

## Tobacco Heir's Widow Gives Birth to Daughter

LUCERNE, Switzerland (UPI)—The widow of Richard J. Reynolds Jr. today gave birth to a daughter—less than two days after the tobacco heir's death from a lung ailment.

Reynolds, 38, who had been kept alive for years with oxygen from a special breathing machine, died Monday night at Santa Anna clinic.

His fourth wife, German-born Anneliese Schmitt was in the same hospital awaiting the birth of the child.

The hospital said Mrs. Reynolds gave birth to a healthy girl around noon, (3 a.m. CST.) Both the 35-year-old mother and the infant, named Irene Sabine, were well, a spokesman said.

Hugo Frey, Reynolds' lawyer, said the heir to the Camel cigarette fortune died of pulmonary emphysema, a lung disease. He said Reynolds had been using a pressure breathing apparatus for several years.

## Better Button Up, It's Gonna Snow

## Buddhist Monks, Nuns Begin Hunger Strike Against U.S.

SAIGON (UPI)—More than 450 Buddhist monks and nuns today began a hunger strike aimed at toppling the U.S.-supported South Vietnamese government. They ignored an appeal by American officials to call it off.

On the military front, the government issued a revised report on a major battle with Communist forces last week, admitting that the guerrillas captured or destroyed a quarter of million dollars worth of American equipment.

Two senior officials from the U.S. Embassy spent three hours Tuesday with Thich Tri Quang, a powerful Buddhist leader, in an attempt to alter his anti-government hostility. He has been on a hunger strike since Saturday.

But the buddhists went ahead with the strike after issuing an open letter to President Johnson charging that continued support for Premier Tran Van Huong would plunge this country into "permanent instability." They said they were prepared to make "any sacrifice" to bring Huong down.

The hunger strike started on schedule at the National Buddhist Center, a focal center for anti-government unrest.

The government's military report involved last week's three-day battle for the Vietnamese garrison at Lao in the Central Highlands. It was besieged by a large force of Communist guerrillas in a battle in which at least three Americans were killed.

## LBJ to Issue Poverty Grants

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson was expected today to announce a "Christmas package" of federal grants to advance his war against poverty.

The second allocation of U.S. funds in the drive to reduce hardship will exceed the \$32.5 million approved in the opening assault last Nov. 24.

## Jet Service Started

MEXICO CITY (UPI)—Jet airplane service was inaugurated Tuesday between the capital and Acapulco, the nation's playground.

The service was started by Aeronaves de Mexico with DC-8 aircraft.

## Ted's Promise Kept, He Walks Out of Hospital

BOSTON (UPI)—Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., walked slowly and deliberately out of New England Baptist Hospital today, almost six months after his back was broken in the crash of a small plane.

The 32-year-old senator, accompanied by his radiant blonde wife, Joan, walked unaided down the long corridor of the hospital to the main entrance. Outside the door he spoke briefly to the approximately 100 well wishers waiting in the below freezing temperatures to wish him well.

He shook a few hands and said, "It just so happens I have a speech I never got to deliver at the Democratic convention in Springfield."

This was a joking reference to the plane crash last June 19 which occurred en route to the state convention.

From the hospital, the senator went to Logan Airport to board a commercial jet liner for Florida. He planned to spend about two and a half weeks in Palm Beach at a rented home near the winter residence of his ally, Joseph P. Kennedy. He then plans to return to Congress.

Kennedy was flying to the Massachusetts Democratic Convention in West Springfield where he was to be nominated by acclamation when his chartered plane crashed. Despite the injury he was elected over-

## CASTS LONG SHADOW

## Nato Planners Disagree

PARIS (UPI)—NATO planners have failed to agree on a joint military strategy for Western response to a potential Communist attack, authoritative sources said today.

Efforts to compose differences between French and American defense concepts for the alliance have ended in a deadlock. NATO planners have reported this to the NATO ministerial conference being held here.

The political rift in the alliance has not basically affected its military might. NATO's military men feel the defense shield is generally in good shape, although it needs strengthening in the nuclear sector.

But the political differences, spotlighted by France's go-it-alone policy, have cast their shadow over the alliance's basic strategy—how to use its military might.

There is now no agreed strategy for NATO—which could prove dangerous to the extreme in the event of an emergency, the sources said.

The problem facing the alliance is whether to meet a Communist attack once it occurs with conventional weapons in the first instance and to utilize the nuclear deterrent only as the last resort. This is the policy advocated by the United States and the bulk of the alliance.

NATO unprepared and requires crisis decisions under the fire of the guns.

Current pressures for the creation of a NATO nuclear force have in turn tended to underline the need for an agreed NATO strategy if serious trouble is to be averted, the sources said.

An emergency would find remainder of the alliance, advocates a policy of "flexible response." It calls for the use of conventional weapons in the first stage of aggression, then tactical nuclear weapons, and only as the last resort of strategic nuclear weapons.

Dr. Smith B. Sybert, 40, Pampa dentist and one of the city's most active civic and political figures, died suddenly in his home, 1816 Dogwood, early today.

Death, attributed to a heart attack, came at 1:20 a.m. only a few minutes after he had told Mrs. Sybert he was feeling ill.

Dr. F. J. Vendrell, a next door neighbor, was summoned but Dr. Sybert had succumbed to the attack.

Dr. Sybert, an ardent worker for the Republican Party, also was Kiwanis Club sponsor and advisor for the Pampa High School Key Club.

He had been serving as chairman of the Public Relations and Dental Health Committee of the Panhandle District Dental Society, was a member of the First Baptist Church, teacher of the Everyman's Bible class, member of the Downtown Kiwanis Club and a former member of the Pampa Toastmaster's Club.

Dr. Sybert was a veteran of World War II, having served with the U. S. Navy in the Asiatic theater of war and in Japan.

He was born Jan. 28, 1924, in Dallas and was graduated with a BA degree from the University of Texas in 1947. In 1950 he received a DDS degree from Texas U.

On June 17, 1950, Dr. Sybert was married to Johnnie Reese in Dallas. They came to Pampa in August of 1951.

Survivors in the immediate family are his wife, Johnnie, two sons, Stephen, 14, and Ricky, nine. He also is survived by his mother, Mrs. Bertha Sybert of Dallas, and a brother, C. Wayne Sybert of Busby, Montana.

Funeral arrangements for Dr. Sybert had not been completed at noon today.

Members of the family requested that any memorials be sent to the Bob Sybert Key Club Memorial Fund, in care of the Pampa Key Club, Pampa High School.

Paris (UPI)—Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara told the Western Allies today that the United States has a mighty arsenal of weapons for the protection of Europe that includes more than 800 intercontinental ballistic missiles.

In a speech to the Council of Ministers of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO), McNamara gave a revealing picture of American military strength.

The defense secretary said U. S. nuclear power includes:— More than 300 polaris missiles.

—Hundreds of B52 bombers.

—Total nuclear firepower located in Germany alone which is more than 5,000 times that of the atomic bomb dropped on Hiroshima in 1945.

With all this power, McNamara said the United States sees no point in increasing expenditures on strategic weapons for the alliance.

**Forces Adequate**

He added that, in general, the present structural goals for forces within Europe appeared adequate if a few countries would go ahead and fulfill their commitments under those goals.

In summing up, McNamara told the council that roughly 40 per cent of the entire American nuclear weapons power is located in Europe or allocated near the Atlantic area.

In a development related to the NATO meeting, it was learned that West Germany has proposed creation of an atomic mine field along the Iron Curtain in central Europe to provide instant retaliation against an aggressor. The plan was said to be under study by NATO defense chiefs, although opposed by Britain.

West German officials announced that the "big four" of the Western Alliance have decided that the time is ripe for a new approach to Moscow on.

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## Steel Contract Talks Underway

PITTSBURGH (UPI)—Negotiators for the nation's "Big 11" basic steel producers resumed contract talks today with the United Steelworkers of America (USWA), which is seeking major wage concessions for its 1.2 million members.

The company-by-company meetings got under way at 9 a.m. CST.

At the formal opening of the Tuesday session, it was all smiles and guarded optimism. But sources close to both sides said privately there would be a long and hard road to an agreement.

J. Warren Shaver, chairman of U.S. Steel Corp.'s bargaining team and his union counterpart, James Griffin, director of USWA District 26 in Youngstown, Ohio, expressed guarded hope talks would continue to proceed on an amiable level after their opening two hour session Tuesday.

"The meeting went fine," Shaver said, adding he was "hopeful" a contract agreement could be reached.

## Duke Is Patched Up After 67-Minute Artery Surgery

HOUSTON (UPI)—Surgeons today removed a four-inch section of the Duke of Windsor's main artery and replaced it with an artificial "patch" in a 67-minute operation. The 70-year-old Duke withstood the surgery well.

"The surgery took one hour and seven minutes, during which doctors replaced a section of his aorta 10-12 centimeters (3.94-4.68 inches) long," said famed surgeon Dr. Michael DeBakey.

DeBakey, who has performed thousands of such operations, went from the operating room to the administration offices to issue the report. Then he went to the fourth floor to inform the anxious duchess that all went well.

"He tolerated the surgery well and is now in what is expected to be a three-hour post-operative recovery period," DeBakey said.

The aorta is the main artery leading from the heart. From it, blood is pumped to arteries all over the body. In the case of the Duke, a section of the aorta in the abdominal region had become weakened.

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## Nazi's Try Dallas Party

DALLAS (UPI)—A veterans group Monday denounced plans by the American Nazi Party to open a headquarters in Dallas, saying it would become an "arsenal" and lead to violence.

"Dallas is still suffering from the act of one crackpot, and now we will have 47 right in our midst," said Allen A. Burleson, commander of the Oak Cliff chapter of the World War I veterans group. Lee Harvey Oswald lived in Oak Cliff.

The leader of the American Nazis, George Lincoln Rockwell of Arlington, Va., visited Dallas recently. He announced that 47 "tough young men" had met in a Dallas garage to form the local Nazi chapter, swearing to fight race-mixing "to the death."

He announced that the Nazis had purchased a house for use as headquarters in Dallas, which would be opened after it was "extensively remodeled and armed."

The District 5 commander of the veterans group, Simon P. Oster, said that anyone "who knowingly rents, leases or sells property to such individuals for such purposes should be classed as of the subversive group."

He said the property had been leased "for arsenal purposes...to the extent of eventual violence."

## Figueres Given Peace Time Prize

NEW ORLEANS (UPI)—Jose Figueres, former president of Costa Rica, will be honored in New Orleans Thursday night for his contributions toward better understanding in the western hemisphere.

He will be the first Central American to receive the Theodore Brent Inter-American Award, an honor given each year to a recognized Latin American leader.

Henry Zac Carter, president of the International House, said Figueres was chosen as the recipient by a special International House committee. The award was established by Delta Lines.

Figueres, a former coffee planter, was president of Costa Rica in 1948-49 and 1953-58.

He denounced the Communist-dominated government in 1942 and became his country's first exile in the twentieth century.

He returned in 1944 as organizer of an underground movement and took over as provisional president under a junta after the government was defeated in 1948.

## Unusual Cold Due For Next 30 Days

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The weatherman says most of the United States is going to get colder than normal weather for the next 30 days, along with heavier snows than usual in many northern areas.

The U.S. Weather Bureau said Monday in its forecast for mid-December to mid-January that temperatures will "average below seasonal normals over most of the nation except for near normal in the far Southwest and near to above normal in the Southeast."

The most frigid weather will probably occur in the Northern Plains, the bureau said. It added that "precipitation frequently in the form of snow in the northern half of the nation is expected to exceed normal over most areas east of the Continental Divide."

"West of the divide, greater than normal precipitation is indicated for the Central Pacific coast while subnormal totals should be confined to the southern plateau," the bureau said.

## Arkansas Reserves Training Stays Same

LITTLE ROCK Ark. (UPI)—Reorganization of the Army Reserve and National Guard will not change the plans of Arkansas National Guard units for field training next summer, Maj. Gen. Sherman T. Clinger said on his return from Washington.

Clinger, the state's adjutant general, said he had no information yet on what Arkansas and Louisiana will get to replace the 39th Division, one of the units to be disbanded. He speculated it would be replaced by a brigade but said he did not expect any details for several weeks, perhaps as late as March.

## Canadians Have New Flag But Fight Still Raging

OTTAWA (UPI)—Hemmed in by closure, but bursting with investive, the Commons early Tuesday gave birth to a new Canadian flag.

Prime Minister Lester B. Pearson made one final plea for all sides to "rally around" the flag, but the offer was shunned by the Conservatives, some of them waving fists. The battle ended as it began—with division.

The design of the new Canadian flag: a single red maple leaf on a white background with vertical red borders, recommended by an all-party Commons committee and finally voted on under closure after helping prolong the longest Canadian parliamentary session in history.

## Four Youths Burn to Death

SPRINGFIELD, Mass. (UPI)—A wind-whipped fire flashed through a two-story wooden apartment house Tuesday in the crowded Puerto Rican section of this city, killing four children as they slept.

Three of the children were from the same family. Their parents and three of their other children were burned, all but one critically.

Mercy Hospital officials identified the dead as one-year-old Minerva, Franklin, 2, and Maria, 8, children of Mr. and Mrs. Martin Sanchez; and Sonia Torres, 1.

The Torres girl was the daughter of a friend and was being cared for by the Sanchez family.

In critical condition at Mercy Hospital were Martin Sanchez, 32, his 29-year-old wife Antonia and two of their children, William, 6, and Santos, 12. They suffered from smoke inhalation and burns.

In good condition was another Sanchez child, 4-year-old Ester, who suffered from smoke inhalation.

## Freights to Do Without Firemen

CARSON CITY, Nev. (UPI)—The state Supreme Court has ruled that firemen are not required on freight trains hauled by diesel engines in Nevada.

The court upheld the railroads, which claimed the 1913 steam engines once used uniformly, and not to modern diesel locomotives.

"The 1913 act requiring a fireman in the car with the engine does not apply to diesel engines, where an available and qualified head brakeman can perform all the duties necessary to the safety of the public and the crew," Chief Justice Milton Badt wrote in the unanimous decision.

## Her Name Will Join Selections

DENVER (UPI)—An elderly Denver woman who left her entire estate to the city and county of Denver upon her death last March 14 will have her name inscribed on the city's memorial wall, even though her contribution totaled only \$762.

There are only 38 other names listed on the wall.

## National Window

The trouble with General Ike's plan for a two-man leadership of the Republican party to be divided between Ray Bliss of Ohio and Walter H. Judd of Minnesota is that the plan takes no account of political reality.

Nobody ever claimed that General Ike knew much about politics. Least of all did he claim such for himself. He was dragged into politics believing that it was a dirty business. He served nearly four years in the White House before coming to realize that it was a matter of importance whether the citizens elected Republican or Democratic majorities to Congress.

The general now proposes Ray Bliss, a real pro, for chairman of the Republican National Committee with responsibility for party organization and housekeeping to the exclusion of all else. That is an excellent suggestion. It has been made from time to time by most Republican party leaders.

Leader Without Troops

Then the general proposes that former Rep. Walter H. Judd be named Republican policy spokesman. Named Republican policy spokesman by whom? That is the question. Another is: From whence would come the disciplined political militia, commandos, enforcers and recruiters to validate Judd policies as party gospel?

If there is any elected, legitimate, enforceable leadership in the Republican party as of now it consists of Ev and Charley, the Republican leaders respectively of the U.S. Senate and the House. They are leaders in fact of what remains of the Republican forces and they are policy makers to boot.

No one who knows Rep. Charles A. Halleck, R-Ind., and Sen. Everett M. Dirksen, R-Ill., would expect either happily or long to accept an outsider as spokesman on party policy. Co-spokesman, maybe. But, head man? No!

Now, all of this is a great pity because Walter Judd is an able man. Moreover, he is a certified conservative with prestige among the moderates and even the lefties of the Republican party. The Goldwater forces surely could accept Judd. It is likely that most other party elements would take him too. But what about the congressional Republicans who are the real elected spokesmen of their party. General Ike overlooked the congressional leadership.

Judd Rates High

Judd's conservative certificate comes from Americans for Constitutional Action (ACA), a well adjusted organization headed by Adm. Ben Moreell, retired. The late Herbert Hoover was a member of the founding group. Felix Morell of Maryland, Charles Edison of New Jersey are board members. ACA is responsible and respectable.

On the record of service to 1961, ACA rated all members of Congress some years ago. The standard of judgment was votes cast on issues which in the opinion of ACA had a significant bearing on preservation of the principles and spirit of the Constitution: Here are some scores:

William E. Miller, R-NOE 90 per cent. Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, D-Tex., 16 per cent. Sen.

TOKYO (UPI)—Communist North Viet Nam charged Tuesday that an American - built South Viet Nam transport plane violated North Viet Nam's airspace Monday. It immediately filed a protest with the International Control Commission in Viet Nam, the New China News Agency reported.

The official Communist Chinese news agency quoted a Communist Viet Nam news agency as the source of the report.

## Financial Gossip

NEW YORK (UPI) — One of the cloudy areas in the future of international business is the lack of confidence in the British pound sterling, and tears are openly expressed that it may eventually be devalued, despite Britain's assurances.

Britain's chief customers on the European continent are irritated at the import surcharge, and may retaliate in some fashion against British goods. Yet, because it was a highly unfavorable trade balance over many months which helped put Britain in its present predicament, British business and industry are forced to redouble their sales efforts abroad.

The past year, London dispatches note, British exports to Cuba hit the highest levels since Castro came to power in 1959; 10 months figures show sales of more than \$19.6 million, compared with \$5.6 million in the same periods of 1963 and 1962, and \$11.2 million in 1961.

But, the dispatches continue, there is doubt whether this volume of sales can continue; Cuba, too, has a shaky financial base for its foreign trade.

Some major English firms also remain reluctant to trade with Cuba lest their actions prejudice progress in their main markets in the United States. U. S. imports from the United Kingdom in 1963 were \$1,079,239,000, the highest figure for any nation in the European trade area.

Hence the British, already active in the U. S. markets, can be expected to redouble their sales efforts here in any field where they think they can make progress — from heavy machinery to consumer goods of any kind.

As a rule, the anniversaries that we are asked to celebrate are divisible by five — the 5th, 10th, 25th, etc. I don't know why the Book of Knowledge is urging the celebration of an anniversary that is divisible by 3, 7, 33 and 77. But I am all in favor of it.

Why should we be slaves to conformity? Who is to say that a 200th anniversary is any more suitable for celebrating than 231st?

I, for one hope that this starts a new trend and that we can look forward to more off-year celebrations in the future.

For Shakespeare's anniversary, I prepared a series of "interviews" in which I used some of the Bard's famous lines to illuminate contemporary problems. It seems only fair to do the same thing for, or to, Franklin.

Following in question-and-answer form, are selected quotations from "Poor Richard's Almanack" transferred to a modern setting.

Q. Mr. Franklin, what advice can you give us about Christmas shopping?

A. "Beware of little expenses: A small leak will sink a great ship."  
Q. Each year we are warned to do our shopping early, and yet a lot of us always wait until the last minute. Why is that?  
A. "Experience keeps a dear school, yet fools will learn in no other. The family of fools is ancient."  
Q. What sort of shopping technique do you use?  
A. "An egg today is better than a hen tomorrow."  
Q. That sounds simple enough but are you able to find suitable gifts that way?  
A. "Blessed is he that expects nothing, for he shall never be disappointed."  
Thank you, Poor Richard.

## Gardening News

By THELMA BRAY

Feeding wild birds can be a most rewarding experience for adults as well as children. Birds' daily requirements are about the same as humans. They need food, shelter and water.

Shelter to a bird does not mean a roof over its head. Shelter means a bush or tree into which the bird can fly to safety.

Most people, when they first begin to attract birds, forget that they need water, for both drinking and bathing. John K. Terres in his book "Songbirds in Your Garden" says "Always put hot water in the birdbath in winter because you may find, as we did, that birds like it as a foot warmer if you don't want walk out into the back yard to thaw the birdbath on cold, freezing days, a small birdbath bowl can easily be set up on a window shelf — feeder."

Terres says "Birds need salt for their health and well-being just as we do. Usually they won't eat table salt put out for them, but they will eat certain kinds of salty foods. Peanut butter and bread, both of which are favorite foods of birds, seem to have all the salt in them that a bird normally needs. The peanut butter can be easily spread in cracks in the bark of tree trunks.

Suet is a quick source of heat and energy for birds, which makes it particularly valuable to them in winter. It is a good substitute for the insects that birds usually feed upon in the summer."

Suet may be placed in a mesh bag that fruit or potatoes are packaged in. Bleach out the bright color of the mesh bag before using as birds are suspicious of the bright hues.

Melt suet or use left-over grease and mix with any or all of the following: corn meal, millet, sunflower seeds, oatmeal, rice, cracked corn, cereals, bread crumbs, etc. Pour into jar lids or other containers to mold. Then freeze and store in freezer for ready use.

Bags of chicken scratch feed for the birds can be bought at the local nursery or feed stores. Other foodstuffs enjoyed by the birds include: chopped hard-boiled eggs, buckwheat, crackers, coconut meat, popcorn, corn bread, corn meal, broken dog biscuits, doughnuts, pastry, whole oats, rolled oats, etc.

Any effort on our part to encourage birds to visit our gardens will be more than repaid by insect destruction and in pleasure.

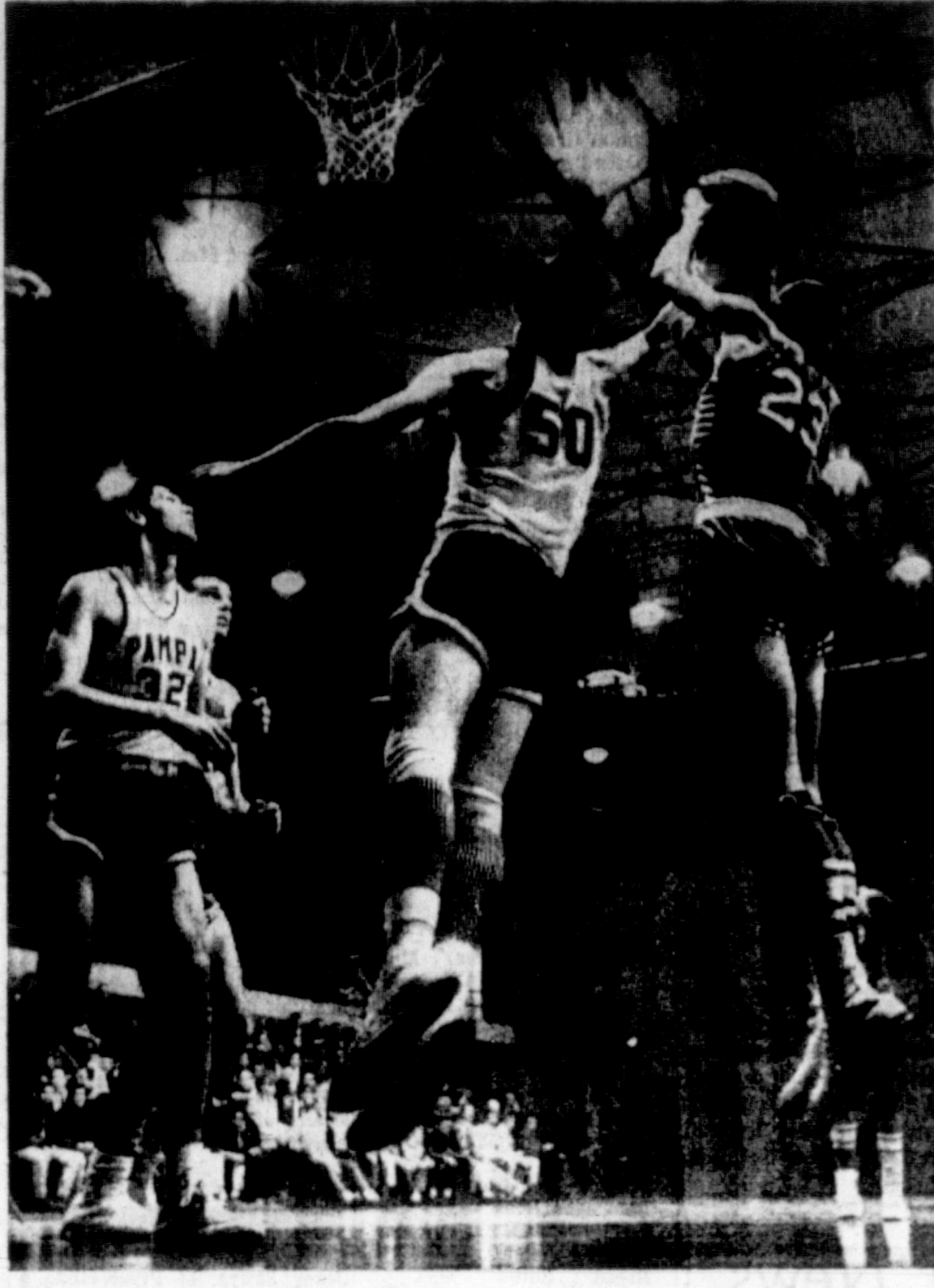

## Red-Hot Second Quarter Cools Off Borger, 67-44

The Pampa Harvesters broke open a tight ball game midway in the second quarter as they shut the Borger Bulldogs out for four straight minutes while pumping 13 points through the hoop to set up a 67-44 victory last night.

The Harvesters made their district record 2-0 and their season mark 9-2 as they used a familiar combination of deadly shooting from the floor and the foul line, a tight defense and a backboard domination by Roper Roper, piling most of the edge in the fantastic second frame.

With the score 19-7, the Harvesters suddenly went wild. Roper racked up three straight points, Carl Harnsberger stuffed in a rebound and Pampa was off and running. Borger jammed up the frontcourt and

# Sporting Sidelines

IT LOOKS like a number of major changes are going to occur among area football coaches this year. Some of them are getting ready to move up after winning seasons, others are getting out one jump ahead of the wolves... and several are awaiting what happens at Pampa, expecting that some openings will come up here in turn leaving openings at other schools.

NATURALLY, something is going to happen at Pampa... it may have happened already but that is doubtful... but there is no doubt that someplace along the line a meeting of the School Board will be held to determine whether or not the local school system will promote a coach out of that system or hire a coach from outside.

THIS DEPARTMENT still feels that someone from the Pampa system deserves a crack at the job... and presents what I consider another first-class candidate for the job.

Norman Phillips. Personally, although on the surface I feud with Norm constantly, I consider him one of the finest coaches I have ever met... one who really knows how to get the most out of his boys.

PHILLIPS has one really bad handicap, however, the fact that he played football and was twice district 440 champion at, of all places, Borger! Getting past that barrier, Norm went on to college football as an end and more track fame at West Texas.

Phillips went to Plainview as junior high coach in 1953, the following year coming to Pampa, which makes he and Frank Craig, the oldest coaches in continuous active service in the system, certainly a very good reason for his eligibility for the job.

Coming to Pampa under coach Aubra Nooncaster, Phillips moved steadily up under coaches Don Lockett and Babe Kurfman, from assistant to head coach at Pampa, then at Lee, then to head B team coach and assistant track coach in 1919.

In 1962, Phillips became head track coach and was moved down to assistant B team coach, Otis Holladay feeling that a man should not be head coach in two sports.

NO ONE CAN deny that Norman Phillips has given all he has to his job... or that it has produced results. Only once has there been a losing B team in the past six years. Some fine material and a winning spirit have come up to the varsity from the charges of Phillips and Don Myers. Good, smart, heads-up football has been taught those youngsters on the Shockers... and a tremendous fighting spirit which has brought them from behind in many games.

As far as Phillips' work as a track coach, I doubt if there is any necessity to go into it before Pampans. Some gainsay Randy Matson because he got his start under Dwaine Lyons and other coaches... all I know is that Randy kinda thinks different, and in any case there are Ralph Palmer, Bill Martin and Mark Westbrook.

PHILLIPS, a "reluctant dragon" as far as announcing himself for the job, tried to bypass leading questions as much as possible. The Pampa pipe-puffer would only say "I hope that, whoever becomes head coach, the people of Pampa will support him and encourage the kids to play... as far as my being a candidate for the job, I have been in Pampa 11 years and I feel that the School Board knows my qualifications."

"I think that before Pampa has a winning season, the boys will have to get a winning attitude... they will have to believe they can win and it will take the whole community to convince them."

"I feel the right kind of coach can generate the right kind of attitude, yes. As far as a n y plans or changes... I don't know yet... I would have to wait and see what happens."

SOMEONE POINTED out that this column could be giving the impression that coaches Eural Ramsey, Norm Phillips, John Hale and Don Myers are fighting each other for the job. This is absolutely erroneous. All this column is trying to do is to plug the eligible candidates within the system, giving the qualifications of each for your consideration. There is no animosity whatsoever... but all coaches, all the athletes and this reporter feel strongly that one of these four well-qualified men from within this Pampa coaching system, should get first crack at the job. Choose whichever one you think best... but choose one of them!

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## President Wielding Sharp Knife on Proposed Budget

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson is wielding a "fairly sharp pruning knife" on proposed spending in the federal budget he will send to Congress next month.

That was the word Monday from White House Press Secretary George E. Reedy who said that Johnson planned to spend most of the week hard at work on the budget.

The President scheduled a meeting today with Dr. Donald Hornig, his special assistant for science and technology, and other scientists who recently visited the Soviet Union.

The meeting with Hornig was scheduled for noon 11 a.m. CST. He also planned to meet with a group of foreign ambassadors to receive their credentials. The

group included envoys from Mali, Panama, Tanzania, Ecuador, Zambia, Korea and South Viet Nam.

The meeting was scheduled for 4:30 p.m. CST. Johnson spent most of Monday closeted with Budget Director Kermit Gordon and other staff advisers in an effort to pare down spending requests that now total close to \$110 billion.

Reedy said that Johnson was going over the requests from government agencies with a "sharp eye and a fairly sharp pruning knife." The President has expressed doubt that the budget for the fiscal year beginning next July can be kept below \$100 billion, a symbolic barrier he avoided passing in

his first budget of \$97.2 billion. Although the spending request totals around \$110 billion, administration officials now expect the government's revenues to total something less than \$96 billion in the coming fiscal year. A proposed cut in excise taxes would mean an even smaller growth in revenues.

### 'TRAFFIC LIGHT' IN THE SKY

NEW YORK (UPI)—A "traffic light in-the-sky" to help military planes land safely on tiny battlezone air strips by means of a tri-colored shaft of light beaming into the sky is being developed by a watch company.

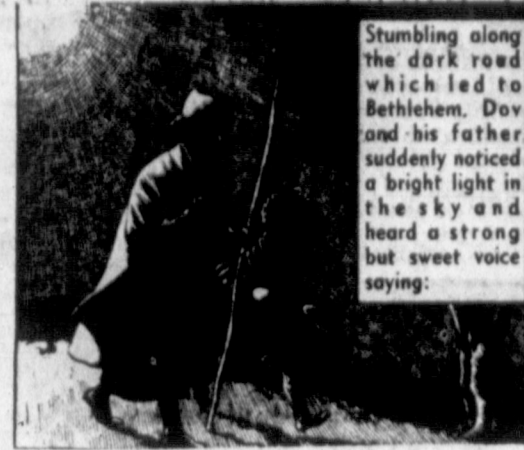

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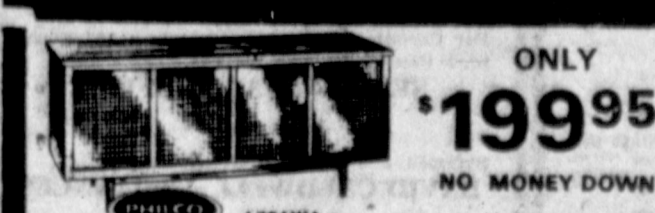
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
