Air Force Orbits Two New Atomic Detectives

By AL ROSSITER JR. CAPE KENNEDY (UPI) -The Air Force orbited two new atomic detectives today to bolster the U. S. satellite force policing space for bootleg nuclear explosions.

The twin space sentinels raced into orbit with a third satellite. a tiny radiation research laboratory, on a single Atlas Agena

rocket that thundered into the skt at 4:27 a. m. EDT with a brilliant display of flame and smoke.

The Air Force reported 12 minutes later that all was going as planned. "It looks like we are almost on the button." an Air Force spokesman said.

The pact, signed in Moscow two years ago, outlaws all but underground tests. The space crait, each equipped are part of the Defense Department's Vela program designed to keep tabs on all nuclear explasions -- underground, in the atmosphere and in space.

The mission of the 124-pound Vela satellites is to watch for sneak blasts in space. To do it, each of the 20 sided spacecraft had 17 eyes and sensors watching in all directions for tell-tale signs of nuclear explosions.

Scientists estimate the satellites could detect detonations as small as 10 kilotons - half the force that destroyed Hiroshima 20 years ago - more than 100 million miles away in space, possibly as far as the planet Mars.

Today's satellites were streaking away from earth on a path planned to reach about 62,000 miles out in space before looping back toward the globe, Tonight, if all goes as planned, the Air Force Satellife Control Center in Sunnyvale, Calif., will trigger a basketball - sized rocket on board one of the watchdog satellites

to shoot it into a near - circular path ranging from 57,000 to 63,-000 miles above earth.

NEW YORK (UPI)-The late President Kennedy did not commit himself to the Eisenhower administration's involvement in the Bay of Pigs invasion of Cuba, but he wept when the anti-Castro strike foundered.

In the second installment of his book on the Kennedy administration appearing in Life magazine, historian Arthur Schlesinger Jr. said the vision of the men on the beaches "haunted" Kennedy-"the men who had gone off with such splendid hopes, had fought so bravely and now would be shot down like dogs or carried off to ! Castro's prisons."

Kennedy) had seen him weep were in the hospital at moments of sheer discouragement over his back; tears would fill his eyes and roll down his cheeks," Schlesinger wrote. "Now, in the bedroom, he put his head down into his hands and almost sobbed."

Schlesinger said Kennedy was informed of the previous administration's plans to back the invasion by Cuban exiles 12 days after his election. The historian said the President instructed CIA Director Allen Dulles to proceed with plans with the understanding that he was not committed to them. He later refused to call off preparations at the request of Acting Secretary of State Chester Bowles and Sen. J. William Fulbright, D-Ark, because it would have been embarrassing and disgruntled Cuban brigade leaders might have scattered throughout South America. Schlesinger said he and for-

mer Assistant Secretary of State Adolph A. Berle were sent by Kennedy to New York to tell the Cuban Revolutionary Council that there would be no support by U.S. fighting personnel in the invasion. He said the council never believed this, preferring to think that they would have the backing of 10.000 U.S. soldiers that they had been promised before Kennedy came to office.







For instance, it is certain that De Gaulle would like at that time to eliminate all the supra - national aspects of NATO.



"Tails He's Guilty!" The hour was late and the furors were weary of trying to decide whether the defendant had really committed the crime Finally one exasperated jurror proposed that they toss, a coin 'Tails he's guilty, heads he' innocent

Everyone agreed to abide by the toss. And, in obedience to the tails that turned up, they brought in a verdict of guilty But when the facts came to the attention of the court, the verdict was set aside.

For the law does not recognize coin-tossing as a legitimate method of doing the job of a jury. Nor does it recognize cutting cards or drawing lots, which jurors have also been known to try. As one court put it:

Nothing short of a free and deliberar: finding, made upon a conscientious conviction of the judgments of all the jurors, will satisfy the law.

Another shortcut, sometimes resorted to by a jury in fixing the amount of damages, is known as the "quotient verdict." In this method, each juror writes down how many dollars he recommends: Then the figures are added up and divided by 12 to get the final amount. It is true that the quotient

verdict is not as haphazard as the coin verdict. It is also true that such calcbulations could be a helpful step in the process of deliberating.

Nevertheless, courts generally frown on quotient verdicts. The main objectionable feature is the agreement, in advance, to be bound by a mathematical result - no matter how high or how low. The juror who does that abdicates his responsibility. disdains his oath, and cheats the opposing party of the "day in court" they are entitled to have.

Quite properly, jurors are reluctant to wind up deadlocked. One jury. rather than admit defeat, brought in a a verdict of "almost guilty."). And quite properly, jurors want to speed the wheels of justice.

But speed is not all-important. Of what value is a quick verdict that makes a mockery of trial by jury? Better slow justice than no justice.
