The critical maneuver was triggered by a radio signal sent from scientists on earth at 6 a.m. EDT to make the spacecraft change direction from its general "moon collision" course into "a trajectory for its precise target."

Although jubilant scientists declined to make a prediction. they indicated they now felt confident that the spacecraft would hit close to its planned impact area in one of the moon's dry "seas." where astronauts of the future are to make landings!

Without the correction which took 112 hours, the spacecraft would have swung around the left edge of the moon at a distance of 243,000 miles and hit on the far and dark side of the lunar body, where television pictures could not be taken.

(UPI) Police today angrily denied reports they were using "storm trooper methods" to recover property taken during last weekend's rioting and looting in two Negro sections of the city. The accusations were hurled at police Tuesday by Laplois Ashford, national youth secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP.) Detective Lieutenant Thomas Celura said loot recovered so far was the result of "sheer investigation" in following up tips by anonymous callers or in questioning the nearly 800 persons arrested during the rioting.





## New Astronauts May Get Outside **Of Space Craft**

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On The Witness Stand By far the most vital people in our system of justice a r e witnesses. Everyone else in a trial exists to hear what they have to say.

Our courts need witnesses. A jury to find the facts. The judge to apply the law. The lawyer to telling your story in court.

Chances are you worry about stepping up, taking an oath, and telling your story incourt.

On some rare occasions you could be called upon to testify about something affecting your own standing in the community. As a witness you too may have the right, for example, not to testify against yourself in somebody else's lawsuit or crime trial.

If you are ever in such a bind, consult a lawyer of your o w n choice on what to do. The lawyer who called you to testify has a sworn duty to protect his client, not you. But your lawyer is sworn to keep what you tell him secret and to advise you in your own interests within the law.

Wise lawyers tell their witnesses to obey twelve rules:

1. Go to the place (say, t h e scene of an accident). Check your memory before you go to court. People forget and g e t caught up on details. But if you check what you saw and heard you are on solid ground.

2. Visit a court. Hear how other witnesses testify. It will help you see your role on the witness stand.

3. Wear clean, conservative clothes.

4. Don't memorize your story word for word. That is the surest way to sound bad. But think of what you saw and heard. 5. Listen to the questions you are asked with care and answer thoughtfully.

7. If you err — and people often do — correct yourself at once. If you can't remember some detail, say so. Don't bluff. 8. Tell the truth. Don't figure which side you may help. Don't identify yourself with either side.

9. Stop when the judge breaks in, and don't try to sneak an answer in before he can stop you. What you might say could end in a "mistrial."

10. Keep cool and don't sass back.

11. If they ask you: Certainly, you have talked to other people —the lawyer, for example; and yes, you may be reimbursed for certain of your expenses incurred in attending the trial.

12. Remember, without witnesses our law would fail to do justice. If you are called, be a good witness.


