War Rumbles Threaten Peace

By United Press International The Middle East rumbled today with threats of a new war even as Secretary of State Henry A: Kissinger flew there on a mission of peace. The Arab states cut oil production 25 per cent and Egypt said the an Arab oil embargo would increase until the United States took an "even handed" policy in the

State-controlled Egyptian newspapers charged that Israelis planning "aggressive" actions against the Arabs and the semiofficial Al Ahram said the situation was "explosive" along the cease-fire lines. Israeli Defense Minister Moshe Dayan

said that Egypt had built up its troops to renew the war.

Diplomatic reports in London said the Soviet Union had resupplied Egypt and Syria to prewar levels and had pledged more up-to-date weapons in the event of a new outbreak of hostilities. The reports said Russia also had sent in Soviet experts to oversee the new

Israel reported the front lines quiet today despite the reported preparations for war. Egypt has demanded that Israel withdraw to the Oct. 22 ceasefire lines, thus freeing the trapped Egyptian 3rd Army, but today the U.N. Emergency Force in

Male Passenger Sucked Through Jetliner Window

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (UPI) - National Guard pilots circling the mountainous wilderness of central New Mexico have found part of a National Airlines DC10 engine, but no trace of a man sucked through the window of the jetliner.

Searchers were ordered back to the northern fringe of the Gila Wilderness today to look for the body of G.F. Gardner of Beaumont, Tex., pulled from the plane following an explosion during a flight from Houston to Las Vegas, Nev., and San

"I still think it's a very slim chance the body will be found." Sgt. Al Whitehouse of the New Mexico state police said.

A jet engine on the plane. which carried 116 passengers and a crew of 12, disintegrated Saturday night and tossed chunks of metal into the fuselage. A window was smashed, the cabin was decompressed and, despite the efforts of passengers who vainly tried machinist on his way to a job in emergency exit from landing.

IN RESIGNING

Nominee Supports Richardson Action

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Vice ranking Republican on the Presidential nominee Gerald R. Ford said today he "probably would have resigned just as former Attorney General Elliot L. Richardson did if faced with the same circumstances.

Responding to questions at the Senate Rules Committee's televised hearing into his confirmation, the Republican House leader said he fully understood why Richardson felt compelled to resign after President Nixon had ordered special Watergate prosecutor Archibald Cox fired.

"I assume if I was in that possition I would probably do the same." Ford told Sen. Claiborne Pell, D-R.1., who brought the matter up.

Pell said he was pleased w Ford's answers. He said the nominee had "this quality of openness and honesty" which the American people are

Communist Troops Take Control Of Two Outposts

of sabotage

SAIGON (UPI) - A column 2,000 feet, apparently because of tank-led Communist troops captured two government outposts Sunday near the Cambodian border, the Saigon command said today, and all 29 men aboard a government transport plane carrying reinforcements to the battlesite died when the aircraft crashed.

The twin battles were the biggest armored clashes since major battle in South Vietnam the signing of the Vietnam cease-fire nine months ago.

Lt. Col. Le Trung Hien said there was no word on casualties in the ground fighting. He said he expected they would be heavy on both sides.

The command said the government's outpost at Bu rang, 115 miles north of Saigon, fell to an overwhelming North Vietnamese ground and armored attack. Military sources said the twin outpost of Bu Bong, one mile away, was seized later in the day by the Communist infantry and armored juggernaut

Hien said Bu Prang and Bu Bong had been in government hands for years, and continuously since the Jan. 28 cease-

A spokesman for the Viet Cong truce delegation. however, accused the South Vietnamese government of 'landgrabbing" in the area and said the Communist units wiped out several units of the Saigon army" in retaliation.

The Caribou crashed while landing at Nhon Co Air Field 20 miles south of Bu Prang, Hien said, killing the 25 infantrymen and four crewmen aboard

It was the worst air crash in Vietnam since March 19 when an Air Vietnam DC5 airliner with 62 people aboard blew up at

Elsewhere, the command reported five guerrilla attacks that killed seven people, including four hamlet chiefs and deputy chiefs, and wounded 42

The government said losses on both sides were believed heavy in the fighting, the eight in six weeks. The South Vietnamese government has been predicing a full-scale North Vietnamese offensive late this year or early 1974.



Saxbe said in a statement. "I indicated if there was illegal activity recorded on the tapes, I questioned whether such tapes ever would be forthcoming.

'I also recall indicating inasmuch as the President and others knew of the tape machine. I considered it highly unlikely that anything embarrassing would have been said under those circumstances. In an interview with UPI in

Washington Oct. 23, Saxbe said "I don't think there's going to anything particular on them (the tapes). If there was anything on them, they would have been destroyed long before the investigation ever started.")

Saxbe also said he did not believe Nixon should be subjected to court action so long as he is president.

"I believe the President is exactly right when he said 'I can be impeached but I cannot be foisted around in the courts'. which is what he's saying. I think this is exactly right," the



Astros To View Kohoutek Comet

Skylab astronauts will walk in whip around the sun, pass 75 space Christmas day to get an unparalleled view of a brilliant visitor from far beyond the

The final crewmen in America's space station will look at a comet which first appeared last March as a faint, fuzzy spot of light on a photographic plate of the Czechoslovakian astronomer Lubos Kohoutek.

The comet, rapidly becoming known as the comet of the century, was more than 400 million miles from the sun when Kohoutek found it while looking for some of the 50 asteroids he discovered two years ago in search of another comet. The detection of the new comet was one of those rare strokes of luck that galvanize scientists around the world. It was quickly named after its finder.

The tight, frozen nucleus and its surrounding cloud of gas is falling toward the sun at ever increasing speed. It crossed the orbit of Mars, 142 million miles out from the sun, Friday and will pass within 13.2 million

glasses and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA), which is coordinating Kohoutek studies in the U.S., estimates it may be visible to the naked eye in a week or two in the southeastern sky two to three hours before sunrise.

The comet is receiving unprecedented attention from the scientific community. Most comets are found only two or three months before they make their closest approach to the

The Skylab 3 crewmen scheduled to walk in space on Christmas day will photograph the comet with three instruments and look at it visually.

The significance of comets is that they are believed to be bits of the original material from which the planets formed some 4.5 billion years ago.

Comets may be the only examples of the primordial matter left in the solar system and as such are of great interest to scientists trying to figure out the composition of the material from which the planets formed.

As the comet approaches the sun, solar gases and radiation will strip off an estimated 50 feet of material. It is this gaseous matter that forms the coma or cloud of gas around the nucleus and tails of gas and dust which glow in the sunlight.

The modern view of comets is that their nucleus is in effect like a dirty iceberg, consisting of frozen water, methane, ammonia carbon dioxide and particles of cosmic dust.

Telescopic instruments viewing comets from above the screening effects of earth's atmosphere can identify the molecules making up the gas cloud and tail.

Every time a comet makes a swing by the sun, it loses some of its material and eventually will disintegrate. Kohoutek is expected to live several million

A massive screening in the blood, and many persons program, along with a public awareness campaign, is being conducted in Starr and Hidalgo Counties through local health departments, the medical society and backup support of the State Health Department

Diabetes may strike anywhere, but in the Rio Grande Valley it is more prevalent among those in the high risk group. Who composes this high risk segment of society?

You are in it IF - you are more than 45 years of age; if ou are 45 or older and a close blood relative of a diabetic; if you are 45 or older and you are very overweight (obese); and if you are 45 or older and the parent of a newborn baby weigning nine pounds or more.

Some private physicians and local health departments screen patients for diabetes routinely if they fall into the high risk category. In Starr and Hidalgo counties, with a strong assist from television stations, those who are most susceptible are being sought out.

Through use of four specially produced television films from the State Health Department. as well as spot announcements. the message is being carried to all viewers. They are being asked to have screening blood tests made at a health department clinic, or from a private doctor if they are in the high risk group.

The blood samples are then sent to the State Health Department Laboratories for evaluation. Local health department personnel will follow up on persons whose tests were positive.

Studies done in Starr County and elsewhere in the Valley have indicated that diabetes mellitus is much more prevalent in South Texas than elsewhere in the nation.

Dr. Mario Ramirez of Roma said about 20 per cent of his patients at high risk have diabetes. Oftentimes, those with diabetes don't report to a physician until complications from the disease force them to seek medical aid.

Some of the complications from diabetes are blindness gangrene, damage to kidneys. blood vessels and nerves, heart attack and stroke

Early detection and treatment, so important in other diseases, is just as important if you have diabetes. It is estimated that only about half its victims are aware they have the disease. In the other half it is hidden. Programs such as the special effort in the Valley may insure a healthier future for those in whom the

disease is found. Diabetes is a chronic. matabolic disease which is a world - wide problem. It has been known for thousands of years. The oldest known document, and Egyptian papyrus of 1500 B.C., contains the earliest reference to what

was probably diabetes. Although diabetes affects people of all ages, in this country it is 10 times more

prevalent after age 45. Despite research through the centuries, no cure is yet known. However, the introduction of insulin therapy during the 1920's, followed by oral drugs in the 1950's, greatly improved the prognosis for diabetes.

Today the life expectancy of a diabetic is much greater than it was 50 years ago when insulin was first administered to a 14 year - old boy in Toronto. The boy recovered from a deep coma. Since that day, insulin has saved the lives of millions of



prices soaring?

According to one expert -L.H. Simerl of the Cooperative feedlots. Extension of the University of Hlinois' College of Agriculture - there are four main causes. and none of them developed all that suddenly

(1) The rising incomes of consumers

The increased prosperity of most Americans is readily apparent to everyone who has observed the changes in personal and family living conditions over the past 10 to 20 years, writes Simerl in Patrons Guide, published by FS Services of Mendota III

Grain-fed beef, for example, once a luxury enjoyed only by higher income families, has become a "necessity of life." Despite recent protests - and the abnormal situation regarding beef - food is more abundant and is available in more convenient forms. More consumers now can, and do, buy these foods with much less consideration about prices than

their parents and grandparents. One result is that normal changes in supplies now cause much larger price swings than in earlier years

(2) The increasing specialization of farmers.

In earlier times, farmers produced a variety of crops and livestock. They could make adjustments to changing weather and market conditions. Now, most farmers are specialists. They produce only one or two crops or kinds of

A broiler producer, for example, often produces nothing else, not even the feed he uses. He must buy feed.

Why, all of a sudden, are food increasingly to the producers of eggs and pork, to dairymen and to the operators of cattle

> (3) The disappearance of price - stabilizing reserves of

farm products. For most of the past 40 years. the government helped stabilize farm prices by buying when

supplies where excessive and selling when there were shortages Now, the government has only small reserves that can be

sold to meet rising demands

from our own people and from other lands (4) The growing tendency of world demand for farm products to increase faster than

Until recently, the optimists who believed that the world could feed all its people seemed to be right. But 1971 and 1972 brought short crops in many places - Russia, China, India. Southeast Africa and elsewhere. Bad weather plagued most of the United

This year, the principal U.S. crops, soybeans and feed grains, may again be skimpy. Short supplies always produce unstable prices.

All of these great changes consumer prosperity specialization of farmers. diminishing stocks of grain and short crops - have combined to produce larger swings in the prices of farm products, says

What About Your Right Of Privacy?

The growing invasion of a citizen's privacy by agencies of the Federal Government is alarming to most Americans. Although not specifically guaranteed in the Constitution, the right of privacy is one of the most cherished and guarded of all American liberties.

Last January, by Presidential Executive Order, the U.S. Department of Agriculture was given almost unlimited access to the tax records filed by some three million farmers in this country. Singling out farmers as a class to have their records inspected was supposedly justified as allowing the U.S.D.A. to gain "statistical data". It was only after congressional hearings questioned this sweeping decree that the President rescinded the order and replaced it with one equally alien to our sense of privacy.

Frightening!

Under the new order, any employee of the U.S.D.A., with permission of the Secretary of Agriculture, is permitted to inspect any and all farmers' tax records, provided that the information looked at could be considered as a measure of the farming operation. Certainly this may include almost any information on an income tax return.

1974 Cars Safer, But...?

By PAUL HARVEY You and I have talked about mandatory seat belts on 1974 cars. Belt yourself in or the starter won't start. It's a confounded nuisance: For people accustomed to placing babies or packages alongside seat; for the car jockeys in public parking lots; for anybody escaping a rapist.

The ignition-related seat belt and shoulder harness are cumberson, clumsy and subject to mechanical snafus which create six hazards for the one they are designed to correct.

and shoulder harnesses as safety devices has been established. I have flown airplanes most of


my life, worn shoulder harnesses before Washington, D.C., knew what they were. But experience also indicates

DEAR DR. LAMB - My husband has a slow heart and his pulse goes down to 34 and a few times 32. If he gets outside and digs around it gets up to 42. He does at times seem to have some high blood pressure, but has not taken anything for it in over a year. Fifteen years ago he had a heart block and it left a scar through the heart. He is 72. We have a garden which he takes care of. He keeps up our yard and trims our hedge but tires easily. His doctor tells him to just live with it, but you tell me what foods are

best for people like that. DEAR READER - The most immediate problem for your husband is to evaluate how well his heart functions mechanically. You don't mention any problems that commonly occur when there is a heart block that causes a very slow heart, and perhaps he has none. The slow heart rate in this

instance means that the normal impulses from the top of the heart are not getting to the lower part of the heart. As long as the heart is able to pump enough blood this way to provide good circulation to the brain, individuals with this problem do fairly well. If there is a problem in circulation to the brain then fainting and other problems develop. These problems cannot be avoided. In patients who need a faster rate, a pacemaker can be installed that stimulates the heart electrically to a rate that maintains good cir-

culation. Evaluating who does and does not need a pacemaker is not a simple office procedure. Unless your doctor is a heart specialist I would ask him about a referral consulation with a cardiologist in a center where pacemakers are installed to see if your husband needs one or not. It is entirely possible that he doesn't need one or there may be reasons why he is doing better as he is, but it would be good to have the situation clarified.

Diets for this problem are the same as for all other problems related to fatty deposits in the arteries to the heart that lead to heart attacks. If there is a weight problem it should be controlled. The fat, and particularly the saturated fat, in the diet-from mammal sources should be limited, and cholesterol found in animal foods should be limited. I'm sure your doctor can help you

DEAR DR. LAMB - Will you please explain why outward hemorrhoids itch so much. Can they become cancerous from so much rub-

DEAR READER - Internal hemorrhoids are painless, but they are the ones that bleed. The external ones are located immediately under the external skin where there is an abundant nerve supply. A hemorrhoid is just a varicose vein of the rectal area and the dilated vein can sometimes become clotted

(thrombosed) which results in swelling and irritation. This will either rupture and bleed, expelling the small clot that will form, or else it will dry up and be left as a small tag of tissue.

WASHINGTON - Russia is installing in Cuba the deadly SAM-6 antiaircraft missiles which proved so costly to the Israeli air force in the recent Sinai and Golan Heights

fighting. Despite all the high - flown talk about a U.S. - Soviet detente, the Kremlin is pouring large numbers of the lethal SAM-6s into Cuba - around 100 miles from major U.S. cities and crucial military, economic and other installations. including Cape Canavaral.

These latest missiles are in addition to hundreds of SAM-2 and SAM-3 batteries already emplaced on the Casto - ruled island

Swarms of these surface - to air missiles are deposed around Havana and other cities. airfields and naval bases - and are particularly numerous in the vicinity of Guantanamo, where the U.S. has long had a naval base

To ascertain exactly what is transpiring in the nearby heavily - armed Communist satellite, Rep. Dante Fascell, D-Fla., chairman of the Inter -American Affairs subcommittee, is launching an exhaustive inquiry. Slated to testify are key State Department, Pentagon and

other officials. Following a previous survey some time ago, Fascell, leading congressional authority on Cuba, made two highly significant findings:

(1) "Russia has a long-range strategic design for the Caribbean and Latin America, and has systematically gone about establishing bases in Cuba for a continuing naval presence in the Caribbean.

(2) Soviet building activity at Cienfuegos (several large barracks - type buildings, other structures and pier repairs) appears intended to provide Russia with an increased capability to support naval operations in the Caribbean, including submarines."

"Because the book was written by women and deals with the problems of women, but as they affect the men, as they affect the superiority of men that they have over women in Portugal, that is why they find it shocking,'

Dr. Barreno said. "If it had been written by a man there would have been no problems." She said numerous books dealing with sexual harmony and marriage are sold openly in Portugal but all are written by men and tend to the problems of ignore women.

Even in most fiction by men, Dr. Barreno said, "Love is presented as a battle which must be won by the man."

"New Portuguese Letters" are a mixture of poems, essays and letters, each written by one of the three women but unsigned and therefore, she said, the responsibility for each is collective.


