A family fight which started last weekend ended today in the shooting death of a 32-year-old Pampa housewife and the mother of eight children. Her husband was transferred from Week Days is Highland General Hospital to Amarillo for emergency brain surgery

Sheriff's officers said the man, Albert Fay (Ab) Branscum, 35, apparently shot his wife in the head with a .22 automatic pistol and then turned the gun on himself. Hospital attendants said Branscum has two bullets lodged in his brain. and is listed near death.

The forces opposing Laetrile report they have had no firsthand experience in testing it on human beings. But theirs is the weighty opinion that predominates in the world of medicine in America.

. This opinion derives chiefly from a 1953 evaluation of the drug by- the Cancer Commission of the California Medical Association. The report was published, unsigned, in California Medicine, the official publication of the CMA, dated April, 1953.

-- It was written by Dr. Ian MacDonald, a Los Angeles surgeon, and Dr. L. Henry Garland, a San Francisco radiologist. Dr. MacDonald was chairman and Dr. Garland secretary of the Cancer Commission. Members for the nine - man commission were selected by Dr. MacDonald. The commission included five surgeons, two radiologists a professor of a state medical school, and a pathologist. The 1953 evaluation was based on reports concerning 44 patients treated with Laetrile. The commission members did not examine the patients, but studied the reports of physicians who said they had used Laetrile and

and had achieved some effective results. The conclusion of the commission was that "No satisfactory evidence has been produced to indicate any significant cytotoxic effect of Laetrile on the cancer cell." This basically is the case

against Laetrile although two subsequent reports also termed it ineffective.

In 1960, the National Cancer Institute in Bethesda, Md., reported it had tested Laetrile on mice with transplanted tumors with negative results, and in 1963, the California State Health Department issued a report upholding the 1953 report and recommending that use of Laetrile be banned under provisions of a law enacted by the 1959 Legislature creating a Cancer Advisory Council.

Although the official voice of medicine agreed there were no harmful side effects from opposition. It places Laetrile the foundation includes Krebs Jr. and E. T. 

An example is the "International Association of Cancer Victims and Friends," founded by Mrs. Donald Hoffman of San Diego, Calif. Mrs. Hoffman, a former school teacher, says she was a "hopeless" victim of cancer and that Laetrile saved her life after surgery and radiation had failed.

The story of Laetrile also reached the public through a book "Laetrile: Control For Cancer" by New York author Glenn D. Kittler, published in April, 1963. The book was quickly condemned. by the opponents, but curios-





The state report was issued May 20, 1963.

On June 26 and 28, 1963. public hearings were held in Los Angeles and in San Francisco on a proposed regulation to ban the use of Laetrile in California.

On Sept. 20, 1963 in Los Angeles, the State Board of Public Health adopted the regulation which became effective Nov. 1, 1963.
