Thousands File Past Casket of Herbert Hoover

Body of 31st President Lies In State in New York Church

NEW YORK (UPI)—Mourners from every walk of life filed today past the flag-draped, candlelit bier of former President Herbert Clark Hoover in St. Bartholomew's Episcopal Church.

Hoover, 31st president of the United States and a humanitarian of world renown, died at his Waldorf Towers apartment across the street from the church Tuesday at the age of 90. The lying-in-state began this morning and will terminate with a memorial service Thursday afternoon.

New Yorkers have two days to pay their respects to Hoover before his body is flown to Washington for honors reserved for departed presidents, statesmen and heroes. A line of 100 mourners had formed outside St. Bartholomew's before the doors were thrown open.

The crowds walked slowly and reverently up the aisles to the chancel where Hoover's coffin rested between the U.S. and presidential flags. Five servicemen, representing all branches of the armed services, stood rigidly at the head and foot of the catafalque.

Soft morning sunlight streamed through the stained glass windows, as a Bronx housewife, Mrs. Catherine Quill entered the church at the head of the line. Mrs. Quill said that although she had never met Hoover she had come to pay her last respects because he was "a wonderful man."

President Johnson and GOP presidential candidate Sen. Barry Goldwater will come to St. Bartholomew's Thursday to attend the brief Episcopal Memorial service. Hoover was of Quaker stock on both sides of his family but considered St. Bartholomew's his neighborhood church. The funeral of his wife, Lou Henry Hoover, was held there in 1944.

On Friday morning the coffin will be moved by train to Washington where Hoover will lie in state under the great Rotunda of the nation's Capitol.

Hoover Leads In Honors For Americans

NEW YORK (UPI)—Herbert Hoover garnered more honors, awards, decorations, honorary degrees and distinctions, than any American of his time.

"According to a booklet published by the Hoover Institute at Stanford University last July Hoover had received honors from 14 foreign governments and the Presidential Awaro of the United States. He was an honorary citizen of Finland and Poland.

He received 65 honorary doctorates from American universities beginning with Brown University in 1916. The latest was conferred on him by California Baptist College this year. Twenty-eight universities abroad had honored him.

He received honors from 115 professional and scientific societies ranging from gold medals, prizes, honorary membership, trusteeships, and inscribed gold watches. The Astronomical Observatory in Brussels named the star it discovered in 1938 "Hooveria."

For 42 hours the public will have a chance to pay its last respects to Hoover beneath the same Rotunda where in recent months the bodies of President John F. Kennedy and Gen. Douglas A. MacArthur lay in state.

On Sunday Hoover will be flown to his hometown of West Branch, Iowa, to be buried beneath a simple headstone he personally selected. His wife is buried at Stanford University in Palo Alto, Calif., but her body will be brought to West Branch and buried by his side.

Hoover was stricken last Saturday by massive internal bleeding. His doctors eventually were able to stop the bleeding, but toxins built up, poisoning his system, and his heart gave out under the strain.

Alert to End
Hoover remained alert until the time he was stricken. His closest aide Neil MacNeil said Hoover was deeply absorbed in the recent World Series.

President Johnson and Sen. Barry Goldwater were among the first to pay tribute to the man affectionately known as "The Grand Old Man of the Grand Old Party."

"His steadfast leadership," said Johnson, "served us undaunted through good times and bad — as business man, provider for the poor and hungry, President and elder statesman."

"He combined the best of our national heritage with broad-gauged understanding of the tumultuous times in which he lived. A man of character and conviction, he was both profound and practical in meeting the many tasks he undertook for his fellow men."

Nikita S. Khrushchev was recently ousted as Soviet Premier and chairman of the Communist party of Russia. He was replaced by Alexei N. Kosygin, Premier and Leonid I. Brezhnev, party leader in a move that took most of the Western World by surprise.

While President Johnson in his Sunday night speech to the nation predicted no change in USSR foreign policy, European leaders speculated a possible change in Red outlook.

Change of some sort is inevitable and Pampans have their own ideas how this change will affect the world's destiny. "What was your reaction to the recent change of leadership in Russia?" This was the Daily News' question posed to five residents picked at random.

The replies were:
Joe Tooley, Pampa business man. "I think we had better look out. I don't think they are going to follow the easy line that Khrushchev was following

Nikita Threatened To Quit in Winter

MOSCOW (UPI)—Nikita S. Khrushchev threatened to resign as long as last February because his Kremlin aides disagreed with his tactics against Communist China. East European sources said today. The sources said that the men who ousted Khrushchev last week also are charging him with "squandering" foreign aid and pushing "irresponsible" farm programs.

The new leaders are circulating a memorandum attacking Khrushchev to Communist party members, the sources said. At the same time, they are making every effort to assure

the West that there will be no radical changes in policy with the leadership shift. Diplomatic sources said Communist party chief Leonid I. Brezhnev and Premier Alexei N. Kosygin have personally assured U.S. Ambassador Foy D. Kohler and other Western ambassadors that the West can expect better relations with the Soviet Union.

The sources said they have not spelled out in detail just how relations can be improved. The sources however made it clear that Khrushchev's dismissal does not mean the end of the cold war thaw he promoted.

D. C. Ash, insurance man. "I think it is a purge. I think it will be better for us in the long run."

Elley Sargent, waitress. "It makes me wonder. We were getting along with Khrushchev, but I don't see how we'll get along with the new leaders of Russia."

Buz Tarpley, businessman. "I don't think it is going to change the communist objective of world domination. We know the aim of the Communists and if Khrushchev was doing the job expected of him, I don't think they would have made a change in leadership."

David Damron, chemical engineer. "Since these two new leaders are members of the same regime as Khrushchev I don't see any immediate change. I feel that Khrushchev destroyed persons that he did not agree with, so therefore these men follow the same ideology as Khrushchev."

Kidnapers Nab Gangland Boss

Nationalist Spy Pilots Gathered Red Bomb Data

American-Trained Fliers Used U-2 Planes, Listening Devices

WASHINGTON (UPI)—American-trained Chinese Nationalist pilots, flying U2 spy planes, gathered much of the proof that Red China was on the verge of setting off its first nuclear explosion.

They played a key role in an information-gathering operation which also featured photo-reconnaissance satellites in polar orbit, electronic listening devices and plain cloak-and-dagger methods.

The atomic blast came at 3 a.m. EDT, Oct. 16, just 17 days after Secretary of State Dean Rusk had told the world that the Communist Chinese were about ready for their long expected test.

When Rusk made his announcement, Washington thought the explosion might come on Oct. 1 to celebrate the Chinese Communist regime's 15th anniversary.

Sources said today that U2 planes flown by Formosa-based Chinese pilots, had kept the China mainland under surveillance for more than two years. It has now become clear that a main aim of these flights, in planes said to have been sold to Chiang Kai-shek's government, was to keep watch on the preparation of nuclear test facilities in Sinkiang Province.

So vast a development for the specific purpose of atomic testing would make its own special "footprint" on the Takla Makan Desert site, near the dry, salt-

Baylor Gets Rare Law Book From Former Senator

WACO (UPI)—The Baylor University law school Monday was presented with a copy of the world's rarest law book—printed 489 years ago on the same press that printed Gutenberg's Bible.

Former U.S. Sen. William A. Blakely of Dallas presented the school with a copy of the Code of Justinian, the compiled edicts of the old Roman emperors, drafted about 529 A.D. by a commission appointed by Julian.

There are only four known copies of this work, and this is the only one in the Western Hemisphere.

Mafia Big Shot Missing

NEW YORK (UPI)—Mafia big shot Joseph (Joe Bananas) Bonanno was kidnaped at gunpoint early today only hours before he was to be questioned by a federal grand jury investigating syndicate crime, police said.

Bonanno, who the FBI regards as one of the underworld's most feared chiefs, was dragged out of a taxi on Park Avenue by two men with 45 automatics, his lawyer told police. The lawyer said the gunman grabbed Bonanno by the arm, pushed him into another car and sped away.

One of the kidnapers fired point blank at the attorney when he tried to intervene but missed, he said.

William Power Maloney, the attorney, said one of the abductors told Bonanno, a cosa nostra boss in Brooklyn, "c'mon Joe, my boss wants to talk to you."

Maloney said he, Bonanno and an associate had just arrived in the taxi at Maloney's apartment and planned to go inside to discuss the jury appearance when the gunmen appeared and spirited Bonanno away in a beige sedan driven by a third man.

Maloney thought a gangland execution might be awaiting his client. The lawyer categorically denied the kidnaping might have been staged to keep Bonanno from having to appear before the grand jurors.

"Any suggestion that this was a dodge to get him out of appearing before the grand jury is utterly ridiculous," he said.

Bonanno was one of 30 persons who were called before the federal grand jury. Federal authorities declined to reveal specifics about the jury's investigation. But reports circulated that the government was receiving information from an informer, perhaps on the scale of Joe Valachi, the much-publicized Senate witness who revealed details of the Cosa Nostra last year before a nationwide television audience.

Bonanno, 59, was the reputed head of a Brooklyn crime syndicate active in narcotics, gambling, extortion and labor racketeering.

Chou En-lai Again Asks Bomb Summit

TOKYO (UPI)—Communist Chinese Premier Chou En-lai called anew Tuesday for a world summit conference on nuclear disarmament. He pledged his government would use its new atomic bomb only in self-defense.

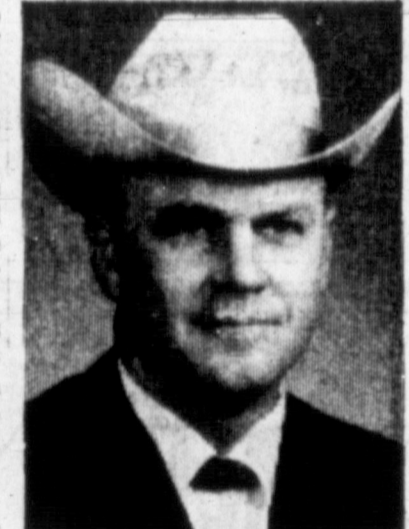
Chou issued his appeal to "the heads of government of the countries of the world," the official New China News Agency said in a dispatch monitored here.

Another New China dispatch complained that the United States was trying to belittle the significance of China's atomic explosion.

The premier's statement was similar to a call for a ban-the-bomb meeting issued by China last Friday at the same time that it announced its first atomic test explosion.

Chou said Tuesday the suggested summit conference should bring together leaders "of all the countries of the world to discuss the question of the complete prohibition and the thorough destruction of nuclear weapons."

His statement continued: "As a first step, the summit conference should reach an agreement that the nuclear powers and those countries which may soon become nuclear powers undertake not to use nuclear weapons, either to

Price Says Opponent not 'Representing' Area

Bob Price, Republican candidate for Congress, charged in Amarillo last night that his opponent "does not represent the will of the people in this district."

He told an audience of Amarillo Teen Age Republicans that

the incumbent congressman ignores the expressed position of the free and independent Americans who live in the Panhandle. He is our representative, but he does not pretend to represent us."

Said Price:

"Our Congressman voted for a Farm Bill that shackles our great wheat industry with Federal controls. Welfare Index Makes Yule Plans

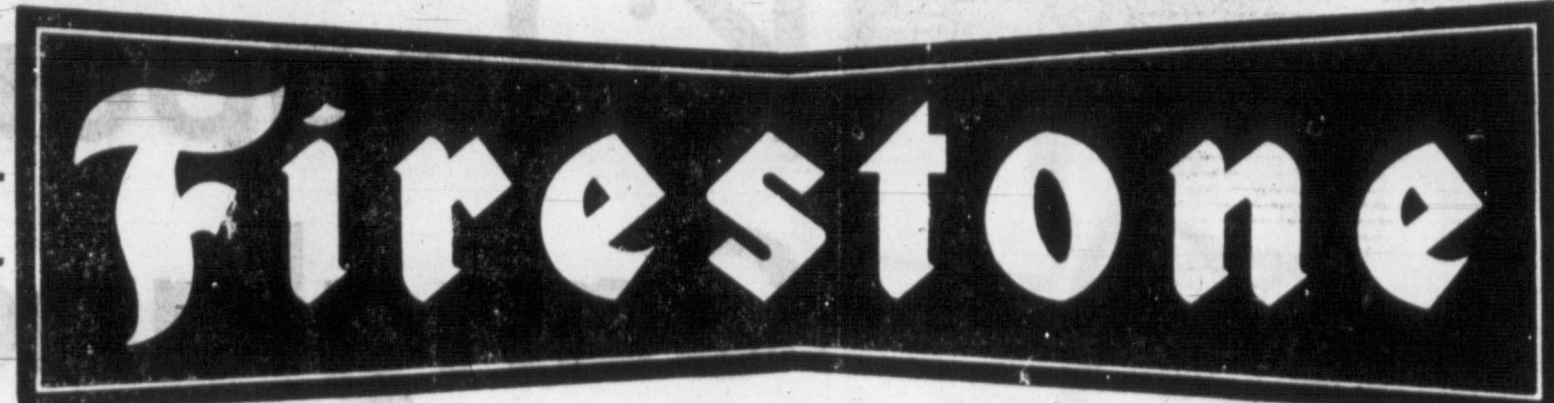

Presidential Race: How Barry Can Win

WASHINGTON (NEA)—President Lyndon B. Johnson probably would bury Sen. Barry Goldwater under an electoral vote avalanche if the election were held right now.

But Democrats are displaying the caution signal. Several factors could work to draw these two presidential contenders much closer in the remaining decisive weeks of the campaign.

The unanswered question is whether that change could be big enough to overturn present indications and give Goldwater an uphill victory. Most polltakers, most political experts and most bettors suggest today, in a broad consensus, that the answer likely is no.

NEA's latest findings in the field, cross-checked against many other soundings, indicate that as of now the President might win 32 states with a total of 354 electoral votes (270 are required for election). There are 23 pretty clearly in his column, and another 9 leaning his way.

By contrast, Goldwater at the moment can count as sure or leaning toward him just 12 states with a combined electoral vote of 96. That figures out to be 174 votes short of victory.

The newest samplings place the remaining 6 states, with 88 electoral votes, in the doubtful category. Even if all these be now assigned to Goldwater, his total climbs only to 184 electoral votes. He would still need another 66.

These are the factors which may give Goldwater vitally needed pull-up leverage in the closing campaign weeks:

1. The possibility that a strong silent vote might develop for him amid the unusual voter ferment that marks this election. Ample evidence exists that countless voters have been torn loose from traditional moorings. How deep this unsettlement runs is not clear.

2. A furious beating of the bushes by Goldwater's dedicated followers which might get out his firm vote almost to the last man, while complacent Democrats—perhaps overconfident of victory—fail to push Johnson's larger legions to the polls in sufficient force.

History indicates Democrats invariably have a harder time getting out their vote than do Republicans. Given an ardent Goldwater backing and a Democratic support generally reported lukewarm about the President and stirred by charges against his integrity, the problem could be greatly aggravated for the Democrats in 1964.

One contrary note: In the many places across the nation where new registrations have been completed, Democrats more often than not appear to have added most to their rolls.

Negro registration in the South, for example, has topped 2 million for the first time. These are considered safely in the LBJ column.

3. If polls and other indica-

tions close to voting day show Goldwater still far behind the President, the GOP nominee might suddenly find himself the beneficiary of an important "underdog" vote. There might be a tendency to "martyr" him in advance.

Many voters might then swing to him in sympathy, or vote for him because they believe he will lose anyway. Some would not want him crushed in a humiliating landslide.

4. Republican moderate and even conservative defectors from Goldwater, now measured at upwards of a quarter of the potential GOP electorate, could swing back to the senator in really significant numbers.

Goldwater and his managers believe this movement is already seriously under way. They count on the powerful pull of old partisan ties to haul millions back into the fold.

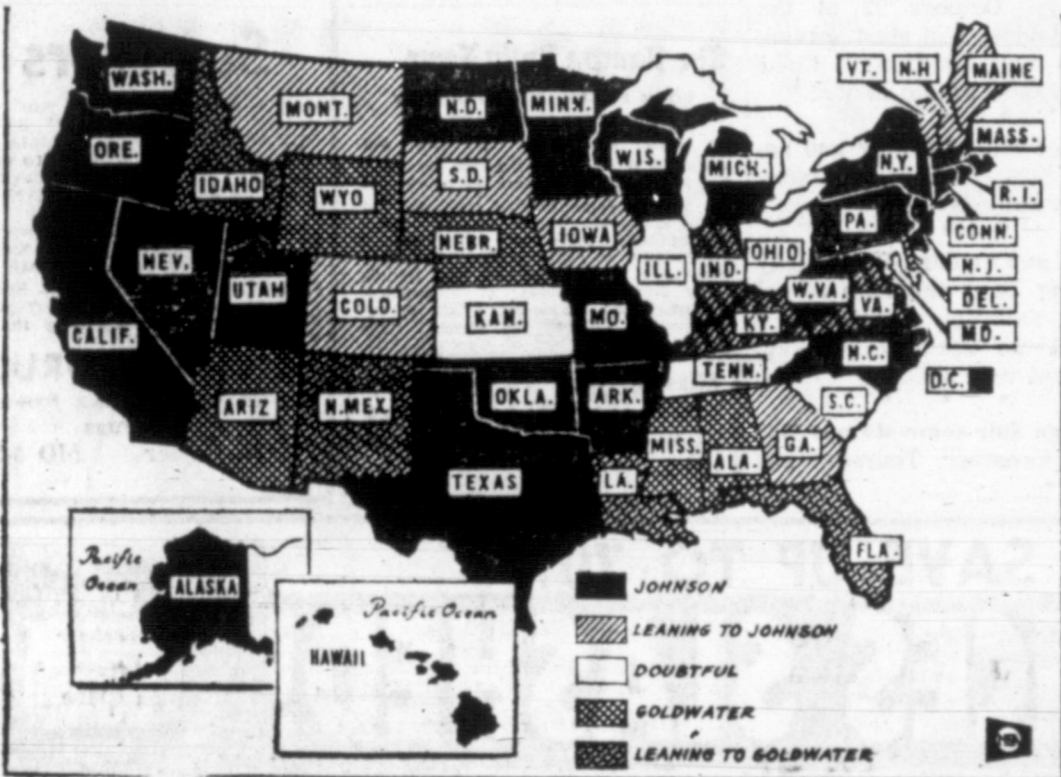
If there is a developing big silent vote for Goldwater, it has to mean that many potential voters have been lying to poll-takers for weeks—since the reported undecided factor is a modest 6 per cent.

C of C Chief Says Issues Should Be Determining Factor in Voting

NEW YORK — President Walter F. Carey of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States urged that issues rather than party labels — or personalities — be made the determining factor in selecting the next Congress.

"The issues will always outlive the candidates, no matter how colorful they might be," Mr. Carey said in an address to the Annual Meeting of the American Bakers Association. The speech was titled, "Congress Counts Too."

Carey, who also is President of Automobile Carriers-Dealers Transit, Inc., Birmingham, Mich., coupled a call for a conservative Congress with an appeal to businessmen to get active in the political party of their choice as a matter of self-interest.

"If there is a quickening pace today away from a free market economy and toward more federal regulation and control," he told his audience, "it is because we businessmen are allowing it to happen by our own inertia in the political field."

Despite all the interest in the Presidential campaign, Carey said, Congressional contests deserve more attention than they normally get during a quadrennial race for the White House.

"After all," he added, "we must live by the laws that Congress makes. And members of Congress are naturally responsive to the wishes of people who are active in their political party back home. When the party is in good hands locally, the Congressman stands on principle."

When self-interest groups hold sway back home, that's the way the Congressman votes. "We businessmen, more than most others, should recognize our stake in good Congressional representation. The impact of federal activities on the conduct of business is severe. When you get right down to it, it's a question of helping to pick the right kind of business partner for yourself, since government enjoys partnership rights in everybody's business."

It is important to choose Congressmen for their stand on the issues rather than for such whimsical things as their looks, charm or how they "come across" on television, he said. "Long after the men we elect to Congress are gone," Carey added, "the effects of their concern about fiscal integrity and balancing the federal budget, their emphasis or the lack of it on community and individual self-reliance, (and) their attitudes regarding federal subsidies... will be felt across the land and will influence the economic growth of our nation."

Carey said this fact demands that we take another look at the traditional approach to politics which places greater stress on party loyalty than on individual performance on the important issues.

"Frankly, I think it is time we made issues, rather than party labels, the dominant factor in politics. I cannot believe that blind allegiance to a party leads either to better government or to a better party."

Stressing that his concern was, mostly about candidates for Congress than for this year's Presidential nominees, Carey added:

"Does it really make good sense to bind oneself rigidly to support a candidate for Congress when you are firmly convinced your party has made an unsound choice? Participation in the process of selecting a candidate is one way to guard against fielding less than the best. Unfortunately, however, the political process isn't like milk — the cream doesn't automatically rise to the top. A minority opinion isn't always the wrong one."

THIS WEEKS GARDENING TIPS
House plants should be taken in now so they may gradually become accustomed to house conditions before the doors are closed and the heat is turned on for winter.

The feeding of chrysanthemums should be stopped when the color of the petals begins to show. Continuing to fertilize after that time is inclined to distort the blooms.

Caladiums are beginning to die down now. The tubers should be dug or pots lifted and stored in a cellar or dry, moderately warm place until early spring. The Caladiums around the Bob Curry home have been beautiful this year. Caladiums are very effective as houseplants and add a touch of dramatic beauty to the decor of the home. They thrive best in low light intensity and may therefore be grown in or near windows where they receive little or no sun. They are also of great decorative value in room dividers and niches when they can be grown under artificial light.

Colchicums or autumn flowering crocus are now blooming in Pampa gardens. These crocus-like blooms are dainty and appealing and bring a shy, bright touch to the autumn landscape. Do not neglect to water now. Trees, shrubs, roses, grass and many other plants are making vigorous root growth. Lack of moisture now will be reflected in next spring's growth and flowering. Very thorough watering before the ground begins to freeze is especially important with evergreens.

Dates for rooting and transplanting according to the moon signs are Oct. 21, 22, 25, 26.

Foreign Commentary

 LONDON (UPI) — Scientists trained in France and the United States are believed to have masterminded Communist China's nuclear development that led to last week's atomic explosion in Sinking Province.

Dr. Chien Shueh-shen, who worked on scientific defense projects in the United States during World War II, is mentioned among the bomb builders. After the war he tried for some time to go back to China following the revolution of Mao Tsetung. In 1955, he finally succeeded in leaving the United States and reportedly is the man who started the Peking Institute of Dynamics.

Two other Chinese scientists who are one-time American citizens are cited in this context. They are Chen Ning-yang and Tsung Tan-li, who won the Nobel Prize before returning to Peking.

French sources now report that several Chinese-trained in France are also among the top Science for his research in nuclear atomic bomb.

Among them, according to these reports, is Chien San-chiang, a 54-year-old scientist who was trained by one of France's leading nuclear physicists, Frederic Joliot-Curie.

After the war, Chien won the prize of the Paris Academy of Science for his research in nuclear physics.

He has been assisted by his wife, a leading physicist in her own right who worked with him in France.

Later Chien went to Russia and subsequently became director of the Institute of Atomic Energy of Red China.

In the heyday of Sino-Soviet friendship Russia too helped train Red Chinese scientists, but Soviet informants claim that Moscow has long been careful not to pass on vital nuclear information.

Nude Model, Vicar Exchange Concepts

LONDON (UPI)—An Anglican vicar who termed as "sacrilicious propaganda" a safety poster depicting a beautiful nude wearing only a pair of sunglasses and a smile Monday met the model who posed for the picture.

The Rev. Gordon Guinness, a 62-year-old bespectacled, grey-haired father of five, looked first at the model and then at the picture. "This," he said, "is part of the process which is helping to undermine the morals of the country."

The model, Mrs. Kay Kirkham, 22, snapped back, "If anyone finds anything dirty or sexy in that picture it is in their minds—not in the photo."

Vicar Agrees, But "I agree," said the vicar, "but a youngster told me that after seeing the poster, no one could think of anything else but the girl."

Mrs. Kirkham is the wife of an automobile plant worker and the mother of an 11-month-old son. In the poster, placed strategically on her anatomy are the words: "But I always wear my eye glasses for protection."

The vicar and the redhead met at the British Safety Council headquarters with the organization's controller, James Tye, and the photographer who took the picture, George Harrison Marks. The meeting was arranged after the vicar protested display of the poster in factories.

Cites Eye Accidents Tye said there were about 1,000 eye accidents a week in Britain and that the poster would draw attention to the danger. "I see nothing wrong in this poster at all," he said. "I feel that a woman's body is sacred," said the vicar. "It is sensible for her to expose it in certain circumstances, such as to doctors in a hospital, but not in a strip club in Soho."

Russians Closing In On Olympic Medals

TOKYO (UPI) — Sprinters Bob Hayes and Henry Carr anchored crack United States relay teams to world records today and boosted America's gold

medal total to 34 in a brilliant drive to wrest the over-all team championship from Russia. With only three days of competition remaining, the powerful U.S. team now has 15 more gold medals than the Russians who dominated the last two Olympiads and have an outside chance of catching up in gymnastics, boxing and canoeing still to come.

To Honor Randy on His Return

Officials of the Chamber of Commerce, Pampa Independent Schools, and the Chamber Sports Committee met yesterday and made preliminary plans to honor Pampa's Randy Matson, winner of the silver medal in the shot put at the Olympic games in Tokyo, upon his return to Pampa sometime around the first of November.

Preliminary plans call for a caravan of automobiles, headed by the Pampa High School Band, to be on hand at the air terminal in Amarillo upon his arrival, where the golden car will be rolled out. The caravan will then return to Pampa with a parade through the downtown area and move on to the High School Field House where the student body will be on hand for a rousing reception for one of Pampa's all-time great athletes.

Further plans call for honoring Randy and his parents at the Chamber's Annual Membership Banquet to be held in the Robert E. Lee Junior High School Cafeteria on Tuesday evening, November 10.

Matson's achievement at the Olympics is the highest honor that has ever been won by a Pampa athlete and deserves all the recognition that Pampa is able to pay him, according to Joe Donaldson, Chairman of the Chamber's Sports Committee.

Reservations to the banquet are open to the public and will be handled on a first-come, first-served basis. Approximately 500 people can be accommodated, and a sell-out is assured, according to Chamber officials.

Cards Sign Schoendienst

ST. LOUIS (UPI)—The St. Louis Cardinals announced Tuesday the signing of Albert Fred Schoendienst, former major league infielder and Cardinal coach as manager, to succeed the resigned John Keane, now manager of the New York Yankees.

The 41-year-old Schoendienst, a second baseman with the Cardinals and the Milwaukee Braves, was named manager of the Cardinals on the same day Keane was named manager of the Yankees.

American speedsters swept the men's 400 and 1,600 meter relays in the track and field windup today while Russia's world record-holder, Valyrie Brumel, barely edged long John Thomas of Boston in the high jump for the first and only Soviet victory in the men's division.

Missed Fewer Times
Brumel and Thomas both cleared 7 feet, 1 3/4 inches but the Russian was declared the winner on fewer misses en route to that height.

John Rambo of Long Beach, Calif., won the bronze medal at 7-foot-1.

Rambo's third in the high jump gave the United States a total of 86 gold, silver and bronze medals compared to 71 four years ago and Russia received a sharp setback in women's gymnastics tonight.

The Soviet girls retained the team title by a narrow margin over Czechoslovakia but a 22-year-old Czech secretary, Vera Caslavskva, won the individual crown by upsetting a 24-23 halftime deficit, poured it on the second half for a 62-42 victory over Puerto Rico to set up a gold medal showdown against Russia. Russia gained the final by defeating Brazil 53-47.

A slow baton pass on the final leg cost the U.S. women's 400 meter relay team an expected gold medal. Dyrul Burleson ran fifth in the 1,500 meters won for the second time by Peter Snell of New Zealand. American yachtsmen failed to win a single gold medal and three Yank boxers were beaten.

By sweeping the men's relays with world records of 39 seconds for the 400 meters and 3:00.7 for 1,600 meters, the U.S. boosted its gold medal haul to 34 — equalling its harvest at Rome four years ago.

Poles Set Record
The women's relay team, anchored by 200 meter medalist Edith McGuire of Atlanta, had to settle for a silver medal as a Polish four set a world record of 43.6 seconds to shatter the mark of 44.3 set by Wilma Rudolph's American team in 1960.

Colt Disarms Houston .45s
HOUSTON (UPI)—The Houston Colts baseball club is thinking about changing its name before the 1965 season starts.

In other finals, Abebe Bikila of Ethiopia, one of Emperor Haile Selassie's palace guards, ran the fastest marathon in history for an unprecedented second Olympic victory in two hours, 12 minutes, 11.2 seconds. Bikila, who ran barefooted in 1960, trotted the 26 mile, 385 yard course this time wearing white tennis sneakers.

Suprise Medal
The U.S. picked up a surprise bronze medal in middleweight judo when Jim Bregman of Arlington, Va., tied for third behind winner Isao Okano and a German.

Unofficially, until protests were ruled on, American yachts bagged silver medals in the Star and Finn classes, bronze medals in 5.5 meter, Dragon and Flying Dutchman.

Germany won the 4,000 meter team cycle medal and Italy scored over Russia to win the 2,000 meter sprint tandem.

Marine Sgt. Charles Brown of Cincinnati, who had been hospitalized for a sore throat Sunday and Monday, tired in the third round and was beaten in a featherweight boxing semifinal by Anthony Villanueva. Brown, however, earned a bronze medal.

Flyweight Robert Carmody of Paterson, N.J., won a bronze but lost his shot at a gold medal when he lost a split decision to Italy's Fernando Atzori.

Keane Warns Tough Policy

NEW YORK (UPI)—Johnny Keane assumed command of the New York Yankees today with a double-edged hint that he can be a stern disciplinarian and may make some major changes next spring.

The former manager of the world champion St. Louis Cardinals also revealed that he accepted a one-year contract "because I prefer it that way—it makes a man drive a little harder."

"Yes, I can be tough," said the 52-year-old Keane in an obvious reference to reports that Yogi Berra lost out as Yankee manager because he could not control the off-field activities of some of the players. "I don't object to a beer after a game or a cocktail before dinner.

"But if players start to go overboard, the situation will be corrected in some way," he continued. "A few players can't be permitted to jeopardize the income of the others."

WestTex Buffaloes Plan Get Even Week

This is "get even" week for the West Texas State Buffaloes. Joe Kerbel's squad, now 2-3 for the season after Saturday's 41-0 belting by Memphis State, can even both its season record and the series record with Trinity University by beating the Tigers this Saturday in Buffalo Bowl.

This will be the fourteenth meeting of the two Texas schools. Trinity holds a 7-6 edge in the series, but West Texas State has won all four games played under Joe Kerbel by scores of 28-0, 29-28, 61-0 and 24-2. Trinity's last win came in 1959, when they edged the Buffs 14-8 at San Antonio.

The Tigers, although not as formidable as the Memphis State Tigers, are not being taken lightly in the Buffalo camp. "Obert Logan is perhaps the finest halfback we'll face all year," said WTSU scout C. E. "Dirk" Dierking. "Quarterback Les Obie completed 15 of 19 passes against Arkansas State last Saturday and their passing attack netted over 200 yards. They are a much better ball club than their record indicates and they'll beat us if we're not ready."

The Tiger offense has jelled in recent weeks as evidenced by a 275-yard performance against Lamar Tech and the superb passing effort against Arkansas State.

The Buffaloes threw 36 times against Memphis State and completed 12 for 127 yards, but had five throws picked off by the alert Memphis State defense.

Russell Mundy was not only the big gun, but nearly the only gun, in the ground offense. Of the Buffs' 18 yards in 24 rushes, Mundy made 70 in 14, a five-yard average, and moved into the West Texas State 1,000 Yard Club with 1,054 career rushing yards. With five games to play and good health, Mundy could move well up into the top ten among the all-time Buffalo rushers.

"They have a good line and they throw well when they need to... almost all their backs can throw."

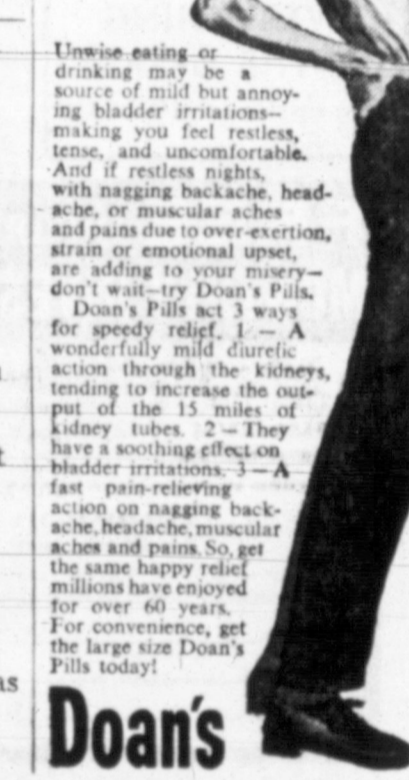

NEA Client Editors See LBJ Winner

By BRUCE BLOSSAT Washington Correspondent WASHINGTON (NEA) — NEA client editors predict overwhelmingly that President Lyndon B. Johnson will defeat Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona for the presidency on Nov. 3.

In a broad-ranging Newspaper Enterprise Association survey that drew replies from 47 of the 50 states, the 380 responding editors were recorded as follows:

- 323 — some 85 per cent of those reporting — picked Johnson as winner. — 51 — just 13.4 per cent — chose Goldwater. — Six ventured no opinion. — Almost 90 per cent of the respondents in the Old South, and 78 per cent of those reporting from the Midwest, named Johnson the likely victor.

These results are interesting in light of the fact that Goldwater counts heavily on these two regions — plus the Mountain West — to give him the foundation support necessary to November victory.

The editors were asked also to specify which of the two major party nominees would carry their individual states. Their replies, broken down by states, assign to the President a total of 27 states with 332 electoral votes (270 needed to win), to Goldwater's 15 states with 170 electoral votes.

Of the 380 responding editors (or publishers), 109 said their newspapers are endorsing Goldwater, while almost as many — 106 — said their endorsements were going to President Johnson.

In other and somewhat larger soundings, Goldwater's edge in endorsements was more pronounced. Some 60 editors said their papers are undecided about endorsing. Another 63 said they would endorse neither candidate, and 52 did not answer the question.

Of the 60 undecided, 48 — some 80 per cent — are traditionally Republican newspapers, and only nine are Democratic, with the other three independent. Of the 53 which say they are endorsing no candidate, 18 identify themselves as Republican, five as Democratic, with the remainder independent.

Johnson's 106 endorsements include 29 newspapers which have switched from a traditional Republican endorsement policy in 1964. Goldwater's 109 include five — all in the Old South — which this year have turned away from customary Democratic endorsement.

WASHINGTON — The Central Intelligence Agency withheld vital intelligence information from the Warren Commission during its investigation of the assassination of President Kennedy.

Despite the commission's written request for all documents that might shed light on the assassination, CIA authorities failed to turn over a national intelligence estimate warning that it is Kremlin policy to remove from public office by assassination Western officials who actively oppose Soviet policies.

Titled "Soviet Strategic Executive Action," the suppressed CIA document went into the shocking details of how agents of KGB, the Soviet secret police, are trained to do away with Western leaders, including officials in the U. S., and to make their deaths appear due to natural causes.

One of the KGB's newly devised assassination weapons is "a pneumatically operated poison ice atomizer," which leaves no wound or other evidence of the cause of death.

While this deadly weapon has yet to be used against any high Western official, hundreds of KGB agents covertly operating outside of Russia have been supplied with this pocket-size gun, awaiting only orders from Moscow to use it.

The Liberal Establishment would like to have all voices of dissent snuffed out, and to have their viewpoint be the only one given voice, at all levels of communication. Yes, freedom of speech is in danger, but not from the sources Mr. Burgin thinks.

Around the World

By ROBERT MORRIS LISTENING TO GUS HALL With the political campaign dominating the news, everyone seems to be discussing the state of the nation and world. Unfortunately, partisanship is coloring everything and the real significance of the world's events is being lost in the partisan whirl.

On the international scene, the characters to watch are Sukarno and Nasser. Both have been brought to power with the help of our State Department and CIA. Both are frontrunners for Russia and the planned conquest of the world by "disarmament, peaceful coexistence and decolonization."

Sukarno, armed by the Kremlin, now stands astride Singapore and between Oceania and the Indian Ocean. With the encouragement of Russia he is menacing Malaysia, Britain's last effort at resistance in Asia. The administration in Washington literally brought his cruel sceptre to Dutch West Guinea a year ago.

I encountered Sukarno during World War II when he was the Japanese collaborator in the Dutch East Indies. He was the character who said in Tokyo that it was the dream of his life to dance on and desecrate the grave of Franklin D. Roosevelt. Nonetheless, after Sukarno made his alliance with the Communists, Philip Jessup and the State Department brought him to power in the fledgling Republic of Indonesia.

Nasser, with a firm military alliance with Russia is moving in the Middle East, not only in Yemen and in the Red Sea area, but down into Black Africa. When we see the extent of Soviet penetration in Guinea, Ghana, Algeria, Mali, Zanzibar and other trouble spots in Africa, it is frightening to conjure up a year ago on the unsupported charge that he was a "secessionist."

On the home front, this same deterioration is apparent. Resistance to what the Kremlin, Sukarno and Nasser are attempting is being successfully labeled "rightist" and "extremist." Support of Red China and the long-dead Stalin is also labeled extremist — but "leftist." Even though the mean between these poles is hard to define, therein lies "moderation." If we would listen to prevailing voices.

But the gauge between these poles, counterfeited as they are, moves to the left. Dean Rusk acts as public relations for Mao by dramatizing Red China's possession of nuclear power and, while they are still dubbed leftists, the covert Communists are speaking the consensus that holds sway.
