Trio Robs Couple Of \$5,000

tire Texas Panhandle was launched this morning after three men broke into a motel room in Shamrock and at gunpoint took \$5,000 in cash from a Miami, Okla., couple

The robbery occurred about 5:45 a.m. at the Rambler Motel.

The trio escaped in the couple's 1964 Cadillac, but were sighted less than an hour later in Shamrock by a woman who saw them abandon the car, and steal a black 1958 model Dodge.

The search for the men was greatly hindered when a telephone failure over the Panhandle prevented the alerting of officers in several adjoining cities and towns.

According to reports over the police short - wave radio, the trio broke into the room of Mr. and Mrs. John Henderson, while they were asleep in their room. At gunpoint, they held the couple at bay and robbed them of fifty \$100 bills and a diamond ring valued at \$2,000.

The gunmen then took the keys to their car and escaped. Officers over the Panhandle area were alerted and roadblocks were set up on most



At present, only four predominantly white schools are paired with four Negro schools and the total number of students required to leave their neighborhoods is about 13,000mostly Negroes and Puerto Rfcans. The transfers generally are over less than 1.5 miles and only 1,000 students are required to go by bus.

The transfers represent only a small part of the city schools' \$1.3 million battle against de facto segregation. But the opposition is determined and highly organized.

More than 2,000 pickets, most of them white mothers. marched outside of about 150 schools Monday in the demonstration organized by two predominantly white parents' groups, the Parents and Taxpayers Coordinating Council

Foreign News Commentary

By PHIL NEWSOM UPI Foreign News Analyst Amid the concern over Cy prus and fears of a general explosion in the eastern Mediterranean some tribute should be paid to a man who has played a huge part in so far

That man is 80-year-old Turkish Premier Ismet Inonu, companion-in-arms of the Turkish hero Kemal Ataturk and the soldier - statesman who curbs the emotions of his countrymen clamoring for direct military intervention in Cyprus.

For such is the mood of the Turks as demonstrated by crowds in Ankara, Istanbul and Izmir that Inonu probably could make himself a national hero overnight by moving against the Cypriot government of President Archbishop Makarios and to the aid of the 100,000 embattled Cypriots of Turkish descent.

Under Pressures

As Turkish leader, Inonu is under opposing pressures.

An important one is the fact that Turkish intervention in Cyprus against the wishes of Turkey's Western Allies, especially the United States, updoubtedly would mean a cut-off of the foreign aid on which the country depends for its fiveyear development plan...

U. S. economic aid to Turkey over the last 10 years has amounted to well over \$1 billion and the United States also is an important member of the nine-nation Western consortium pledged to support of the five-year plan.

Lending strength to Inonu's determination has been the support of the Turkish military high command.

Tribute To Ability But the fact that Inonu, at the head of a minority government, has thus far been able to ride the waves of Cyprus's emotional appeal to Turks and not be swamped by them also is a tribute to his political abil-

For the Turk at home has been described as a man more interested in the future of 100,-000 Turks on Cyprus than in a greater number of Turks unemployed in Istanbul or in the future of 27 million Turks in Turkey itself.

And therein lies the danger of the Cypriot dispute to Turkey and the accompanying threat to Inonu's own position the longer the civil war between Turks and Greeks on Cyprus drags on without solu-

Student rioting in the latter days of the Adnan Menderes regime played a leading role in its fall in May, 1960, and in the country's subsequent takeover by the military.

Troubled Course Student demonstrations with a heavy overtone of anti-Americanism may therefore have special significance. Participation in one student march by the new commander of Turkey's land forces may also be significant.

In the three years since national elections, Inonu's course has been a troubled one.

His is a nation with one of the highest population growth rates in the world. Illiteracy is close to 80 per cent. Once-fertile fields have become eroded through the disappearance of forests and the presence of

some 25 million goats. It is a nation unused to the taxes necessary for development and it is torn between a desire for modernization and the backward ways of ancien







Be sure that the names are always right. In publicity for your group, you have a legitimate excuse for being "nosey", Determine at the beginning of the club year, all of your members married names. The woman's editor does not like to use first names, such as "Mary Smith." Sometimes this is the only name you know a member by, but we must have the husband's name, except in the case of a widow or divorcee.

As most of you know, the woman's editor does not have time to take a story by telephone. You may call when she is rushing to meet a deadline or in the midst of an interview. Sometimes she may be out on a story and you will not be able to reach her. She is especially rushed from Wednesday morning until Saturday noon. That is why it is requested that you bring the story to the office. If the woman's editor is out of the office, your story may be placed on her desk.

Your story may be short, tak ing only 10 minutes, but multiply that by as few as six calls a day (and there are often more), that is one hour spent in conversation. Then when your stories have to be typed, edited and a headline written for them you can see that it would be time consuming. Stories left in the News office, even in note form, can be typed and edited in a third of the time they can be taken over the phone, retyped and edited.
