Scranton Has Hopes for '68 Presidential Race

HARRISBURG, Pa. (UPI) -Mrs. William Scranton has told her husband what she wants for Christmas next year, and Republican politicians planning strategy for the 1968 presidential election had better pay at-

Scranton's term as governor

of Pennsylvania expires on Jan. 1, 1967, and under state law he cannot run for re-election. So does that make him available for another try at the GOP presidential nomination, and, if so, is he interested?

"Well," he said, "I'll tell you what my wife said to me. She said that for a Christmas present next year she wanted me

to promise that I would come home for dinner every night until she is 60 years old."

Running for President and getting home to dinner every night probably are beyond the reach of a mortal man. But at this date Scranton cannot be written out of the race nor can he be shoved into it. He says with a ring of sincerity in his

thought about the possibility. He adds that he doesn't intend to make any decision until he walks out of the governor's of-

At no time during a half hour talk in his office did Scranton evidence any bitterness or frustration over the events in and

Palace when the Republicans assembled to nominate a candidate. That, you will recall, was the occasion when he stood alone in the middle of the road and tried to halt the Goldwater bandwagon. He was run over

and badly crushed and bruised. Scranton still is fighting for

the Republican party and this

is his formula for victory: "We must concentrate on 1966. Lots will depend on local and state issues and we must get good candidates at all levels. We must build up the national organization, improve the party's financial situation, but, above all, we have to make sure that the best candidates are running on the Republican ticket."

Asked about the new conserv ative society led by Barry Goldwater, Scranton said: "I'm against any proliferation of the party. I never have joined any

He believes the Republicans lost the presidency last year on the basis of "personal feelings." What he means is that too (See SCRANTON, Page 3)

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By PHIL NEWSOM UPI Foreign News Analyst Outside Portugal the four-line announcement issued by the National Union, the country's only legal political party, attracted little attention.

It said Rear Adm. Americo de Deus Rodrigues Tomas, Portugal's 70-year-old president, had agreed to run for another seven-year term. Since no other party is permitted to exist and because the scattered opposition was unlikely to put up a candidate, any suspense in Portugal's election thereby was removed.

The Portuguese presidency largely is a ceremonial position but what duties he has, President Tomas performs with devotion. More important is the fact he is a man of no political ambition in the pattern required by Premier Antonio de Oliveira Salazar.

Has Firm Rule

Salazar has ruled Portugal with paternal firmness for 37 years and his presidential candidates were handpicked.

Of greater significance in the announcement of the Tomas candidacy was the possibility it may fall to him to name Salazar's successor.

Salazar is 76. As with Generalissimo Francisco Franco in neighboring Spain, political discussion in Portugal centers not upon any possibility of Salazar's overthrow but on the question of his successor at such a time as he should be removed by death or infirmity. Age is becoming a

Few Recall Others

Comparatively few Portuguese can remember any other rule but Salazar's. Politically, the last real oppo-

sition to Salazar came in 1958 from Gen. Humberto Delgado. Delgado lost the campaign and took refuge in the Brazilian Embassy, leaving the country later under a safe conduct guarantee. From then on he plotted Salazar's overthrow until a body buried under a eucalyptus tree just across the line in Spain was identified as

Delgado's early this year. As it has been each year under the Salazar rule, Portugal's budget is balanced. And his adamant refusal to even consider independence for Portugal's African provinces appears to be paying off. Near quiet has returned to Angola and the province is making money from petroleum and coffee.

Mozambique remains a problem because of a threat from nearby Tanzania, but it is a relatively minor one.

SAFE MOWER

NEW YORK (UPI) - Item 50,000 fingers and 100,000 _toes lost. That's the National Safety Council estimate on needless amputations of toes and fingers sacrificed through accidents occurring while cutting the grass with a rotary mower.

Now along comes a firm Dura Corp.—with a mower said to be the first safety blade mower capable of reducing the accidents by 98 per cent. The mower has a blade with comblike projections. These are said to reduce the chances of cutting off a finger or toe, or of throwing an object with gunlike velocity.

BUSY 4-H

NEW YORK (UPI) - The 4-H club members are busy. They are enrolled in almost 5 million work projects covering home centered endeavors ranging from cooking and sewing to livestock and safety. So says the U.S. Department of Agriculture.
