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Korean Students **Riot to Protest Treaty Signing**

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ed gas bombs Monday to break up a demonstration of more than 7000 rock-throwing South Korean students protesting the planned signing Tuesday of the controversial Korea-Japan normalization treaty.

About 600 university and high school students were arrested as the city's entire police force went on "extraordinary alert" until further notice.

Opposition parties announced that their "struggle committee" against the treaty would stage a massive demonstration Tuesday through every means possible, including violence.

As a move apparently to prevent the students from taking part in the demonstration. officials of 11 private universities and colleges in Seoul said they would close classes for "summer vacations."

President Park Chung Hee rejected the struggle committee's demand that he meet representatives of the group to discuss the normalization issue. The treaty is to be signed in Tokyo but it will be subject to ratification at a later date by the parliaments of both countries.

Congolese Rebels Slaughter Police

LEOPOLDVILLE. The Congo (UPI) - A survivor reported that Congolese rebels slaughtered police in a village 200 miles northeast of Leopoldville Monday. They then laid seige to a factory in which 30 Europeans sought refuge.

The report came from a European who fled the village of Nioki and radioed an appeal

The 30 Europeans, including men, women and children, were reported to be armed and fighting for their lives.

The European who escaped and radioed Leopoldville army headquarters said the rebels killed all of the handful of de fending police and gendarmes

in the village. The whites sought safety in the factory building of the Forescom Timber Exploitation Co pany. They included 17 male employees of the company, 10 women, including two social: workers, a male missionary and two children, the reports said.
