AFTER THE FIRST STEP

How often we hear expounded the simple yet beautiful plan of salvation! And certainly the acceptance of this salvation is the first step that an individual takes toward Christ. Yet in view of current trends in our society, particularly among professed followers of Christ, it almost seems that there is only one step to take.

When we stop to evaluate the Bible however we find that much more of it is dedicated to instructing the follower of Christ in Christian behaviour than in the actual plan of salvation. The Bible teaches us to "Lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us." Rom. 12:1.

Careless attitudes toward sin will result in eternal tragedy. "Immorality, Impurity, indecency; Idolatry, sorcery, enmity, strife, jealousy, anger (ill temper), selfishness, divisions (dissensions), party spirit (factions, sects with peculiar opinions, heresies); Envy, drunkness, carousing, and the like. I warn you beforhand, just as I did previously, that those who do such things shall not inhert the kingdom of God." Gal. 19-21. (Amplified Translation.)

There is also a positive side of the Christian life and it is set forth in the next verses after the above. "But the fruit of the (Holy) Spirit, (the work which His presence within accomplishes) is love, joy (gladness), peace, patience (an even temper, forbearance), kindness, goodness (benevolence), faithfulness; (Meekness, humility) gentleness, self-control (self-restraint, continence). Against such things there is no law (that can bring charge). And those who belong to Christ Jesus, the Messiah, have crucified the flesh -the Godless human nature-with its passions and appetities and desires. Gal. 5:22-24 (Amplified Translation).

Yes, there are many steps after the first step. And each of them should be so directed "That ye would walk worthy of God, who hath called you into his kingdom and glory." I Thess, 2:12.


