Stage Set for Fight On Defense Slashes

Protests Come Quick, Loud on M'Namara Plan

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara announced sweeping plans Saturday to transfer the 300,000-man Army Reserve into the National Guard. Key federal employees and congressmen who are reservists also would be put into inactive standby reserve.

Reaction was loud and immediate. Some legislators vowed to fight it. The Reserve Officers Association (ROA) called it "monstrous." But McNamara said it would save \$130 million a year and increase the nation's combat readiness.

At a news conference, McNamara ticked off a series of reorganization moves certain to arouse stubborn opposition: —The "unit structure" of the Army Reserve will be transferred to the National Guard; units will be eliminated for which there is no military requirement; Army Reserve will consist of individuals rather than units, and the authorized strength of the National Guard will be increased from 400,000 to 550,000 men.

Transfer Key Employees — Key federal personnel — which could include 83 congressmen — in the ready reserve will be transferred to the inactive standby reserve. McNamara said they would be "more valuable to the national security" in their current jobs than in the Army.

Plans to consolidate the Air Force Reserves and the Air National Guard still are under study and should be completed in a few weeks.

Guerrillas Kill 500 Government Troops In S. Viet Attacks

Two Americans Dead, Five Wounded In Latest Raid Series Near Saigon

SAIGON (UPI) — Communist troops smashed government forces in a five-pronged day-long assault southwest of Saigon that killed two American soldiers, wounded five others and left one missing and feared captured, a U. S. military spokesman said Saturday night.

U. S. military sources said Vietnamese government losses in the action Friday, will probably exceed an entire battalion about 500 to 600 men.

The new U. S. casualties raised to nine the number of Americans killed in combat in South Viet Nam this week.

In Saigon, another U. S. soldier was wounded when a terrorist bomb exploded Saturday night in a bar frequented by Americans in a busy downtown street. At least 12 Vietnamese were injured by the blast.

Begin Hunger Strike
On the political front, South Viet Nam's three most powerful Buddhist leaders began a 48-hour hunger strike against the U. S.-backed government of Premier Tran Van Huong.

But American spokesmen reiterated their support for Huong's government, despite the dramatic action of hunger strikers Thich (venerable) Tinh Khet, Thich Tam Chau and Thich Tri Quang who gathered in the incense-dimmed chapel of the National Buddhist Center.

A U. S. military spokesman said the five coordinated Communist attacks occurred 110 miles southwest of Saigon.

The major Viet Cong assault began with an attack that almost succeeded in overrunning the Long My district capital. It led to three daring ambushes and was climaxed by an assault on the depleted garrison

Tshombe Claims Revolution Is at An End in Congo

ROME (UPI) — Congolese Premier Moise Tshombe declared Saturday the revolution which ripped his African nation and led to wholesale massacres "has ended." He said there were no organized rebel forces remaining and that their leaders had fled.

He cancelled his trip to the United Nations and announced he was returning to Leopoldville. Tshombe had planned to lodge charges with the U. N. Security Council against African countries allegedly giving military aid to the Congo rebels.

(Arms reportedly shipped to the Congo rebels by Algeria and the United Arab Republic were hurriedly recalled when it was believed they might fall into the hands of Tshombe's national army, diplomatic sources in Khartoum, Sudan, said Saturday.)

Tshombe announced the "end" of the revolution and his sudden change in travel plans just before he flew to Munich, Germany. He arrived Saturday evening and said he was to address the Rhine-Ruhr Club in Dusseldorf Tuesday before flying back to the Congo, probably on Wednesday.

Meeting with newsmen in his Rome hotel, Tshombe declared: "The revolution in the Congo has ended."

He said his trip to New York had become unnecessary because the United Nations accepted his country's complaint "more rapidly than anticipated."

"We can no longer tolerate the intrusion in our internal affairs of Ghana, Algeria, the Sudan and Egypt — these countries must realize that they are serving a lost cause," he added.

Burch Declares GOP Must Try for Unity

WASHINGTON (UPI) — GOP National Chairman Dean Burch said Saturday there has to be a compromise in the bitter intra-party fight over his ouster if Republicans are to unite to win future elections.

But he fears both moderates and conservatives are "locked in position" for a damaging showdown at a National Committee meeting in Chicago Jan. 22-23.

The 36-year-old Arizona attorney told United Press International in an exclusive interview that both sides must "pull back" — with his opponents assuring that Sen. Barry Goldwater will be included in any conferences on reshaping the party.

Burch said, however, that the moderates — a term he dislikes for "its lack of definition" — are forcing him and Goldwater to "see it through."

Questions Moderate Aims
The question is whether the party can afford to retain Barry Goldwater out of it," he said. And again, he added:

"The question is whether forcing Goldwater and me into a conference is the way to win elections."

Burch was interviewed in his office just after a hurried call had put him in touch with Michigan Gov. George Romney, a leader in the moderates' drive to unseat him. The chairman, who sought the conference, met briefly with Romney, then rode with him to National Airport in an effort to explain his attitude.

He said he "didn't get any encouragement" from the exchange.

Burch is unhappy about the fact, as he puts it, that he has spent most of his time since Goldwater's crushing presidential defeat Nov. 3 dealing with the moves to lift his scalp. He said he would force a voting showdown at Chicago "if someone else doesn't."

The moderates have made it clear they will.

Scouts will place them in city and county offices and in business houses over the city.

Leonard cited Scouting as one of America's most powerful means of fighting juvenile delinquency and "in training our youth of today for leadership tomorrow."

Police Holding Two Men, Girl In Texas Slaying

CARTHAGE, Tex. (UPI) — Louisiana police seized two men and an 18-year-old girl Saturday for the killing of one Carthage policeman and the wounding of another a block from the county courthouse. One of the men, an escaped convict, confessed.

The slain policeman was J. M. (Pete) Woods, 33, six years on the force and father of two children. Policeman Fred Williams, 48, was shot in the shoulder. His condition was fair.

Thomas W. Shaw, 25, a Louisiana convict who escaped while being treated in New Orleans Charity Hospital nine days ago, confessed shooting the policeman, according to Panola County District Attorney K. Baker.

The other two were Otis Arden Webb, 39, who also has a criminal record, and Edna Liotta, 18, both of New Orleans. Shaw identified them. They were captured in Shreveport and rangers left Carthage to get them.

Baker declined to make details of Shaw's confession public but he charged him with murder with malice in the shooting of Woods.

The car in which Webb and Miss Liotta were riding ran over Woods after he was shot.

Woods was shot in the head and stomach and physicians thought he was dead when the car passed over him.

Woods stopped the car in which the three were riding about 3:15 a.m. EST. Saturday because of the robbery of a drugstore earlier in Mount Pleasant, Tex. The robbers were believed to be in a stolen automobile.

But before Woods got out to check, he radioed for help and Williams answered the call. Shaw was reported to have gotten out of the car and to have shot Woods. The car with Webb and Miss Liotta in it, sped off.

Americans Wounded
Two enlisted men and one U. S. Army officer — pilot were wounded aboard U. S. Huey helicopters that were peppered by Communist groundfire.

U. S. military headquarters in Saigon, meanwhile, disclosed that a U. S. Army enlisted advisor missing in a massive Communist ambush in Dinh Binh Province Dec. 8 has been found dead.

The spokesman identified the soldier as SP5 William R. Hamlin of Seattle, Wash.

In Saigon, the Buddhist hunger strike began at 3 p.m. (2 a.m. EST) to the sound of gongs and chanted prayers in the chapel of the Unified Church's center.

Of the strikers, Tinh Khet is chairman of the Unified Church, Tam Chau directs the church's secular affairs and Tri Quang heads its religious affairs department.

Duke Coming To Texas for An Operation

NEW YORK (UPI) — The ailing 70-year-old Duke of Windsor, accompanied by his American-born duchess and 21 pieces of luggage, left New York by train Saturday night for Houston, Tex., where he will undergo vascular surgery.

The duke, looking wan and tired, grimly described his trip as "not a pleasure trip" but "business of a kind." He wore a tan topcoat and was hatless and rode in a limousine to the railroad station.

The former British king, who has a ballooning artery caused by a weak spot in an artery wall in his abdomen, will be operated on early next week at Houston's Methodist Hospital by Dr. Michael J. deBakey, a cardiovascular expert.

ing from detachment to brigade size are under the overall command of the Eighth Army Corps.

The peace time size of a division is 12,000 authorized men while a brigade has only 3,200 men. Some brigades will be independent while others will be under the command of one of eight high-priority divisions which is being retained.

Maj. Gen. William R. Calhoun, commander of the 8th Army Corps said in Austin that it will be months before anyone knows how Texas and New Mexico Army reservists will be affected by McNamara's order merging the reserve and guard.

"Until we have many, many planning conferences, nobody will know who goes into the reserve (non active status) pool and who goes into the guard," Calhoun said.

Air Force Reserve and National Guard units were not immediately affected. But McNamara indicated similar shifts are under study in the air units and may be announced in a few weeks.

The Pampa National Guard, 1st Battle Group, 142nd Infantry, 36th Division, has 88 enlisted men and five officers.

Wes Langham, sergeant in the local unit, said last night the order actually means that the two Texas guard units will be disbanded and reorganized into smaller brigades.

"The re-organization might also mean the changing of the units' regimentation," said Langham. "Under this order, we do not know whether the local guard unit will be an artillery, infantry or maybe an armored brigade," he said.

The local army reserve will be incorporated into the local guard as part of the order, Langham said.

"I expect you can anticipate some violent reaction," Maj. Gen. Harley B. West of Dallas, commander of the 49th division, said Saturday in Austin.

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Scranton Wants Overhaul Of Republican Leadership

NEW YORK (UPI)—Pennsylvania Gov. William W. Scranton Saturday strongly endorsed the ouster of Republican National Chairman Dean Burch as the first step to erase the "image" that the GOP is an "exclusive" party.

In remarks prepared for the Trumbull Society of New York, Scranton warned that the GOP is doomed to be a "perpetual minority" without an overhaul in national leadership and a "blood transfusion."

The address was liberally sprinkled with indirect attacks on U.S. Sen. Barry Goldwater,

1964 Republican presidential nominee, though it cited neither him or Burch, his handpicked national chairman, by name. But Scranton made clear his likes were directed at the two leaders of the forces which thwarted his 11th hour bid to grab the GOP presidential nomination last summer.

Scranton told the society, a New York area "moderate" Republican group, "The unhappy impression is abroad in the land today that the Republican party has tended toward a policy of exclusion, rather than inclusion."

"At this time and in this contest of exclusion, I would favor replacing the national chairman even if he agreed absolutely and completely with me on every issue, on every philosophical detail," he continued.

"Whether he is a conservative or a liberal or a moderate or a right-handed fiddle player, the national chairman must step down because that's the only way we can begin to say to Americans that we truly want to become a broad-based, majority party."

Allies Mystified By Soviet Plan

BERLIN (UPI) — Western allied missions here expressed surprise Saturday over a sudden Soviet proposal that U.S., British and French officials in West Berlin meet with the Russians regularly to discuss "matters of mutual interest."

The proposal was made informally. It mystified Western allied officials here and put them on guard.

County Commission To Meet Tomorrow

Gray County Commissioners are expected to pay monthly bills and handle only routine business as they meet at 10 a.m. Monday, according to Judge Bill Craig.

Craig said no specific matters are slated to be considered by the commissioners during the semi-monthly meeting.

McNamara's plan for transferring the reserves to the National Guard will slash the total authorized strength of the drill-paid Army Reserves from 700,000 to 550,000 men, but the cuts would come through wholesale elimination of units which McNamara said are now militarily worthless.

It involves elimination of 21 of the 29 civilian reserve divisions, including 15 of the 23 in the National Guard. The number of combat brigades in the National Guard would be increased from 11 to 16.

He said the 21 divisions to be eliminated contain only 168,400 men compared to a required combat mobilization strength of 850,000 men.

Under the new program, thousands of young reservists who have an obligatory enlistment will have to go into the guard or serve as individuals in the reserve.

As for the reservists holding a key federal post, they do not have to serve in the guard. They can resign from the reserve.

McNamara would not say directly that President Johnson has given his full support. But he said the plan would be presented to Congress as "representing the views of the administration." He said a "major portion" of the savings would be reflected in the budget to be submitted in January.

"I feel sure that Congress will exercise its own judgment on the composition of forces, both active and reserve," Thurmond said.

Rep. F. Edward Hobert, D-La., served notice that his House military affairs subcommittee would make a full inquiry.

The ROA, representing about 50,000 reserve officers outside the National Guard, appealed directly to President Johnson to block the plan. They called it evidence of "the vendetta that civilian planners have waged against the reserves."

The ROA said if reserve forces are placed under the National Guard it would indicate that McNamara felt that "governors and their political appointees can and have done a better job of training than the regular officers appointed over the reserve forces."

Eliminates Units

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Wildcatters Hit Four Oil and 26 Gas Discoveries

AUSTIN (UPI)—Texas wildcatters had four oil and 26 gas discoveries last week, the State Railroad Commission reported Saturday.

The activity gave wildcatters 335 oil and 799 gas completions so far this year compared with 310 oil and 621 gas finds to this date last year.

Regular drillers reported 111 oil and 68 gas completions, giving them 7,988 oil and 2,622 gas wells this year compared with 8,189 oil and 2,321 gas wells in the same period last year.

The oil finds were two in the Midland district and one each in the Corpus Christi and San Angelo districts.

Gas discoveries were eight each in the Refugio and Corpus Christi districts, four in the Houston district, two each in the San Antonio and Pampa districts and one each in the Abilene and Midland districts.

The average calendar day allowable was 2,926,661 barrels. The commission said 207,662 wells were producing from 8-178 fields.

Former Kennedy Aide Named As LBJ Assistant

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Richard N. Goodwin, 33-year-old former aide to President John F. Kennedy, has been named a White House special assistant by President Johnson.

Goodwin, who has worked as a speech-writer for Johnson, Thursday was assigned to handle a broad range of domestic problems and programs, according to White House Press Secretary George E. Reedy.

Reedy said that Goodwin, who had been on temporary assignment to Johnson's staff for the past few months, would be working on the federal anti-poverty program and other matters.

At the same time, Reedy said he knew nothing about reports that two former Kennedy aides — P. Kenneth O'Donnell and David J. Powers — were about their White House jobs.

Reedy said that Jack Valenti, another Johnson special assistant, has taken over O'Donnell's duties as appointments secretary. He said O'Donnell has been busy with other matters during the election campaign and still was working on details of Johnson's inauguration Jan. 20.

SEIZED MORE DRUGS
WASHINGTON (UPI) — The U.S. Customs Bureau reports it seized almost four times more illegal narcotics during the year which ended June 30 than the year before.

Seizures of opium, heroin, other narcotics and marijuana totaled 3,200,976 grams in fiscal 1964 compared to 923,433 grams in fiscal 1963, the bureau said Thursday. All of the drugs were seized at seaports and border crossings.

Reedy Says It's Policy to Keep Salaries Secret

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Press Service Committee Chairman and Secretary George E. Reedy declined during the weekend to make public the salaries he and nine other special presidential assistants make but said they will be announced shortly.

Reedy explained that Civil Service Committee Chairman John Macy, who has been assigned as President Johnson's top talent searcher for federal posts, is currently conducting a study of White House salaries. Salary data will be provided after that study is completed and in connection with the budget, Reedy said.

Reedy commented in reply to a series of questions from newsmen who contended, in effect, that the salaries of the public officials should be public knowledge available on request.

The questions were an outgrowth of Reedy's announcement Thursday that Richard Goodwin had been appointed a special assistant by President Johnson. Goodwin's salary was not announced.

Holiday Season To Be Observed At White House

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The White House plans to ring in the holiday season with the sound of Christmas bells and three parties. At two of them, children will be the honored guests.

The social schedule for the Christmas season will include a party Dec. 16 for underprivileged children, the annual reception for the White House staff Dec. 17, and a party the following day for children of White House personnel.

This party will feature entertainment by the Holland Bell Choir from the Mt. Vernon Place Methodist Church here. The choir performs with tuned handbells.

The White House said that 150 children from area settlement houses supported by the United Givers Fund would be guests at the first party on Wednesday.

The agenda includes Santa Claus, ice cream and goodies, the Marine Band playing Christmas carols, and a puppet show. This party will be held in the East Room.

On Thursday, White House staff members will gather at 6 p.m. for a buffet to be served in the dining room.

Use of ZIP Code Speeds Up Mail

All major post offices have recently converted their parcel post sorting and transportation facilities to the ZIP Code system, Postmaster O. K. Gaylor said Saturday.

This is important to people in all areas of the country, since almost every parcel at one time on its trip goes through these offices. The use of ZIP codes can save 24 hours or more in the delivery of most parcel post. "ZIP Codes on parcels means a far less chance of damage because of more direct routing and fewer handlings, but the success of the program hinges on public use of the ZIP Code numbers in addressing packages," he said.

Gaylor suggested that even if people do not know the ZIP Code of the address to which their mail is going, they should use the code on return addresses. When cards and packages arrive, the five digit return address codes should be added to Christmas lists for use in the future. ZIP coded mail from smaller post offices will generally be sent to the nearest main post office or "sectional center." From there, it is sent directly to the sectional center nearest the final destination. In most instances, this eliminates at least one further separation of mail.

Gaylor pointed out that a package mailed from Long Beach, Calif., to Alexandria, Va., without ZIP Code must be halted enroute at Cincinnati for further sorting. From there it is sent to the Washington, D. C. sectional center and then forwarded to Alexandria.

If the package is ZIP coded, it will by-pass Cincinnati and move directly to Alexandria through the Washington sectional center. This usually saves at least 24 hours.

Motorist Shoots 190 Feet Into Space Off Bridge

PITTSBURGH (UPI)—A motorist crashed a wooden barrier Saturday and raced across the unfinished Fort Duquesne Bridge. He crashed another barrier at the open north end of the span and hurtled off into space.

The car soared through the air for about 190 feet and landed on its top on the north bank of the Allegheny River.

The motorist, Frederick Williams, 21, of 83 Mt. Airy Road, Basking Ridge, N.J., a University of Pittsburgh student climbed out of the car, hailed a taxicab and went to Allegheny General Hospital. He was treated for shock and released.

BONN (UPI)—Mrs. Joseph Kennedy, mother of the late President, arrived Saturday from Copenhagen in connection with the opening Tuesday of an exhibition of her son's private papers and some of his White House furniture.

The wife of Ambassador George McGhee met Mrs. Kennedy at nearby Wahn Airport. The Kennedy exhibition has appeared in several European cities.

Wiley Reynolds advises me there will be a Chamber of Commerce agricultural committee meeting at the Court House Cafe on Tuesday, at 12 noon. All agricultural committee members are urged to be present. Main topic will be plans for the com-

ing Top Q' Texas Junior Livestock Show. Last week we helped Clyde Carruth take some measurements for the purpose of building a new lighter weight sales arena. We believe this will be an excellent improvement.

Rain

Raymond Maddox reports receiving .75 inch of rain last Wednesday night. Jerry Thomas, 8 miles southwest of Pampa, got better than an inch. Amos Harris reports .70 inch. The rain seemed to be general over much of the High Plains. We need two weeks of warm weather to improve the growth of our wheat. Wheat pasture has dwindled pretty fast due to the unseasonably cold weather.

Cattle Feeding

Rex McAnelly reports they have over 7,000 head of cattle in their feed lot. Usually wheat pasture cuts into the number going into feed lots.

Income Tax School

We had around 60 people that attended our one day income tax school last Wednesday. They came from Potter, Gray, Lipscomb, Hemphill, Wheeler, Hutchinson, Roberts, Ochiltree and Carson counties. Thirteen towns were represented. Most of the out of towners were income tax accountants that file reports for farmers. Around half were local farmers or accountants. We have heard many complaints on Don Bell's, Internal Revenue Service, presentation as well as our farm management's specialist James Murphy, Amarillo. We have about 30 of our 1965 Farmer's Tax Guides left. Seventy have been distributed. If you need a copy call our office, and we will be happy to mail you one.

Income Tax

There are many new changes in the income tax laws that will affect your 1964 return. Whether you are a farmer or not it would pay you to study many of the changes. Most of them are to your benefit. Other than lowering of rates, change in procedure on investment credit and a few other minor items the 1040F farm form will be essentially the same. The main changes that all tax payers will want to look into closely are (1) new minimum standard deduction (2) no tax due on sale of residence in certain cases (3) auto tag and certain other forms of state tax not deductible. If you make out your own return, start getting your figures together now and don't wait until the last minute to ask for help on specific problems. Richard White at the local Internal Revenue Service will gladly help on specific problems as much as he can. You can help matters greatly by taking your problems to him early.

Gray County SCD News

Robert Rapstine reports that a diversion he recently completed worked real well during the last rains. Robert plans to carry out a complete conservation plan over the next three years.

In 1950 the population of the United States was 151 million people; 1960, 180 million; in 1980 the expected population is 260 million; and 385 million in 2000. The world population is increasing at this same rate and even greater in some countries. From the above figures we can see a good reason for controlling erosion on farms and ranches in the U.S.

The maintenance or improvement of soil fertility should be considered a major item in any conservation cropping system. Soils that become depleted in nutrients will not produce as they should. A reduction in yield means a reduction in plant residues. A reduction in plant residue means that the land is more susceptible to erosion.

Each time we remove a crop from the land or lose soil through erosion, part of the soil fertility is lost. A 40 bushel wheat crop contains 50 pounds of nitrogen, 25 pounds of phosphorus and 15 pounds of potassium; 4 tons of alfalfa contains 180 lb. of nitrogen, 40 pounds of phosphorus, 180 lb. of potassium and 112 pounds of calcium; 120 bushels of grain sorghum contains 100 lb. of nitrogen, 50 lb. of phosphorus, and 30 lb. of potassium.

Texas Receives Quota for Sugar Beet Production

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Agriculture Department has allocated 6,335 acres to Texas for sugar beet production in 1965.

Nationally, the agency allocated total acreage of 1,375,000 acres to 22 states which produce sugar beets.

Other acreages — Colorado 176,101; Kansas 20,664; New Mexico 91.

Allocations from the national reserve to meet commitments in acres included New Mexico 2,500 and Texas 22,230.

The department allocated 1,225,165 acres to established areas in 21 states and distributed from the national reserve 118,815 acres to nine states to meet previous commitments.

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Edward G. Robinson celebrated his 71st birthday this week by starting work in his umpteenth movie.

No one in motion pictures has starred during a greater span of years — from 1924 through 1964 — and apparently no one is less impressed than the long-time film tough guy.

But he does have an explanation for his professional longevity.

"Take Jack Benny and George Burns," he said, avoiding the obvious reference to himself. "You know why they

are still around? Why they are still stars?

"There are three reasons. One, talent. Two, they're stage struck. Three, they are somebody on their own."

The same can be applied to Robinson.

He is a man of enormous charm and wit and listens and speaks with a youthful intensity that belies the years. At 71 he is gray at the temples and his goatee is more white than black. But his voice is rich and vibrant.

Back in 1924 Robinson starred in "The Bright Shawl," his only silent movie. This week he co-stars with Steve McQueen — who hadn't been born when Robinson made his movie debut — in "The Cincinnati Kid" at MGM.

"Perhaps my durability is due to enthusiasm and interest in what I'm doing," Robinson said. "It takes an understanding of people. You must always be contemporary."

In second round action Richard Drug Synonyms took Pampa Jaycees 87-42. Roy Poole with 23 points and John Perry with 16 points. First National

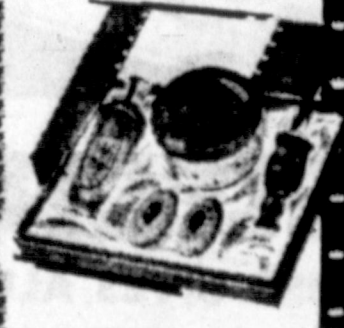

Only Another Pine Tree Can Tell Which Is Which

WASHINGTON (UPI) — One of the duties of a newspaperman is to investigate rumors to see whether they are true or false.

Last weekend, when I was at a fox hunt near Southern Pines, N. C., I heard a rather interesting rumor regarding the sex life of pine trees.

A person who claimed to be "in the know" told me that pine trees occasionally change sex for no apparent reason. A tree that starts out as a male winds up as a female, and vice versa.

He said things get so confused that only another pine tree can tell which is which.

My informant said he understood that paper mills, which depend on pine tree for pulp, had undertaken a research program to try to determine what caused the changeover.

Slow Motion Cameras

He said he had heard that scientists were using slow motion cameras in hopes of photographing a pine tree in the act of transferring, so they could learn how the process works.

When I returned to Washington, I checked out the rumor with Lon Dill of West Point, Va., one of the Eastern Seaboard's leading pine ecologists.

Dill, who works for the Chesapeake Corp., a pulp and paper firm, said there was nothing to it. He said the rumor apparently was a twisted version of some research that the paper industry has been doing in tree genetics.

Dill, said impartial and unbiased studies have shown

that "pine trees and other conifers are both male and female."

Both In One

"There is a male holly tree, for example, and a female holly tree," he said. But the conifer wraps up both sexes in one tree.

The cone is the female portion. A flower which showers down a yellow pollen is the male portion. When they get together, you have little pine trees standing all over the place."

Nicely put, I would say. When Dill explains the pine tree facts of life, it all seems fine and beautiful.

He went on to say that the genetic research program was undertaken to develop pedigreed pines. "What happens is this:

When a tree geneticist finds a superior pine tree, he obtains a cutting. Rather than climbing to the high crown, he often takes a rifle and shoots down a limb, which is grafted to an ordinary tree.

Then the cone is pollinated from another superior tree and the seeds are planted in experimental plots.

It has some of the aspects of a shotgun wedding, but if all goes well the woods will one day be full of superior pines.

Martian Photos May Give Clues On Planet Canals

PASADENA, Calif. (UPI) — Mars has only 213 days left to primp before a television camera aboard America's Mariner-4 snaps the first close-up pictures of its mysterious surface.

Scientists at the California Institute of Technology's Jet Propulsion Laboratory (JPL) said Saturday that they are confident the spacecraft will fly by the red planet at an amazingly close distance of only 5,400 miles.

The historic space rendezvous is set to occur at 6:10 p.m. PST, next July 14, climaxing a 7½-month-long, 325-million-mile journey for the vehicle.

The scientists also told newsmen they are confident that a series of 22 television photos of Mars will be taken by Mariner-4 for relaying to earth.

Although the photographs are not expected to answer the age-old riddle of whether some form of life exists on Mars, it is anticipated that they may provide clues about the Martian canals which have fascinated man since invention of the telescope.

The actual picture-taking will start when Mariner-4 is zooming past Mars at a distance of 9,000 to 8,000 miles in a downward angle.

Primary goal of the spacecraft is to photograph the surface of Mars and to take scientific readings on radiation, magnetic forces and space dust surrounding Mars. The information should tell scientists the density of the martian atmosphere and whether a space ship can land on the planet.

What's This? No Pekinese Dogs In All Peking

TOKYO (UPI) — President Johnson may have his Beagles, but there's nary a Pekinese in all Peking.

There soon will be, however. When the Communist Chinese freighter Hsien Feng sails from Kobe next Sunday, it will have aboard a pair of four-month-old Pekinese puppies.

The puppies are the gift of Miss Shigeko Yuri, a Tokyo authoress, to Liao Cheng Chih, chairman of the China-Japan Friendship Association.

When she visited Peking last March, Miss Yuri was told by Liao that not a single Pekinese could be found in Peking today. They were all carried away by the British as booty after the 1842 opium war, Liao said.

PREPARING EXERCISE
WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Navy and Marine Corps are reported to be preparing for a giant exercise in the Pacific—"Silver Lance"—to run from Feb. 23 to March 12, 1965.

Reports indicated that the seagoing war games would be as large as those conducted in the Atlantic during October under the code name "Steel Pike," which involved 22,000 sailors and 28,000 Marines in landings on the coast of Spain.

There has been no official announcement of the exercise as yet.

Salinger Will Quit His Senate Post on Dec. 31

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Sen. Pierre Salinger, D-Calif., announced yesterday he would resign his Senate seat Dec. 31 in order to give California's Republican Senator-elect George Murphy an edge on seniority.

Salinger said, Gov. Brown has told me he will appoint Senator-elect George Murphy to my post."

Ordinarily Salinger would have relinquished the seat in January.

Salinger also announced he would assume duties as vice president of National General Corp., an entertainment organization that exhibits and produces motion pictures and has extensive closed-circuit theater television holdings.

Ceremony to Honor Memory Of Texan, Negroes' Friend

HOUSTON (UPI)—A special ceremony Monday will honor the memory of the late E. E. Worthing, a white man who left his fortune to educate young Negroes. Worthing, who died in 1951, said he became rich from selling real estate to Negroes and wanted to do something in return. At the time of his death, he left more than \$1 million to help Negro high school graduates seek a higher education in college. It was his largest, but not his only donation to charity during his life. Already, 255 scholarship funds



have been awarded to Negro high school graduates. Recipients of the awards are allowed to attend the school of their choice. A principal and committee at each Negro school decide who will receive the awards each year. Many of the recipients from across the U.S. now graduates, will return for the memorial service, set for 10 a.m. CST. John West Jr., a teacher at Worthing High School where the memorial is to be held, and who once received a scholarship to enter college, will give an eulogy entitled, "E. E. Worthing—the benefactor."

Representatives from the honor societies of five Negro high schools and retired teachers have been invited to attend the services, in addition to the school's 1,475 students. The 30-member high school boys choir will sing, "Once to Every Man and Nation," and the band will play "Kamenoi Ostrow." A memorial prayer will be offered by the Rev. R. E. Robinson during the service. Worthing, who was 69 when he died, started out in the late 1920's selling real estate. He saw the need for apartment housing in the Negro communities and expanded from there. He was a contractor as well as an owner of property, and built houses to sell and rent.

Assistant FBI Chief Retires

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Courtney A. Evans, an assistant director of the FBI and one of its financial experts, is retiring after a 24-year career as a government sleuth. Evans is leaving his \$34,500-a-year job for personal reasons, an FBI spokesman said Saturday. He plans to enter private law practice. The 56-year-old Evans was a bank embezzlement detection specialist, along with being an expert on the confidence racket, and organized crime. Evans said his decision to resign was in no way connected with the controversy over his boss, J. Edgar Hoover, who has been criticized for his statements on civil rights, the Supreme Court and the Warren Commission.

STILL HOPING that the Pampa School Board will give a good long look at the eligible candidates from inside the school system for the position of head football coach before turning to outside candidates, this department would like to bring forth the name of another eligible, Lee ninth grade coach John Hale.

I did err when I said that Eural Ramsey was the only candidate with head coaching experience, John Hale had many years experience as a head football and basketball coach, both in Texas and in Colorado, before joining the Pampa coaching system.

A graduate of Roby High School, where he was an all-district quarterback and a trackman and basketballer, John played college football at Howard Payne as QB. Going in to coaching, he was head man at Lohne, Trent and Novice, as well as at Sargent and Del Norte, Colo., producing two district football champions and a couple of top cage teams as well.

Following the 1957 season, John wished to return to Texas because of his wife's health, and Babe Kurfman hired him to coach Pampa's 7th grade in 1958. Moving to Lee as assistant 9th grade coach, John went on to head coach there, before coach Otis Holladay released him when he made his staff changes. Out one year, John returned to Lee as head coach in 1963.

With a long record of winning football, basketball, baseball and track behind him, Hale makes no bones about the fact that he would make some changes in the system if he were offered the post.

"I feel that we should play our own level at all levels competitively," said Hale, explaining that he felt the junior highs should play other junior highs, not small-school B teams, our sophomores should play their sophomores such as Amarillo's jayvees, and our B or C team should be composed of transfers and juniors not quite ready for the varsity.

"A more personal interest should be shown in the athletes, all the way from seventh grade on up," says the burly Lee head man. "That is the way to develop a winner, from the bottom up."

Can Pampa have a winner soon? Emphatically yes, says Hale. "We have the material for a winning team next season. Once we have a winner and a

winning attitude, we will have the right attitude from the kids coming up, and a constant source of supply for more winners."

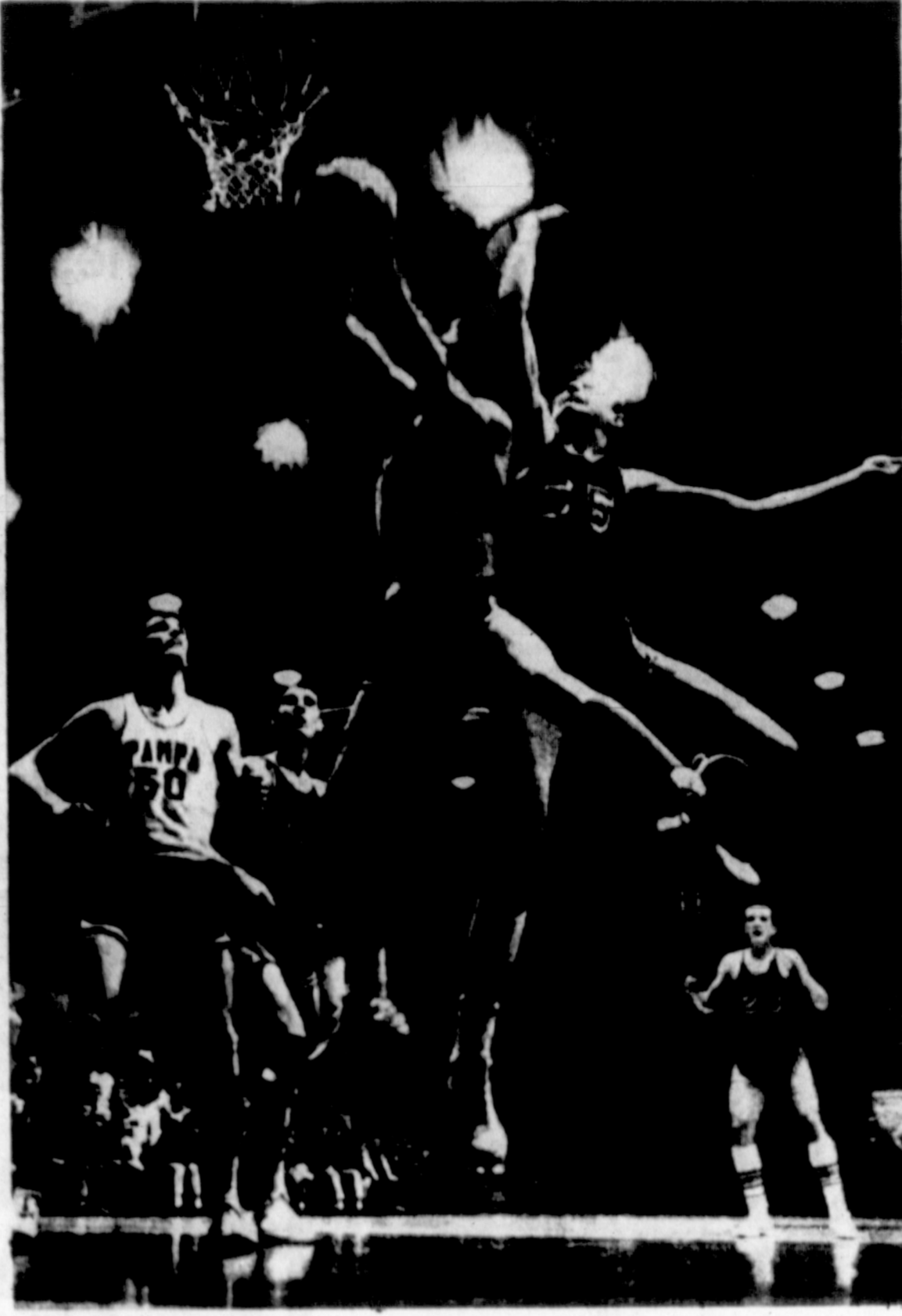

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Garland Grinds Up Rebs, 21-7

DALLAS (UPI)—Rambling Ronnie Scoggins ambled for three touchdowns in the second quarter Saturday to lead the defending state champion Garland Owls into the Texas Class AAAA finals with a 21-7 victory over Amarillo Tascosa.

Scoggins, a 172-pound senior, scored on runs of two, nine and six yards and generally proved a sore thorn in the Panhandle Rebels' side before an estimated 35,000 fans in the Cotton Bowl.

All of the game's scoring was crammed into the second quarter with Doug Valois calling in an eight yard pass from quarterback Ted Pospisil for Amarillo's lone score.

The game was raggedly played with fumble recoveries and interceptions both frequent occurrences.

Interception Sets Score
An interception set up Garland's first touchdown drive which had to carry only 18 yards while a fumble recovery set up the second Garland scoring drive of only 40 yards.

Tascosa drove 67 yards, with two Pospisil passes contributing 24 of the yards to set up his scoring loss to Valois.

That score came with 1:09 left in the first half and it appeared that Tascosa might yet get in position to avenge last year's 7-6 loss to Garland at this same stage of the playoffs.

That was only a fleeting idea however, since Scoggins returned the ensuing kickoff 28 yards to the Tascosa 47, and Garland in two plays moved to the Tascosa six yard line, from where Scoggins put the game out of reach.

Scoggins carried the ball 21 times for 103 yards while teammate Clifford Turner picked his way for 81 yards and Roger Parker had 44 more to give the Owls a 263-107 edge on the ground.

Pospisil hit 10 of 16 passes for 140 yards but the Rebels' only other serious drive was turned back inside the Garland two-yard line in the final quarter.

Coach Lou Saban's Buffalo Bills are a little confused—and with good cause, too.

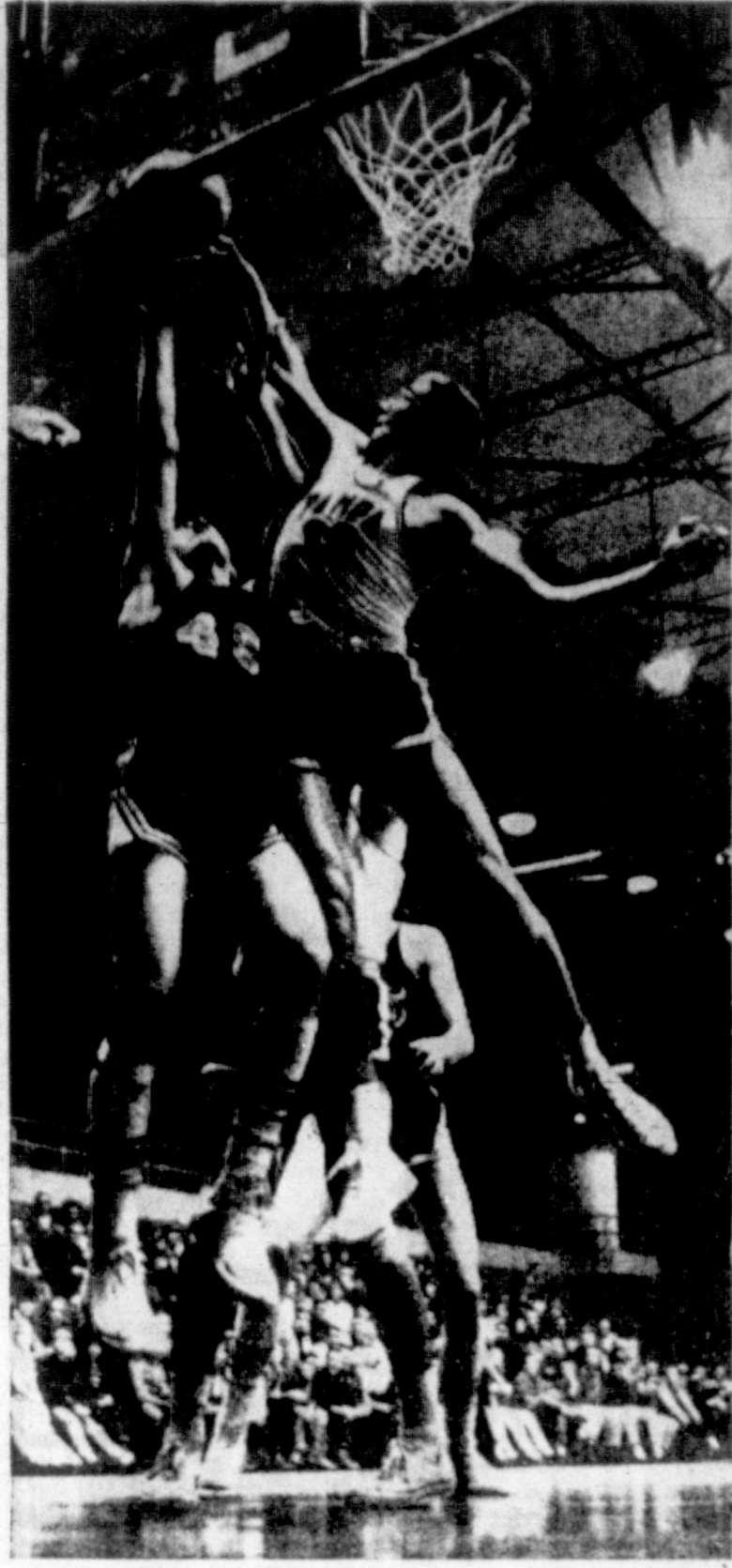

Cleveland Smashes Over Giants, 55-20

NEW YORK (UPI)—Frank Ryan passed for five touchdowns and ran for another Saturday to give the Cleveland Browns a smashing 55-20 victory over the New York Giants and a berth in the National Football League's championship game against the Baltimore Colts at Cleveland, Dec. 27.

A three touchdown surge in the second period and another in the third rocketed the Browns to the Eastern Conference championship with a 10-3-1 record and their eighth appearance in the title game since entering the league in 1950. Their last was 1957.

A defeat Saturday would have put the Browns in a precarious position, with the St. Louis Cardinals needing only a victory or a tie against Philadelphia Sunday to win the division title. The Cards, however, had to settle for second place while the Giants wound up with the worst record in the club's history, 2-10-2.

Ryan ran 12 yards for a second period touchdown that put the Browns in front to stay at 10-7 and then reeled off his five scoring passes with almost ridiculous ease, completing 12 of 13 overall for 202 yards.

Pampans Given Warning On Christmas Gyp Sales

The Solicitors Review Board son of the Chamber of Commerce Saturday warned the public to be on guard against the fraudulent and misleading sales and promotional schemes that flourish during the Christmas season.

Veale secretary of the Review Board. According to the National Better Business Bureau, with which the local Chamber is affiliated, these seasonal swindlers drain millions of dollars yearly from consumers and business men throughout the U.S. They capitalize on the Christmas rush and the fact that people tend to be more generous, more trusting and less likely to turn down a request at that time of year.

Veale said holiday shoppers can protect themselves by avoiding fly-by-night operators and by making Christmas purchases from dealers of known reliability. Based on past experience, he said, the following schemes can be expected to make their appearance again this year.

Mail order bargain offers quoting toys, watches, jewelry and other items allegedly at a fraction of the retail price. When the gift arrives it may be a cheap imitation of the item thought to have been ordered.

Mail and phone appeals for donations from unknown charitable organizations. Attempts to collect on C. O. D. packages supposedly for your neighbor who, the deliverer says, "is not at home."

The package may contain unneeded merchandise or merely paper or cotton wadding. Mail order schemes in which you get a claim stub telling you that the shipper is holding a package which will be sent on return of the stub and a small amount. If you send the money you get a cheap pen-and-pencil set or something similar which you never ordered.

Unordered merchandise appeals by unknown charitable organizations with requests for donations for the goods shipped.

Personal appeals by mail from self-described needy individuals seeking clothing, food, fuel and funds.

Sales may be attempted in offices, on the street or door-to-door. The most widespread scheme involves the sale of well-known brands of colognes and toilet water re-bottled in small, purse size containers by companies having no connection with the original manufacturers, said Veale.

Santa's Helpers Keep Busy Working Christmas Mail



Christmas greetings began moving through the Pampa Post Office last week in a hurried up pace — a pace that is expected to increase during the coming days to reach a record high volume of mail for local facilities.

Postal employees start handling incoming and outgoing mail at 5:30 a.m. each day and shifts are still moving mail at 9 o'clock at night. The 52 Pampa Post Office workers expect a record volume of mail this year. The total volume of mail in the United States has been rising at about three per cent a year.

Pampa Postmaster O.K. Gaylor says that public cooperation is one important reason post offices are able to handle the growing volume of holiday mail. The use of ZIP Codes, securely wrapped packages, proper addressing and early mailing all helps postal employees meet the mail avalanche.

The accompanying layout shows a routine morning in the Pampa Post Office as mail arrives and other parcels get ready to leave for scattered destinations.

PARCEL POST — Postal clerk J. B. White weighs a parcel post package, top right photo, and tells the patron, William Finkbeiner, the cost of mailing. During rush periods patrons line up in front of this window waiting to post their Christmas packages.

DISTRIBUTION — Clerk J. D. Williams, top left photo, reaches for a bundle of mail being distributed to carriers and post office box holders. Four clerks distribute incoming first class mail to 17 local mail carriers during a three-hour period each morning.

CARRIERS SORTING — All mail to be delivered to Pampa residents must be sorted several times before reaching the home mail box. Carrier Gerald Smith stands in front of a line of carriers, bottom left photo, sorting mail given to him for his route. Hundreds of mail slots enable him to put his mail in the order of delivery. After sorting is completed carriers leave for their routes at about 9:30 a.m. and usually finish around 4 p.m.

PACKAGES — Carrier foreman C. A. Scott sorts some of the parcel post packages to be delivered to Pampa residents in the bottom center photo. Scott is in charge of all carriers and all mail delivery. The mail sacks in front of him are next to the last step before residents receive the packages.

OUTGOING — Mrs. J. B. Blakemore, distribution clerk, sorts letters for outgoing mail in the lower right photo. She is sorting letters into a case which is divided according to states. Another case similar to her's is used for Texas mail that is divided into districts and towns.

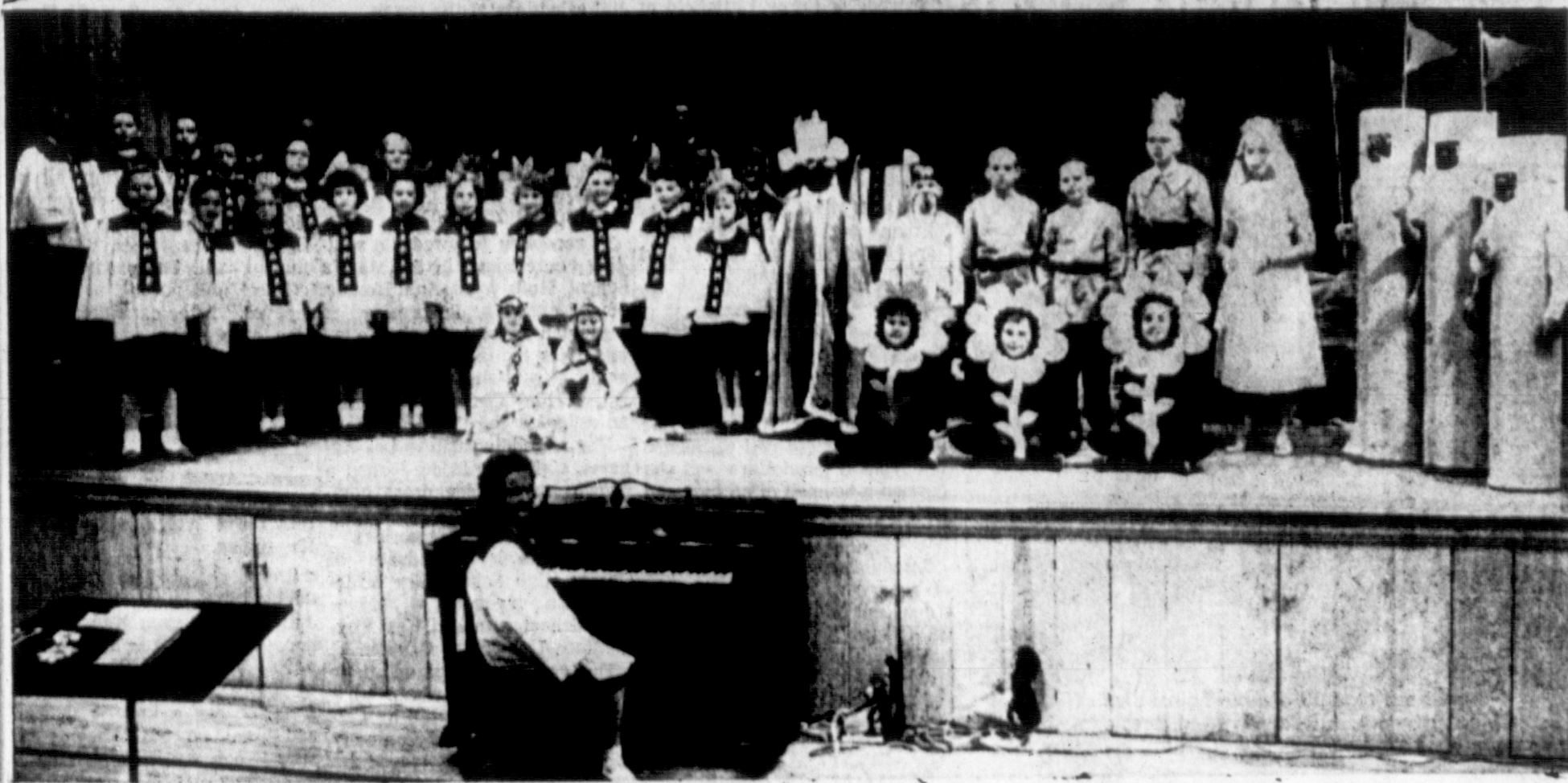

Members of this group are Jackie Nichols, Suzan Hun Judy Cox, Mignon Nichols, W nona Chisum and Cynthia Hogsett.

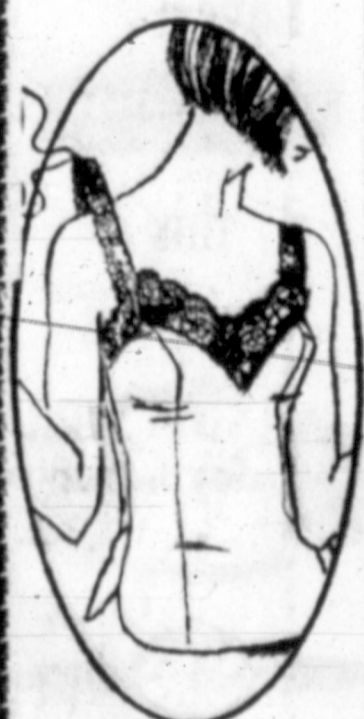

Mrs. Johnson Presents Program for Twentieth Century Forum Club Meeting

Twentieth Century Forum Club met Tuesday in the home of Mrs. Aubrey Steele. Assisting as co-hostess was Mrs. Robert West. Guests were served punch from a crystal bowl upon arrival. The president, Mrs. Arthur Teed, opened the meeting with a Christmas poem after which she presented Mrs. Homer D. Johnson who spoke to the group on "Celebrating Christmas Texas Style." Mrs. Johnson used as her sources of material "Christmas on the American Frontier" by John E. Bauer and "Candle Star and Christmas Tree" by Charles L. Allen and Charles L. Wallis. "Texans are known not only for tall stories but also for open handed hospitality. This was displayed early in 1828 when a kindly lady gave some hominy beaten in a wooden mortar and some fresh milk to a stranger in their midst. It would have been hard to conceive that a frontier Texan would have let a Babe be born in a manger no matter how crowded their border town was," the speaker began. "During the nine perilous years of the Texas Republic, 1836-1845 Christmas was nonetheless a jolly season. True no decorated tree had yet appeared and the giving of gifts was not customary except among the Germans of New Braunfels and other European founded colonies. On Christmas Eve and the day following neighbors assembled in small groups and usually drank punch with whiskey, the national drink after which they danced and discharged firearms as a display of youthful enthusiasm. "Gustav Dresel, a German who visited the Republic in 1839 after spending Christmas with friends whom he had known at Houston felt that the Americans did not give their best to celebrate Christmas. Frankly Dresel remarked 'I did not want to wait long on a buffalo skin while all Germany was jubiling, singing and dancing and kissing, rejoicing that they had gotten through another year and finding everything as it had been before.' Dresel and his new found friends went forth visiting farm after farm, waking the neighbors and as the German put it, 'The housewife fetched the stage's horn, the young daughter baked a maize cake, and we gave the remaining two jugsful of whiskey.' As a reward for his efforts Dresel received eggs, sugar and hot water and from these he made an egg-nog. This was passed around and so the gift giving became mutual. "Yet even in the early Texas frontier life a wholly alcoholic Christmas was not characteristic for in 1846 Ferdinand Roemer another German saw a German Christmas tree in the best finery. It seems that a tree in

the settlement was already a tradition. "With the coming of Texas of the Rev. L. C. Ervendberg a Protestant minister to serve the settlers came the festive of world holiday, with the Holy Eve tree. He had no pine tree but improvised by decorating a large oak. Christmas day he celebrated the Lord's Supper. "Half a decade later with the Abbe Domenech came the Christmas Carol for the young men of Castroville awakening him at Eleven O'clock singing a Christmas hymn. "The spirit of kindness expressed in gift giving was remembered by Texas Governor Hogg when asked by a reporter in the late fifties what Yuletide had meant to him, he reminisced "My first impression of Christmas was made by Santa Claus. I thought that in a great battle with the devil God had won and sent Santa around to celebrate the victory by making presents to the children on his side. Mrs. Johnson continued "Year after year we perform the same rituals at Christmas: We decorate trees. We hang wreaths on our doors. We light candles in home and church. We take our children to see Santa Claus. We

go to Church and sing carols. Why do we do all these things? Christmas means many things to many people but it's meanings are superficial and transitory if they do not mean Christ. To sweep clean the hearth and the heart sweep our lives clear of the cob webs of indifference the clutterings of failure and the odd accumulations of sin. Then we claim Christmas as Christ's day and He will enter our lives as our dearest Guest. In the words of Phillips Brooks: "No ear may hear His coming But in this world of sin Where meek souls will receive Him still The dear Christ enters in." Mrs. Johnson closed her talk by saying that her five wishes on the Christmas star were to have "Courage to face each busy day Faith to trust God all the way Hope to look through shining eyes Love a flame that never dies Joy that sings through sun and rain and in the darkness sings again God turns the Christmas Star to bless You where you are." Refreshment were served to members from a beautifully appointed Christmas Table.

Mrs. Henderson Hostess for Twentieth Century Culture Club Christmas Party

Mrs. E. L. Henderson's home was the scene of Twentieth Century Culture Club annual Christmas party Tuesday. Co-hostess was Mrs. J. R. Donaldson who presented each member with a pair of very clever slipper-slacks she had made.

President, Mrs. N. D. Steele, presided over roll call and a brief business session, after which Mrs. Donaldson introduced Mrs. Ross Buzzard and Mrs. D. W. Bond who presented the program.

Mrs. Buzzard used J. Evetts Haley's Christmas story "A Repealed World - Warmed by the Spirit." The speaker stated that Haley took the story from J. C. Tolman's "Christmas 1887 in Palo Duro Canyon."

"This is a Christmas story with a setting in our own locale in 1887. A party of surveyors was running a survey line across the plains southwest of where Amarillo now stands. A Texan named Phil G. Omohundro was in charge of the party establishing corners and property lines. The lines still stand although the men are gone and forgotten. One of this party was J. C. Tolman," the speaker stated.

"Winter found them still at their monotonous task, far from home and familiar scenes of the Christmas season. They could have no special observance for this season, as work was the order of the day.

"This plain had been the home of the buffalo and their bones, skulls and horns could be seen in any direction. The buffalo chip was the only fuel of the plains and each day the cook would rout the party from their blanket rolls and give them a good hot breakfast of sourdough biscuits baked in hot dutch ovens with a bull-chip fire. Then the party would set out for work covering an average of seven miles a day.

"After leaving the area which became Amarillo, they worked their way southward. One day they started to run a line south and they came upon a beautiful scene. The author said, 'Here the result of the slow erosive action of waters through hundreds of thousands, perhaps millions of years, was a gash cut through the plains for fifty miles. For a long time they gazed in silence and were thrilled with appreciation of the wonderful works of God. Awakening early one morning in their camp by the canyon, they saw the entire canyon mirrored in the sky; a gorgeous phenomenon which lasted for about an hour.

"When supper and chores were done on the evening of December 24, 1887, the men sat around the campfire with the howling of lobo wolves in the background, listening to P. G. relate a novel to them about high-toned society back in Ireland. Upon finishing the story P. G. looked at his watch and said, 'It's past one o'clock. Merry Christmas! They all shook hands.'

Mrs. Buzzard concluded, "Thus as these lonely Texans sat in the glow of a burning cedar in the wild and colorful Palo

Duro Canyon, with snow sifting down upon them, there came that Silent Night, Holy Night where all is calm, all is bright, in a land where there was little to comfort and cheer them except the Spirit of Christmas, which after all is everything."

Mrs. Bond told the history of some of the Christmas carols. "All of the songs sung at Christmas time are not carols. Carols are supposed to have originated from circle dances with themes of New Year, Easter, spring-time and harvest as well as Christmas. The older ones, like folk songs, came directly from the hearts of the people, so that the authors of both words and lyrics have been forgotten. Hymns are religious poems of a lyrical character and are essentially devotional, while the carol narrates the story of the star, the shepherds, the wise men or some other aspect of the Christmas observance in a festive or playful manner. In France, all songs pertaining to the Christmas season, whether hymns or carols, are called Noels; however in England the same word is used but it is spelled 'Nowel.'

After playing each of the carols, Mrs. Bond gave the history of the following carols: "The First Nowel," "God Rest Ye Merry, Gentlemen," "I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day," "Deck the Halls," "Joy to the World," "Rise Up, Shepherd, An' Foller," and "Silent Night! Holy Night!"

Mrs. Bond concluded the program by asking the members to sing "Silent Night."

Renew Sparkle of Favorite Ornaments

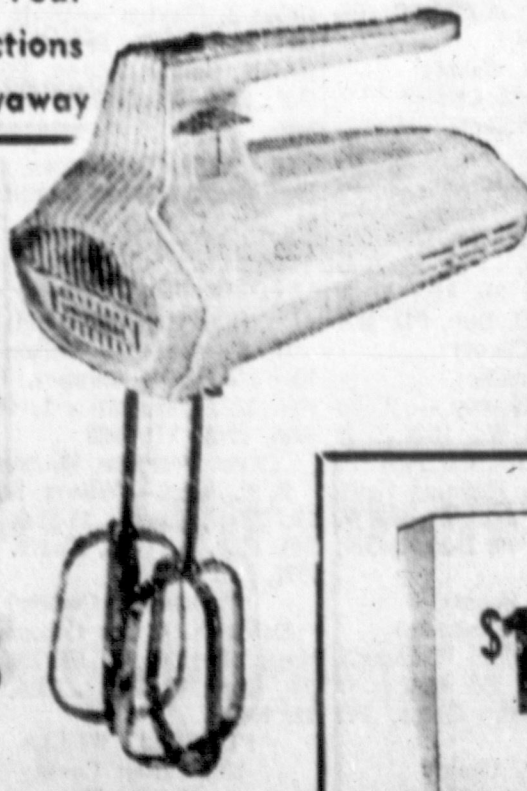

Scientist Says Clam Substance Inhibits Tumors

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A government research scientist said today he and his co-workers have discovered that a substance extracted from clams will inhibit growth of tumors.

The find was announced by the National Institutes of Health in a report prepared by Dr. C. P. Li of the Division of Virologic Standards.

The report, prepared for delivery at a meeting of the New York Academy of Sciences, was based on investigations by Li and Drs. Benjamin Prescott, Bernice Eddy, William Green, G. Caldes, E. C. Martino and A.M. Young.

The report said the substance, known as "paolin," also counteracts bacteria and viruses.

The report said the substance, virus-induced tumors but a spokesman said another scientist, Sister Rosalie Schmoer, Catholic nun, has had similar results with other type of tumors in investigations at Woods Hole, Mass.

The NIH scientists obtained paolin from fresh clams purchased in August and September, the report said.

The tumor-inhibiting capabilities of the extract were determined by administering it to hamsters who also were infected with tumor-producing virus.

'Old Spindletop' Becomes Center Of Court Battle

AUSTIN (UPI)—The edicts of King Charles II in 16th century Spain don't mix very well with hundreds of millions of dollars worth of 20th century Texas oil.

Add in 3,000 descendants of a Texas pioneer who say the oil is theirs, a sprinkling of mammoth petroleum companies who say they've got it and darn well intend to keep it, and you've got the recipe for a complicated half-billion dollar court hassle.

The center - and prize - of the hassle is "Old Spindletop," a marshy oil field near the Gulf of Mexico that was the birthplace of the Texas oil boom. The first great Texas gusher, the Lucas well, came boiling out of the ground there one day in 1901. The area is now pinched in with oil wells.

The roar of that gusher, and the scratch-scratch of some 18th century Spanish official's quill pen, were heard in the Texas Supreme Court Wednesday.

Some 3,000 heirs of Texas pioneer Pelham Humphries, who once held a Mexican title to the Spindletop land in the early 1800s, have been fighting to have the land returned to them.

And they asked for \$500 million in damages for the more than 300 million barrels of oil already taken out of the land.

The Texas Supreme Court gave them an answer Wednesday.

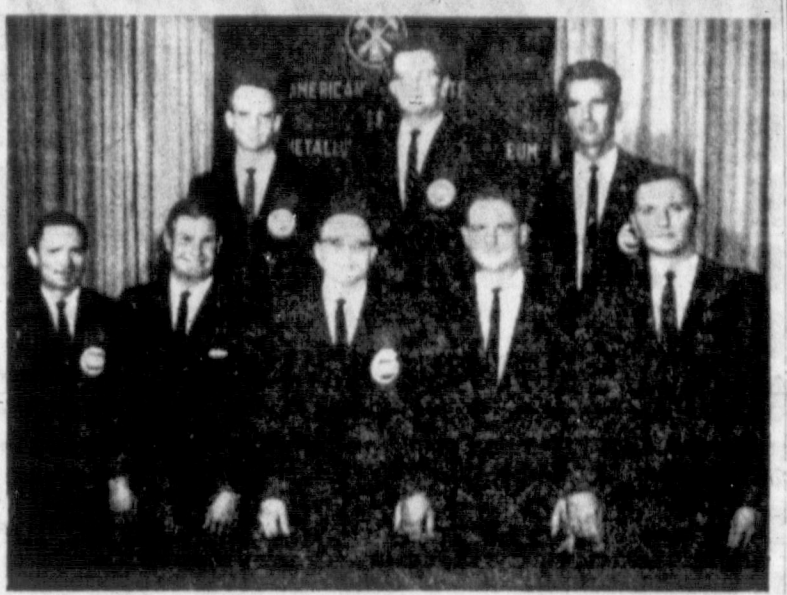
In a word, no.

But the heirs, led by Mrs. Coral P. Jones, are looking around for new legal avenues. They can ask the Texas Supreme Court for another hearing, or go to the federal courts.

The heirs are laying claim to a league of land, a Spanish measure of about 4,439 acres. This league was first surveyed in the 16th century when Texas was part of the overseas Spanish empire.

Independent Says Tax Burden Too Heavy to Carry

DALLAS (SpI) — Independent producers will find it increasingly difficult to stay in business as long as the present climates of taxes and government sentiment prevail, a former top independent believes.

Robert O. Anderson of Roswell, N. M., who earlier this year merged his Hondo Oil and Gas Co. into Atlantic Refining Co., disagrees with the theory, rife within most segments below the "big business" level, that the major oil companies are responsible for the steady stream of sellouts and mergers which has been evident for several years. In an exclusive interview, Anderson has this to say:

"I think the trend toward acquisition by the majors is caused as much, or more, by independents wanting to sell as by the majors having a policy of acquisition. And I think the trend toward sellouts and mergers definitely will continue.

"First of all, the taxes and insurance on the individual businessman — the successful businessman — are burdens almost impossible to carry. For instance, it is almost impossible to pass on to heirs a wholly-owned, closely-held company as long as we have the tax laws we have today."

Anderson, board chairman of Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas and a major interest holder in a number of going concerns outside the oil business, declares that unless there is some change in the tax laws, the small business segment faces continuing troubles — inside the oil industry and outside.

"Frankly," Anderson says, "these factors influence me in my decision to get out of the oil business."

Gate Valve To Be Demonstrated

Public demonstration of the first full-opening gate valve which can be installed in a high-pressure line without shutting down operations will be held at 1 p.m. Dec. 29 at the Top O' Texas rodeo grounds, its inventor, C. L. Thompson of Pampa, announced Saturday.

The "Thompson Mark A-1 Gate Valve" and special cutters he invented will allow the valve to be built into an operating line without blowing the pressure down, shutting down the compressor stations, or clogging the wells. The valve itself will cost about 25 per cent more than the present gate valves, and will eventually be available in sizes two inches to 30 inches.

Thompson points out that when it costs \$1,000 an hour to shut down and build back up even a small plant and takes a minimum of six hours to complete the operations, the savings will be tremendous. Thompson has invited construction engineers from major oil construction companies throughout the United States to be on hand in Pampa for the four-hour demonstration. Included among those invited is the Shreveport, La., chief engineer who told Thompson when he first got the idea fifteen years ago it was impossible. Thompson foresees a

world-wide demand for the valve, which will necessitate building a factory here, thus making Pampa the center of a world-wide gate-valve industry.

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Goldwater Still Has One Chance To Be President

Despite what 69 million voters thought they did on election day, they did not elect a president. The job of actually electing the president falls to only 538 men and women. They vote tomorrow in each of the 50 states and the District of Columbia.

Who are these president-makers? Where do they get their power? The answer is found in the Electoral College, an often-criticized holdover from the days of the founding fathers who didn't trust the popular will.

Here's the way it works: Under Article 2 of the Constitution, each state is entitled to as many electors as it has senators and representatives. At the presidential election time, the voter actually casts his ballot for a slate of electors.

Electors Decide President
It is possible for a presidential candidate to receive more popular votes but lose the election because he failed a majority of the votes in the Electoral College. The anonymous electors can—and have—decided who will be president.

There is nothing to prevent a state for electing a slate of unpledged electors, but if an elector is representing either of the two major parties he theoretically must vote for his party's candidate. The political trouble has been that he doesn't always do this.

As recently as 1960, a defecting Republican elector from Oklahoma voted for Sen. Harry F. Byrd. In 1956, a Democratic elector from Alabama cast his vote for a man who was almost unknown to the nation at large. In 1948, former President Harry S. Truman lost a vote when a Tennessee elector cast his ballot for Sen. Strom Thurmond, who ran for president on the Dixiecrat ticket.

Happened Three Times
The possibility of a mass defection of previously pledged electors is remote, but the idea of a man being elected president with less popular votes, but more electoral votes than his opponent, is not. It has happened three times in the past.

The most famous case was the Rutherford B. Hayes-Samuel J. Tilden battle in 1876. Tilden not only beat Hayes in the popular vote, he had a majority of all the popular votes cast for the five other candidates. But he never became president. The reason lay in a dispute over the electoral votes from Florida, Louisiana, South Carolina, and Oregon. To settle the fight, Congress set up an electoral commission along party lines. The result was that the commission gave the contested votes to Republican Hayes.

Retired General Praises Battle of Bulge Soldiers

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Gen. Anthony C. McAuliffe, a veteran of the historic Battle of the Bulge, credits the doggedness of the American infantryman with foiling a German plan to give Hitler the strategic town of Bastogne for a Christmas present.

McAuliffe and other veterans of the battle attended a meeting of the U.S. Army Association the other night to mark its 20th anniversary. The retired general praised the performance of the individual soldier during the two-week long siege.

"A commander can only put his troops in position and hope they stay there," McAuliffe said. "And that's what they did."

Last Big Offensive
McAuliffe was commander of the 101st Airborne Division in December, 1944, when it was thrown into the breach to stem the last big offensive of the

German war machine. The peppery paratrooper general gained a place in history by his answer of "nuts" to a German demand for surrender at the height of the fight.

In an interview with United Press International, McAuliffe told how the Germans secretly massed 250,000 men around the Allied front in Belgium. About 75,000 U.S. troops, thinly spread along an 85-mile defense line, faced them.

Within a week after the Nazi push began, Panzer tank units and infantry had bulged 60 miles into Allied territory and had cut off the road center of Bastogne, where McAuliffe had his headquarters.

"The Germans hit us here one day and someplace else the next," the general said. "The offer to surrender came on the 22nd."

Col. Joseph H. Harper, who delivered the famous answer to the Germans, said "nuts" was

decided on after attempts at a formal reply failed.

The next day the skies cleared, allowing planes to drop supplies to McAuliffe's tough paratroopers. The lifting fog also allowed devastating Allied air attacks on the Nazi counteroffensive.

But Hitler still wanted Bastogne, and rumors said his troops wanted to give it to him for a Christmas present.

At 3 a.m. on Christmas Day, the Germans launched an all-

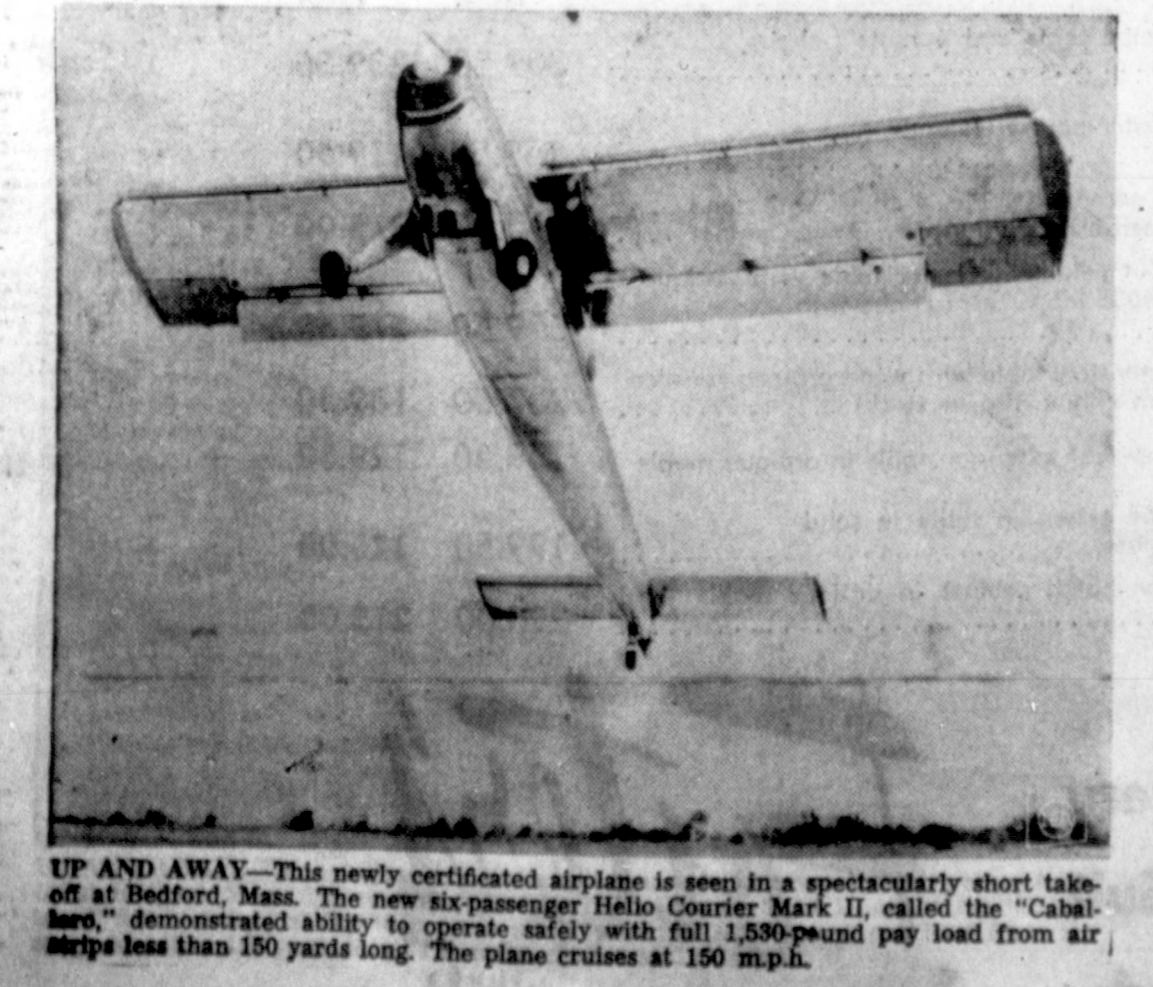
out assault on Bastogne. Panzer tanks and infantry were followed by troops with flame-throwers.

When the battle was over—early in January—8,000 Allied troops were dead, 21,000 missing or captured and 46,000 wounded. The Germans lost 90,000 men.

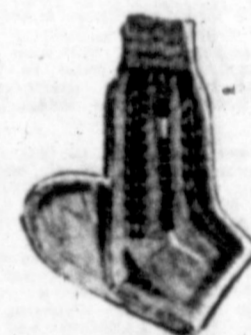
