Son Should Regulate His Own Date Hours

Dear Mrs. Lawrence: Our college student son has started dating a girl who keeps him out until 3 and 4 a.m. over weekends. He is showing the strain of these late hours. What feeling for him can this girl have to be so inconsiderate? But he just gets wild if I say a word about her. What am I supposed to do — just stand around and watch him have a breakdown? I've thought of telephoning this girl and...

Answer: Why are you making her responsible for your son's late hours? He's a big boy now. He doesn't have to stay out until 4 a.m. if he does not choose to.

If you cannot face your son's responsibility for his failure in self-consideration, you'd better ask his father to put limits on your youngster's night life which he can't put on it himself.

The fact that you've chosen to blame this girl for your son's late hours should interest you because it accounts for the intensity of his attachment to her. By blaming her for his decision to stay out, you have betrayed your own view of him as a choiceless puppet — a thing anyone can manipulate by picking up its strings.

No wonder he gets "wild" when you criticize his girl for "keeping" him out until 4 a.m. Your criticism eliminates him as a person capable of any choice of his own. It tells him

that you regard him as susceptible to the influence of anyone who chooses to make his choices for him. This suggestion is terrifying to all adolescent people, involved as they are in the struggle to develop confidence in their own choices and decisions.

You've compelled him to defend the girl, not because he feels any special loyalty or admiration of her, but because he feels obliged to tell you that you can't dictate his choices and decisions to him any more.

There comes a point in the development of sons when resistance to the dictatorship of mothers becomes a matter of masculine honor. That is the point which, I suspect, your son has reached.

It's time for you to retire from opposition to him. If he is to learn better responsibility to the job he has undertaken to do, it is his father, not you, who is qualified to put him straight.

Neat Trick Helps Keep Track of Coupons

DEAR POLLY — I could never keep track of the coupons I clipped from the paper or that came in the mail until I started to use a discarded wallet. 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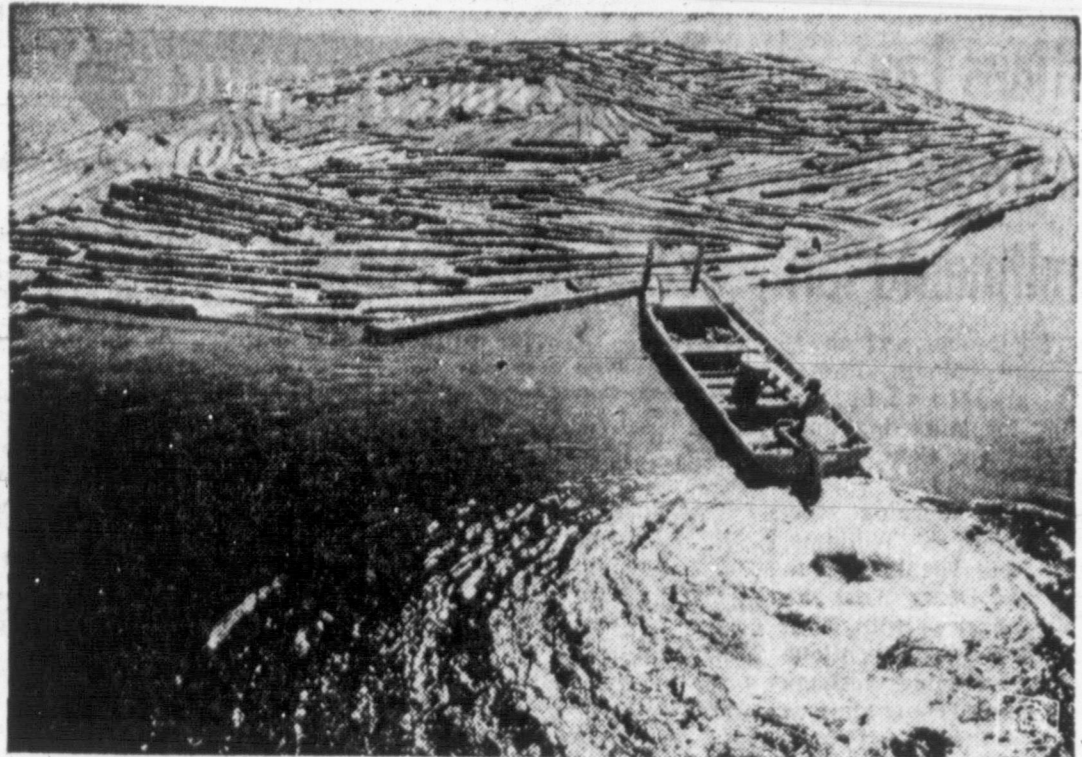

Ford and Union Agree to New Contract, Averting Walkout

DETROIT (UPI)—Ford Motor Co., and the United Auto Workers Union today agreed in principle on a new three-year contract calling for improved retirement benefits at \$400 a month at age 60, improved working conditions and wage increases.

The agreement was announced only 55 minutes before 130,000 Ford workers were scheduled to strike.

The settlement basically followed the pattern of the 54-cent-an-hour package CAW won last week from Chrysler.

Malcolm L. Denise, Ford labor relations vice president, said in a prepared statement, "the agreement provides for wage and benefit increases closely comparable to those already agreed upon by Chrysler Corp., and the union. It there-

Crackdown on Crime Urged in Conference

AUSTIN (Sp1) — In a speech to the annual Attorney General's Law Enforcement Conference in Austin today, Attorney General Waggoner Carr told the group that "It is time we became concerned over the rights of our law-abiding citizens as we are about the rights of the convicted. It is time we 'cracked down' on the lawless and give real meaning to the term 'crime doesn't pay'."

Carr outlined an 8-point program to accomplish this and asked the officials to take the ideas home for study and local useage.

Warning Given in Lefors on Poison

LEFORS (Sp1) — A rash of dog poisoning in Lefors has prompted Mayor Leonard Cain to issue a warning to residents to refrain from the practice.

Several dogs have been poisoned in Lefors during the past week, including two last night.

Cain said he doesn't know how the dogs are being poisoned and is afraid if the practice continues that a child might accidentally come in contact with the poison.

Cain asked that anyone in Lefors who has a complaint against a dog to either come before the city commission or go to the dog owner.

Trio Accused of Using State Press In Counterfeiting

LITTLE ROCK (UPI)—Four men, including three highway department employees, were arrested Thursday night and charged with counterfeiting money on state printing presses.

Leroy Letter, secret service agent in charge, said the money was distributed among the men. He declined comment on whether any of the money was passed.

The three highway department employees are Donald B. Aley, 30, David Lee Johnson, 23, and Robert Wayne Allen, 19, all of Little Rock.

James Harold Dicus, 24, also of Little Rock, was charged with possession of counterfeit money.

Prosecutor John Jernigan said state officers were tipped about the operation and began an investigation with the help of the Secret Service.

Letter said the money, 150 bills in \$1 and \$10 denominations, was recovered and appeared to be the entire output. A highway department spokesman said the men worked as technicians for the department and used its equipment to make the bills.

FFC Decision Could Affect Gas Rates

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Experts say that a revolutionary decision by a Federal Power Commission examiner ultimately could affect the gas bills of more than 35 million consumers.

But they are unable to predict whether the decision's impact on consumers would be favorable or unfavorable.

The ruling, which is subject to commission approval, was handed down Thursday by FPC examiner Seymour Wenner. It concerned federal regulation of prices paid to producers of natural gas in the Permian Basin.

Wenner said there should be a two-price system designed to speed the search for new sources of gas. He also proposed that about 4,500 small producers now subject to FPC jurisdiction be freed of government controls. This would leave about 100 major companies under regulation.

Price Says Rights Bill Was Coverup For Power Grab

CHILDRESS (Sp1) — Bob Price, Republican candidate for Congress, at his Childress County kickoff rally here Thursday evening, blamed "lack of moral leadership in our national government for the occurrence of racial violence and for our fast rising crime rate."

Price lashed out at "political machinations" by the Democratic administration in the field of civil rights. Price charged that the civil rights bill of 1964 was a "cover-up by the Democrats for the biggest grab for power by the federal government in the history of our nation."

"Fair and equal treatment of all citizens will only be obtained through the efforts of men of good will, both white and colored," he said. Price declared that "Senator Barry Goldwater will restore moral leadership to the White House and will end the political hypocrisy now coming out of Washington."

Thursday afternoon Price attended a coffee in his honor at Matador. This afternoon he was to attend a coffee in Turkey and tonight will attend his Hall County kickoff rally at 8 p.m. in Memphis.

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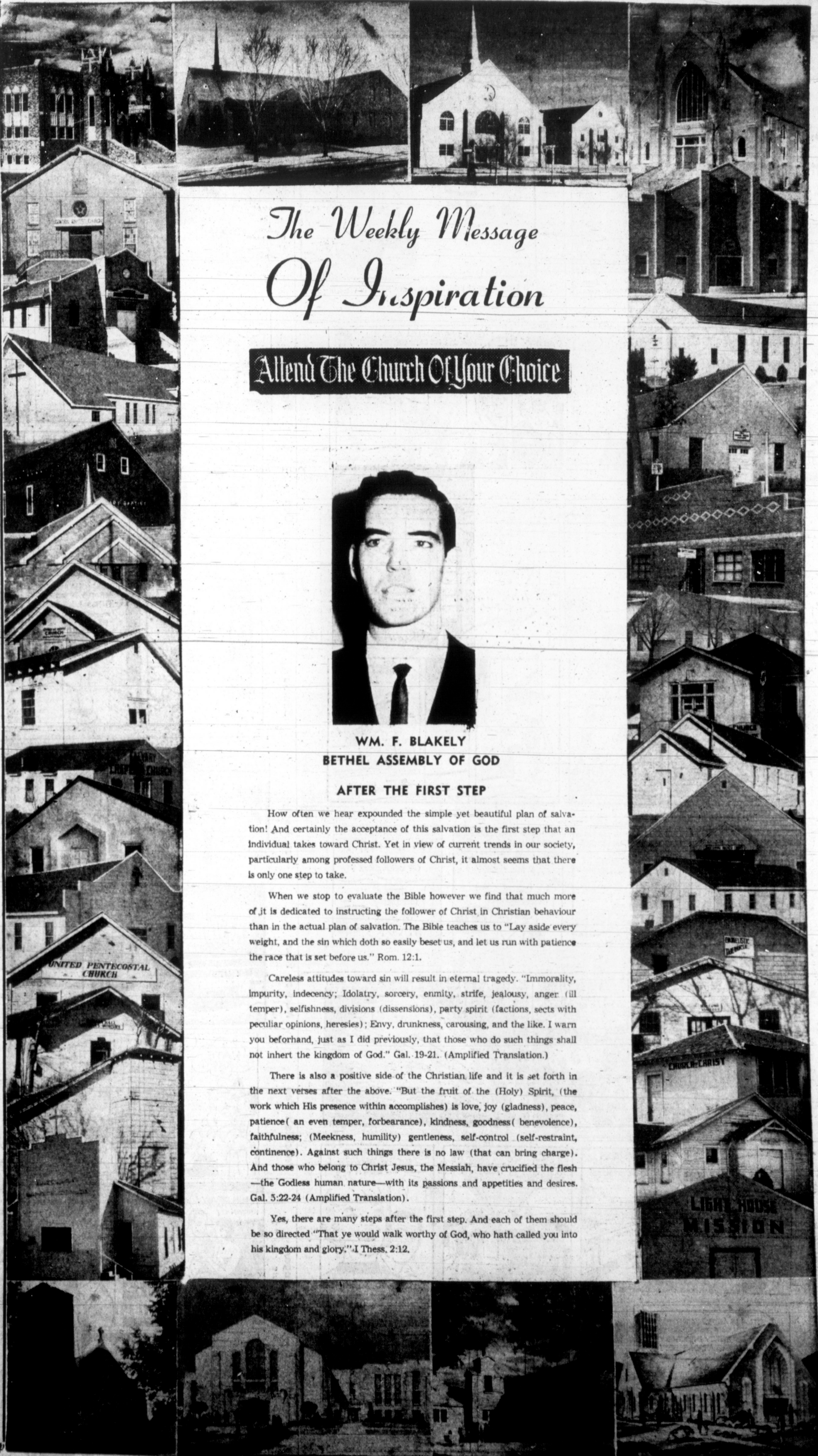

AFTER THE FIRST STEP

How often we hear expounded the simple yet beautiful plan of salvation! And certainly the acceptance of this salvation is the first step that an individual takes toward Christ. Yet in view of current trends in our society, particularly among professed followers of Christ, it almost seems that there is only one step to take.

When we stop to evaluate the Bible however we find that much more of it is dedicated to instructing the follower of Christ in Christian behaviour than in the actual plan of salvation. The Bible teaches us to "Lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us." Rom. 12:1.

Careless attitudes toward sin will result in eternal tragedy. "Immorality, impurity, indecency; Idolatry, sorcery, enmity, strife, jealousy, anger (ill temper), selfishness, divisions (dissensions), party spirit (factions, sects with peculiar opinions, heresies); Envy, drunkenness, carousing, and the like. I warn you beforehand, just as I did previously, that those who do such things shall not inherit the kingdom of God." Gal. 19-21. (Amplified Translation.)

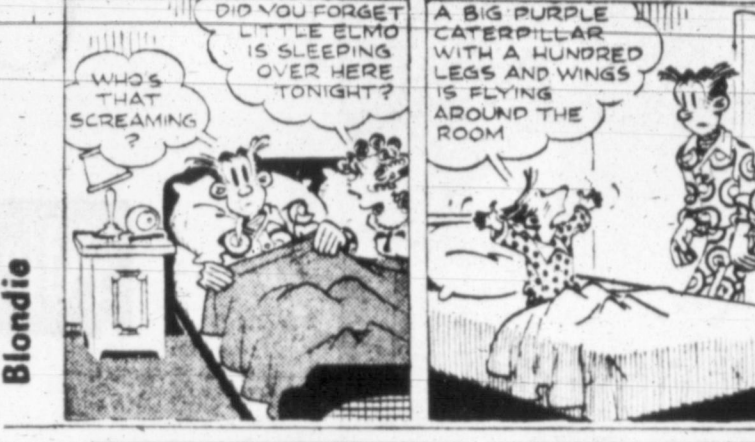
There is also a positive side of the Christian life and it is set forth in the next verses after the above. "But the fruit of the (Holy) Spirit, (the work which His presence within accomplishes) is love, joy (gladness), peace, patience (an even temper, forbearance), kindness, goodness (benevolence), faithfulness; (Meekness, humility) gentleness, self-control (self-restraint, continence). Clayton Husted, Gray County GOP executive chairman, said today Mrs. Tom Snow is doing her bit to add to the campaign fund.

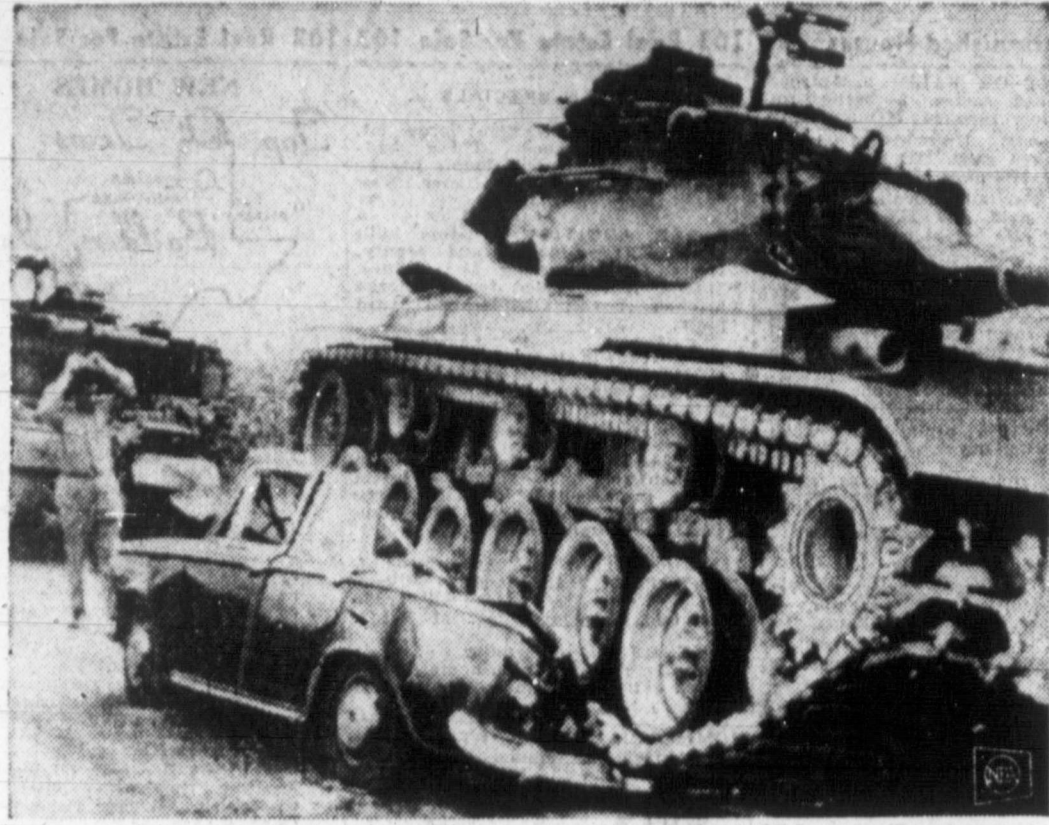

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Total output of the nation's factories, mines and utilities rose in August for the 12th consecutive month, according to figures of the Federal Reserve Board.

The move upwards was spread fairly evenly among all sectors of the economy in both durable and soft goods. Government economists are understood to see no change in the improving pattern in the months ahead.

DETROIT — New car sales in the first 10 days of this month climbed 16 per cent to 16,865 units a day from 14,548 units during the same span a year ago. Ford's daily rate spurred 53 per cent; General Motors' 32 per cent and Chrysler's 13 per cent. American Motors' sales dipped to 921 a day from 1,033.

COLUMBUS, Ga. (UPI) — George Walton, in federal court on a charge of moonshining, explained Wednesday that he suffered from arthritis and liked to take an occasional nip for relief.

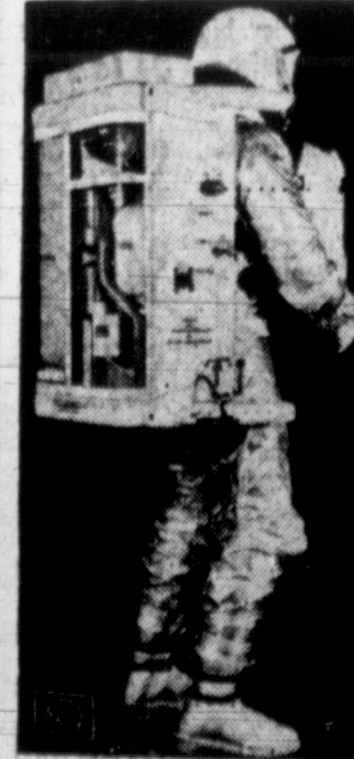
