

# Stories Vary on Johnson's Nomination for Veep

WASHINGTON (UPI) — There's a new form of vice presidential sweepstakes. You pick any one of four versions of how Lyndon B. Johnson was chosen as the No. 2 Democratic candidate in 1960. And you can't lose because the people who say they were there can't seem to agree.

Johnson agreed to be the running mate of the late John F. Kennedy after losing out in his own bid for the presidential nomination. The latest subject of political controversy in the capital. About the only thing they have in common is that Kennedy asked Johnson to run with him.

# Adlai Stevenson Dies in London

## Ambassador to U.N. Is Taken Suddenly

**BULLETIN**  
 LONDON (UPI) — Adlai E. Stevenson, twice Democratic candidate for president, collapsed today in a London street and died of an apparent heart attack. He was 65.

Stevenson, chief U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations, was in London on a private visit. He was passing the International Sportsmen's Club on Upper Grosvenor Street in Mayfair near the U.S. Embassy when he collapsed.

Stevenson was reported to have collapsed this afternoon and to have died after being taken to a hospital.

President Johnson was notified of Stevenson's death by Secretary of State Dean Rusk at 11:04 a. m. CST. Rusk, who was

## Marshall May Have Long Wait For Appointment

WASHINGTON (UPI) — If previous experience is any guide, Senate confirmation of Thurgood Marshall's appointment as the nation's first Negro solicitor general may be a long time coming.

President Johnson Tuesday named Marshall, a 57-year-old federal appeals court judge, to the No. 3 post in the Justice Department, succeeding the retiring Archibald Cox. He described Marshall as "one of the most distinguished advocates in the nation" (with) an outstanding record of legal and judicial experience."

But Marshall's appointment must be cleared first with the Senate Judicial Committee, under the chairmanship of Sen. James O. Eastland, D-Miss., before it can be confirmed by the Senate.

And when the late President John F. Kennedy named Marshall to the bench of the 2nd Federal Circuit (New York, Connecticut and Vermont) in September, 1961, it took almost a year for the nomination to be confirmed.

Southern lawmakers have not forgotten Marshall, who was the winning attorney in the Supreme Court's landmark school desegregation case of 1954. Rep. James D. Martin, R.-Ala., called his appointment "a direct affront to the South."

In his new post, Marshall, a man with a football build and a homespun manner, will be in charge of all federal cases in appellate courts and will be chief government spokesman before the Supreme Court.

The second major appointment Johnson announced Tuesday also involved a change in the image of a top government post—this time in the directorship of the U.S. Information Agency (USIA).

at the White House for a lunch had just received the word by telephone from the embassy in London.

Stevenson, U. S. ambassador to the United Nations, met earlier today with British Foreign Secretary Michael Stewart in London. He was on his way to New York from the Geneva U. N. Economic and Social Council conference. During the weekend he had met with British Prime Minister Harold Wilson.

No details of his death were immediately available. He had appeared to be in excellent health during recent activities here.

Stevenson was born in Los Angeles, Calif., Feb. 5, 1900. He was the son of Lewis Green and Helen Louise (Davis) Stevenson. He was named after his grandfather, Adlai Ewing Stevenson, vice president of the United States during the second Cleveland administration.

Stevenson attended public school at Bloomington, Ill. He graduated from Princeton University in 1922, where he was editor of the school newspaper. After graduation he worked on the Bloomington Daily Pantagraph and also studied law at Harvard and Northwestern University law school. He was admitted to the Illinois bar in 1926.

From 1923 to 1934, Stevenson served in Washington with the Agricultural Adjustment Administration. He returned to private law practice in Chicago in 1935 but was called back to Washington July 1941 — this time as special assistant and personal counsel to Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox. He worked at the job until after Knox's death on April 28, 1944.

In 1943, under an appointment by President Roosevelt, he headed a mission to Italy to plan economic support and revival of that country following the war.

A series of government jobs followed.

Served in London and European theater of war in 1944 as a member of an Air Force survey mission.

Appointed special assistant to Secretary of State Edward Stettinius to assist in reorganization of the United Nations organizations in 1945.

Appointed as a delegate to the U.N. General Assembly by President Harry S. Truman in 1946 and 1947.

In November and December of 1957, at the request of President Eisenhower, he served as consultant to the secretary of state in the preparation for the North Atlantic Treaty Council meeting in Paris.

## Chicago Authorities Wait And Watch for Mad Bomber

CHICAGO (UPI) — Authorities watched and waited today for the next move of a "mad bomber" believed to have set off three of the four major explosions to rock Chicago in the past week.

Police, disguised themselves as delinquents and common laborers in an attempt to nab the terrorist on the street before he strikes again. A reward of \$20,000 was offered for information leading to his capture.

Orlando W. Wilson, superintendent of police, said it was likely the mysterious bomber would detonate more of his terror charges.

"I find it difficult to believe that these are the acts of a normal man," Wilson said. "I am unable to ascribe any motive to these attacks. We are taking preventative measures."

The rewards of \$10,000 each were offered Tuesday night by the Chicago Tribune and the William Wrigley Co., chewing gum manufacturers whose towering White Building on North Michigan Avenue was rocked by a bomb Sunday night.

## Mariner 4 on Mars Target

PASADENA, Calif. (UPI) — The U.S. Mariner 4 spacecraft mission of Mars reaches its climax today in a historic attempt to take the first close-up photographs of the mysterious red planet.

The first crucial step in the complex picture-taking process — more than 134 million miles from earth — takes place at 9:15 a.m. CST when an electronic sensor on Mariner 4 starts searching for Mars.

Some 10 hours later, if all goes well, the spacecraft's "cosmic eye" will begin its picture-taking encounter in a 25 minute period during which 21 photographs will be snapped for transmission to earth, starting Friday.

Radio data received from Mariner 4 at earth tracking stations indicated the windmill-shaped spacecraft was on course.

"We are ready to go," said Dan Schneiderman, Mariner project manager for Caltech's Jet Propulsion Laboratory (JPL).

But scientists were at the nail-biting stage since they conceded they had no way of knowing in advance if the camera would work.

JPL Director Dr. William H. Pickering had this comment: "I don't want to sound pessimistic, but I want to admit the possibility that we may get no pictures at all."

Pickering said JPL scientists would know Thursday morning whether the photographic phase of the experiment had collected "reasonable data."

The first picture may be available to the world Friday, Pickering said.

Each picture will take eight hours and 35 minutes in transmission.

The photographic information is transmitted in digital form — ones and zeroes — and then is placed in a computer which "unscrambles" it.

Because of weight limitations, only a small radio transmitter of 10-watt power was put on board the 573-pound spacecraft. The information must be sent back literally bit by bit. Six bits of information must be received before either a one or a zero is compiled. This makes one dot on a line of 200 dots.

One picture is composed of 40,000 dots, thus accounting for the long transmission time.

Another factor in the time element is the great distance to be covered — 134 million miles. The radio signal travels at the speed of light — 186,000 miles a second — but it takes 12 minutes to reach earth.

The pictures may provide new information on the Martian terrain — features about two miles long should be visible — but even without photographs the mission is considered a scientific success.

## U.S. Army Task Force Lands in Viet Nam for Search and Kill Mission

SAIGON (UPI) — A task force of 2,976 U.S. Army combat infantrymen landed in South Viet Nam today to search out and destroy Viet Cong guerrillas operating near the Bien Hoa air base only 15 miles north of Saigon.

The infantrymen of the Army's big Red One Division bring to 71,000 the number of American armed forces in South Viet Nam. They will join an advance unit as the only Army infantrymen committed to combat in the war. U.S. Marines and paratroopers already have seen action.

Ten rounds of mortar fire struck the edge of the air base shortly before the infantrymen arrived. It was first thought to be a Viet Cong attack timed to the exact moment the troops were supposed to land but an investigation disclosed the mortar fire was part of a regular practice drill by a Vietnamese mortar unit which got off target.

Scattered incidents were reported in the Bien Hoa area today but the emphasis was on the ground war. While Navy and Air Force planes struck deep into North Viet Nam a force of 150 U.S. and South Vietnamese warplanes carried out a saturation bombing of an area near Da Nang believed to be a Viet Cong stronghold.

The Viet Cong have been increasingly active in the Da Nang area and today's massive strike, one of the largest of the war, was ordered after a series of skirmishes in which six U.S. Marines and a reported 48 Viet Cong were killed.

A full division of guerrillas was believed hidden in the dense jungles south of Da Nang. The bombs, rockets and napalm were concentrated on a two-square mile patch of jungle but the dense foliage prevented assessment of the damage.

In the air war Air Force jets hit the Son La army supply depot 125 miles northwest of Hanoi and about 80 miles from the China border. Other planes hit the Ban Xom Lam barracks 85 miles south of Hanoi, bombed communications and dropped

propaganda leaflets over Vinh, 135 miles north of the border.

In ground action a South Korean soldier was wounded when the Viet Cong opened up on a Korean patrol with machine guns near the Korean camp at Di An, 15 miles north of Saigon.

A delegation of Vietnamese newsmen was touring the camp at the time.

In an action 15 miles southwest of Saigon Vietnamese soldiers killed 15 guerrillas and captured two. The government opened a sweep and ran into 100 guerrillas, most of whom fled.

Vietnamese troops in the same area Tuesday discovered 21 Viet Cong bodies killed by U.S. planes.

Marines 10 miles southeast of Hue on the northeast coast killed one Viet Cong Tuesday and captured another. There were no Marine casualties in the operation.

The U.S. military reported that 20 Americans were killed and 52 wounded in action during the week ending Saturday. Another three were listed as missing or captured.

The government lost 285 killed, 435 wounded and 160 missing the same period. Viet Cong losses were put at 741 killed and 172 captured.

The American troops arriving today were elements of the 2nd Brigade of the famed 1st Infantry Division. They were waiting to board transport planes 55 miles from Bien Hoa when word came the base was under "attack." But they landed without incident.

A carnival has also been set in the rear of the armory and will be open coinciding with opening times of the fair.

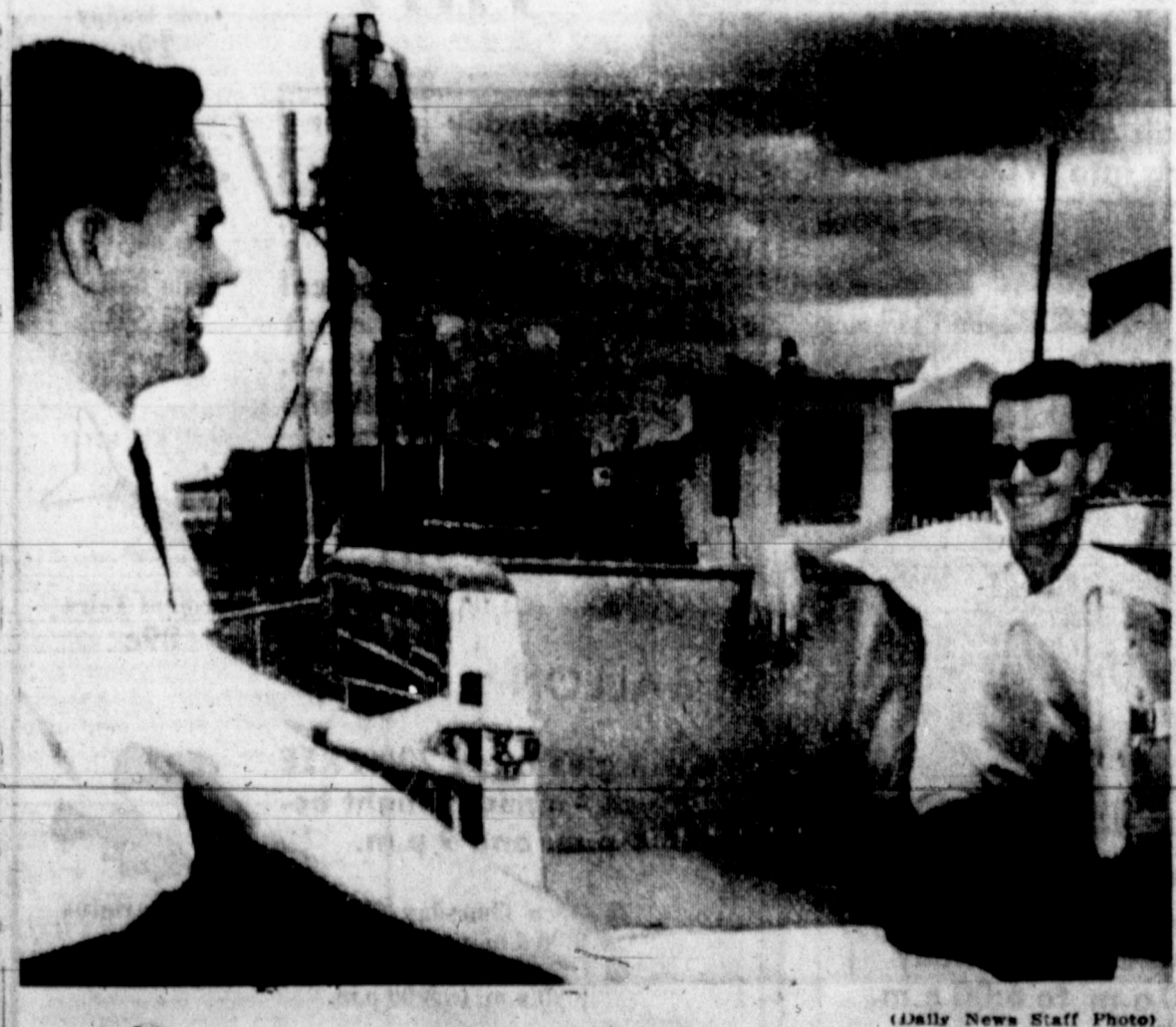
The talent show is scheduled each night of the fair.

END POSTAL SAVINGS

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The 34-year-old postal savings system, a once-booming federal activity now a pale shadow of its former self, would be eliminated under a measure approved by the House.

At its peak in 1947, postal savings had more than 4 million depositors with \$3.4 billion on deposit. But now there are less than 1 million depositors with less than \$256 million on deposit. Postal savings, which has paid 2 per cent interest since the day it began in January, 1911, has never lost money, however.

# Practical Politician Is Seldom Seen in Capital

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Backstairs at the White House: A most interesting, but seldom seen figure in Washington is the practical politician — the Republican or Democrat who can view issues and personalities dispassionately and not think in terms of heroes and villains.

He looks at candidates and issues with much more detachment and coldness than the hot-eyed zealots who show up in the volunteer or amateur sections of any political organization. The real pros seldom have real animosity toward each other. They can sit over cigars and brandies kidding each other a little.

They meet along the banquet and cocktail circuits, josh each other about such things as fundraising dinners, primaries and candidates who missed the boat. Like soldiers of fortune, they sometimes get wounded but seldom killed.

Their allegiance to national party usually is lifelong, more as a way of life and income than deep emotional fervor for specific and often ephemeral policies or issues. The seasoned pro can end often does switch men, but not parties.

Two such pros — one Republican, another Democratic — met at a party here recently and

fell to musing over the future. The Republican thought his side would pick up some seats in Congress next year. The Democrat conceded this usually happens in non-presidential years but he did not expect the party's 1966 losses to be of such nature as to threaten the presently substantial Democratic majority in both houses.

The most interesting part of their casual bull session had to do with President Johnson and Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, D-N.Y. Neither pro professed to have any inside knowledge. Both men were operating on information and comment in the public domain.

By independent avenues, they arrived at the same conclusion: An educated guess that in 1968, if not before, the brother of the late President will undertake some line of action to establish himself as a power within the national Democratic Party. Both pros agreed this strategy in any form would be regarded as a frontal Kennedy challenge to the Johnson dominance in party affairs.

They, by no means, believed that the junior senator from New York would seek to challenge Johnson for re-nomination in 1968. But they agreed casually he would attempt to establish himself as an unquestioned power within the party. Both pros reasoned that such a Ken-

## Many Reasons for Car Accidents

WASHINGTON (NEA) — As long ago as 1910, when the only two automobiles in Kansas City collided with each other, men of conscience realized that something had to be done about traffic safety.

Something has been done but not nearly enough, in the opinion of many concerned with driving safety. Anyone who doesn't agree need only refer to the death toll on this year's Fourth of July holiday weekend.

Poor roads, bad drivers and unsafe cars are all part of the nation's hell-on-wheels.

Roads have been paved with good intentions and made wider and handsomer, yet "Too often the road and traffic situation facing them (the drivers) is just more than they can handle," according to Sen. Abraham Ribicoff (D-Conn.), who is one of the leaders in the national fight to curb death on wheels.

Driver education has improved and become more widespread and every state now requires an examination for a driver's license but "The license is sometimes little more than an identification card, occasionally useful when cashing checks,"

maintains Paul V. Joliet, M.D. "In one state it costs less than a fishing license, is valid three times as long, is easier to obtain and can be renewed indefinitely by mail," continues the chief of the Division of Accident Prevention of the U.S. Public Health Service. "Possession of a driver's license in that state does not insure that one can see, move, or think — let alone drive."

Cars have been improved structurally — "Nobody tries to make an unsafe automobile," as one manufacturer points out — but Sen. Ribicoff is firmly of the opinion that "One of the great spawms of modern society and industry is the failure of the automobile industry to put well-known, well-tested and well-accepted safety standards into automobiles as standard equipment."

Tires have been made much safer since the days when a pinprick would cause instant collapse but "Many new cars come equipped with tires which are not adequate, even for normal use and even sizes stamped on tires do not tell the actual size and were never intended to do so," according to Sen. Gaylord Nelson (D-Wis.), who is pressing the tire manufacturers to

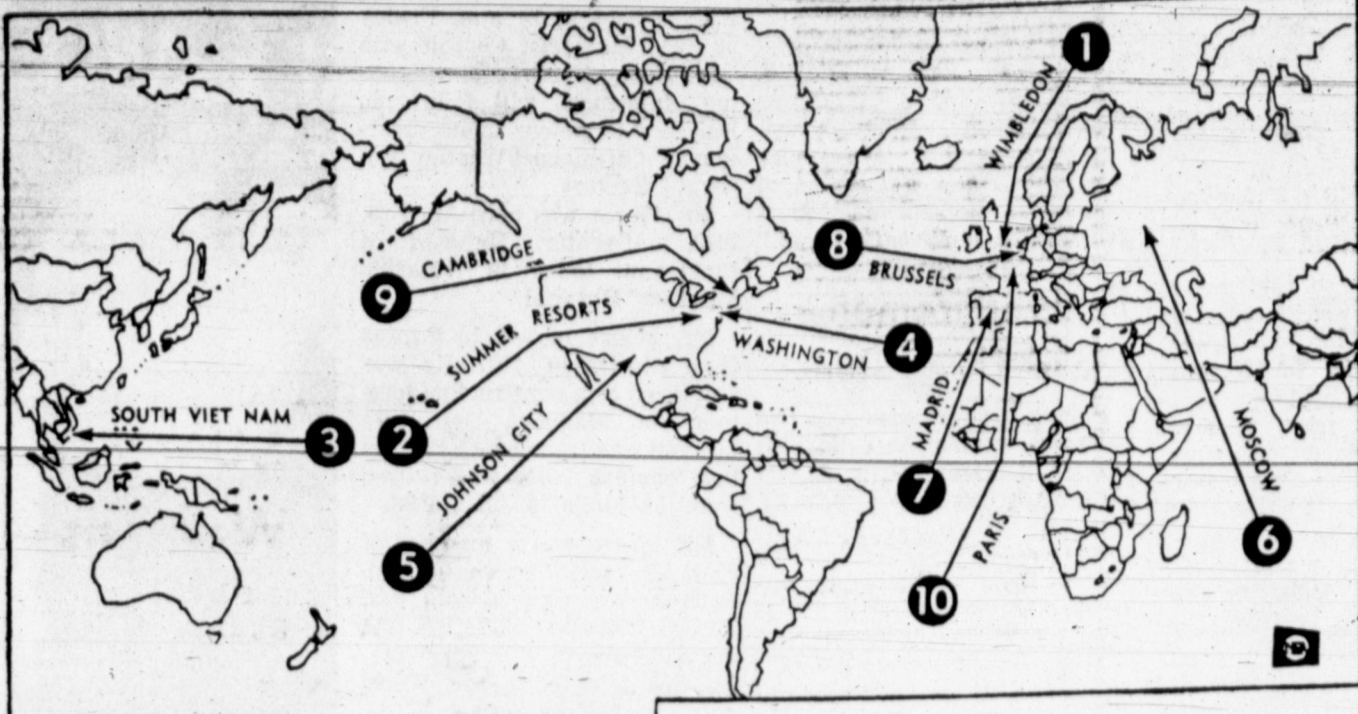

### Foreign Commentary

PARIS (UPI) — Europeans are asking themselves whether French President Charles de Gaulle has set out to kill the European Common Market.

Diplomats believe, rather, that he may have undertaken to try to re-mould the whole project.

The biggest crisis in the history of the eight-year-old six-nation trading group blew up in a Brussels meeting at midnight June 30.

The six Common Market nations—France, West Germany, Italy, Belgium, Netherlands and Luxembourg—long ago set that as their deadline for agreement on the financial conditions under which a common market would be established for farm produce parallel to that already existing for industrial goods.

The talks broke down on two main issues:

—France's partners insisted a financial agreement should be coupled with one to push ahead again on plans for European political unity, which have been at standstill for more than three years. The French rejected any such political commitment.

—The French wanted the financial agreement on farm prices to last for five years. The Italians insisted on a review after three.

Nearly Total Boycott

As a result, France withdrew her ambassador to the European Economic Community (EEC) in Brussels, announced she would not attend any future meetings of Common Market ministers and also decided to stay away from all similar talks among EEC officials.

The French action, amounting almost to a total boycott, brought the EEC or Common Market to a dead halt. Since all its decisions still must be unanimous, any progress by the Common Market became impossible.

French officials assert De Gaulle took this action because he felt his partners had gone back on a three-year-old pledge to agree on financing the agricultural Common Market by June 30 this year.

There is no sign when or whether he is likely to relent.

Blocked Great Britain

The only Common Market crisis or remotely the same seriousness exploded in January, 1963, when De Gaulle black-balled Great Britain from membership of the six-nation trading organization.

It long has been an open secret that De Gaulle dislikes the Common Market. In particular, he objects to its supra-national aspects and to the fact that its executive commission of international civil servants can take decisions that bind French economic policy.

At the moment France still enjoys a veto right in the commission. But by next year all decisions will be by majority vote and De Gaulle might find himself regularly outvoted by his partners.

For this reason some have thought De Gaulle took this drastic action because he decided now is his last chance to kill something he dislikes.

French officials deny this.

Other diplomats believe De Gaulle's aim is to use the crisis to remodel the Common Market entirely so as to eliminate the supra-national aspects and to convert it into a simple free-trading association.

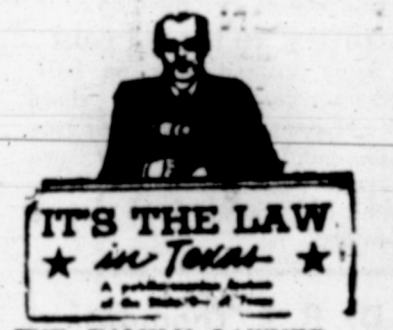

**THE FAMILY LAWYER**  
 To the wage earner drowning in a sea of debt, the Bankruptcy Act offers two kinds of rescue. One is bankruptcy itself, whereby most of a person's debts are wiped out. Last year about 155,000 individuals chose that course.

The second alternative, although not so well known, has been gaining favor steadily in recent years. Called the Wage Earner Plan, it is designed for the person who is ready, willing, and able (eventually) to pay his debts—if only he can have a breathing spell to put his finances in better shape.

Although the Wage Earner Plan is administered by the bankruptcy court, the debtor continues to be called a "debtor"—never a "bankrupt." In a typical case it works this way: The debtor agrees to turn over a fixed percentage of his weekly wages to a court-appointed trustee, who makes regular payments to the creditors. In return, the debtor is protected from wage attachments and most other forms of pressure by creditors.

In short, the Wage Earner Plan gives a debtor time to pay his debts gradually, under the protecting wing of the court. It requires an OK by a majority of the unsecured creditors, and also by the court.

Under what circumstances will the court approve a debtor's application? There are two main tests.

1) Financial—The debtor's earnings must be large enough, in proportion to his debt burden, to give a reasonable chance of success. As a rule, the court will approve only if his debts can be paid off in not more than three years, using not more than 25 per cent of his income.

2) Moral—The debtor must have an earnest desire to make good on his obligations, even at the cost of prolonged belt-tightening and penny-pinching. And, in most cases, his wife must share that desire.

The Wage Earner Plan is not an easy alternative. Nevertheless, last year about 27,000 debtors chose that way of keeping the stigma of bankruptcy from their record.

He dropped behind in the final round however, tallying 39 for a 76 and 147 total.

In addition to McDonald, others who finished at 146 in the qualifier were Sonny Ewing of Dallas, Tex.; Rich Hevl of Falls Church, Va.; Wendell Kop of Honolulu; Hubert Farmer of Toledo, Ohio; Les Wimp of Tempe, Ariz.; and Ronald Greenback of San Francisco.

The Warren G. Harding Cup competition for three men teams, decided during the qualifier, went to Phoenix, Arizona's squad of Bill Farkas, Jr., Tom Schenke and Richard Taylor. Their aggregate score was 445.

Thus began the fabulous record that has seen no one cross the Pennsy goal line in four previous games. The Coal Cracker blanked the All-Americans, 6-0, in 1960, shut them out again, 18-0 in 1961, then fought the national stars to a scoreless deadlock during a heavy rain in 1962.

**Tested Texans**  
After a year off against outside competition, the Pennsy lads took on the Texans last year and edged out a 12-6 victory on an 80-yard punt return in the closing minutes after James Russell (Hurst Bell) had kicked two field goals to tie the game, 6-6.

It's still a little early to establish either team as a favorite this year, but another down-to-the-gun contest is certainly in the making.

Just as the Texans have been dubbed the favorites in the weight department, the Pennsy stars hold the edge in statistics.

While the 12-member backfield and six ends from Texas have scored 171 touchdowns and ran and passed for 43,133 yards, the outfit from Pennsy (called the best team ever assembled) has run and passed for 16,137 yards and was responsible for 209 touchdowns as seniors last year.

**Not So Hefty**  
Therefore, the Texan weight advantage of 15½ pounds per man doesn't seem quite so big. The Texas average weight is 219 while the Pennsy average is 203½.

Three members of the backfield figure largely in the Texas figures. Fullback George Danford (Waco-Moore) leads the scoring parade with 126 points, including 20 touchdowns and six extra points.

# National League Takes All-Star Edge, Wins 6-5

## Single Decides Battle of HRs

MINNEAPOLIS (UPI) — A single, a rather cheap one, decided what had been a battle of home runs and gave the National League the All-Star lead over the American League for the first time.

"We'll take 'em any way we can get 'em," said National League manager Gene Mauch of the Phillies, who succeeded in getting his league on top in this mid-summer competition which started back in 1933.

"We killed them early with home runs and then we won it with an infield hit," he grinned.

The man who got that hit, third baseman Ron Santo of the Cubs, and Willie Mays, the Giants centerfielder who scored the winning run on it, were among the National League heroes in their 6-5 defeat of the American League in Tuesday's 36th All-Star contest before a crowd of 46,706 in Metropolitan Stadium, home of the Minnesota Twins.

It was the National's 18th triumph against 17 defeats and one tie and it climaxed a long uphill climb for the senior circuit. The N. L. once trailed the American League 12 games to four, but Tuesday's triumph was its seventh in the last nine games.

**Mays Breaks Records**  
Mays, appearing in his 12th consecutive All-Star contest, played a major role in the National League's historic victory. He set an All-Star record for 21 hits with his third All-Star homer in the first inning, then extended one of his own marks by scoring his 17th run and later in the game his 18th—the biggest one of them all.

There were no goats for a change, although pitcher Jim Maloney of the Reds, who squandered a five run lead, came pretty close to being one. And a home town favorite, Harmon Killebrew of the Twins could have been the hero.

He had hit a home run in the fifth inning to put the American League into a 5-5 tie, but in the ninth he struck out with the tying run on second base.

"We gave 'em all we had," said Al Lopez of the White Sox. "It wasn't quite enough. It was a helluva game but there's nothing you can do about that ball that Santo hit. It's a shame to lose on a hit like that but that's baseball."

What hurt manager Lopez, too, was the fact that the hit resulted in his sixth loss with an American League All-Star team and he's without a single victory.

The turning point of the game was that Santo hit and the clutch pitching of Bob Gibson of the Cardinals in the eighth and ninth innings.

**Santo Breaks Tie**  
Santo's hit came in the seventh inning with the score tied 5-5. What had looked like a National League home run romp had disappeared when the American League started hitting the ball out of the park.

Mays, who had started the game with a home run, walked to lead off the seventh with left hander Sam McDowell of the Indians pitching for the A. L.

Hank Aaron of the Braves rapped a single to center and Mays, playing despite a bruised side, raced to third. He stayed there as pinch-hitter Roberto Clemente of the Pi-

rates grounded out to third baseman Brooks Robinson.

Robinson could have gone for a double play, but elected to get only one man instead to make sure Mays held third.

Then Santo hit a bouncing ground ball toward second base. Neither shortstop Zoilo Versalles nor second-baseman Bobby Richardson could handle it and Wondrous Willie raced home with the big run—the biggest the N. L. ever has scored in All-Star competition.

Versalles got his glove on the ball to stop it from going into center field, picked it up and rifled a throw to first, but it was too late to get Santo, who had come into the game as a replacement for Richie Allen of the Phillies.

The National League, thanks to pitchers Dick Farrell of the Astros and Gibson, made that run stand up.

**Nationals Start Fast**

The National League had started out like it was going to make a shambles of the game. After Mays drove the second pitch by Milt Pappas of the Orioles into the new pavilion at Metropolitan Stadium as the leadoff man of the game, Willie Stargell of the Pirates singled and with two out scored when Torre hit a home run, also into the pavilion.

Lopez decided that was enough for Pappas and sent Jim (Mudcat) Grant of the Twins to the mound in the second inning. Grant yielded a single to Juan Marichal, the starting National League pitcher, and walked Mays. He got Hank Aaron to hit into a double play, but then Stargell lined another home run into the pavilion and the National League was in front, 5-0.

Marichal allowed only one hit in the three innings he pitched and wound up being voted the most valuable player of the game, nosing out Mays by one vote, 46 to 45.

Maloney followed Marichal to the mound and ran into rough going right away. Shortstop Dick McAuliffe singled, went to second when Killebrew walked, and scored on Rocky Colavito's single.

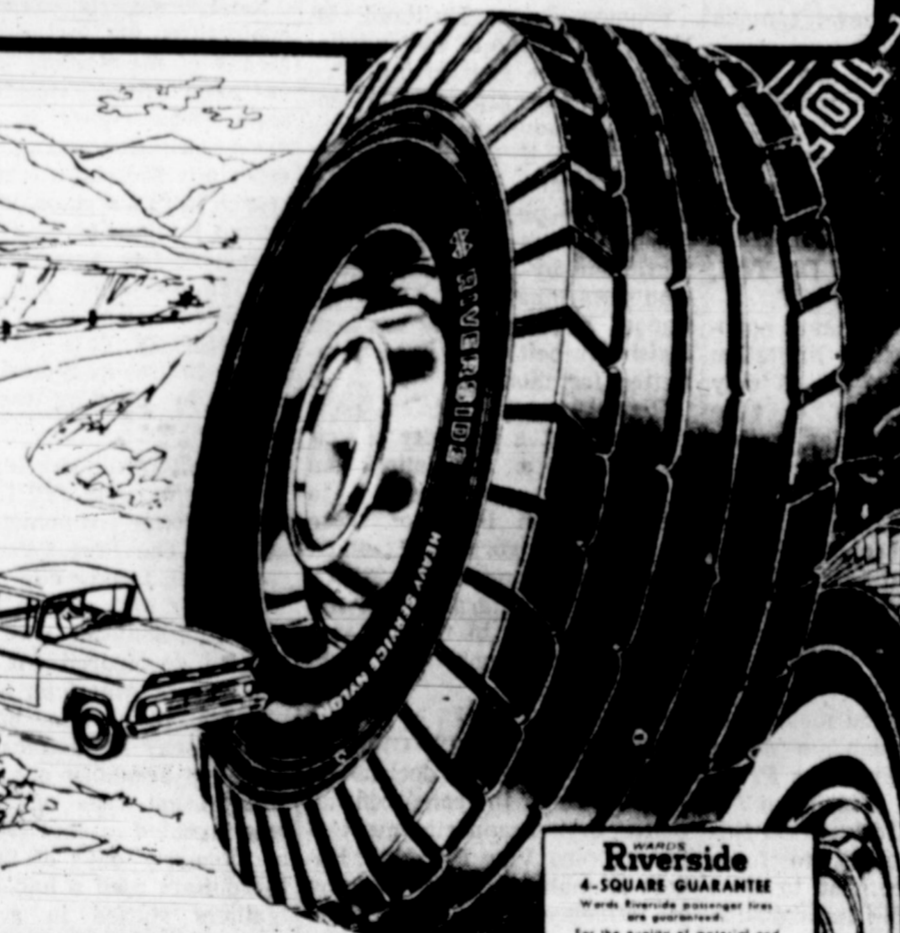

### Backstage Washington

Congressional Battle Looms over Immigration: Worldwide Ceiling and Funds for Feighan's Study of Whole Program

WASHINGTON — The initial voting on President Johnson's controversial immigration program points to a slam-bang congressional battle over whether a drum-tight ceiling will be placed on the number of immigrants allowed to enter the U.S. each year.

While the House Immigration Subcommittee privately voted 3 to 1 to support the President's request for repeal of the country - by - country quota system over a three-year period, its members deadlocked on putting a rigid limitation on the program.

A test motion by Representative Michael Feighan, D-O., chairman, to limit immigration to 300,000, approximately 15,000 more than entered the U.S. in 1964, was defeated by a 4 to 1 vote.

Representative William Cahill, R-N.M., ninth and swing member of the subcommittee didn't vote, although present at the closed-door meeting. He later explained, "I haven't made up my mind."

Favoring the ceiling were Representatives Feighan, Frank Chelf, D-Ky., Arch Moore Jr., R-W. Va., and Clark MacGregor, R-Minn. Opposed were Representatives Peter Rodino Jr., D-N.M., Harold Donohue, D-Mass., Jack Brooks, D-Tex., and Jacob Gilbert, D-N.Y.

Both supporters and opponents of the 300,000 limitation regard the 4 to 1 tie as only an initial indication of the strength of both sides rather than a showdown vote. Other proposals, ranging from ceilings of 305,000 to 350,000 are to be offered in the subcommittee and on the House and Senate floors.

NO THIRD TERM AMENDMENT

Interior Secretary Harold Ickes wrote, "22nd Amendment Lags" published in New Republic, January 1951:

"During 1947 the no-third term amendment got off to a good start. It was ratified by the legislatures of 18 states. In 1948 three more followed suit.

But the best that the 'saviors of the Constitution' could do in 1949 was, like the mountain, 'to conceive and bring forth a mouse' in the two Dakotas. Louisiana followed suit in 1950, making 24 states that have ratified an amendment which proponents insisted was necessary to prevent the creation of an American royalty dynasty of absolute power with a 'crown prince' who by right of descent would succeed to the throne upon the death or abdication of the reigning sovereign. An equal number have not ratified."

I was appalled that this great provision for rotation in our highest office might die. Never before had an amendment been ratified four years after being submitted to the State Legislatures.

I began writing or phoning state legislators who were in session and writing articles to newspapers widely read in their states.

In Arkansas both Houses had that year rejected the 22nd Amendment. I previously lived in Arkansas and persuaded members of the Arkansas Legislature to reconsider. Both Houses promptly ratified. This news helped.

I circulated maps showing progress as either house of any state ratified. I reminded the public of the many mothers and teachers who had told a little boy, "Some day you may be President."

U. S. Senator Pat McCarran told me Nevada wanted to be the 36th state, and they ratified one hour after Utah. Seven weeks after my start the 22nd Amendment became the law of the land. Senators Harry Byrd and James Eastland asked me to continue my efforts, but I did not believe it could ever be repealed.

Without its ratification Harry Truman or Dwight Eisenhower would no doubt be President today.

### What's the Pitch In Puerto Rico?

Private word from San Juan indicates that anti-American, pro-independence elements in Puerto Rico may be building secret strength within the new Popular Democratic administration of Gov. Roberto Sanchez Velella.

One source says that these elements are now so well established that Sanchez is "very close to being their prisoner."

The potential significance of these reports far outweighs that of recent accounts which suggested that the tiny Independence party got a recruiting lift from wide Puerto Rican disenchantment over U.S. intervention in the Dominican Republic.

The impact of the Dominican affair is said to be real enough—but not of major consequence. Even in the unlikely event that the Independence party's numbers were doubled, they would still represent less than 6 per cent of the Puerto Rican electorate.

What is happening inside the Sanchez government is a matter of the greatest import for the island's future. It is known only to a few people in Puerto Rico. And it represents a stunning surprise.

Sanchez, who piled up more than 60 per cent of the vote in winning election on the moderate Popular Democratic ticket last fall, was the personal choice of the then Gov. Luis Munoz Marin, the widely revered architect of Puerto Rico's political and economic advances.

That party, long heavily dominant in island politics, is committed to maintenance and improvement of Puerto Rico's so-called commonwealth status. This is a hybrid allowing substantial autonomy but stopping well short of independence.

Sanchez, for 14 years Munoz's chief of staff as secretary of state, was expected to follow his mentor's programs and policies, and this he has done in his first six months.

He has lived up to no other principal expectations. Not once has he consulted with Munoz. His presumed desire to be his own man hardly seems to justify a total freeze-out. Furthermore, Sanchez has had virtually no dealings with the established Popular Democratic leaders in the Puerto Rican legislature.

Instead, the governor has made a series of appointments of young, independence-minded leftish Puerto Rican intellectuals.

These men form what is being called "the Group of 22." Their real leader is a 28-year-old Garcia Passalacqua, a special assistant Sanchez.

Most significant of all, two cabinet members and one other top appointee are reliably reported to have served earlier as intimate advisers of Huberto Conception de Gracia, head of the Independence party. These three cannot be named here.

Since independence has only minor support on the island, "the Group of 22" has no practical base. "In a test at the polls, they couldn't win a barrio (election district)," says one source.

Their position inside the governor's compound is, however, regarded with the deepest concern by Munoz and those few others who see what is happening.

At the moment there is no overt action. Even with the "embarrassment" felt by many Puerto Ricans over the Dominican matter, the political climate on the island is said to be largely unfavorable to major moves toward independence.

# Flash Point Breached in Viet Propaganda

The flash point has been breached in the appeasement propaganda to persuade the United States to scuttle and run from hot war in Viet Nam. This propaganda has been ceaseless. The bass drum beat for negotiation and an end to the war in Viet Nam sounds from the intellectual commu-

nity, from the front fighters for racial equality, from citizens organized and unorganized. Negotiate, end the war, get out—this is the theme song of appeasement. It is almost overpowering. What the average, worried U.S. citizen should remember is that not all of this propaganda is a sincere expression of an honestly patriotic

point of view. Not at all. Every individual and institution in the United States, subject for any reason whatever to Communist influence, is active in the negotiate-and-get-out-propaganda.

**Red Propaganda**  
Those citizens who are not touched by Communist influence cannot complain if it is remarked that their propaganda coincides so well with the propaganda of communism. It must be assumed that the good Americans who demand negotiate-and-get-out have considered the fact that they and the Communies are in step and that they reject such coincidence as being of importance.

These patriotic Americans who demand that the United States scuttle and run from Viet Nam are like the patriotic but

frightened Englishmen who sold Czechoslovakia to Hitler in exchange for "peace in our time." The parallel is a good one. These patriotic Americans argue that we must not escalate the war in Viet Nam lest we invite on our homes a shower of World War III nuclear bombs.

**Appeased Hitler**  
So did the pre-war British demand appeasement of Hitler to keep his bomber fleets out of the overhead skies. So have bullies abused the fearful since the beginning of time.

Now the appeasers use a powerful argument for scuttle-and-run in Viet Nam. It is the argument that the United States should never commit itself to ground warfare against Asiatic soldiers.

The casualty lists will underscore this argument against winning the Viet Nam war. The United States—the Johnson administration—is trapped. It is trapped in a long war. This is a war the United States can win but also a war likely to become so unpopular that the American people will refuse to win it—or worse, it will become so hazardous that the politicians will lack courage to try to win it.

**Quotes Churchill**  
Either way would be a retreat toward earth-bound Armageddon in which the evil legions would have a much improved opportunity to triumph. Patriotic Americans, teach-in exhibitionists and such should read again Sir Winston Churchill's argument against appeasement: "If you will not fight for the right when you can easily win without bloodshed, if you will not fight when victory will be sure and not too costly; you

may come to the moment when victory because it is better to perish than to live as slaves. The American patriots who demand a Viet Nam scuttle-and-run should consider Churchill's words in the light of his proven good judgment.

Suppose we scuttle-and-run from Viet Nam. Then what? Then where do we next defend our way of life against communism? On the beaches, perhaps, and in the fields and on the streets!

## Oldsmobile To Show Toronado

DETROIT (UPI)—Oldsmobile will introduce this fall an automobile called the Toronado. It will be the first American production car with front-wheel drive since the old Cord of the 1930s.

It already has become the most talked-about car in the industry, even though it won't go on sale for three months.

The Toronado will appear as a 1965 model car in a class with the Buick Riviera and Ford Thunderbird. It will probably cost about \$4,500.

The car was shown for the first time to newsmen last week at the General Motors proving grounds in Milford, 30 miles northwest of here.

Details were not supposed to be released until September, but the information was published prematurely last week.

The car has been the subject of many rumors and much speculation for more than a year.

It will appear in only one model—a sleek-looking, six-passenger hardtop. It has a long hood and fast-sloping rear roof line.

But the unique feature of the car is its front-wheel drive American cars, with the exception of the rear-engine Corvair, have a drive shaft tunnel from the engine in the front to the differential in the rear. The power is delivered to the rear wheels.

But on the new Olds, all the running gear—engine, transmission and differential—is placed up front. Thus, the front wheels pull the car.

Newsmen who saw the car last week had high praise for it. One writer said it "gives the driver a feeling of stability and security not found in most standard cars."
