### State Court Says Loan Law Is Not Constitutional

AUSTIN (UPI) -The Texas Supreme Court today upheld a lower, court ruling that portions of the 1963 "loan shark" law are unconstitutional.

The provision held invalid was Section 7-D, which requires new loan companies to be at least 50 per cent Texas-owned. The decision does not affect the rest of the complex regulatory loan act.

The Supreme Court upheld without written opinion a deci-sion of the third court of civil appeals in Austin.

The suit was brought by five. branch offices of Termplan, Inc. and Texas Public Finance Corp., Beneficial Finance Corp. of Houston, and Consolidated Credit Corp. of Arlington.

The firms sued loan commis sioner Francis A. Miskell after Miskell denied them licenses to make loans in Texas, citing the ction 7-D.
