Solons Adjourn 59th Legislature

AUSTIN (UPI) — The 59th Texas Legislature has adjourned after a session which was marked by a record of achievement for the legislature in its 59th regular session of the Texas Legislature, which in my judgment has been the most productive of any session in this century," said Gov. John Connally. Connally addressed an afternoon joint session of the legislature, which he presided over. The speaker's address was the first of his annual "State of the State" addresses since the legislature adjourned in 1964. Connally's message was the longest ever, lasting over an hour. He said the legislature had passed a record number of bills, and that the session had been the most productive in the state's history. He praised the work of the legislature and the cooperation of the executive branch. The session ended with a prayer and the playing of the Texas state song.

SAIGON (UPI) — South Vietnamese marines today launched a counter-attack against a Communist force withdrawing from a region which used human wave tactics to smash two government battalions around the city of Quang Ngai. A Viet Cong terror squad penetrated Quang Ngai's defenses before daybreak today and attacked the provincial police headquarters with satchel charges and hand grenades. One policeman was seriously injured. The guerrillas penetrated to within 400 yards of the American military command.

SANTO DOMINGO (UPI) — Jose A. Mora, secretary general of the Organization of American States, was reported here today that the OAS will relieve him of the task of trying to mediate the Dominican crisis. Informed diplomatic sources said Mora believes the OAS selection of a committee should appoint a special committee to replace him. In Washington, Secretary of State Dean Rusk said the OAS meeting is "moving very strongly toward an ambassador of Latin American consensus to supersede Mora."

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI) — A medical OK today gave U.S. astronaut Edward H. White the go-ahead to try to "walk" 3,600 miles across northern Mexico and the United States during 12 daring minutes of his leap into space Thursday. White and fellow astronaut James A. McDivitt, a former college chum assigned as pilot of their two-seater Gemini-4 spaceship, underwent a final head-to-toe physical and psychological examination at the hands of a team of experts headed by Dr. Charles Berry. Early forecasts indicated good weather at Cape Kennedy and in the main recovery areas on Thursday and probably on Friday. As the blast-off hour of 8 a.m. CST Thursday neared, a drastically revised flight plan revealed that, in addition to White's highly touted "space walk" and their attempt to steer to within 20 feet of another satellite, the astronauts will dump air from their cabin at least twice. The plan, virtually rewritten following a series of dramatic changes ordered by federal space agency chiefs last week, also reflected the featherlike touch that McDivitt will be called upon to use on the controls to separate gently enough from the Titan-2 rocket booster that earlier orbited them, to keep it nearby. McDivitt and White, a pair of space rookies with the nation's first real chance to challenge Russian manned spacecraft supremacy, hope to fly the 7,200-pound Gemini-4 for 12 hours around the world in 37 1/2 hours.

A full battalion of Vietnamese marines was involved in today's counter-attack. Helicopters airlifted the troops into an area 10 miles northwest of Quang Ngai.

Two U.S. military advisers were among the Quang Ngai dead and a U.S. military spokesman in Saigon reported today that ten other Americans were killed in scattered ground actions against the Viet Cong north and around Quang Ngai.

Commissioners Okay Street Paving Pact

Two homestead property owners who had signed the original petition for paving the 200 and 400 blocks of N. Zimmers St. today asked to withdraw their names for financial reasons. City Engineer Harold Foreman told city commissioners. The property owners were involved in the paving of the two blocks and all but five had made five-year arrangements to go ahead with their share of the paving and assess costs. Following a public hearing on the project at today's commission meeting, commissioners passed on first reading an ordinance to authorize the paving and assess costs.

Nation's Drivers Set New Traffic Death Record

The nation today counted a record number of persons dead in traffic accidents for a three-day Memorial Day weekend. With late death reports still coming in, United Press International counted 487 persons killed on the nation's streets and highways between 6 p.m. local time Friday and midnight Monday night.

FPC Has Authority To Regulate Sales Of Natural Gas

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Supreme Court ruled today that the Federal Power Commission (FPC) has authority to regulate sales of natural gas located in the ground, just as producer - to - pipeline sales are regulated. The 8-1 decision was a victory for the federal government. It reversed an adverse ruling in the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals. Justice John M. Harlan spoke for the majority. Justice William O. Douglas dissented. The case involved sale of leasehold interests in Rayne Field in Acadia Parish, La., in 1959 to Texas Eastern Transmission Corp., a pipeline. The sellers were Continental Oil Co. and General Crude Oil Co. The question was whether the contract provided for the sale of gas moving in interstate commerce but does not concern itself with production and gathering of gas. In the 1954 Phillips petroleum case, the court ruled that sales by producers to pipelines were part of the movement in interstate commerce and subject to regulation.

Explorer Delirious After Cave Rescue

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI) — A young explorer delirious after dancing for eight hours while climbing after a day of a shoulder harness, was hauled from the nation's deepest vertical cave Monday night in an "amb-y-inch" rescue. James Dowling, 22, a University of California graduate student from Connersville, Ind., was pulled from the 40-foot level of Nege's Cave in a three-hour rescue operation, suffering from shock, over-exertion and painful bruises. He was taken to a Salt Lake City hospital where his condition was reported "critical." The cave, which is 1,170 feet deep, is located in the Wasatch Mountains on the southeast outskirts of the city. The opening is 2 1/2 feet wide and the largest cavern is estimated at 40 feet. Dowling and two companions — John Wood, 23, and Paul Gerhard, 22, both UC graduate students and from Bladesburg, Md., entered the cave Sunday morning. Dowling became trapped the following morning as they were ascending.

52 Persons Killed In Texas Holiday Highway Accidents

The survey spanned the period from 6 p.m. Friday to Monday midnight. At least 29 persons died in traffic accidents, six in a single crash. The worst accident occurred north of San Angelo late Sunday. Two cars carrying Odessa residents crashed head-on. Four persons were killed in that crash, two by Beverly Mackey, 28, his 27-year-old wife, Rosa and their children Richard, 2 and 15-month-old Roseanne.

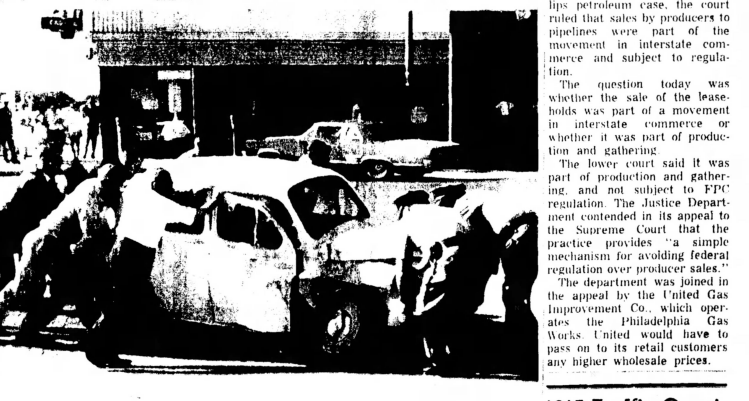

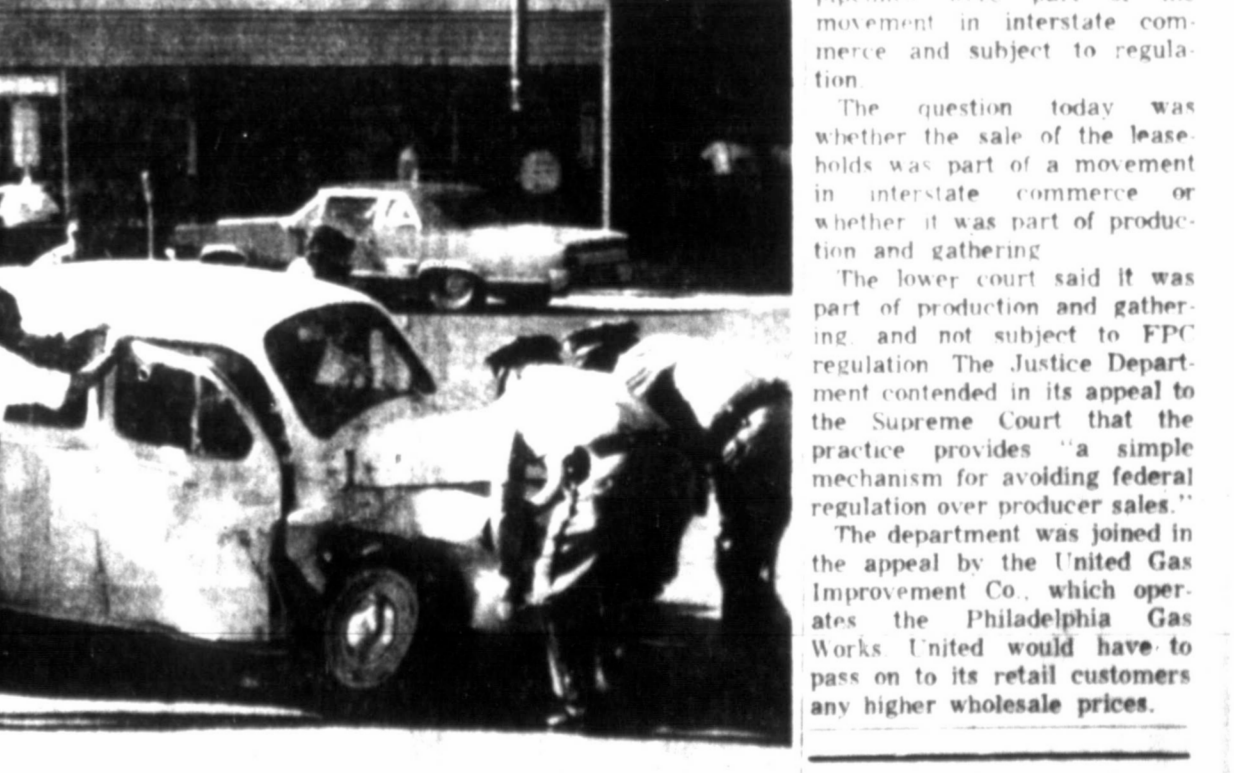

52 Persons Killed In Texas Holiday Highway Accidents

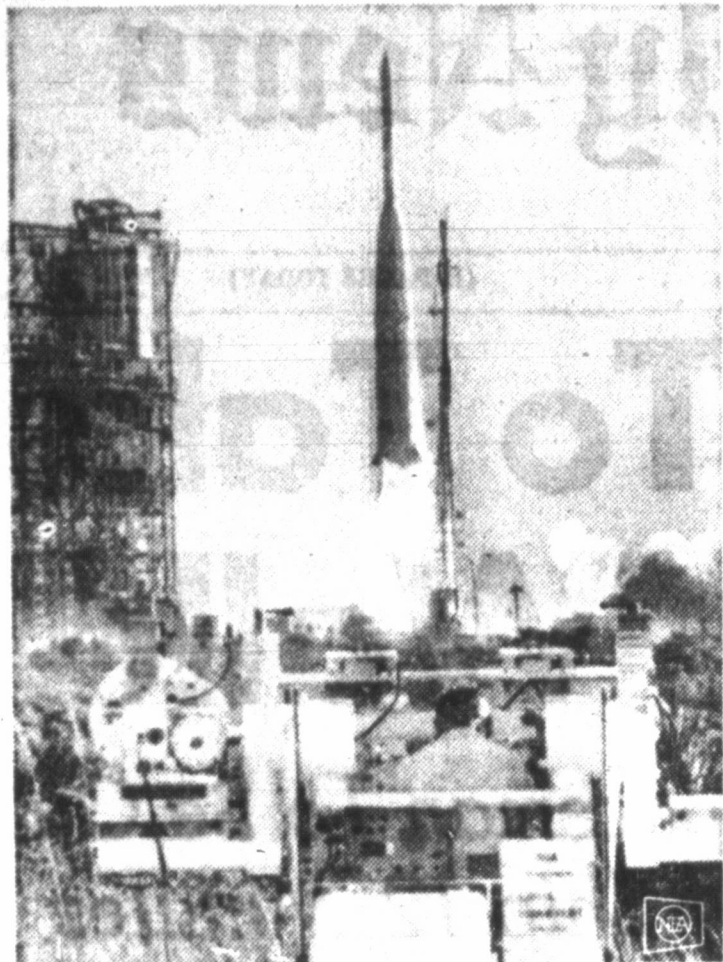
By United Press International - At least 52 persons died violently in Texas during Memorial Day weekend, a United Press International survey showed today.

Foreign Commentary

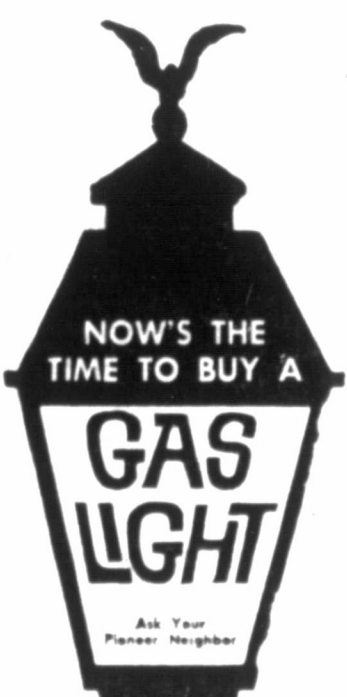

Notes from the foreign news cables:

Asia Checkerboard:
Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's Nationalist Chinese government is reported to have set aside \$25 million to "cope with the emergency that may develop" in Southeast Asia. A sizeable portion of his 600,000-man army also is known to be ready to move out either to Viet Nam or the China mainland on as little as 24-hour notice. In short, the Nationalists expect to play a decisive role in case the Chinese Communists should intervene openly in the Vietnamese conflict.

Sukarno Move:
Malaysian intelligence reports say Indonesia may have moved a large number of crack combat troops into Rhuo Island only a few miles south of Singapore. The troops could be for defensive purposes, but Malaysian officials are betting the move heralds another big landing on the Malaysian mainland. These officials note grimly that both the caliber and the fire power of the invaders are improving.

Spanish Plebiscite:
Political sources in Madrid believe Gen. Francisco Franco may call a national referendum in the coming months to vote on a crucial law now being prepared separating the jobs of chief of state and head of government. Both have been held by Franco since Oct. 1, 1936. It was believed the referendum would throw some light on the touchy question of how heads of government will be chosen after Franco. At the same time, the sources said, Franco might also use the occasion to proclaim official Prince Juan Carlos of Bourbon as Prince of Asturias, Spanish equivalent of crown prince.

Visit To Paris:
West Berlin's Lord Mayor Willy Brandt visits Paris this week to address the Western European Union (WEU) assembly. He also will be received by President Charles de Gaulle and probably will see Premier Georges Pompidou and Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville. De Gaulle is likely to re-

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West German Election Candidates Politicking

West Germany's general elections don't come until Sept. 19, but candidates already are off and running, and part of the Campaign will be fought on U.S. shores this week.

The U.S. portion of the campaign got under way today with the awarding of an honorary degree of doctor of laws to Chancellor Ludwig Erhard by Columbia University in New York.

That is the ostensible reason for the trip which also will include a talk with President Johnson and with United Nations Secretary General U. Thant. The visit will be followed closely by West German newspapers and it therefore becomes significant that, besides his foreign minister, the Erhard party also includes state secretary Karl - Gunther Von

Hase, the government spokesman.

Since this West German republic came into being 16 years ago, West German politicians always have felt it necessary to demonstrate their close ties with the government of the United States.

It is not stretching a point, therefore, to assume that the chancellor's current trip is designed not only to demonstrate this fact but also to offset a similar visit in April by West Berlin Mayor Willy Brandt, Erhard's chief rival in the approaching elections.

Naturally, the United States itself will have a considerable interest in the outcome of the election since West Germany is its strongest ally in Western Europe.

So close is the voting shaping up now that most analysts are refusing to make a prediction. Erhard's personal popularity still is rated far ahead of Brandt's because West Germans continue to give him credit for the country's great and continuing prosperity.

On the other hand, the Socialists, always strong in the cities, now are beginning to make inroads elsewhere as shown by the outcome of recent state and local elections. For the first time in the history of the republic, a Socialist is being given a chance of victory over the Christian Democrats, the party of Erhard and former chancellor Konrad Adenauer.

So close does the election shape up today that neither party completely rules out the possibility of a coalition government. The U.S. interest is a government that could act quickly and decisively in foreign affairs.

The Lighter Side

WASHINGTON (UPI) — You simply never know just what sort of problems you're going to encounter when you become a property owner.

You may have termites in the basement, or mice in the cupboards, or bears in the kindling. To mention just a few.

But rarely do you run into a problem of a type encountered by the General Services Administration, which looks after the property owned by the federal government.

The GSA recently was horrified to discover that it had beatniks in the attic.

This unusual situation arose when the government commandeered a block of building along Pennsylvania Avenue here as the site for a new FBI headquarters.

The buildings are marked for destruction about two years from now. In the meantime, a group of local artists obtained permission to use the upper floors as studios.

But hardly had the artists moved in before the police who patrol that area noticed that some of them had beards, long hair, something less than Brooks

Eros, clothing, and a generally unsanitary appearance.

The police immediately called the GSA and reported that the attics were infested with beatniks.

In obvious alarm, the GSA promptly dispatched a beatnik repellent to the premises with orders to evict the artists forthwith.

I probably would not have become involved in this situation except for the fact that one of the tenants happened to be a young art student named Rickey Hart, the son of an old friend of mine.

Rickey called me up in a state of righteous indignation. "Here is your chance to win yourself a Pulitzer Prize," he said. "You can expose the incongruity of the government's program to escalate the cultural level of the United States."

It isn't every day that someone dumps Pulitzer Prize material in my lap, so I begged Rickey to elucidate.

"What the government doesn't seem to realize is the depressing effect that the anti-poverty program and all the other measures to bring on prosperity is having on young artists," he said.

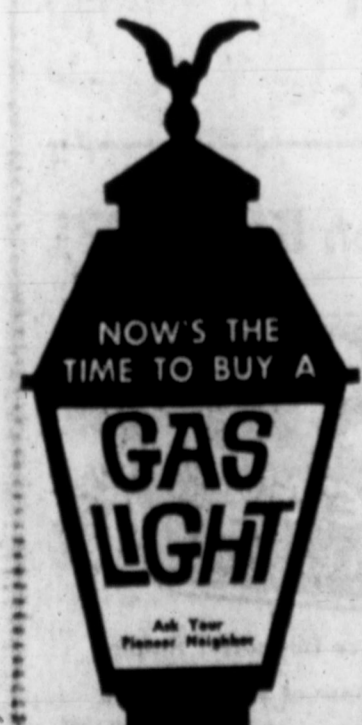
TV's official schedule for next season formalizes the fact that

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National Window

The Johnson administration kept the faith last week with its credit card economic advisers and asked Congress for another hike in the public debt limit, the 12th in 10 years.
This is to be a temporary hike of \$5 billion to a record limit of \$329 billion. The permanent debt limit is \$285 billion. As of today the debt amounts to about \$317 billion, an increase of \$59 billion during the past 20 years. President Johnson estimated today the debt amounts to about \$316.9 billion on June 30, the end of the current 1965 fiscal year. Between June 30, 1965, and June 30, 1966 LBJ calculated that the national debt would rise by about \$6 billion to \$222.5 billion.

But LBJ probably will top that. He is a big-time spender in the Texas tradition. Whatever Texans do they do big, such as piling up more and more public debt for future generations to pay; if it ever is paid.

The faint hearts among us—good neighbors all—shrink from the idea that the great and noble government of the United States would repudiate its public debt. And maybe the faint hearts are right about that.

Great Prosperity

But what about this: There has been in the past 20 years—since the end of World War II—prosperity unprecedented in the United States. Except for the unfortunate unemployed, Americans never had it so good. A chicken in every pot and two cars in every garage! And during all of these years of prosperity the U.S. taxpayers have not paid in full their government's bills. Government had to borrow about \$59 billion to pay bills. This sum increased the public debt. The politicians were busy shovelling out government funds to provide the citizens with a free lunch of this and that luxury, subsidy, benefit, boondoggle and whatnot. If we cannot pay government bills and begin debt retirement in boom times such as these, when can retirement begin? Tough question: These borrow and spend policies are proven in the political wars. The political leaders who borrow to spend, spend, spend are likely to win, win, win elections. No matter if they spend borrowed money. A fair question would be: How and when will the people decide that this fiscal flim flam has gone far enough and demand that debt retirement begin? When will the people do that? Probably never!

News Of Day

The news of the day is fit for the attention of modern Gilberts and Sullivans or for tense conversations between the Mad Hatter and the White Rabbit. For example: an administration that does not raise enough revenue by taxation to pay its bills now proposes more tax reduction and Congress yips hurra. Simultaneously, administration and Congress resist effective economy and consistently whomp up new spending projects because they are desirable. The question whether the nation can afford these projects does not arise.

White Rabbit: And pray when shall we begin to repay these last debt obligations. It already is quite late.

Mad Hatter: Don't worry, man. Like we owe it to ourselves.

To reduce taxes repeatedly while spending borrowed money probably is like the use of morphine—comforting and good under controlled conditions but disastrously habit forming. The user becomes hooked. Since 1933 the United States has been hooked by deficit spending. The time and symptoms of withdrawal are terrible to anticipate. So terrible that politicians and people may never face up to government economy and debt retirement.

RENEWS ACCUSATIONS

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen John J. Williams, R-Del., the chief accuser in the Bobby Baker case, has renewed his charges that someone in the administration is "trying to destroy me" through leaked reports on the investigation.

But he said, so far as he knew President Johnson had "nothing to do with it." He said he had an idea as to who was involved but in the absence of proof could name no names.



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What Next, Penelope, Fish and Chips for Phillip?

LONDON (NEA)—The new "matey" look of the British monarchy goes down well with most Britons, but there have been a few yelps of outraged protest.

The royal family is getting too down-to-earth and folksy, some of the traditionalists complain. They say there has been a general lowering of tone at Buckingham Palace.

Some of the Queen's recent guests at the palace have been criticized. What is Her Majesty doing consorting with low comedians like Peter Sellers? The die-

hards ask.

And what is Prince Phillip doing playing polo every Sunday? Hardly a good example to set for the rest of the nation.

And those recent birthday pictures of the Queen pushing a baby pram and larking about with her children among the daffodils of Windsor Great Park—Queen Victoria would never have approved.

The monarchy, the Queen's critics argue, should remain on a pedestal slightly above ordinary mortals. Otherwise the Queen will end up cycling to the local fish and chips shop to buy Prince Phillip's lunch.

It should be stressed that these criticisms represent a minority view. The vast majority of Britons are delighted to see the Queen looking so happy and in such a relaxed mood.

Although royal mateyness is up to a palace revolution, in the opinion of most Britons. Nevertheless recent innovations at Buckingham Palace are not without interest as straws in the wind of change.

ITEM: For her official 39th birthday pictures the Queen called in a press photographer from the breezy Daily Mirror tabloid, instead of summoning

Cecil Beaton or one of the other posh photographers.

The results were gratifying. Instead of the usual stilted pictures, the news photographer caught the royal family in casual clothes and an off-beat mood, baby carriage, Corgi dog and all.

ITEM: The royal family turned up at the Comedy Theatre recently, with Peter Sellers as their guest. No sooner did the house lights go down than the Queen and her party found themselves part of the act.

First, comedian Spike Milligan put a napkin on his head and did an imitation of Queen Victoria. "I will probably get sent to the Tower of London for this," he added.

But when Milligan interrupted a passionate love scene on stage to quip, "Philip, get that lad of yours out of here," the Sunday Telegraph thought that the comedian had gone too far. After all, "that lad" happens to be Prince Charles, aged 16, the future King of England, the Telegraph grandly reminded its readers.

ITEM: Prince Phillip again found himself on the spot when he agreed to be quizzed on radio by teen-age students, most of them budding journalists. Did he

not think that his children were missing out on parental love because he was "always away and busy." Prince Phillip was asked. He protested with some heat that he was not always away. "It happened that since last October I have been away quite a lot, but that's unusual," he explained.

Finally, Philip was asked what he missed most by being prince consort. "Being able to walk into a cinema," he replied, "or to go out to a night club or to a pub, things of that sort.

"I can do it," he added. "But it isn't always enjoyable, because if you're recognized the atmosphere changes and people nudge each other, conversation stops and somebody asks you for your autograph."

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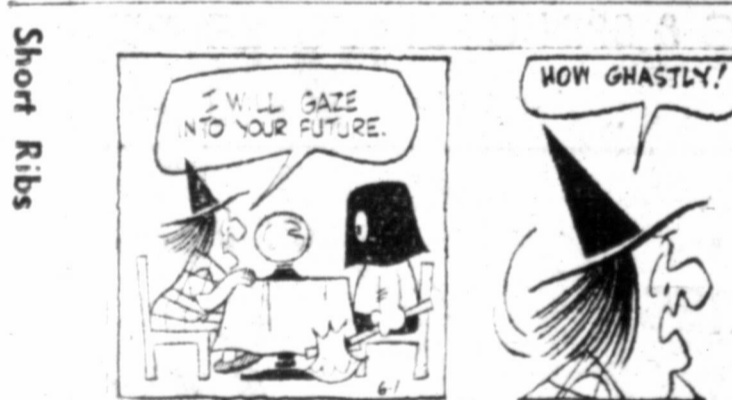
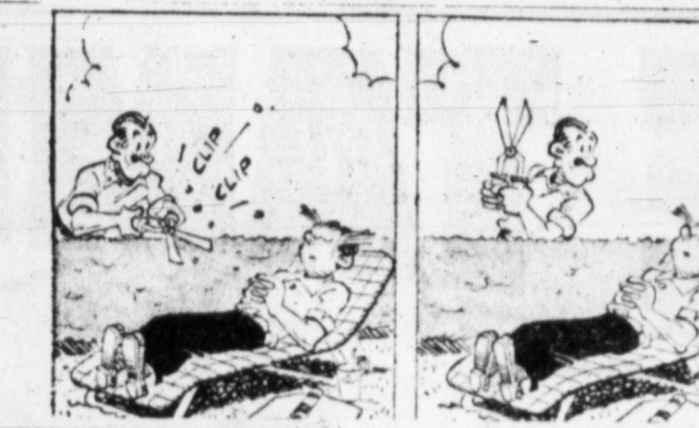
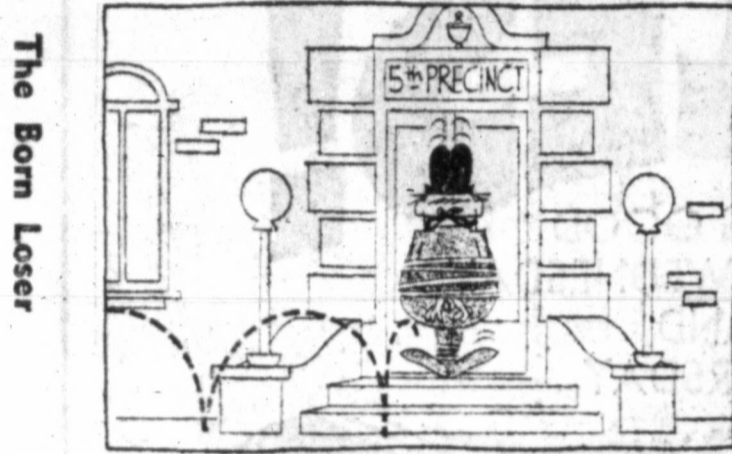

Art of Spying Short On Glamor, long on Drudgery

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Almost all of the glamor has gone out of the craft of spying. Today it is a nuts-and-bolts, assembly line operation and some of the nuts involved are human.

Female spies these days bear small resemblance to Mata Hari, the dancer who was executed for espionage in World War I. They are likely to be either fat and 40 or thin and frustrated. They are suckers for sweet talking men who love 'em and leave 'em as soon as they have served their purpose.

Most spies lead full lives. Harry Gold, a Russian agent involved in the Klaus Fuchs case, complained a bout his dreary routine to FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover.

"There is difficulty in raising money for trips. The weary hours of waiting on street corners in strange towns where I had no business to be. The killing of time in cheap movies

and the lies I had to tell at home and to my friends to explain my supposed whereabouts (Mom was certain I was carrying on a series of clandestine love affairs). It was drudgery anyone who has an idea this work is glamorous and exciting is very wrong indeed. Nothing could have been more dreary."

There is a general impression that FBI agents, who are charged with the duty of fighting Communist subversion inside the United States, lead exciting lives. Sometimes they do, but more often their activity consists of tramping from garage to garage in large cities searching for automobiles that may have been involved in a crime.

With a few exceptions, spies are underpaid, considering the risks they take. One exception was Col. Stig Wennerstrom of the Swedish air force who used his position as air attache in Washington to send secret information to Moscow. He was

sentenced to life imprisonment and at his trial it was brought out that the Russians had paid him \$100,000 over 15 years.

Another exception was Col. Rudolf Abel, who may have been the ablest Russian spy of our generation. When he was arrested, he had \$6,500 in cash. He had \$1,386 on deposit in the East River Savings Bank in New York and \$15,000 in a safe deposit box.

Abel deserves our attention because he is an example of the new type of international spy. He had contempt for agents who engaged in spectacular feats of derring-do. He was a master of blending quietly into all sorts of conditions and environments. He was fluent in several languages and accents and had passed successfully as a Jew, a German, a Pole and a resident of Brooklyn.

He had a keen and wide interest in scientific matters and for relaxation and light read-

ing he turned to Einstein's treatises on relativity. He knew enough about law to make valuable contributions to his own defense while he was in jail awaiting trial.

Abel probably never would have been caught had not one of his subordinates turned into an alcoholic and, in a moment of depression, went to the FBI and told his story. The result was that Abel was sentenced to prison and then was exchanged for Gary Powers, the American U2 pilot who was shot down over Russia, Moscow obviously held Abel in high regard and just the other day it was announced he had been awarded a medal. The full extent of the damage he did to the national security of the United States probably will never be known to anybody except Abel and his superiors in Moscow.

NEW YORK—Building awards rose 9 per cent ahead of a year ago in April, F. W. Dodge Corp. reports, following a 2 per cent decline in the first quarter. All categories of building showed gains, the most significant being in homes.
