



Under the Federal Power Act the commission regulates prices on gas moving in interstate commerce but does not concern itself with production and gath ering of gas. In the 1954 Phillips petroleum case, the court ruled that sales by producers to pipelines were part of the movement in interstate com merce and subject to regula tion

The question today was whether the sale of the leaseholds was part of a movement in interstate commerce or whether it was part of produc tion and gathering

The lower court said it was part of production and gathering, and not subject to FPC regulation The Justice Depart ment contended in its appeal to the Supreme Court that the practice provides "a simple mechanism for avoiding federal regulation over producer sales." The department was joined in the appeal by the United Gas Improvement Co., which operates the Philadelphia Gas Works. United would have to pass on to its retail customers any higher wholesale prices.
