School-Age Marriages Continue to Increase
COLLEGE STATION—School age marriage may not be wise, yet after one becomes a fact, adults working with the couple have a responsibility to help them succeed. Indications are that they will continue to increase in numbers.

So says Patsy Reynolds, Extension specialist in family life education at Texas A&M University.

Marriage is always a time of adjustment, she explains, regardless of the age of the couple. "Add to the normal problems of this period the disapproval and often bitter incriminations of parents and the load becomes almost impossible for the young couple to carry."

According to a study made

by Dr. B. J. Fallon, Executive Secretary of the West Texas School Study Council, school-age marriages have a divorce rate two to four times greater than for those who marry at age 20 or older. Dr. Fallon directed the survey in 238 Texas schools in 1962.

Conclusions of the research indicate that schools should educate for a "balanced social perspective" if these school-age marriages are to be reduced or those which occur are to succeed, the specialist says.

The parents and community can give the young couple practical education for dealing with problems such as budgets, house cleaning and care and use of household equipment, and preparation for earning a livelihood.

tin and extend the color over the tip of the nails for protection.

5. Brush on top coat to add to the strength and perfection of the manicure.

6. Each night before retiring, add a thin application of top coat for day - by - day protection.

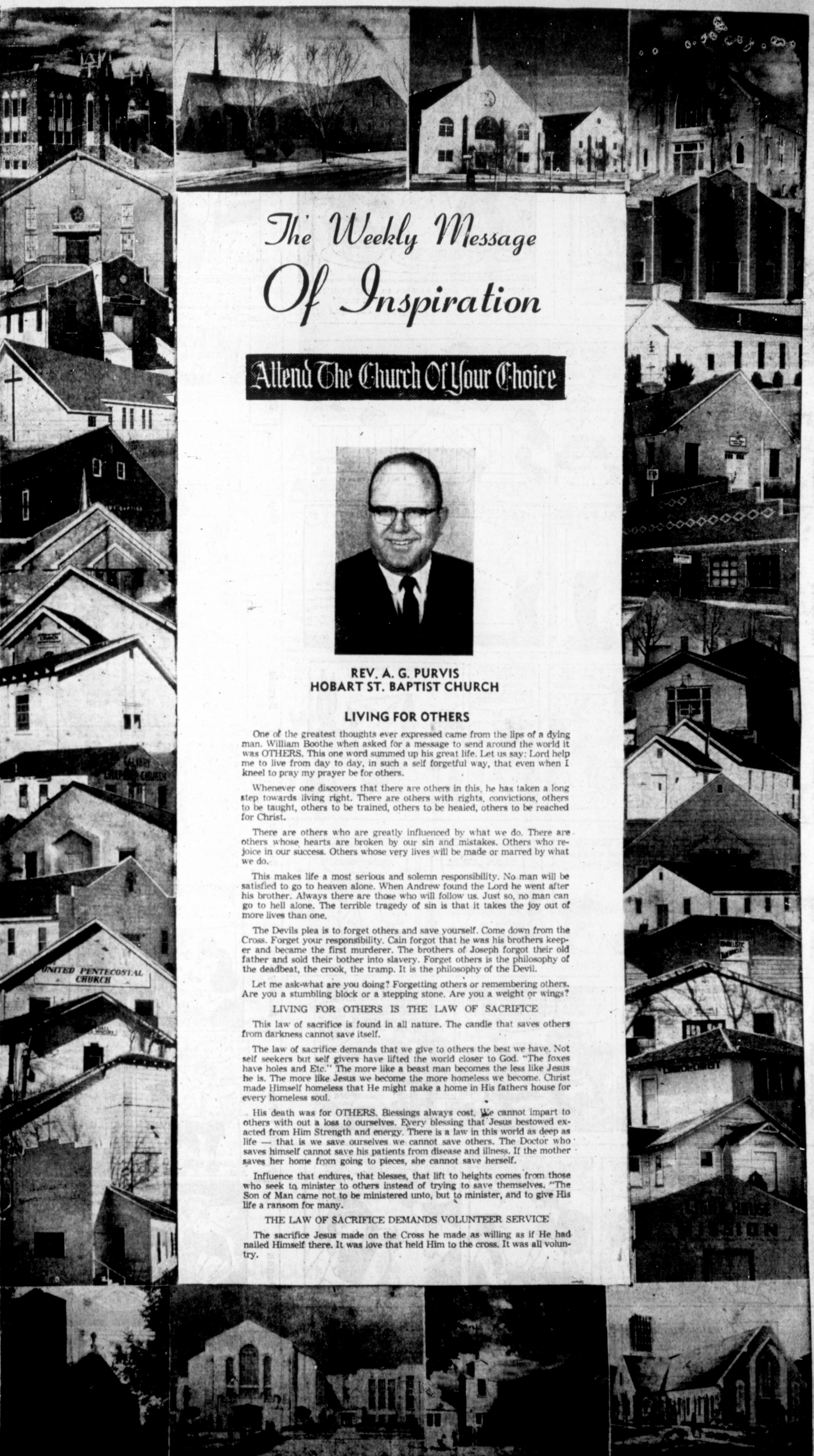

This law of sacrifice is found in all nature. The candle that saves others from darkness cannot save itself.

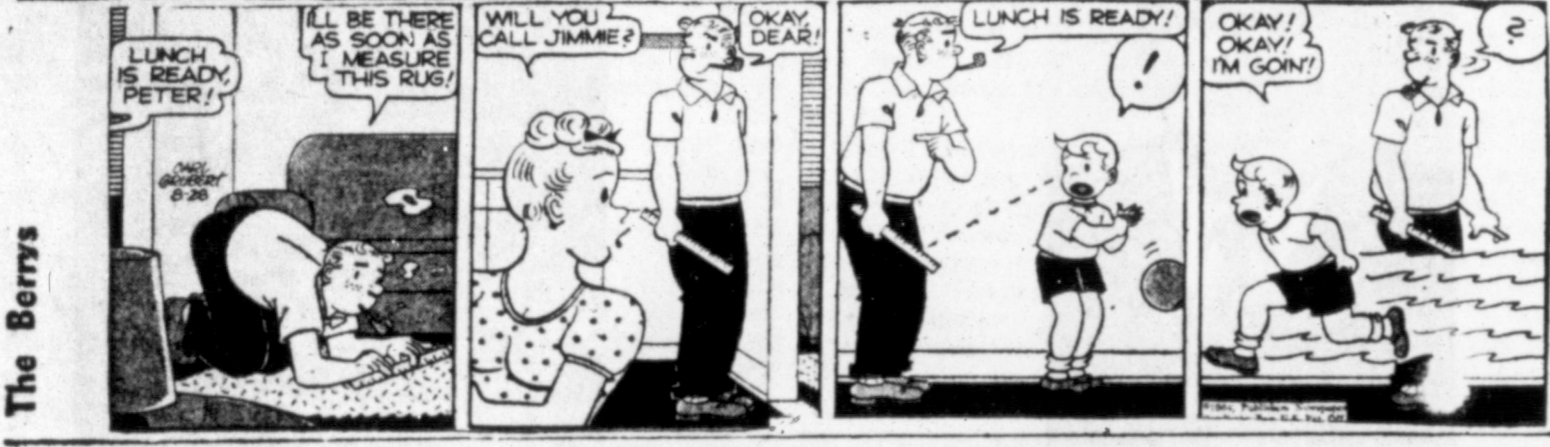

Texas Income Up For 2-Year Period

DALLAS (UPI)—Personal per capita income in Texas increased \$95 from 1961 to 1963, from an average of \$1,973 to \$2,068, the Department of Commerce said.
The total personal income in Texas was \$19,569,000,000 in 1961 and two years later it had increased \$1,782,000,000 to \$21,351,000,000.

Strong Quake Hits Soviet Laptev Sea

MOSCOW (UPI)—An earthquake possibly stronger than the Alaska shock of last March has struck in the Laptev Sea north of the central Soviet Union, radio Moscow said today.
It said the Moscow central seismic station recorded an earthquake of force 8 to 10 on the Richter scale at 78 degrees north and 127 degrees east. This would put its epicenter well north of the nearest town of Tiksi.
The Alaska quake had a Richter rating of 8.9.

No. 2 Russian Visits Museum in Vatican City

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—The Soviet Union's number two man, First Deputy Premier Leonid Brezhnev, Wednesday made a sightseeing visit to the Vatican City Museum.
Brezhnev, the highest ranking Soviet leader ever to set foot in the Catholic citadel, spent over an hour visiting the Sistine Chapel and looking at sacred art treasures.
The Russian official was in Rome as leader of the official Soviet delegation to Italian Communist leader Palmiro Togliatti's funeral. He was accompanied by Soviet Ambassador to Italy Semen Kozlyev, an interpreter and two other unidentified persons.

Waggoner Aide Seeking Release

VERNON, Tex. (UPI)—Robert B. Anderson, former secretary of the Navy and treasurer under the Eisenhower administration, has filed a suit seeking his release as a trustee of the Guy L. Waggoner trust.
The suit, filed in 46th District Court, asks that he be granted permission to resign.
He is also general manager of the W. T. Waggoner estate, the remnant of a gigantic cattle and oil empire that once covered thousands of acres of Northwest Texas.
The Guy Waggoner trust was once part of the overall W. T. Waggoner estate but was taken out in the 1950s.
Another suit was filed earlier this year by Mrs. Elise Waggoner Hay of Fort Worth, asking that both Anderson and the Valley National Bank of Phoenix, Ariz. be removed as trustees.
No action has been taken in that suit.
All of the litigation grew out of an attempt to determine who the heirs of the W. T. Waggoner estate were.
