GOP Campaign Efforts Focused On Texas Today

Washington Rumor Turned Into Fact by Jenkins' Resignation

Texas, a pivotal state in November's election, was the focus of the Republican campaign effort today. Sen. Barry Goldwater was in the state, talking about what he called President Johnson's efforts "to cover up one of the sorriest rumors we have ever had in the nation's capital."

Goldwater said he was referring to the Bobby Baker case, but a Washington rumor that turned into fact Wednesday was the one about Walter Jenkins, the President's confidant, who quit when reports of his two arrests on morals charges became known.

Jenkins, a native of Jolly, Tex., was replaced by Bill Meyers, a 30-year-old Hugo, Okla., native who attended the University of Texas.

LBJ CHALLENGED TO GIVE FACTS IN JENKINS CASE

American, German Split Nobel Prize

STOCKHOLM (UPI) — A Harvard University professor and a German chemist today won the 1964 Nobel Medicine Prize for their research into the mysteries of cholesterol which medical science has labeled the villain of heart disease.

The joint winners of the prize for medicine or physiology are Prof. Konrad Bloch, a biochemist at Harvard, and Prof. Feodor Lynen, of the Max-Planck Institute in Munich.
Medical experts said their discoveries may prolong the life of man.

In making the award, the Nobel committee hailed the impact of their research on circulatory diseases which "are the foremost cause of death in many areas of the world." The battle against these diseases will rest upon the work of the two men, the committee said.

Will Share Prize

The two professors will share the \$52,500 prize that will be presented here on Dec. 10 by Swedish King Gustaf VI Adolf. At Cambridge, Mass., Bloch, said he was "surprised and pleased."

In Harvard's Conant laboratory students and teachers swarmed around the Nobel winner giving him hugs, kisses, and handshakes.

Bloch said he didn't know what he would do with his share of the prize money. He added that he planned to continue his attempts to clarify the processes by which the substances such as cholesterol are produced by animal cells from precursors such as acetic acid.

At the time the award was announced Lynen was en route from Hamburg to Munich in his automobile and could not be reached at once for comment. But his secretary said he had been hoping for a Nobel prize for the past six or eight years.

GOP Cites 'Grave Questions'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Republican national Chairman Dean Burch challenged President Johnson today to make full public disclosure of what he called the "Walter Jenkins episode."
Burch read a statement to newsmen after it had been disclosed that Jenkins had resigned as special assistant to the President following his recent arrest on a morals charge. The longtime aide to the President was arrested on a similar charge in 1959, Washington police records showed.

"The Walter Jenkins episode raises grave questions which only the President can — and must — answer," Burch said. "The story up to now is only partially revealed."

"President Johnson, who talks about responsibility, now has the responsibility to explain why he covered up for five — and a — half years — since Jan. 15, 1959 — that his top aide had been arrested on a similar perversion charge."

"Knowing, as he must, the vulnerability of morals offenders to blackmail, the President should tell us whether Mr. Jenkins was permitted to sit in on meetings of the National Security Council, meetings of the cabinet and otherwise was given access to top military secrets."

Burch said he had been informed that the President had obtained national network time to speak at 9 p.m. EDT tonight. He said he assumed Johnson would "give us the full story at that time."

(The television address by President Johnson had been scheduled prior to disclosure of the Jenkins arrest. It had been reported that the paid political telecast would deal with the nuclear test ban treaty.)

The resignation of Jenkins was announced Wednesday night by White House Press Secretary George E. Reedy in New York where the President is campaigning.

Dog's Life Will Be Better Now In Pampa Pound

Things are looking up for Pampa's canine prisoners at the city dog pound.
Stray pooches picked up by the dog warden will be housed in more sanitary conditions and have more comfort while they wait for their owners to spring them or sit out the waiting period before that "last mile" to the gas chamber.

City Manager Harold Schmitzer said today a new concrete floor with drainage has been installed so the kennels can be washed out daily. Plywood siding has been put up and new kennels have been built inside the enclosure.

"We even have installed a big electric light to keep it warmer for the dogs," Schmitzer said.

The improvements were made, the city manager said, after several complaints that they were needed to provide more humane treatment for the dogs.

City Gets Deed For Park Area

Prairie Village Park now is legally the property of the City of Pampa.
The 2½-acre site in Prairie Village originally was set out for city use in the original plat for the addition.

However, a deed for the site never had been given to the city. City Attorney Bob Gordon field that the city could not legally keep up the grounds until city ownership was established.

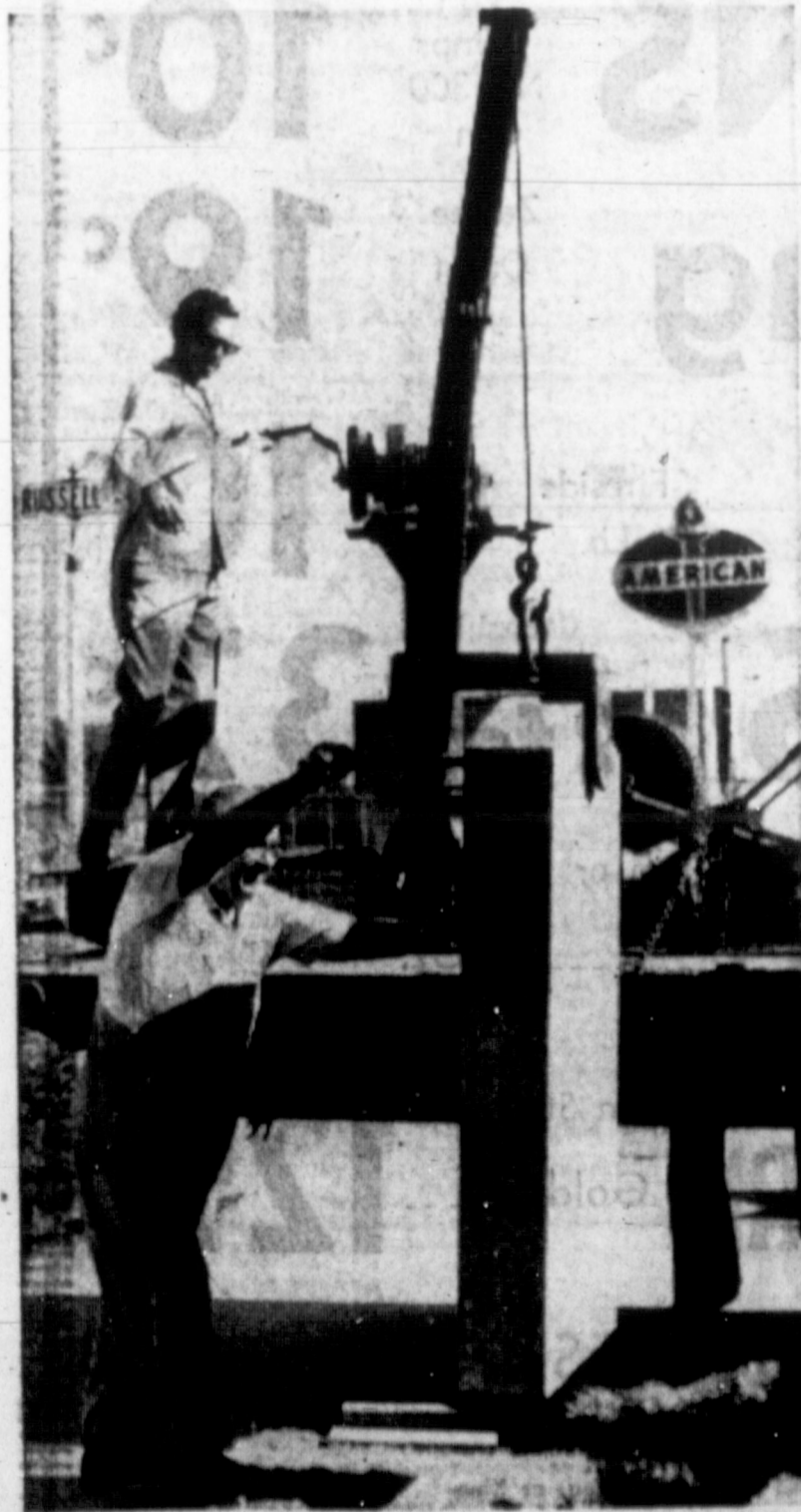
Residents of Prairie Village had complained of the unkempt condition of the park site.

Paper Indicates Red Atom Rocket

MOSCOW (UPI)—Soviet scientists have mastered the principles of building nuclear-powered rockets for flights to other planets, the Communist newspaper Trud said today.

"The work of scientists in this field shows that there are no difficulties in principle for creating such rockets," Trud said. "Only a certain time is required for designing, building and testing."

(UPI correspondent Alvin B. Webb, reporting from the U.S. space center at Houston, said this is believed to be the first time the Russians have let it be known they are working on a nuclear rocket. However, the mastering of principles and the production of such a rocket are two different matters.

(The United States has been working on a nuclear rocket for some time. But because of technical difficulties no launching is expected before 1971, and probably later. The U.S. program is being undertaken at Jackass Flats, Nev., and is primarily concerned with static tests of rocket engines.

Cemetery of War Prisoners Found

WARSAW (UPI) — New mass graves of Poles, Jews, and Italian and French war prisoners killed by the Nazis in 1944 have been discovered near Krakow, the newspaper Zycie Warszawy said Wednesday.

The bodies, excavated in the Neipolomnicki forest, bear gun shot wounds in the back of the head and some skulls are badly broken, probably by rifle butts, the newspaper said.

The number of murdered persons had not been determined and the investigation of the grave site was still in progress. According to preliminary data, hundreds of bodies were buried, the newspaper said.

Lieutenant Credited With Saving 30 Lives

(UPI) — Marine Corps officers credited a California lieutenant with saving 30 Leathernicks when their 40-ton landing craft burst into flames.

Nine Marines were burned seriously in the fire, following an explosion Monday aboard the amphibious landing craft which was carrying them toward a beach in an assault exercise.

The enclosed LVT (landing vehicle track personnel) exploded in flames about 3,000 yards offshore as it approached the beach in the first wave of Exercise Hard Nose.

The blast happened when fuel splashed on the LVT's hot engine as the crew tried to change a filter. It blew a 7 by 10-foot metal hatch off the craft's top deck.

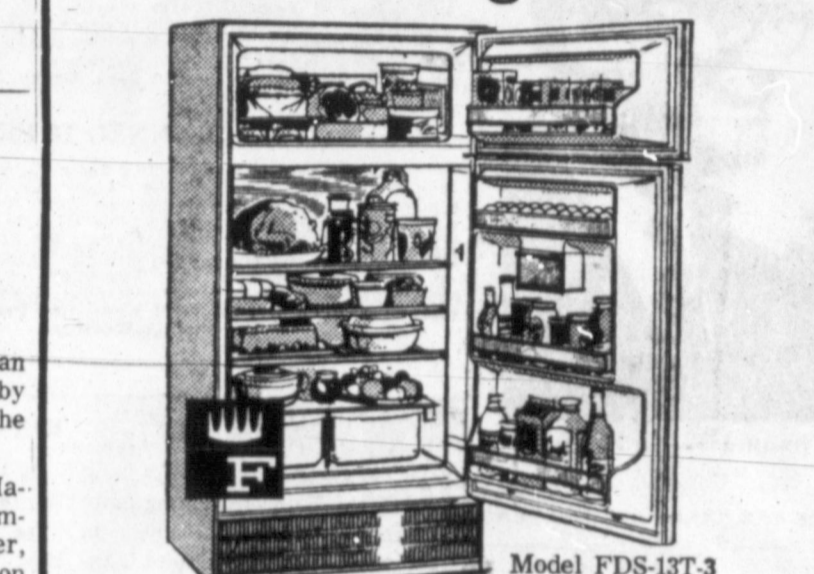

Barry Attacks LBJ On Missile Program

Republican presidential nominee Barry M. Goldwater leveled a broadside attack on President Johnson this week in demanding a "major re-direction" of U. S. space efforts because of Russia's achievement in orbiting a three-passenger spacecraft.

In a speech prepared for delivery at a rally in Topeka, Kan., Goldwater said the military possibilities of space have been "downgraded by this administration as, indeed, has most research into the advanced weapon systems which we so urgently need to keep the peace in the face of Soviet advances scientifically and Soviet threats politically.

"This is a full-time and a full-scale problem requiring immediate attention. We need a major re-direction of our space research efforts. But our part-time president, busy pleasing crowds, has no time to face grim reality or to ask you to join him in facing it," the Arizona senator said.

Elated Over Tour
The President returned to the White House, elated by a 9,998-mile stumping tour which saw him attract record crowds while campaigning on a "peace and prosperity" platform in 14 states. Johnson ended his campaign trip at Boise, Idaho, Monday night, somewhat hoarse from his week on the stump. He resumes campaigning in

New Jersey Wednesday, and plans to go to his home state of Texas for a little politicking this weekend.

At a night rally in Boise, Johnson called his trip "the happiest" anyone has ever had. He said the big crowds he drew reflected the fact that the nation belongs to "responsible Americans."

The President's running mate, Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, headed into New England on a campaign swing with stops scheduled in every state in the area except Rhode Island. His first speech of the day was at Smith College, Northampton, Mass.

Urges Hope
He urged his audience to "re-

judiate the politics of despair and move forward under the banner of hope to the great creative task of building an America worthy of our dreams."

After his Smith speech, Humphrey was to visit Rutland, Vt.; Concord, N.H.; Lewiston-Auburn, Maine, and New Haven, Conn.

Humphrey's opposite number, Rep. William E. Miller, planned to resume his campaign in Pennsylvania after a two-day rest to recuperate from a severe head cold.

United Press International LONDON (UPI) — Russia is pushing a plan for all U.N. members to renounce the use of force for settling territorial and frontier disputes.

Soviet diplomats have hinted strongly Premier Nikita Khrushchev wants to make this one of the key topics in any summit conference with the U. S. president, after the Nov. 3 election.

The Kremlin's eagerness for a world wide pledge against forceful changes of international borders appears to have been motivated at least partly by growing uneasiness that Communist China may one day seek to retrieve some of the vast areas which she claims Russia took from her in the past century.

A Peking reminder that vast stretches of Asian Russia were once Chinese has prompted strong reaction from the Kremlin, which warned Mao Tse-tung's regime bluntly any move against Soviet territory would be met with vigorous resistance.

Reinforcing Frontiers

Recent reports suggested both Russia and China have been reinforcing their frontiers in the Far East. The two Communist giants have a joint 5,000 mile frontier and friction has already occurred in some sectors.

Khrushchev apparently had this potential threat in mind when he circulated some time ago to heads of government a proposal to join Russia in renouncing force for settling territorial disputes. The response was indifferent and the plan forgotten.

Last Month Moscow suddenly revived the plan. This time it sent the proposals to U.N. Secretary General Thant for inclusion on the General Assembly agenda in New York next month.

Warns Of Dangers

An accompanying letter warned that conflicts once started over territorial claims threaten to spread to vast areas of the world, even very remote from their flashpoint and in the final run to overgrow into a world nuclear missile war.

Moscow is now to all appearances most anxious to win backing from the neutral and unaligned nations as a protective world public opinion shield any possible Chinese territorial moves in the future.

That Moscow has China uppermost in mind in pushing this plan has been spotlighted by the lack of Soviet concern for other more immediate and explosive flashpoints. Russia is backing, in principle, Indonesian President Sukarno in his current aggression against Malaysia and is supporting Egypt's arms buildup in full knowledge of Arab desires to clip the frontiers of Israel.

RECOMMENDS DISMISSAL

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A Federal Trade Commission (FTC) examiner Tuesday recommended dismissal of government charges that the Columbia Broadcasting System (CBS) and its subscription record club engaged in unfair practices.

Examiner Donald R. Moore ruled that the "evidence fails to support the allegations." The action is not a final decision of the FTC. It may still be reviewed by the full commission.

In 1962, the FTC charged that CBS and an affiliate, Columbia Record Club, had engaged in monopolistic and unfair practices which led to reduced competition in the record industry.

Figures Will Aid Calorie Counters to Lose Weight

Q—My husband is 27 and a very heavy eater. I think he eats too much, far too many high-calorie foods. About how many calories a day should he eat?

A—The Food and Nutrition Board of the National Academy of Science, in its 1964 Recommended Daily Allowances, recommends about 2,900 calories a day for a moderately active man around 25 years old weighing approximately 154 pounds. This is a reduction of 300 calories from their former recommendations. They seem to believe we are getting too fat.

Q—I want to cut 300 calories a day from my diet. Can you suggest what to cut out?

A—These calorie figures will help you decide where to cut:

Two 3½-ounce Martinis contain 300 calories; 1-3 pint chocolate ice cream contains 200 calories; 1-6 of a 9 - inch cream pie, 299 calories; a chocolate éclair, 316 calories; 1 cup macaroni and mayonnaise salad, 335 calories, and an iced coffee cake, 4½ inches in diameter, 196 calories.

It will interest you to learn that if you cut 500 calories a day from your diet, you can lose one pound a week.

Milk Reduces Radioactivity

Q — Isn't it true that we should not drink milk because it may contain radioactive material?

A — No. In fact, quite the opposite is true. Biochemists at several agricultural experiment stations report that people who don't drink milk have three times more radioactive material in their bones than those who do. Milk is the body's chief source of calcium. When milk is not included in the diet, more strontium - 90 is deposited as a substitute for calcium in the bones, they discovered.

Q — What do the grocery store terms applied to cheese and cheese products really mean?

A — These terms are your clue to how the cheese is made and what's in it.

Here's how you can identify them:

Natural cheese: Cheese in the original sense of the word — Cheddar, Swiss, Muenster, Edam, and so forth — made by curdling or aging to develop flavor.

Pasteurized process cheese: A blend or combination of natural cheeses which have been blended by heating and melting.

Pasteurized process cheese food: A product prepared in much the same manner as process cheese except that it contains less cheese and has non-fat dry milk or whey solids and water added. It may also contain pimiento, fruits, vegetables or meats.

Weight-Control Breakfast Aid In Starting Day Sensible Way

A little "straight talk" about why breakfast is important may be just what teen-agers need from mothers who are fed up with nagging them for skipping breakfast.

Sometimes their excuse is "no time," due to oversleeping. With others, it is because of lengthy primping. And, still others have the mistaken notion that they will get fat or develop skin blemishes if they eat breakfast.

Well, breakfast is no meal to omit. Surveys show that this meal is essential to get teens off to a good start in the morning. Scientific breakfast studies at the State University of Iowa demonstrated that a basic breakfast built around cereal and milk provides quick and lasting energy throughout the morning. It is also a good source of many nutrients.

This practical weight-control breakfast of about 500 calories is planned around cereal and milk. It is designed to enable teen-agers to start their day the sensible way.

1 ounce oven-toasted rice ce-

- 5 slices fresh or canned peaches
- 1 cup nonfat milk (for cereal and beverage)
- 2 slices enriched raisin toast
- 1 teaspoon butter
- 1 teaspoon sugar

An insecticide may not be necessary to rid house plants of insects and other pests.  its founder. "This is simply because the Communists in Washington planned it that way."
 Welch made the statement in the course of a two-day speech which he estimates he had delivered 29 times.

In its printed form, it is the famous "Blue Book," which contains Welch's analysis of the Communist threat to America. He believes it is wholly internal, from domestic Communists.

Welch explains that John Birch was a Christian missionary in China who was killed by the Chinese Communists 10 days after V-J Day.

First Casualty

"He thus became probably the first American casualty in

that third world war, between the Communists and the ever-shrinking 'free world,' which is still being waged against us," Welch says.

"His heroism, accomplishments and nobility of character were to make him a legend which the Communists could not allow to live," Welch adds. And he charges it required five years of effort "to pierce the blanket of oblivion which had been so brazenly thrown over his life and death by Communist sympathizers in our government."

The 11 businessmen from nine states who heard Welch tell about John Birch and the Communist conspiracy in the Indianapolis hotel agreed to join with him and formed the society.

Welch says chapters exist in all the states except Alaska and Hawaii.

Nothing about Robert Welch suggests zealotry. He has said "the secret Communist looks and acts just like anybody else only more so" and he, too, looks like anybody else.

Quick To Anger

He is a short, white-haired, soft-spoken man, a lover of practical jokes, sometimes quick to anger, a nervous pub-

lic speaker. He is a native of North Carolina, a product of that state's university and of Harvard and the U.S. Naval Academy, a former vice president of the National Association of Manufacturers, a resident of the well-to-do Boston suburb of Belmont. He was born in 1899.

In the 1940's he became alarmed over the spread of communism and socialism. He visited England in 1948 to study its socialist government. He made a month-long trip around the world in 1949. He visited President Syngman Rhee of Korea and President Chiang Kai-shek of Nationalist China in 1955. Chancellor Konrad Adenauer of Germany in 1956. He decided to devote the rest of his life to fighting communism. His associates say he devotes 18 hours a day to that cause.

Welch made it clear at the beginning that the society would be monolithic. "No collection of debating societies is ever going to stop the Communist conspiracy from taking us over," he said.

He estimated five million Americans were supporting "ineffective" anti-Communist groups.

Could Win Battle

He said he could win the battle with communism "if I could coordinate the activities of those million men and women with some degree of positiveness and efficiency approaching the coordination by the communists of their members and fellow-travelers..."

The society retains the structure Welch outlined. There are no other national officers and no elections. There is no accounting of funds to members. And while its goal is 1,000,000 members, it declines to say how many members it does have.

A "council" of 30 members or fewer exists, its chief purpose to advise Welch and to pick his successor in event of his death. Paid and volunteer "coordinators" recruit members. Local and national "endorsers" lend their names to the society, but are not necessarily members.

Dues are \$24 for men, \$12 for women, a year. A life membership costs \$1,000.

Members are organized in chapters of 10 to 20 persons. A community can have any number of chapters. The society is said to be strongest in Texas, California and Ohio and weakest in the East.

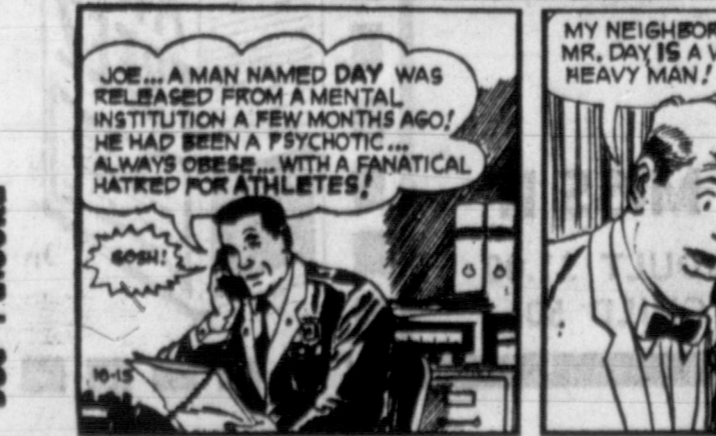

Al Oerter Wins Discus, U.S. Upsets In Rowing

TOKYO (UPI) — Massive Al Oerter of West Babylon, N. Y., won his third straight Olympic gold medal in the discus throw today and the United States regained world supremacy in the 100 meter dash and eight-oared rowing.

Big Bob Hayes of Florida A&M, wearing borrowed shoes, tied the world record of 10 seconds flat as he blazed to his long expected 100 meter triumph but the rowing success was a shocker.

Philadelphia's Vesper Boat Club eight, a hybrid crew put together less than a month before last summer's team tryouts, swept through almost total darkness with an ever-increasing lead to knock off Germany's defending champions, Czechoslovakia finished third.

An American pair-with-coxswain, with Ed Ferry of Seattle and Conn Findlay of Belmont, Calif., manning the oars, also won a gold medal. U.S. double scullers won a silver medal and

four-with-coxswain finished third for a bronze medal. Wins Rifle Competition Gary Lee Anderson, a divinity student from Hastings, Neb., gave the U.S. a gold medal in the 300 meter free rifle competition with a world record score of 1,153 points and Leslie YBush of Princeton, N.J., provided the sixth gold medal of the day with an upset in the high dive.

Miss Bush defeated Germany's Ingrid Kramer, who won both the platform and springboard events in 1960 and the 1964 springboard earlier in these games.

Oerter, a teen-ager at the University of Kansas when he won his first Olympic crown at Melbourne in 1956, fired the discus to an Olympic record of 200 feet, 1.63 inches Nov. 28, the 265-pound employe of an aircraft plant made his record toss on the fifth of six throws.

Oerter outclassed a feared competitor, Ludvik Danek of Czechoslovakia, who finished second with 198.6. Dave Weill of Walnut Creek, Calif., gave the U.S. a bronze medal at 195 feet even.

Hayes, a 190 pounder with brilliant starting speed to go with his raw power, won by three yards over Cuba's Enrique Figuerola with Canada's Harry Jerome third by inches.

Mother Watching Looking on were big Rob's mother, 1936 Olympic ace Jesse Owens and Germany's Armin Hary, whose victory at Rome shattered a string of five straight victories by American dash men.

Hayes, who forgot his shoes and had to borrow a pair from teammate Tom Farrell, flashed to a 9.9 second qualifying heat but the time was disallowed because of an excess following wind.

Then in the final, with the wind abated, he barreled down the red composition track before a crowd of 72,000 in National Stadium and led all the way with a clocking of 10 flat—equaling the world mark shared by Hary and Canada's Jerome.

The Vesper crew, which had to work its way to the finals through a "second chance" heat after losing its first race,

ST. LOUIS (UPI)—The New York Yankees send a comparative boy — rookie righthander Mel Stottlemyre — out to do a man's job against the St. Louis Cardinals today in the decisive seventh game of the 1964 World Series.

Raw power was the story of the sixth game of the 1964 World Series as the New York Yankees stretched it to its seven-game limit with an 8-3 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals.

That old Yankee home run trade mark — missing in earlier games of this series — was in evidence as Roger Maris, Mickey Mantle and Joe Pepitone connected to pave the way for Jim Bouton to win his second game of the series and square the classic at three victories each after six games.

The homers by Maris and Mantle — only the fourth time in series history that batters have hit consecutive homers — came with one out in the sixth inning while 35-year-old Curt Simmons was battling young Bouton pitch for pitch.

Maris' homer broke a 1-1 tie and then Mantle followed on the next pitch to make the score 3-1.

Plenty Of Cushion
The Yankees gave 25-year-old those wins, it might help us all the way through."

It was the second victory of this series for Bouton, who won 18 games for the Yankees during the American League season. The loss went to Simmons, an 18-game winner, who pitched beautifully against the Yankees until the M&M bomb went off in the sixth.

Take Brief Lead
The Cardinals staked Simmons to a run in the first inning on singles by Flood and Lou Brock and Bill White's infield double play. Simmons shut out the Yankees until the fifth when Tom Tresh doubled and scored the tying run on Bouton's line single to left center field.

Phil Linz led off the eighth with a single for the Yankees, moved to second on a sacrifice and to third on an infield out. Mantle was purposely passed but Elston Howard singled for one run and Tom Tresh walked to load 'em up again. That ended Schultz' tour on the mound and brought in Richardson.

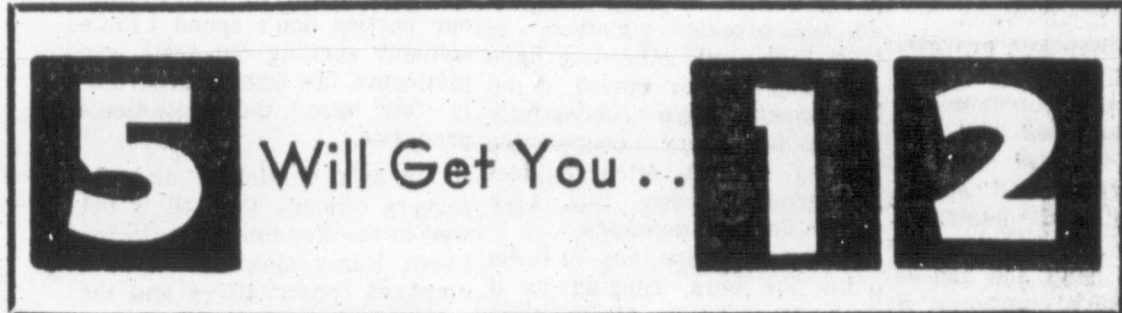

National Newspaper Week

National Newspaper Week is being observed this week. And when, during these days, editors risk the appearance of immodesty by blowing their own horns, they have a right and an obligation to do just that.

The local newspaper provides a service that is unique, irreplaceable, and a fundamental part of our national life. Its pages tell an endless story of the events, great and small, that influence and determine the destinies of each of us. There is good news and bad — but, whatever it's character, it is part of the scheme of things. Only the newspaper can adequately record it — and keep it as history in the ever-growing files of past issues.

Beyond this, there is no freedom more vital than that of

freedom of the press. A good newspaper is, in a sense, a watchdog of the public. It stands for integrity and fair dealing in public and private affairs. Newspapers, on innumerable occasions, have unearthed and revealed violations of trust that would otherwise have remained forever buried. And newspapers have successfully fought for every conceivable kind of reform, often against disheartening odds, that the public interest demands.

No other nation has a press quite like ours, ranging as it does from great metropolitan dailies down to the smallest of the country weeklies. Every one of our thousands of papers, each working in its own special way, is a vital part of the great edifice of freedom on which this country rests.

Trouble in Paradise

Sweden, a highly developed nation of about as many souls as live in Metropolitan New York City, long has been held up by our collectivist thinkers as an example for the United States. We were told that it is the best — tube experiment in social planning could be applied to the giant U. S., and then we should all be as happy as kings.

Naturally, more people have therefore watched Sweden's progress than would normally keep an eye on such a small country. Her every success has been noted, and they have been considerable. Now some failures are coming to light.

The Socialists have won every election since 1932, and each time the welfare state has been expanded. Now the results are becoming apparent. Inflation has trimmed exports in relation to imports. Budget deficits threaten more inflation. Unem-

ployment, a strange word to a whole generation of Swedes, has begun to appear.

The Danes, who embarked on a similar system about the same time, have experienced the same symptoms, and upset their government.

France, which didn't quite go the whole welfare state way, never-the-less is faced with the impending bankruptcy or radical revision of its social security system, depleted through medical payments.

In this light, it's hard to shed too many tears over the demise of Medicare in the rush of the U. S. Congress to get home and campaign. Perhaps more of our citizens will observe the handwriting on those European walls — between now and next time Congress meets, so that this poor and misrepresented bill can be buried for all time.

Oil Industry Has the Answer

It is confidently anticipated that during the last 40 years of this century more fossil fuels will be consumed than in all the previous 7,000 years of recorded history. While world population will somewhat more than double by the year 2000, energy consumption is expected to rise five times. How can that incredible demand be met? The oil industry has a two-pronged answer.

First, huge new petroleum deposits must be found. And the people are finding them — not only under the ground, but beneath the sea. The costs of finding grow steadily greater due to a variety of factors. Wells must be sunk deeper and deeper, and this sends the bill skyrocketing. The cost of offshore drilling, with all the special problems that involves, is espe-

cially great. But we need have no fear that the risks will not be taken and willingly. They will be — so long as the oil men can work in an economic climate which guarantees them the right to gain a fair profit when they are successful.

The other part of the answer is found in what is known as secondary recovery. This dramatically increases the amount of oil and gas that can be obtained from the wells. Natural forces allow production of only about 25 per cent of a reservoir's contents. But, by introducing certain liquids or gases into producing reservoirs, the percentage can be doubled and, at times, even tripled. The industry's record of innovation and technological progress is the best evidence that any demand can be met.

A Must

It is virtually certain that federal tax cuts will come next year. Both the presidential candidates promise that, though their programs differ in detail and method. So do both the platforms. And Congress will undoubtedly be in a receptive mood.

Just how big and extensive the cuts will be, of course an unanswerable question now. But there is one important area where the consumer seems sure of long-overdue relief. That is the area of excise taxes which were imposed in wartime not only to produce revenue, but to deter buying of alleged "luxury" goods. Everyone supposed these levies would be sent into the discard once the war ended. But they are still on the books.

That amounted to breaking a

promise. Beyond that, many of the taxes apply to articles which cannot honestly be called luxuries in a society such as ours. They include such universally used commodities as cosmetics, perfume, leather goods, luggage, costume jewelry and so on. The taxes add materially to the prices the consumer must pay, and they are a financial burden on the retailers.

The remaining question seems to be whether these taxes will be eliminated or merely reduced. The latter step would be an inadequate reform. There certainly is no need now to deter the purchasing of anything in indeed, the whole policy of government is to stimulate investment, business expansion and consumer spending. Absolute and final repeal of the excises should be one of next year's legislative "musts".

Works Like A Charm

In his triumphal visit to El Paso and the ceremonial meeting with Mexican President Adolfo Lopez Mateos solemnizing solution of the 100-year-old Chamizal boundary dispute, President Johnson said:

"Let Chamizal stand as a symbol to all the world that the most troublesome of problems can yield to the tools of peace."

And we are sure it will. We are confident that the Chamizal formula cannot miss anywhere. All you need to do is give the other fellow all he asks for.

And for good measure — and so there can be no local friction — pay your own nationals to move out of the real estate they foolishly thought was theirs.

And, presto, there's peace!

WASHINGTON:

Want 'Real' Dope? Tune Red Radio

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Russian commentators, undaunted by distance from the scene, are busy trying to figure out the American presidential election.

But there's this "thought gap," and it seems to be worse than language differences.

To illustrate, let's have a look at the notions tossed out at a Moscow radio roundtable discussion, with translations provided by official U. S. sources.

JUST FOR OPENERS, Russia's Walter Cronkite and Chet Huntley seem to believe that our parties don't spend time selfishly spelling out their own platforms, but instead generously "lay bare" the opposition's proposals.

Our own politicians and observers concede that all is not well in the Republican party between Barry Goldwater's triumphant conservatives and the vanquished moderates.

But it will be news to New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller, Michigan Gov. George Romney and other still-established state leaders that "liberal-minded elements are being expelled from the party and their places taken by aggressive-minded persons from among Goldwater's supporters."

The Russian chap who offered that one is accustomed to the Communist party's ruthless expulsions and assume we play, the same way.

THE MOSCOW COMMENTATORS understand well enough that Goldwater hopes to achieve victory by taking California, Texas, Illinois, Ohio, Indiana, and a number of other southern and western states.

One Leonid Zavyalov solemnly contends, however, that:

"In the industrial areas Goldwater and his propaganda count on the votes of a certain number of workers engaged in the military industry who fear that a lowering of military orders can affect their living standards."

This fantasy accords nicely, of course, with the ancient Soviet theory — evidently impervious to contrary fact — that everything in America is governed by wicked military monopolists and their workers.

THE RUSSIAN ANALYSTS report Johnson's lead over Goldwater in major public opinion polls. But they seem to think our pollsters go fishing after Labor Day.

Says the same Zavyalov: "It is well known that in the last two months (before election) the figures can change, so that it is difficult to foresee the final result."

It might indeed be tough to predict a given campaign outcome if the pollsters went vacationing just as the battle warmed up.

Zavyalov calls the eastern states the "bastion of the Democrats," evidently ignorant of New England's generally staunch support of the GOP candidates in presidential tests, and of the fact that such others as New York, Pennsylvania and Michigan have swung back and forth.

HAVING PLUNGED BOLDLY into telling Russian listeners what our election is all about, the Soviet "experts" might have dared to prophesy the Nov. 3 outcome in America. But here they grew limp.

Says Alexander Khazanov: "We have attempted to inform you of the suppositions which are being made in America. But it is natural that no preliminary conclusions, no forecasts, can be made on the basis of this data at present."

"The elections are a domestic affair of the American people. We shall learn their result soon. On this we conclude our broadcast."

A LETTER TO THE EDITOR:

Richard Nixon Poses Questions To LBJ on Nuclear Arms Issue

Editor: Most of the pollsters and political experts agree today the nuclear weapons issue may well decide the election of 1964.

It is my conviction, based on first hand personal knowledge of the decisions made on this issue during the Eisenhower Administration, that it is President Johnson's rather than Senator Goldwater's position which is dangerously reckless and irresponsible. The attached statement sets forth the facts as I know them and raises some crucial questions on this issue which I think President Johnson should answer.

Nixon's statement: "There are 26 NATO divisions, including six American divisions, in Europe. They face over 100 communist divisions. Our NATO divisions would be at a terrible numerical disadvantage except for the fact that they are equipped with battlefield atomic weapons."

"The communists know this. And, the knowledge that if they launch an attack, our NATO forces, despite their numerical disadvantage, have the capability of meeting the attack with battlefield atomic weapons has kept the peace and protected the freedom of Western Europe for ten years."

"Responsibility for authorizing the use of atomic weapons rests solely with the President of the United States. There is no difference of opinion on this issue. Senator Goldwater's position, as set forth in the McElroy Task Force Report, is that the President should continue to have this sole responsibility. But, President Eisenhower recognized that in the event of a communist attack in Europe, a delay in responding to this attack with battlefield atomic weapons, of even a few minutes, let alone hours, might result not only in losing the war but would endanger the lives of 250,000 American fighting men stationed in Europe. He, consequently, provided that if a communist attack occurred and the President was unable to issue the order for response with battlefield atomic weapons because of a communications breakdown, illness, or other reasons, that power under certain carefully defined circumstances could be exercised by the NATO commander. President Eisenhower had a particularly strong feeling that this procedure was wise and necessary because of his three illnesses in which there were periods when he personally would have been unable to issue an order to use atomic weapons in defense against a communist attack."

"The Eisenhower policy was continued by President Kennedy. Senator Goldwater has called for a reaffirmation of the Eisenhower policy so that the time will never come when because of a communications breakdown or other mishap our American forces in Europe would be at the mercy of a massive communist attack and would not be able to respond with the battlefield atomic weapons without which the numeri-

cal superiority of the communists is overwhelming.

"President Johnson has charged that Senator Goldwater is calling for a return to the Eisenhower policy is "trigger happy and a warmonger." The people of America and particularly the 250,000 American fighting men stationed in Europe are entitled to have these questions answered by President Johnson immediately.

"1. Has he revoked the Eisenhower procedure which gave the NATO commander authorization to use battlefield atomic weapons to respond to a communist attack when a communications breakdown makes it impossible for the President to give this order?"

"2. If he has revoked the Eisenhower policy, what substitute procedure has he adopted, if any, to protect the security of American and other NATO forces in the event of such attack?"

"3. Is it not true that the entire NATO defense concept is dependent upon the use of Am-

erica's nuclear power to repulse an attack?"

"4. Is it not true that this NATO defense system will be gutted if the NATO commander is forbidden to react to an attack with battlefield atomic weapons unless and until the President alone, whether or not he happens to be available at the time, authorizes their use?"

"5. Is it not true that the whole grandiose electronic nuclear control machine President Johnson referred to on September 16 in Seattle will collapse completely if the indispensable communications system should fail?"

"6. Is it not also true that any aggressor against the United States would strike at those communications coincident with his nuclear attack which, if successful, would consign our whole retaliatory strike into the trash heap until and unless someone could let our NATO commanders know that the President would like them to start shooting back?"

"President Johnson's silence on this issue and his continuing to demagogue against Senator Goldwater's position encourages our enemies, disarms our friends and risks the lives of 250,000 American fighting men in Europe. His conduct is dangerously irresponsible and reckless and he owes it to the American people, to our friends abroad, and to our potential enemies to clarify his position and to apologize to Senator Goldwater for distorting his position on a critical national defense issue."

2. A broad people's democratic movement will become a permanent factor in the political life of the country."

In simpler words, if Barry Goldwater is defeated, America will take one giant step closer to total socialism. It is, indeed, the eleventh hour.

Inflation Spurs Price Rise, Prices Don't Cause Inflation

A certain landowner went forth in the morning to look over his acreage.

As he returned near midday, the sun beat severely upon his head, and he reached the shade of the front porch in a swoon. In this condition he meditated upon his wealth. "My property," he mused, "is 883 yards deep and as many wide. I wish it were more." At this point, he hit upon a brilliant scheme to double the size of his holding. He dashed in the house to tell his wife.

"I have doubled our holdings," he shouted, "I have doubled our holdings with a stroke of a pen. Our land was 883 x 883 yards, but I cut the length of the yard in half so now our property measures 1766 x 1766 yards."

"Hmph," his wife answered and went on peddling her sewing machine.

However, you and I cannot dismiss sunstruck logic as easily as that. For just such error is current in the highest financial circles with potential consequences that are grievous.

When David Rockefeller, president of Chase Manhattan Bank, was in Los Angeles last week, newsmen asked him about the probable effect of the automotive settlements. His response was that he sees inflation creeping in.

By the term "inflation," he made it evident he was speaking of a rise in auto prices as a result of wage increases. In other words he was blaming inflation on the United Auto Workers. For the sake of accuracy, this point should be clarified.

Wages Are Prices
Wages are prices that are paid for labor and have no more to do with the cause of inflation than prices paid for anything else. Price rise — whether for labor or doorknobs — may be, and often is, the result of inflation and may serve as an excuse for more inflation, but it is never the cause. What then causes inflation?

Well, that brings us right back to the sunstruck landowner who supposed he could double the size of his holdings by cutting

the yard to half its original length.

There is a school of economists that believes the wealth of the country can be increased by increasing the number of dollars. The manner of doing this is to have the government spend more dollars than it takes in by taxation. The difference between income and outgo is made up by governmental issue of paper dollars. This is inflation per se.

False Belief
The issue of additional paper dollars cuts the purchasing power of those dollars already in circulation. So that principle is the same as when the farmer devalued the yard in the false belief he was increasing the size of his acreage.

To say that price rises or wage rises cause inflation is like saying that the rise of mercury in a sealed, inflexible tube causes temperature. It is a mistaking of effect for cause, and it indicates the wrong remedy. It is like kicking a tire for going flat instead of pulling out the nail.

True, the UAW wage rise in this instance was won by force. That is injurious. In principle it cannot be distinguished from robbery with a gun. But to call it "inflation" is to set the stage of popular opinion for price control.

Question Box

(We invite questions on economic and the proper functions of government which will not injure anyone.)

QUESTION: "What is the answer to the person who simply says, 'I do not agree with you,' or 'I agree with you on questions of ethics and economics?'"

ANSWER: If he doesn't give any reason why he doesn't agree with you, it might be well to point out to him that he is simply using himself as a standard of right. Whatever he thinks is right is right ipso facto, or whatever he thinks is wrong is wrong because he thinks so. A man must have a standard of ethics in order to determine whether a thing is good or bad or right or wrong.

The man who cannot give a standard and only says, "I agree, or I disagree" is implying by that statement that he needs no standard of right or wrong, that he simply knows it all and has reached the final solution of all questions.

Simply point out that he must have a standard of right and wrong. A mathematical, universal standard that applies equally to all people or he is the law unto himself.

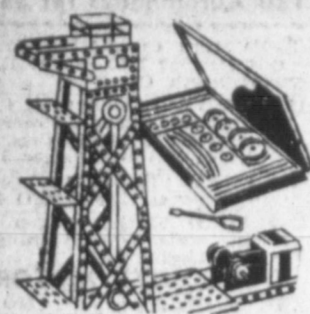

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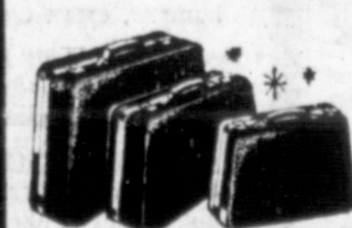


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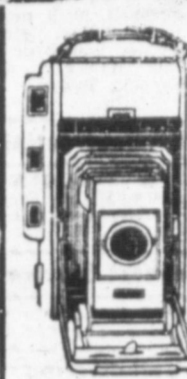
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
