Republican Leader Dies in New York

By CHARLES J. JUSTICE NEW YORK (UPI) Herbert Clark Hoover, humanitarian, statesman and 31st president of the United States died today. He was 90.

Death came in his Waldorf Towers apartment at 11:35 a.m. EDT when his heart, weakened by blood toxins resulting from massive internal hemorrhaging finally gave out.

WATCH YOUR HAT, COAT The sign over the coat rack read: "Not responsible for lost or stolen articles." John glanced at it as he hung up his coat and hat and then turned to assist Jean, his wife, in taking off her fur coat. He put it on a hanger beside his own.

The two of them drifted casually down the corridor into the dining salon and were assigned to a table by the hostess. The lunch was exceptionally good and both were hungry. The minutes flew by. John glanced at his watch, "Golly, it's almost 1 o'clock. Better get going."

But when they got back to the coat rac, Jean's fur coat was

"I'm sorry, sir," said the manager, "but we are not responsible for lost articles. We put up the coat rack for the convenience of our patrons, but that sign you see makes you responsible for your own hat and coat rack, Jean's fur coat was just can't watch everybody's possessions."

Sign Not Factor The fact is that in the case of Jean's fur coat the restaurant would not have been responsible for its loss even if there had been no sign. One who takes off a garment and places it on a coat rack, as one would do in a restaurant, retains the power of surveilance and control over it to himself.

Ordinarily, under such circumstance. the operators of the restaurant have no responsibility toward the customer's belongings because they have not knowingly received the exclusive possession and dominion

The case would be different, however, where the coat had been delivered to an employee n a checkroom. In such event the management probably would be responsible. So, also, in the cases where a customer checks valuables with a bathing house proprietor, or with a hotel desk clerk, or leaves his auomobile with the parking lot attendant to be parked and stored for him, those receiving possession of the customer's property have the duty to use proper care to see that the customer's property is returned.





Foreign News Commentary

LONDON - Britain, which is selling buses to Cuba in defiance of the American blockade, is now pushing a similar deal with Red China.

Moves are under way for a big bus contract with Peking, to match the 25 million dollar Cuban deal.

Samples will be shown at the British Industrial Fair to be staged in Peking next month when other exhibits of British industry also will be displayed to whet the appetite of Red China's machine-starved econ-

The move is part of a determined British campaign for more trade with the Communist nations behind the Iron and Bamboo curtains.

Seek More Trade

British Conservatives and Laborites are at one in advocating more East-West trade which incidentally they also consider as an incentive for progressive easing of the cold

Britain has rejected American objections to her private industry supplying buses to Fidel Castro's Cuba.

She recognizes the Cuban government and holds there is no justification under diplomatie protocol to halt trade. The same goes for Red China. But Britain does not sell arms or war materials to either of them and has undertaken to bar the export of products to Cuba and Red China that are likely to enhance their war potentials.

Britain says she adheres strictly to the Allied security embargo governing relations with the Red nations, though again she feels that it could be eased substantially in the light of changing international condi-

Economic pressures at home are likely to lead to still greater efforts to expand trade with the Communist nations on an increasing scale.

Extends Credit In opposition to the United States Britain has thus decided to extend long term credits to Russia of up to fifteen years. Credits will also be granted to-Red China if prospects for expanded trade prove promising.

Behind this policy lies partly the assumption that other nations in West Europe such as France and possibly Germany will sooner or later also seek more trade opportunities behind the Iron Curtain, and Britain wants to be the first.

But some experts have put a damper on over-extended hopes by pointing out that the Communists have little to offer in exchange and that trade is likely to be a one sided affair for a long time to come. This would therefore require financial resources which neither Britain nor any other European country could afford for any length of time. In Cuba British trade has already come up against this problem.

TO MARRY COMMONER

ATHENS, Greece (UPI) -Prince Michael has denounced his rights as third in line to the Greek throne to marry a commoner.

A court announcement Mon-day said, King Constantine, him-self a recent bridegroom, had given Michael permission to marry commoner Marina Karella, daughter of a Greek businessman.

Scientists to Be Sought for Space Flights

The National Aeronautics & Space Administration (NASA) said Monday the program is beginning at once and the selection of the first group should be completed by next spring.

NASA said the applicants must be U. S. citizens, under six feet tall and have been born on or after Aug. 1, 1930. The deadline for filing the applications is Dec. 31.

In addition to the age, height and citizenship qualifications, additional academic and modi cal standards must be met, NASA said. The screening of candidates will be conducted by NASA's Manned Space Flight Center at Houston, Tex.
