# IRS Makes It Easier to Figure Income Tax

WASHINGTON (UPI)-Cheer up, taxpayers. The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) says it is going to be easier to figure out how big an income tax bill you owe the government.

IRS officials Thursday unveiled a new and simplified version of the form 1040 which many persons use to compute their income tax. It will go out to taxpayers about Jan. 1 for filing returns on income earned

changes made by the revenue act of 1964, which reduced income taxes \$11.5 billion and made 40 other changes in the tax law

Officials also said the new form will be easier to fill out, enabling about 22 million taxpayers to use only a single sheet to figure their tax. They said an additional 22 million were expected to use the card form 1040A.

63 Million Returns A total of 63 million returns

is expected to be filed before the April 15 deadline next year, the IRS said.

It said the face-lifting of the 1040 form was the biggest it has undergone in the last 10 years. The major changes are:

-Four million taxpayers with dividend and interest income will not have to file a separate "Schedule B." A space for this will be provided on the front of the new sheet.

-Taxpayers will list their exemptions on the front of the

sheet instead of page two. Children will not have to be listed by name.

-Single line summaries will replace some of the detailed accounting now required on the face of the return.

-The taxpayer will sign his name on page one. The IRS said that many persons forgot to sign when the space was on the second page.

-The form has been revised for the new minimum standard deduction provided in the 1964 New Deductions

The standard deduction is taken by those taxpayers who do not itemize their deductions. Under the old law, the minimum standard deduction was 10 per cent for all taxpayers. The 1964 law set a \$200 "floor" on this for lower income groups, giving them a slightly

ceived the standard 10 per cent, or \$150. Now, this person receives the minimum \$200 standard deduction plus \$100 for each exemption. This credit for each exemption is in addi-

tion to the \$600 he receives for

each dependent in the other

section of his form. The instructions will contain extra tables to help taxpayers make a choice between the new minimum standard deduction and the regular standard deduction. Taxpayers still will be

able to itemize deductions they wish.

Another innovation of many of the tax returns sent out by the IRS next year will be prestamped names, addresses and IRS account numbers. The 1040A has carried this preprinted identification for several years.

The government Printing Office expects to take 10 weeks to run off the new forms and their instructions. The job will take 8.5 million pounds of paper and 70,000 pounds of ink.



#### LIFT UP YOUR HEARTS


"Be quick," said the father to his slaves. "And bring out the best garment, and clothe him in it, and put a ring on his finger, and sandals on his feet; and fetch the calf that we fattened, and kill it, and let us feast and have a merry time. For the son of men was dead, and has come to life, he was lost, and is found!" They accordingly began to be merry.

Luke 15, 22 - 25

The parable of the Prodigal Son is said to be the "master" page of the Holy Book, the chief work of the inspired scriptures. In it, more than any other, we see manifested the love and mercy of our Heavenly Father for repentant sinners. Here is not a question of an irrational animal, or of an inanimate piece of jewelry that has been lost and found, but of a child that has deliberately turned his back on his father and home, and yet when repentant, has been welcomed in return with greater expression of love and tenderness than if he had never done any wrong or gone away at all,

Despite the story of the Prodigal, many still fear the fatherhood of God. They will not take it literally and must always see it as but a pale reproduction of the love between a human father and his boy. It takes humility to accept one's weakness and to believe that God loves us as we are. God made us out of nothing presumably he made us to his taste.

Many of us will find that the bulk of our unconscious worries stem from a wrong approach to God. Some accept no God at all and there can be no lasting answer to their fretting; they are orphans in two worlds. Others admit a God but see him thundering on Mt. Sinai and are rightly terrified. Fear and guilt drain all the joy from many lives. The salutary fear of God is based on our nothingness and his power, not our sinfulness and his petulant wrath. The strange fact is that even those who know this truth and love God as a father yet retain a prim image of what an Eternal Father ought to be. And what father would like his children to judge him only on his threats. So lift up your hearts!



## The Laetrile Story

none of this money has been spent to investigate the Unitarian Thesis, yet both agencies have dismissed the theory without scientific explanation.

In 1950, Ernst T. Krebs Jr., a San Francisco biochemist, his physician father and Howard H. Beard, a biochemist of Fort Worth, Tex., published in Medical Record a scientific paper outlining the Unitarian or Trophoblastic Thesis of Cancer. They awaited the judgment of the men of medi-

It is traditional in medicine that any faulty theory be quickly pounced upon by those who have the scientific evidence to refute it.

No refutation has come in the 14 years since the Krebs paper was published. But the thesis, unchallenged on scientific grounds, has been held in check by the most punishing of political weapons. . .

Like most of medicine's multi-syllable words, trophoblast is a foreign term to laymen. By definition, it is the most primitive cell in the life cycle. Its sole function in the normal development of life is to prepare the wall of the womb for the attachment and nourishment of the embryo which is to become a new life.

This erosive action against the uterine wall begins following fertilization or union of the female egg and male sperm to form a single cell. This single cell divides with production of trophoblast cells which multiply rapidly.

In the normal function of the human body, enzymes from the mother and from the embryo destroy the trophoblast once it has completed its assigned task. The embryo then continues the life cycle and progresses to the birth of the child.

Pregnancy trophoblast gives off a hormone known as chorionic gonadotrophin, passed from the body in urine. It is detected in urine specimens and its presence confirms the fact of pregnancy.

The Unitarian or Trophoblastic Thesis of Cancer holds that trophoblast can also arise in either male or female individuals without fertilization of an ovum (egg). It holds that trophoblast is created when certain cells are caused to divide by chemical action (the inflammation caused by tobacco tars or by viruses, for example.)

As the germ cells in the body are caused to divide, trophoblast is created. The body's enzymes normally will destroy th's invasive agent, and life will continue without unusual symptoms. Where there is enzymic in-

suffiency of the trophoblast killers, the invasive cells are permitted to multiply and the malignancy known as cancer can develop. The medical revolutionaries
