Amid the concern over Cyprus and fears of a general explosion in the eastern Mediterranean some tribute should be paid to a man who has played a huge part in so far preventing it.
That man is 80-year-old Turkish Premier Ismet Inonu, companion-in-arms of the Turkish hero Kemal Ataturk and the soldier-statesman who curbs the emotions of his countrymen clamoring for direct military intervention in Cyprus.
For such is the mood of the Turks as demonstrated by crowds in Ankara, Istanbul and Izmir that Inonu probably could make himself a national hero overnight by moving against the Cypriot government of President Archbishop Makarios and to the aid of the 100,000 embattled Cypriots of Turkish descent.

Under Pressures
As Turkish leader, Inonu is under opposing pressures.
An important one is the fact that Turkish intervention in Cyprus against the wishes of Turkey's Western Allies, especially the United States, undoubtedly would mean a cut-off of the foreign aid on which the country depends for its five-year development plan.

U. S. economic aid to Turkey over the last 10 years has amounted to well over \$1 billion and the United States also is an important member of the nine-nation Western consortium pledged to support of the five-year plan.

Lending strength to Inonu's determination has been the support of the Turkish military high command.

Tribute To Ability
But the fact that Inonu, at the head of a minority government, has thus far been able to ride the waves of Cyprus's emotional appeal to Turks and not be swamped by them also is a tribute to his political ability.

For the Turk at home has been described as a man more interested in the future of 100,000 Turks on Cyprus than in a greater number of Turks unemployed in Istanbul or in the future of 27 million Turks in Turkey itself.

And therein lies the danger of the Cypriot dispute to Turkey and the accompanying threat to Inonu's own position the longer the civil war between Turks and Greeks on Cyprus drags on without solution.

Student rioting in the latter days of the Adnan Menderes regime played a leading role in its fall in May, 1960, and in the country's subsequent take-over by the military.

Troubled Course
Student demonstrations with a heavy overtone of anti-Americanism may therefore have a special significance. Participation in one student march by the new commander of Turkey's land forces may also be significant.

In the three years since national elections, Inonu's course has been a troubled one.

His is a nation with one of the highest population growth rates in the world. Illiteracy is close to 80 per cent. Once-fertile fields have become eroded through the disappearance of forests and the presence of some 25 million goats.

It is a nation unused to the taxes necessary for development and it is torn between a desire for modernization and the backward ways of ancient Islam.

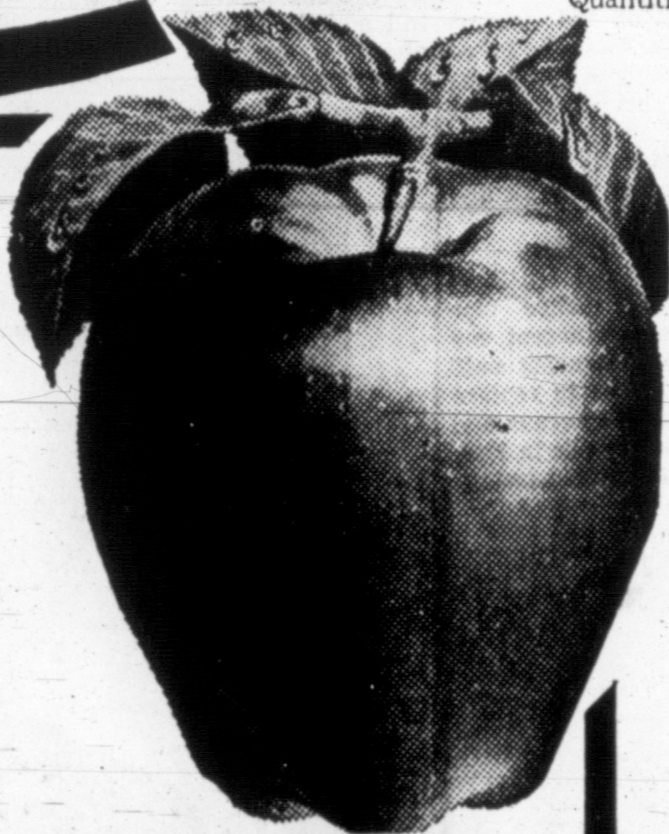

Lubbock Selected For State School

AUSTIN (UPI)—The Board for Texas state hospitals in special schools selected Lubbock this week as the site for a West Texas school for the mentally retarded.

SAN MARINO (UPI)—Women voting for the first time in the 1963-year-history of San Marino defeated Communist efforts to recapture control of this postage stamp republic.

Unofficial but authoritative results from the elections Sunday showed that the democratic parties were returned to power with a three-seat increase in their majority on the 60-man grand and general council.

The Christian Democrats and their rightwing Socialist allies captured 39 seats in the legislature. The Christian Democrats picked up two seats and the Social Democrats one.

New York Police Boss Will Speak At UPI Meeting

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Police Commissioner Michael J. Murphy of New York City has accepted an invitation to address the fifth annual conference of United Press International Editors and Publishers here Oct. 6-7.

Murphy is expected to evaluate recent attacks against law and order in the nation and discuss the challenge they present to police authority. His speech will be made in conjunction with the first working session of the conference Tuesday morning, Oct. 6.

The commissioner is the eighth career policeman to rise from the ranks to head the largest police force in the U.S. Since becoming commissioner in 1960, Murphy has adapted a number of technical advances to modernize law enforcement procedures in New York.

Some 400 delegates from 41 states have registered for the conference. They also will hear Republican presidential candidate Barry M. Goldwater and other national leaders during the two-day meeting. Goldwater will address the group Tuesday afternoon, Oct. 6.

Berliners Praise US MPs for Refugee Aid

BERLIN (UPI)—West Berliners hailed five American military policemen Monday who bravely Communist gunfire Sunday to help a wounded refugee escape over the Communist wall.

It was the first time American soldiers had taken an active part in the rescue of a refugee escaping to the West and also the first time Communist border guards had ever shot at U.S. soldiers.

The MP's courageous act wiped out West Berlin's last vestige of resentment over an incident two years ago when U.S. soldiers were severely criticized for letting a young refugee bleed to death at the foot of the wall.

One of the American soldiers in Sunday's border incident, SP-4 Hans W. Puhl, 22, East Weymouth, Mass., was considered a likely candidate for a medal for bravery.

The blond, German-born six-footer led the move to rescue a 21-year-old East Berliner who was shot and momentarily captured when he tried to escape. Puhl forced Communist border guards to let the refugee go and then pulled him over the wall.

Penney Company Lists Earnings

NEW YORK (SpI)—Record first half and second quarter earnings, on peak sales for both periods, were reported this month by J. C. Penney Company, department store chain.

Net earnings for the six months ended July 31 totaled \$23,522,150 after federal income taxes of \$21,000,000. This compares with net earnings for the six months ended July 31, 1963, of \$17,699,883 after federal income taxes of \$19,500,000 an increase in earnings of \$5,822,267, or 31.4 per cent.

These net earnings were equivalent to 94 cents a share on each of 24,932,183 shares of common stock outstanding on July 31. Net earnings for the six months ended July 31 last year were 72 cents a share on the 24,925,544 shares then outstanding.

For the six months, sales were up 14.6 per cent over a year ago.

Sales for the second quarter totaled \$459,642,529 compared with \$397,803,176 last year, an increase of \$61,839,353 or 15.5 per cent.
