

Motel Owners Finally Concede To Court Ruling

restaurant and motel owners Monday generally conceded, some of them bitterly that the Supreme Court had struck down their last legal argument against serving Negro custom-

"This is the end of the line." said Moreton Rolleston, owner of the Heart of Atlanta motel. His motel was one of two businesses named in the court's order upholding the constitutionality of the public accommodations sections of the 1964 civil rights law.

"That takes care of the only gal argument we had." said John Vonetes, owner of the Lee House diner at Petersburg, Va. "There's no question we're fin-

The Supreme Court ruled unanimously that Congress, under the commerce clause of the Constitution, had the right to bar racial discrimination in motels, hotels and restaurants engaged in interstate commerce. And the court, in a 5-4 ruling, dismissed around 3.000 cases against sit-in demonstrators arrested for trying to desegregate businesse covered by the civil

Ollie McClung Sr., owner of Ollie's Barbecue restaurant in Birmingham, Ala., the other firm named in the decision, said he would "have to wait and see" whether to take any further legal action. McClung said the decision had "struck down the right to private prop-

Rolleston warned that the Supreme Court had opened the door to a "socialistic state." but indicated he was giving up the legal fight. "I've gone as far as I can," he said.



With few exceptions the Johnson administration has simply sat back and let the speculation continue.

What does all this mean to the average American?

What he is witnessing is a tense game of strategic maneuvering played between governments at the highest level and with very high stakes.

Interpreted As Hinting Twice in the last two weeks the governments of the United States and South Viet Nam have issued statements which have been interpreted by perhaps 30 per cent of newsmen as "hinting" at expansion of the Vietnamese war.

The first was a Wnite House statement issued Dec. 1 at the close of U.S. Ambassador Maxwell D. Taylor's Washington talks. It called attention to "accumuating evidence" of increased North Vietnamese infiltration into the South and spoke of measures to improve the battle against communism "in

all its aspects.' The second was a statement issued by the South Vietnamese government last Friday, with U.S. approval. It announced increases in U.S. military and economic aid to improve pro-grams generally "and to restrain mounting infiltration."

Oklahoma School Goes Underground

DUKE, Okla. (UPI) -Workmen have started filling a big hole in the ground here with classrooms. The Duke School is going underground with a 20th century version of the dugouts settlers excavated when this southwestern Oklahoma town was part of Indian Territory,

The school board says the underground school will be cheaper to heat and cool and will provide safe shelter in the spring, when persistent torda-does and hailstorms rumble around the countryside.

The subterranean facility replaces an above-ground building that burned last spring. The only parts of the new school that will poke we are the auditorum-gymnasium and the superintendent's office.

Revolutions for All Latin America

NEW YORK (UPI) - Cuban Minister of Industry Ernesto Che Guevara Sunday predicted that the struggles of revolution would enflame "every country in Latin America."

Fidel Castro's number one aide also admitted that while Cuba's Communist revolution was not "exportable" his country was helping to train Latin American subversives to "acquire some military knowl-

But Guevara denied Cuba was shipping arms to aid the spread of revolution. He spoke to newsmen during and after a television interview program.







Foreign News Commentary

Back on July 1, 1948, the Soviet representative walked out on the four-power Commandatura ruling Berlin and there came into being the divided city now known as West Berlin and East Berlin.

It marked the end of fourpower rule of the city which the United States, Britain, France and the Soviet Union had agreed upon on June 5, 1945, and it paved the way for a series of crises culminating in erection of the Berlin wall on Aug. 13, 1961.

It was as a side result of Nikita Khrushchev's retreat in Cuban crisis of October, 1962, that the situation eased, continued to ease as Khrushchev became more deeply involved in his quarrel with the Red Chinese.

Since then, both as regards West Berlin and a reunified Germany, by tacit agreement it has been considered best to let sleeping dogs lie.

Exploratory Stirrings

But now once again there are exploratory stirrings on both

On the Russian side there has been a proposal that the four powers should get together in routine meetings in West Berlin to discuss "outstanding matters of mutual interest."

It would be the first diplomatic contact of all four powers since 1948. The only vestiges of the Commandatura remaining have been the Air Control Center over Berlin and the administration of Spandau Pris-

on for war criminals. The British have expressed interest in finding out some the Russians have in what mind. The United States and France have shown frank skepticism, suspecting the Russian move to be an attempt to revive four-power rule for West Berlin while still insisting on so-called sovereignty for West Berlin.

Matter Of Reunification

In another area, the West Germans have been sounding out the Western Allies on the possibility of a new approach to the Russians on the matter of reunification of all of Ger-

The U.S. position on this is said to be generally favorable, with France once more opposed.

France believes such an approach would suggest the Allies were willing to make conces-

They also say they believe the Russians would refuse to reach any agreement so long as West Germany remains committed to the U.S.-proposed multi-lateral nuclear force for

Chancellor Ludwig Erhard has an election coming up next year and he wants to reassure the German people that reunification remains a No. 1 objective of his government.

The Germans are reported also to believe that the simple question of economics might sway the Russians in favor of some concessions of their own.

World Exchange Exports Bonn reports say the West Germans would be willing to undertake a long-term program involving exports of more than \$10 billion to the Soviets in exchange for a gradual liberalization of political conditions inside East Germany. One such condition woud be freer travel across the East-West Borders. Such a proposal was in its outline stage when the Germans still were expecting a visit from Khrushchev. Now it is said to have been revived.

The United States long has favored increased individual contacts between the two Germanies and believes that West Germany's economic strength works in its favor in the longterm absorption of the East. At any rate, soundings are being taken.


