Guerrillas Routed By Saigon Citizens

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (UPI) — A heavily armed 30-man Communist Viet Cong patrol penetrated to within less than 1,000 yards of the U.S. Embassy today in an attempt to kidnap a local government official, highly reliable sources said.
But the Red guerrillas fled when local citizens began shouting and banging on pots and pans to attract the attention of security forces.

LBJ in Better Position Than Previous Presidents

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson emerged from the election struggle today in a better position to command action on his legislative program than any chief executive since the high water mark of the New Deal.
From its disaster the Republican party emerged bitterly divided between its pro- and anti-Goldwater wings. But it also was in a position for the normal forces of politics to compel lurching moves toward unity after some skirmishes in the early months ahead.

**WHO OWNS  
WOUNDED GAME?**

Suppose you are hunting and shoot a deer or a duck, which falls mortally wounded. Before you can get to it, another hunter beats you there and claims the fallen game as his own. What are your rights?

Jim had been hunting all day without success, and had headed for home when he finally saw a deer. He took careful aim and hit the deer with his first shot. Although mortally wounded, the deer managed to run a short distance, with Jim in hot pursuit.

Roy was also deer hunting. He heard Jim's shot and saw a deer running toward him. However, before it reached the spot where he was standing, the deer fell to the ground.

Although it was obvious that the deer was about to die, Roy walked to within three feet of it, delivered the finishing shot, and quickly put his tag on it. When Jim ran up and claimed the deer, Roy said that such deer were wild animals, and belonged to no one until killed. Since he was the one that killed the deer, Roy claimed that it belonged to him.

Which hunter has legal title to the deer?

In this case the deer belongs to Jim. Jim was the first to wound it, and did so before Roy appeared on the scene. He had mortally wounded the deer, and had it in such a situation that its escape was improbable, if not impossible. The prevailing rule is that the instant a wild animal is brought under the control of a person so that actual possession is practically inevitable, a vested property interest in it accrues which cannot be divested by another's intervening and killing it, or reaching it first.

Jim had delivered the shot which so crippled the animal as to cause him to cease trying to escape, thus permitting Roy to walk up to the animal and deliver the finishing shot. Jim had effectually brought the deer under his control before Roy took a hand in the matter. The deer legally belonged to Jim, and he can enforce his claim in court.

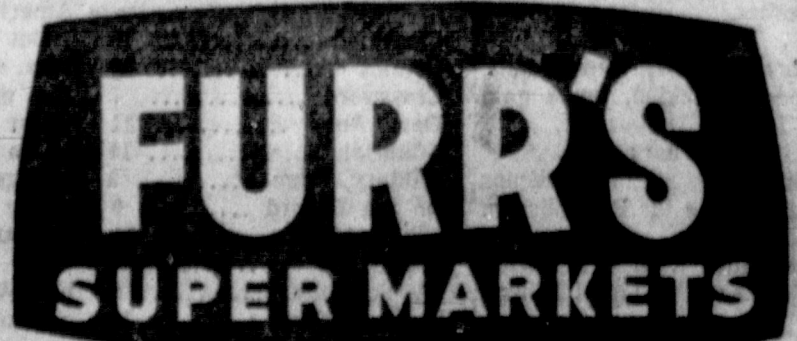

DeGaulle Said To Be Seeking U.S. Consultation

PARIS (UPI)—President Charles De Gaulle was reported Wednesday to be seeking top-level consultation with the United States—perhaps with President Johnson—before a final decision on a multi-lateral nuclear force.

Responsible French sources said such talks also should touch on all aspects of NATO, on which the United States and France are increasingly at odds.

French officials said Johnson's landslide election victory appears to have cleared the way for the controversial U. S. proposed multilateral nuclear force (MLF). That issue is poisoning U. S.-French relations more than any other at the moment.

Under present plans, Johnson would not visit Europe before his inauguration Jan. 20. French sources Wednesday voiced hope that talks might

begin before then—even if they did not involve Johnson and De Gaulle at the outset.

French sources said De Gaulle wants there to be no doubt in Johnson's mind that he considers the nuclear force militarily senseless and politically inadvisable.

Johnson's Cabinet Likely to Stay Intact

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson may make a few changes in his cabinet, but he is expected to keep intact most of the top-level team he inherited from the late President John F. Kennedy.

Secretary of State Dean Rusk, Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara and Treasury Secretary Douglas Dillon are virtually certain to stay.

Interior Secretary Stewart L. Udall, Agriculture Secretary Or-

ville L. Freeman and Commerce Secretary Luther H. Hodges also are good bets to continue in office.

Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz could remain where he is, or he might be shifted to attorney general, a post vacated when Robert F. Kennedy resigned in August to run for the Senate in New York.

Other possibilities for attorney general include Nicholas de B. Katzenbach, who is now acting

attorney general; Abe Fortas, a Washington attorney and former assistant secretary of interior who is one of Johnson's most trusted confidantes, and Leon Jaworski, a Houston, Tex., attorney whom Johnson admires.

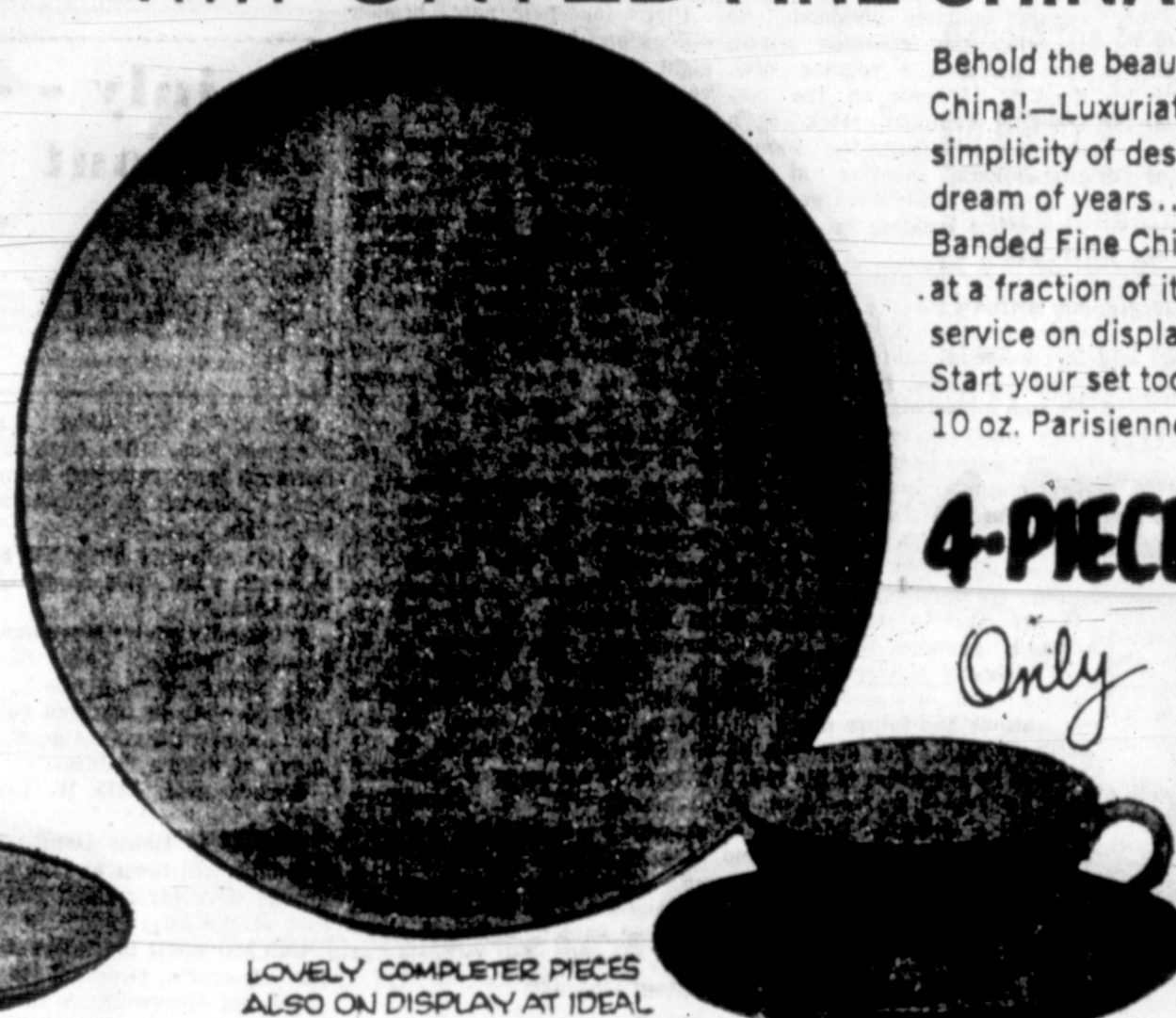
Should Wirtz be shifted, his replacement as labor secretary might well be William Dougherty, former head of the Letter Carriers Union and AFL-CIO vice president, who is now U.S. ambassador to Jamaica.

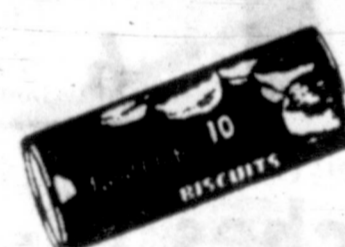

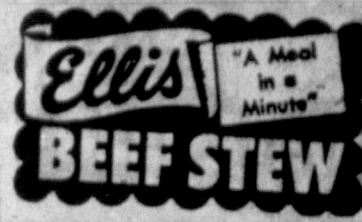

## Instant Bacon Cookery Ahead

**NEW YORK (UPI)** — Bacon that cooks in a pop-up toaster may be just around the corner.

Aluminum foil pouches that make possible this unusual method were among packaging developments described at the annual Newspaper Food Editors Conference here by a spokesman for a major aluminum manufacturer.

Pre-cooked bacon sealed in such pouches heats quickly and crisply in a toaster, once the top is clipped from the pouch.

Other ideas include fancy frozen prepared breakfasts in divided foil trays and an apple pie mix — freeze-dried apples, sugar and spices in one foil pouch, ready-to-roll pie crust dough in another.

A sample breakfast suggested consisted of omelet, sausage patties and glazed apple rings, all of which would heat to serving temperature in 25 minutes.

The packaging outlook also includes attractive heat- and serve containers and more packages designed for storage of leftovers.

### Egg Tastes

**NEW YORK (UPI)** — When it comes to chopping eggs as eggs, most people prefer them scrambled or fried. Soft-boiled eggs run a poor third in popularity, according to the University of Wisconsin Survey Research Laboratory.

Few persons, it seems, eat poached eggs these days. Nearly half of the women included in the Wisconsin survey said they never poach eggs.

## Change of Pace Celery Recipe

The French and many other European chefs often serve celery cooked as a vegetable. Americans like it but we rarely seem to prepare celery at home.

So for a change of pace, try this recipe for French fried celery.

### FRENCH FRIED CELERY

Celery stalks  
Lightly salted water  
½ cup vinegar  
½ teaspoon salt

Trim tender stalks of celery and cut them into 3-inch lengths allowing 4 pieces for each serving. Cook the celery in a small amount of lightly salted water for 10 minutes. Drain the celery, put it in a mixing bowl, and while it is still warm, pour in the vinegar in which ½ teaspoon of salt has been dissolved. Let the celery remain in this marinade for 5 minutes, then drain it and dry thoroughly.

Coat the celery with batter (see recipe below) and fry them in deep hot fat (380 degrees F.) for 3 minutes, or until they are golden brown. Drain the fried celery on absorbent paper. Serve hot as an accompaniment to veal or fish.

### BATTER

1 egg  
¾ cup milk  
1 cup sifted flour  
½ teaspoon salt  
1 tablespoon melted butter

Blend egg with milk and stir in sifted flour that has been sifted again with salt. Add melted butter, and stir the mixture until it is smooth. This recipe will provide slightly more than 1 cup batter.

## Easy Recipes for Homemade Bread

Nothing seems to please modern young husbands more than to be able to brag, "My wife can bake homemade bread." That's a fact based probably on the idea that bread making is proof of a wife's competence.

Here are two particularly easy bread recipes for any bride. Note the interesting flavors in them.

### TOASTED COCONUT TEA BREAD

3 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
3 teaspoons double-acting baking powder  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 cup sugar

1 1/3 cups (about) packaged moist toasted coconut  
1 tablespoon grated orange rind  
1 egg  
1 1/2 cups milk  
1 teaspoon vanilla

Sift flour, baking powder, salt, and sugar. Stir in coconut and orange rind. Beat egg until foamy; mix with milk and vanilla. Stir egg mixture into flour mixture and mix thoroughly, but do not beat. Pour into a greased 9x5-inch loaf pan. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) 1 hour and 10 minutes. Cool. Cut in thin slices to serve. Toast, if desired.

This bread may be wrapped in aluminum foil and allowed to "ripen" for 2 or 3 days before serving.

### CHOCOLATE BREAD

1 cup granulated sugar  
1 egg  
1 1/4 cups orange juice  
3 cups all-purpose biscuit mix  
2 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted  
¾ cup walnuts  
1 teaspoon ground allspice  
1 teaspoon vanilla

Combine sugar and egg, blending well. Alternately add orange juice and biscuit mix, stirring well after each addition. Blend in remaining ingredients. Pour into a greased 9x5-inch loaf pan and bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) 50 to 60 minutes, or until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean.

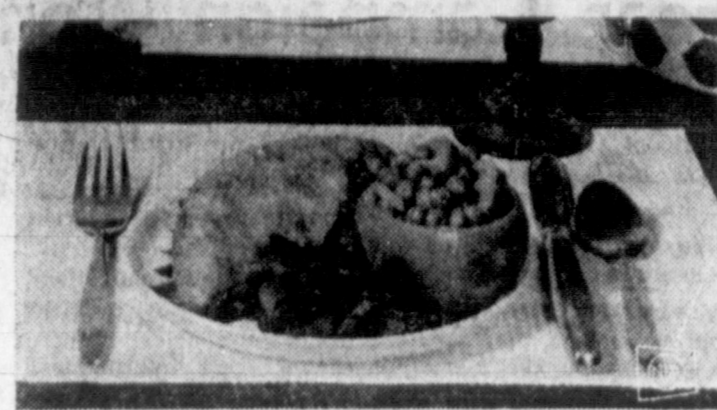
### PEANUT BRITTLE WHIP TOPPING

What cheese is to apple pie, peanut brittle whip topping is to pumpkin pie. To make: Whip ½ cup heavy cream and ¼ teaspoon vanilla extract together until thick. Fold in ½ cup crushed peanut brittle; let stand for about an hour. Spread evenly atop the pie and chill until ready to serve.

## Sour Cream Makes Fine Marinade

The use of a marinade to step up flavor and tenderize meats and poultry is very popular. The marinade usually combines oil and wine, lemon juice or vinegar. A traditional marinade for chicken in the Midwest is seasoned sour cream to give distinctive flavor.

Plastic bags, particularly the new heavier weight bags, can eliminate repeated turning of poultry pieces of meat cubes in the marinating process. Seal the pieces of meat or poultry together with the marinade in the plastic bags and place in a bowl in the refrigerator. During the marinating time, it is necessary only to turn the bag over to insure even distribution of the sauce. When ready to cook, remove the chicken from the marinade and discard the plastic bag.

For Cream Baked Tarragon Chicken, roll the marinated chicken pieces in fine bread crumbs and bake. For a colorful menu, serve with whole tomatoes scooped out and baked and then filled with bright green peas and sliced mushrooms.

### CREAM BAKED TARRAGON CHICKEN

(3 to 4 servings)  
2 cups sour cream  
2 tablespoons lemon juice  
2 tablespoons dried tarragon

1 tablespoon onion salt  
2 teaspoons paprika  
½ teaspoon pepper  
2 teaspoons salt  
6 chicken breasts  
Bread crumbs  
½ cup butter or margarine, melted

Combine sour cream, lemon juice, tarragon, onion salt, paprika, salt and pepper in a large heavy weight plastic bag. Place chicken breasts in bag, seal, and refrigerate overnight to marinate. Remove chicken; roll in crumbs and arrange in single layer in baking dish. Spoon half of butter or margarine over chicken; bake in moderate oven (350 degrees), uncovered for 45 minutes. Spoon remaining butter or margarine over chicken and continue baking 10 to 15 minutes longer.

## Vary Sandwiches

WASHINGTON (UPI) — If a sandwich is to be the "main dish" packed in a lunch-box, give it a high-protein filling, says U.S. Department of Agriculture nutritionists.

Vary the fillings to avoid monotony. Try flaked cooked fish with chopped raw cabbage and salad dressing, or cold baked beans moistened with thick chili sauce, diced sweet pickle, and thinly sliced onion or cucumber.

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# NCAA Places Annapolis On One-Year Probation

NEW YORK (UPI) — The United States Naval Academy placed on one-year probation by the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) for recruiting irregularities, announced defensively today. "It was an honest mistake!"

That defense was made at Annapolis by Capt. William S. Busik, director of athletics for Navy, the first service school ever penalized by the NCAA.

The NCAA council found a guilty of giving four young prospective football players an aerial joyride from Virginia to Dallas, Tex., for the 1964 Navy-Texas Cotton Bowl game.

Three other schools were knuckled-rapped by the NCAA council for "excessive financial aid and recruiting violations." They were Michigan State, Miami (Fla.) and Western State (Colo.).

They, too, joined in the new college marching song: "Just an honest mistake."

**Continuing Investigation**

A spokesman for the NCAA disclosed that his outfit's four-man "committee on infractions" was continuing its investigative work and would make its next report to the 18-man council at its January meeting.

At Annapolis, Capt. Busik said, "The Naval Academy is distressed to learn of Wednesday's action by the NCAA committee."

He continued: "As the NCAA pointed out, the violation was discovered by the Naval Academy, thoroughly investigated by our athletic department, reported to the Naval Academy to the infractions committee and explained thoroughly in the ensuing inquiry."

The probation starting immediately, does not bar Navy's teams from any competition; however, the committee on infractions "shall review the athletic policies and practices of the institution."

Announcing Navy's probation, the NCAA explained that an assistant Navy coach testified that he had been erroneously advised by the academy's athletic department that it was permissible for him to take the four youths from their homes in Virginia to the Dallas football game and back.

**Sentence Reduced**

Michigan State was placed on three years' probation but that penalty was reduced to a suspended sentence, the first of its kind in the NCAA. The suspension was permitted because the various infractions had occurred "prior to and during the period of 1957-59."

The charge was that at least 10 student-athletes in football had received improper financial assistance, and moreover a special football fund for needy players was maintained, apparently with the knowledge of assistant Coach Duffy Daugherty, who later became head coach. At its peak the fund reached \$12,000, the NCAA infractions committee said.

Miami was placed on one-year probation and its basketball team was restricted to games during that year already contracted for. The father of a Miami basketball player had provided transportation for a friend of his son to Miami and back—also free-board and room.

# Keane NL Manager of Year

NEW YORK (UPI) — Johnny Keane, who led the St. Louis Cardinals to the National League pennant and an upset victory over the New York Yankees in the World Series, was named the National League's manager of the year today by the United Press International.

The 52-year-old Keane, who climaxed the amazing season by quitting the Cardinals to become manager of the Yankees after the World Series, was the choice of 13 of the writers who made up the 1964 UPI's 20-man board of baseball experts.

Gene Mauch, the inspirational pilot of the Philadelphia Phillies, finished second in the balloting with four votes and Dick Sisler, interim manager of the Cincinnati Reds, was third with three votes.

A long-time organization man in the Cardinal system who had been passed over five times before being named manager, the grey-haired, leathery-faced Keane guided the Cardinals to their first pennant since 1946 because he refused to panic even when his own front-office had quit on the team.

Keane kept his players plugging away in the wake of the front-running Phillies and Reds even though they fell 11 games behind the leaders in early September. By that time, Cardinal owner August C. Busch already had begun to clean out front-office personnel and had marked the ax on the assumption the Cardinals had no chance to win the . . .

But the Phillies suddenly staged one of the greatest collapses in baseball history and the Reds were unable to hold onto first place when it was virtually handed to them. That left the Cardinals — and they finally clinched the pennant.



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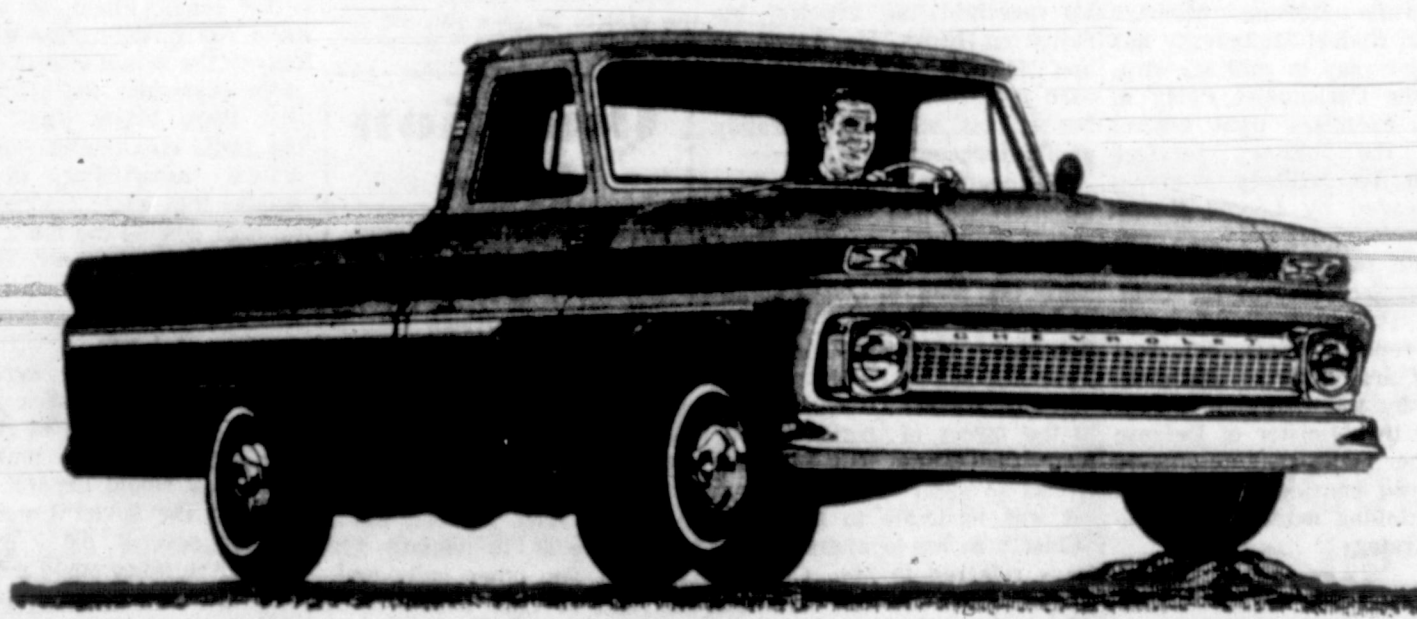
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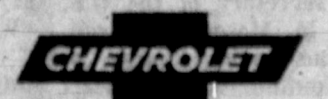

Red Chinese leader Mao Tze-tung's 71st birthday does not fall until Dec. 26, but of all the presents he is to receive then none can surpass those he received on Oct. 16. Nor can greater honors be heaped upon him.

On that day the world learned of Nikita Khrushchev's fall and on that day Red China exploded its first atom bomb.

"We praise the country, we praise the party, we praise Mao Tze-tung," goes the refrain on Peking Radio.

Thirty years back in history is the Communist army's break through Chiang Kai-shek's encircling forces and the "long march" which ended 5,000 miles and one year later in Shensi Province.

Eight years back is Khrushchev's denunciation of Stalin and of the "personality cult" of which he himself today is accused, and the beginning of the personal feud between Mao and Khrushchev over who best could interpret the teachings of Marx and Lenin.

The Chinese never did give more than lip service to Khrushchev's denunciation of Stalin. The evils of Stalinism, they believed, were outweighed by the good he did for communism.

Nor do they see any sin in the cult of Mao.

By 1960 the Chinese already were proclaiming their independence of Moscow and the cult of Mao was at a zenith.

Party experts proclaimed Mao "just like the sun," the "Chinese champion whose thoughts are the supreme combination of Marxist-Leninist universal truth and the Chinese revolution," the "pioneer of natural science," and "the superlative politician, philosopher, economist and military expert."

In 1960, a five-week survey of English and Chinese language releases from the New China News Agency disclosed the mention of Mao's name no less than 1,000 times.

And as the cloud rising from Red China's first atomic blast drifted over the world, the party was pressing even harder the cult of the Mao personality.

In Chinese homes, factories and barracks the people were urged to study the writings of Mao for the solution to all problems.

There also were material gains to be exploited.

Of all the old revolutionaries, Mao alone remained in power and in a position to explain the beliefs of Marx, Engels, Lenin and Stalin.

The new men in the Kremlin, Premier Aleksei N. Kosygin and First Party Secretary Leonid I. Brezhnev were born in this century and were identified with the new and less dedicated technicians of the party.

Particularly there was the influence to be gained among the under-developed nations who identified the agrarian Chinese with their own revolutions.

And there was the prestige of the bomb to be exploited. Red China declared herself into the nuclear club and called for a nuclear disarmament conference—a call in which, for reasons of his own, French President Charles de Gaulle joined.

Coming up: a new effort to gain Red Chinese entry into the United Nations—an effort which the United States believes that for this year at least it can block.

**State Court Says  
Loan Law Is Not  
Constitutional**

AUSTIN (UPI)—The Texas Supreme Court today upheld a lower court ruling that portions of the 1963 "loan shark" law are unconstitutional.

The provision held invalid was Section 7-D, which requires new loan companies to be at least 50 per cent Texas-owned. The decision does not affect the rest of the complex regulatory loan act.

The Supreme Court upheld without written opinion a decision of the third court of civil appeals in Austin.

The suit was brought by five branch offices of Termplan, Inc. and Texas Public Finance Corp., Beneficial Finance Corp. of Houston, and Consolidated Credit Corp. of Arlington.

The firms sued loan commissioner Francis A. Miskell after Miskell denied them licenses to make loans in Texas, citing the section 7-D.

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
