






6 p.m. for a buffet to be served in the dining room.

Use of ZIP Code Speeds Up Mail

All major post offices have recently converted their parcel post sorting and transportation facilities to the ZIP Code system, Postmaster O. K. Gaylor said Saturday.

This is important to people in all areas of the country, since almost every parcel at one time on its trip goes through these offices. The use of ZIP codes can save 24 hours or more in the delivery of most parcel post. "ZIP Codes on parcels means a far less chance of damage because of more direct routing and fewer handlings, but the success of the program hinges on public use of the ZIP Code numbers in addressing packag-

Gaylor suggested that even if people do not know the ZIP Code of the address to which their mail is going, they should use the code on return addresses. When cards and packages arrive, the five digit return address codes should be added to Christmas lists for use in the future. ZIP coded mail from smaller post offices will generally be sent to the nearest main post office or "sectional center." From there, it is sent directly to the sectional center nearest the final destination. In most instances, this eliminates at least one further separation of mail.

Gaylor pointed out that a parce Imailed from Long Beach, Calif., to Alexandria, Va., without ZIP Code must be halted enroute at Cincinnati for further sorting. From there it is sent to the Washington, D. C. sectional center and then forwarded to Alexandria.

If the package is ZIP Coded, it will by - pass Cincinnati and move directly to Alexandria through the Washington sectional center. This usually saves at least 24 hours.



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Christmas greetings began moving through the Pampa Post Office last week in a hurried up pace — a pace that is expected to increase during the coming days to reach a record high volume of mail for local facilities.

Postal employes start handling incoming and outgoing mail at 5:30 a.m. each day and shifts are still moving mail at 9 o'clock at night. The 52 Pampa Post Office workers expect a record volume of mail this year. The total volume of mail in the United States has been rising at about three per cent a year.

Pampa Postmaster O.K. Gaylor says that public cooperation is one maportant reason post offices are able to handle the growing volume of holiday mail. The use of ZIP Codes, securely wrapped packages, proper addressing and early mailing all helps postal employes meet the mail avalanche. **DISTRIBUTION** — Clerk J. D. Williams, top left photo, reaches for a bundle of mail being distributed to carriers and post office box holders. Four clerks distribute incoming first class mail to 17 local mail carriers during a three-hour period each morning.


