NEW YORK (UPI) - The latest shareowner census published by the New York Stock Exchange, like surveys in other fields, shows the effects of the growing population shift to what could be called major metropolitan areas.

The exchange this week released its latest, or 1965, census of shareowners, fifth in a series begun in 1952, showing the shareowner population had grown 18 per cent from the 17 million counted in 1962, to a new high of 20,120,000 individual owners early in 1965.

Duplication of holdings, among those listed on the big board, the other exchanges, on the over-the-counter market and in investment companies only, was taken into consideration by the census.
