Pause in U.S. Bombing Raids Remains Mystery

WASHINGTON (UPI) - A new, though highly uncertain, element was added to the Vietnamese war Saturday in the form of an unexplained pause in U.S. bombing of Communist North Viet Nam.

Suspesion of the raids which were almed at bridges, barracks and other strategic military installations, was in its third day. The reasons remained the subject of speculation and conflicting reports. Administration officials appeared content to let the mys-

tery continue. Whatever the intended purpose, it was clear that the development, together with public speculation, had become one more political factor in the war and in efforts for peace.

No American official was willing to say where it might lead, .. if anywhere.

Background to the enigma was this:

Since Feb. 7. U. S. planes, frequently accompanied by South Vietnamese aircraft, have flown 4.550 sorties against targets in North Viet Nam. The raids have not been on a daily basis. There have been gaps of from one to 11 days.

The United States has always said it would stop the bombings if there was a clear indication the Red Hanoi regime was halting its aggression against South Viet Nam.

There have been frequent proposals for a deliberate U. S. "pause" in the raids on grounds this might prompt Hanoi to respond by ceasing some of its activities. Pause" Not Declared

But President Johnson has never declared such a "pause." What made current three-day stoppage different from the previous ones was that this was the

first time large numbers of officials have spoken of a "decision" to hold up the bombings.

Diplomatic officials said it was a military decision for "operational reasons" - to conduct a period of aerial reconnaissance to assess targets in North Viet Nam, both those which have been hit and those which have escaped.

Military officials indicated it was a diplomatic decision.

The White House and State and Defense Departments had no comment.

Deny Speculation There was speculation in public print that the move followed some "sign" by the Communists that they were or are willing to suspend hostilities.

Diplomatic officials indicated this was not the case.

There also was speculation in public that the Communists had shown some willingness for peace talks, but diplomatic sources appeared to be knock-

ing this idea down also. It may be unrelated, but Secretary of State Dean Rusk was meeting with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko in Vienna, Austria, Saturday at ceremonies commemorating the 10th anniversary of the Austrian state treaty. Viet Nam could be one major subject they might discuss.

Pampa Optimist Clubs' Youth Programs Need Help

In a joint effort, the Morning and Evening Optimist Clubs of Pampa have embarked on a new program to help raise funds for their youth programs.

Brochures went into the mail today asking persons to join the Pampa Optimist Booster Club.

Through the club, a person may become a sustaining member and booster of the Pampa Optimist youth programs for a \$5 donation per year.

The organization of the Boost-

er Club is being handled by Pampa insuranceman, Newt Secrest.

Secrest said the booster club is being started partly to do away with so many individual fund raising drives and projects necessary to support the club's youth programs.

He said the money raised will be used for boys work only and will stay in Pampa, being used to promote the youth activities and using the properties and equipment "for

The summer baseball program has been called the most useful program for Pampa youth in the city by civic lead-

Bill Leonard, juvenile officer, said he personally felt the Optimist youth programs give Pampa boys a sense of responsibility as well as help in the overall betterment of youth,

Realizing the need for a boy's club and summer baseball program in 1956, a group of men known as Optimists purchased 10.25 acres of land located at Craven and Barnes Streets in Pampa. Some \$8,250 was paid for this property.

In August of 1957, the present boys' club building foundation was laid, and in February of 1958 the boys' club was opened for the use of the youth of Pam-

Since then, two Little League ball parks and one full - size Babe Ruth park, all three lighted, have been added.

Up to the present time, more than \$125,000 has been spent, although most equipment was obtained at cost or through donations, and labor on the physical plant, with a few exceptions, was donated

The program grew at such a rapid pace that the two clubs now serve 1,000 young people, primarily boys, in the city through baseball, basketball, football, oratorical contest, bike safety week, youth appreciation week, and the girls' softball program operated by

Today, the facilities owned by the Optimist Clubs are valued at more than \$225,000.
