## Informal Cease-Fire Halts Bloody Fighting

SANTO DOMINGO (UPI) -- An inter American peacekeeping force, its muscle furnished by U.S. troops, today took over the job of ending the Dominican crisis. An informal ceasefire was in effect.

A Brazilian general, Hugo Panasco Alvim, was named to command the Organization of American States (OAS) force, the first such in hemispheric history. The U.S. ground commander, Lt.-Gen. Bruce Palmer Jr., was named deputy com-
