
Text: Search the scriptures; ...they ... testify of me John 5:39

> The Bible is usable. It was made for sinners; it is a saving agent for the crisis. It shows us God saving the world through Jesus, It shows us ourselves and our desperate need of salvation.

> To understand the Bible is to see Christ there. He is there from the beginning to end: prophesied in Eden, foreshadowed in the books of the law, foretold by the prophets, incarnate in the Gospel story, exalted in the final Revelation. It is He who gives meaning and consistency to its sixty-six books.

Jesus is the heart of Scripture; and the cross is central in the gospel of Christ. We cannot understand Jesus in relation to the types and prophecies nor to the consummation of His glory unless we see Him crucified as a sinless atonement for sinners.

To read the Bible with understanding is to see Jesus dying for sinners to bring them to God. To believe with the heart is to go a step farther and see oneself as the one lost sinner whose name Jesus bears to the Father. It is to read His "whosoever" with one's own name substituted; to hear His "Come unto me, . . . and I will give you rest." When "wounded for our transgressions' has become "wounded for my transgressions,' the Word has become personal and thus effective.




