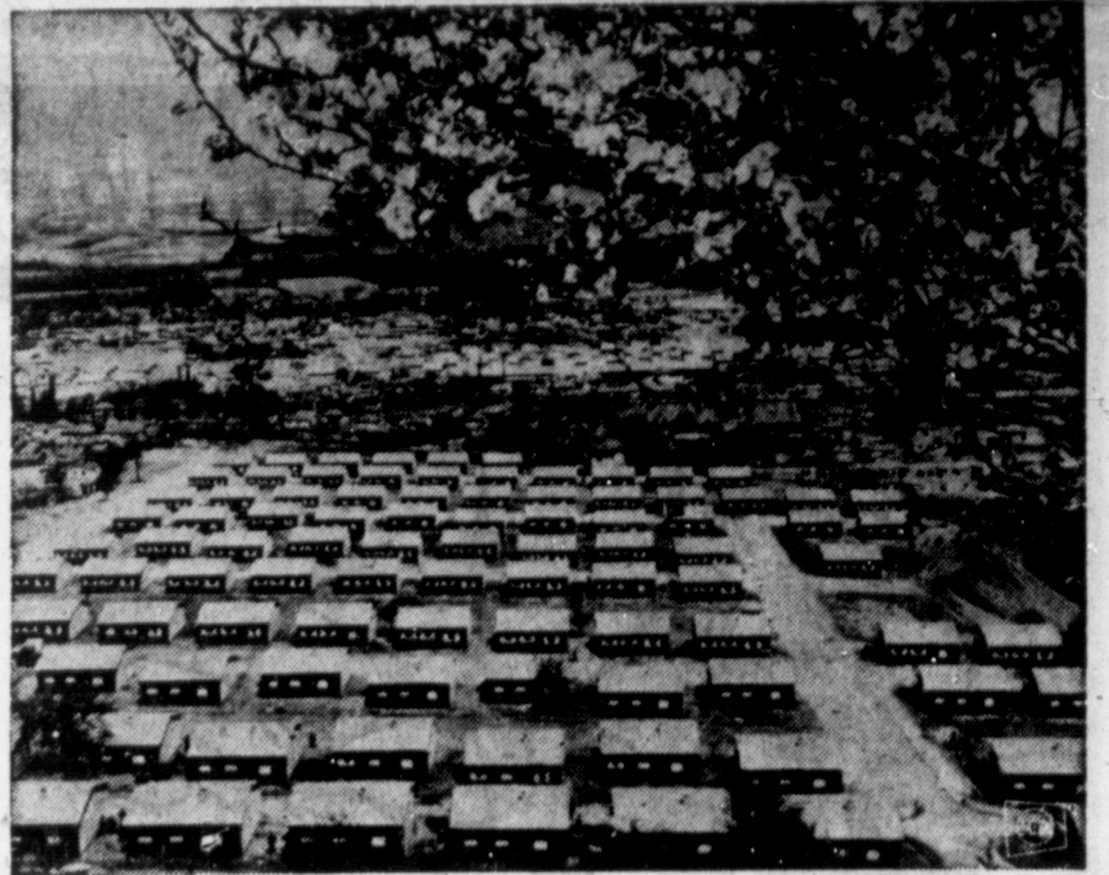
DeSapio Bows Out as Chief Of NY Demos

Mrs. White is one of the 260 "Johnson Girls" who patrol the convention willing to do anything—well, almost—to make the delegates feel cozy and comfortable. They carry big white shoulder bags. Mrs. White emptied the contents of her bag on a table today to prove that the Johnson girls are equipped to cope with any emergency that befalls a delegate with the possible exception of major surgery. The "Johnson Girls" not only must repair stockings, sew up torn trousers and cure headaches. They must minister to the minds and souls of the delegates. They do this by chatting with the homesick, looking at and admiring pictures of children and grandchildren. If a male delegate looks sufficiently forlorn he can win a bonus of a pat on the head and one minute of hand holding.

They had picked to replace him Edwin L. Weisl, Sr., a New York lawyer and close friend for 25 years of President Johnson. The vote Monday stripped the last claim to party leadership from the dapper ex-Tammany chief who once was undisputed political boss of New York.

But woe unto the delegate who pushes his luck with a "Johnson Girl" because he gets the deep freeze immediately. "When they briefed up last Saturday," said Mrs. White, "they emphasized that we were official representatives of the state of New Jersey. We stay proper. No jewelry except our official bracelets. The married girls wear their wedding rings. White gloves all the time. No strong perfume. No false eyelashes. We have to watch our conversation, too. We are not allowed to get into political arguments, but of course we are allowed to indicate in a lady-like way that we are generally in

favor of President Johnson." The "Johnson Girls" wear white dacron dresses designed by Mrs. Richard Hughes, wife of New Jersey's governor; red, white and blue belts; and white hats which they described as bowlers. One of them is assigned permanently to each state delegation, but Mrs. White is a member of the flying squadron which is rushed to wherever the situation is stickiest.

Dallas Educator Denies Attempt To Defy Orders

DALLAS (UPI) — The superintendent of Dallas public schools denied in federal court Monday that there was any attempt to manipulate school districts to perpetuate segregation. Supt. Dr. W. T. White said all Negroes eligible to attend formerly white schools under a stairstep desegregation plan are attending if they have applied and are eligible.

White testified in a suit by 10 Negro students in U.S. District court. The Negroes sought complete and immediate desegregation of Dallas schools. Under a grade-year plan proved by Davidson in 1961 desegregation has progressed through the third grade. White said a total of 194 Negro children have been admitted to formerly all-white classes in 11 schools.

There is no barrier (to attendance) to children living in attendance areas," Dr. White testified. "What do you consider a desegregated school?" Negro leader W. J. Durham asked. "A desegregated school is one legally and administratively open to both races," Dr. White replied. Judge Davidson seemed satisfied that his orders on stairstep integration were being carried out and no testimony was heard on that point. Instead, he let the Negro lawyers begin presenting testimony on their charges that the school board has contrived districts to continue desegregation despite the plan. He also will hear testimony that the vocational educational program is desegregated.

Eufaula Project Key Unit in Arkansas Development

EUFULA, Okla. (UPI) — When President Lyndon Johnson dedicates the Eufaula Reservoir project next month, the chief executive will find himself in a rough, beautifully-timbered area of rural welfare and unemployment created in part by the \$125 million project. Located on the South Canadian River about 100 miles south-east of Tulsa, the project is designed to furnish flood control, hydroelectric power and provide recreation and navigation.

The Eufaula project is a key unit in the multi-purpose plan for the development of the Arkansas River basin and while it has created it has also taken away.

Dr. Charles Mitchell, president of the Eufaula Lake Development Association, pointed out that the project has brought people and their money to Eufaula since the initial construction in 1956.

Charges Filed in Illegal Marriage Of Clovis Girl

CLOVIS, N.M. (UPI) — A 17-year-old Clovis girl, who had her first husband pose as her father to get legal permission to marry another man, has had no charges filed against her, but her two companions are charged with giving false information to the county clerk.

Garcia said Mexican records show the girl married Ashley when she was 15 years old.

Five of Family, Four Others Die in Wreck

NOONDAY, Tex. (UPI) — Monday, six members of the Erwin Redeker family headed home for Milford, Ill., after the happy duty of delivering the oldest Redeker girl, Dorothy, to her first teaching assignment, a job in the little Texas town of Giddings. Shortly after noon, the Redekers drove into a heavy rainstorm just south of Tyler. Witnesses, rain-blinded, could not tell if it was the Redeker car or the truck that skidded on the slick highway.

The head-on collision left nine dead. The four men killed in the pickup truck were Louis Edward Gill, 28, of Winona, Tex., and William Davis Frizzell, 25, Freddy Hammonds, 19, and Leon Ward, 43, all of Tyler. Killed in the Redeker car were the father, Erwin, 45, his wife Carolyn, 47, their son, Franklin, 16, and two teenage daughters, Alma and Beverly. The only survivor of the wreck was the youngest Redeker girl, Gayle, 8, who today was in fair condition in Tyler Medical Center Hospital. Dorothy was at her side today, but had not told Gayle that the two of them are alone now.

Washington Window

Next to the nomination of Lyndon B. Johnson for president of the United States the best bet in the Democratic National Convention is that more politics than prudence will determine LBJ's choice of a vice presidential nominee.

Politics largely determined last month's Republican vice presidential nomination of Rep. William E. Miller of New York. Sen. Barry M. Goldwater chose Miller as his running mate, explaining that:

"Bill Miller drives Lyndon nuts."
Miller had much more than that going for him, of course, but not many persons are insisting that next to Goldwater, Miller is the Republican best fitted to be president of the United States.

That should be standard by which nominating conventions judge vice presidential contenders. It should be the standard but it never is. The chance of a vice president succeeding to the presidency by reason of the death or disability of a president are pretty good, too good. A gambling man would have to call it about a 50-50 chance.

Four Have Succeeded
Consider: There have been 12 presidents in the 20th century so far. Four of them were vice presidents who succeeded to the White House on the death of a president. These four were Presidents Theodore Roosevelt, Calvin Coolidge, Harry Truman and Johnson. They succeeded respectively, President William McKinley, Warren G. Harding, Franklin D. Roosevelt and John F. Kennedy.

Two other 20th century presidents were stricken, almost fatally, while in office. They were Presidents Woodrow Wilson and Dwight D. Eisenhower. Wilson was incapacitated for months but there was no provision for displacing him on grounds of his inability to discharge the duties of his office. Ike was twice seriously ill.

Of the dozen 20th century presidents, then, two were seriously stricken while in office, two were assassinated, two died of natural causes and one, Tru-

man, survived an attempt to kill him. Franklin D. Roosevelt also escaped an assassin's bullet after his election but before taking office. Mayor Anton J. Cermak of Chicago, motoring with FDR in Miami, took the bullet and was killed.

High-Risk Occupation
The presidency is a high-risk occupation. And in this day of push button or panic button warfare, the incapacity of a president might and probably would invite irreparable disaster. Congress and the national nominating conventions have not accepted their responsibilities in the matter of the presidential succession.

For nearly a year there has been no vice president to succeed LBJ in the event of his incapacity. The succession would be to the aged speaker of the House, Rep. John W. McCormack of Massachusetts. There is little in the speaker's background to recommend him for the White House.

There is a possibility, scarcely a probability, that President Johnson will ignore politics to choose a running mate who is fitted in every way to undertake the presidential office. The possibility exists because it is emphatically evident to White House callers that LBJ is supremely confident that he will win this presidential election, regardless of who is on the ticket with him.

SLEEPS THROUGH MATCH
BAKSNLEY, England (UPI)—Willie Webster, 83, fell asleep Saturday while watching a soccer match here and woke up to find all the other fans gone and himself locked in the stadium.

"It was a pretty boring game," Webster said after a stadium official rescued him.

PARISIANS CELEBRATE
PARIS (UPI)—Parisians danced in the streets Monday to celebrate the 20th anniversary of the arrival of three Free French tanks signifying the end of Nazi occupation.

It was 10:20 p.m., on Aug. 24, 1944, that the three Free French tanks reached the square in front of the Paris city hall.

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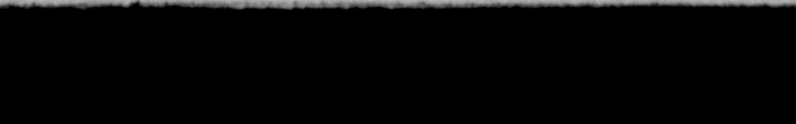
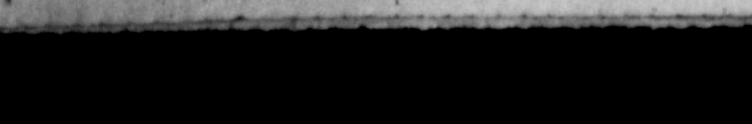

Democrats' Book Praises Party And President

ATLANTIC CITY (UPI). — The official book of the 1964 Democratic national convention is a slick \$10 a copy magazine filled with plaudits for President Johnson and the Democratic party and a tribute to the late President Kennedy.

The souvenir magazine features a main article on Johnson written by Pulitzer prize-winning novelist John Steinbeck. Steinbeck describes the President as "one of the best-prepared, most effective presidents in our history."

Arthur Schlesinger Jr., another Pulitzer prize-winner and a former aide to Kennedy, authored a memorial article on the late President. It says Kennedy's administration, brief and brilliant, "marked out the directions in which this country must move for years to come."

The heavily illustrated volume also includes numerous full-page advertisements by some of the nation's biggest industrial and utility firms, including major defense contractors.

Steinbeck, urging Johnson's election to a full term, said he will be remembered as one of the greatest presidents "if he continues to perform as he has in his first half year."

POSTPONE MEETING

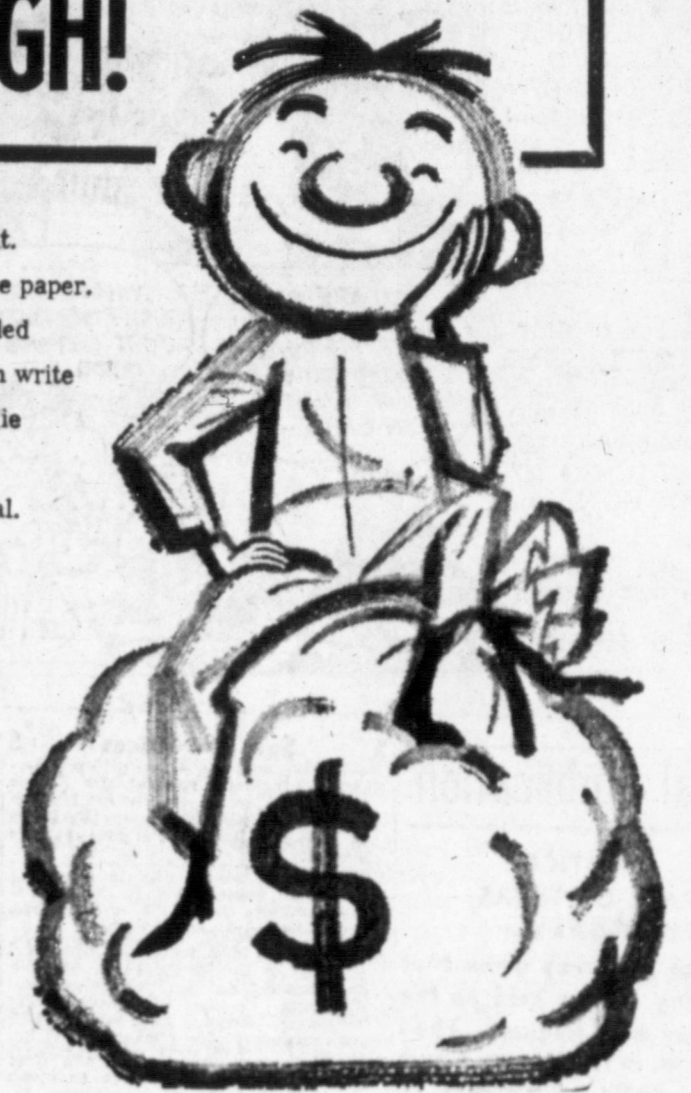

Democratic Eyes Turn to Topless Bikini

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (UPI) — The word got around that a beauty in a topless bikini was displaying her ample charms on one of the pleasure piers up the way from Convention Hall. If you knew something about Atlantic City, the story seemed implausible—as implausible as the notion that this traditional beachhead of Republicanism was playing host to 25,000 or so Democrats.

They don't even allow males to appear on the boardwalk here in topless swimsuits. Nevertheless, the report was true, even to the detail of the girl's name. Her name was Christine, and there she was, posing in the bottom half of a bikini with nobody complaining or calling the cops. What made Christine's conduct permissible in this sedate old city by the sea was the fact that she wasn't a real person. She was just a painting in an art show.

That other report—that the Democratic party was having its national convention here—also is true. But in a way it seems no more real than Christine. A real convention, you might think, is a sort of knightly joust or barroom slugfest, in which rival champions sweat to knock each other out for the big prize, the nomination for president of the United States. But only one champion is entered in the lists here. Unlike Christine, however, he is a real person. His name is LBJ. And with one exception this is the only name you see prominently displayed in the vicinity of Convention Hall.
